# What's happened at the Orion Theatre Campsie?

A few days after our last show at the Orion we learned of a problem with the hoist.

Initially the fault was diagnosed as a broken seal and there certainly was a lot of oil in the liftwell.

However when the lift mechanics investigated further it was found that water had infiltrated the area and the resultant rust had created additional problems necessitating some repairs.

As most know, the building is owned by Council and the hoist is their responsibility. We have been in regular contact with their representative and until 21st July it was stated the repairs would be completed in time for our August show. Fortunately, as it happened, we did not share the confidence of the Council and had booked Marrickville Town Hall for 8th August, "just in case".

It has now been found that the cost of repair would exceed the cost of a new hoist and Council is awaiting receipt of quotes after which all those associated bureaucratic matters require attention.

We do not know how long the Orion Wurlitzer will be out of action but will keep you informed of developments as and when they occur. Meanwhile the Committee is investigating the possibility of some maintenance work on the orion

Wurlitzer during this period. The inconvenience caused to you, our members, is regretted and your understanding, appreciated.

# Review of the Ryan Heggie and Glenn Amer show Sunday 16 May 2010 at the Orion Theatre

I don't wish to circumvent the role of the reviewer of the Ryan Heggie/Glenn Amer show at the Orion Theatre on Sunday 16th of May, but I would like to contribute my views on the two artists. I left the showmusically satiated, - that is to say that I felt that I had really enjoyed listening to two artists of a very high musical calibre.

Ryan's performance was superb in that he chose items from a wide range of musical styles and eras. He played with a muscial sensitivity and craftsmanship that belied the fact that he is currently living in a country town not exactly blessed with Wurlitzer organs, and therefore doesn't have the opportunity to familiarise himself with the scope of the Orion's instrument.

His arrangements were simple yet elegant, and didn't depend upon the sheer level of sound of which the instrument is capable. His arrangement of Saint-Saen's "Clair de Lune" was simply delightful.





Glenn Amer's contributions to the program were similarly a delight. His piano playing was accurate and impressive without resorting to the inaccurate flamboyance so often demonstrated by lesser artists. Glenn's singing voice was likewise a pleasure to listen to, note perfect

and with just the right amount of phrasing variations to suit the particular piece.

Well done Ryan and Glenn and well done TOSA(NSW) for arranging such a successful pairing for the show.

# Working on iconic instrument no grind for these experts

It's sweet music to a chimney sweep's ears -- for the next three years they will be cleaning 8,756 pipes on one of the world's biggest organs.

About \$40 million of renovations to the Sydney Town Hall -- and 30 years of dust -- have left the soaring pipes of the Grand Organ dirty and falling out of tune.

A team of seven organ experts led by Peter Jewkes, the managing director of Pipe Organ Builders, Tuners and Restorers, will clean, tune and repair the pipes.

Some are as small as pencils while others stretch to 64ft tall (organs are measured in imperial, never metric).

Tuning the grand old lady has been diligently performed by 71-year-old Manuel da Costa for the past three decades and the City of Sydney council feared it would not be able to find a replacement [tuner] when he retired.

"We are only the fourth company to maintain it in 120 years, which is a nice little tradition," Mr Jewkes said.

"It did get grubby during the renovations -- this will keep it speaking properly. It's the loudest organ in Australia in sheer decibels and it has wonderful range. It can roar, it can whisper quietly."

Once "sounding first class again", Mr Jewkes will measure every pipe and digitally record every note.

"So if it did ever burn down, we could rebuild it," he said.

The organ was built to be the masterpiece in one of the finest buildings of the 19th century.

"It was a symbol of hope for the economy for old Sydney town, which was a big statement back then," Mr Jewkes said.

"It was built to play orchestral music, the music of the day."

## **VALE ROSA RIO**

Rosa Rio, Organist From Silent Films to Soap Operas, Dies at 107

On Oct. 6, 1927, the day "The Jazz Singer" splashed noisily across American movie screens, Rosa Rio broke down and wept. Al Jolson was talking, and the very sound of him, she knew, would put her out of business.

But Miss Rio's fears went unrealized, and for the next eight decades

 until her final performance, last year — she built a career as one of the country's premier theater organists.

Miss Rio was undoubtedly among the very last to have played the silent-picture houses, accompanying the likes of Chaplin, Keaton and Pickford on the Mighty Wurlitzer amid velvet draperies, gilded rococo walls and vaulted ceilings awash in stars. She was also one of the few women to have made her way in a field dominated by men.

Miss Rio died on Thursday, less than three weeks before her 108th birthday. The death, at her home in Sun City Center, Fla., was confirmed by her husband, Bill Yeoman.

For the silents, Miss Rio provided music — often improvised — to set moods that images alone could not: the footsteps of a cat burglar, the sighs of young lovers and the dreadful roar of the oncoming train as the heroine flailed on the tracks. When silents gave way to talkies, she became a ubiquitous presence on the radio; when radio yielded to television, she played for daytime serials. The Queen of the Soaps, the newspapers called her.

In Miss Rio's career one can trace the entire history of entertainment technology in the 20th century. After all, she was alive, and playing, for nearly all of it.

Midcentury Americans could scarcely touch a dial without hearing Miss Rio. As the staff organist of the NBC radio network from the late 1930s to 1960, and an occasional organist for ABC Radio, she provided live music for a spate of popular shows, including "The Shadow," starring a trim Orson Welles, and "The Bob and Ray Show." Her television credits include "As the World Turns" and the "Today" show.

In recent years, long after television dispensed with live organists, Miss Rio accompanied silent films at some of the nation's tenderly restored movie houses. She was most closely associated with the Tampa Theater in Florida, a lavish picture palace built in 1926.

Several times a year Miss Rio would rise from beneath the stage there, seated at the organ in sequined evening gown, diamond rings and gold lamé slippers. As she wafted majestically upward, the room shook with her signature tune, "Everything's Coming Up Roses," or, as she much preferred to call it, "Everything's Coming Up Rosa."

Borne on a wave of cinematic nostalgia, Miss Rio had come blissfully full circle.

Miss Rio was born on June 2, 1902. Her maiden name and birth-place have been lost to time; her given name was Elizabeth and she was reared in New Orleans. She began calling herself Rosa Rio — a name narrow enough to fit neatly on a theater marquee — early in her career.

**Simon's** first experience of the theatre pipe organ was hearing the late Ernest Broadbent play the Mighty Wurlitzer at Blackpool's Tower Ballroom. In 1982 he entered and won the Northern Young Theatre Organist of the Year competition. Nigel Ogden, presenter of BBC Radio 2's The Organist Entertains, was in the audience, and invited him to make some recordings for the programme on the BBC theatre organ at the Playhouse Studio in Manchester.

The broadcasts resulted in a flurry of concert offers, and **Simon** has since performed at all the major theatre organ venues in Britain, as well as touring in Germany, Holland, Australia, Canada and the USA. There have been 11 appearances at Annual and Regional Conventions of the American Theatre Organ Society.

At 8, Elizabeth began piano lessons and immediately decided on a show business career. This, her parents made clear, was no fit occupation for a proper Southern girl.

She persevered, and her parents relented a little. Playing in church would be fine, they decided. So would the genteel life of a children's piano teacher. With these callings in mind, Elizabeth entered the Oberlin College Conservatory in Ohio.

She chafed there until the day she visited a Cleveland movie palace and heard a theater organ for the first time. Not long afterward, she transferred to the Eastman School of Music in Rochester, which had a program in silent-film accompanying.

Miss Rio's first marriage, to John Hammond, an organist, ended in divorce. She is survived by her second husband, Mr. Yeoman, whom she married in 1947; three grand-children; and nine great-grandchildren. A son, John Hammond III, died several years ago.

In the 1920s, Miss Rio played in movie houses around the country before being hired by the Fox Theater in Brooklyn. Then came Jolson, and she found supplementary work as an accompanist and vocal coach. One of her clients was an unknown singer named Mary Martin, whom Miss Rio accompanied on her successful audition for the Cole Porter musical "Leave It to Me!" (1938), Martin's Broadway debut.

At NBC, Miss Rio played for as many as two dozen radio shows a week, often with just 60 seconds between shows to bolt from one studio to another. On Sept. 1, 1939, the day Germany invaded Poland, she was summoned to work at 2 a.m. For the next 10 hours, she performed somber music between news bulletins. After the United States entered the war, she had her own show, "Rosa Rio Rhythms," broadcast to American troops overseas.

Radio of the period was a roughand-tumble world — a man's world. Miss Rio gave as good as she got.

As recounted in Leonard Maltin's book "The Great American Broadcast: A Celebration of Radio's Golden Age" (Dutton, 1997), she was playing a show at NBC one day when the announcer, Dorian St. George, crept up behind her, undid the buttons down the back of her blouse and unhooked her bra. Miss Rio, performing live before a gallery of visitors, could do nothing but play on.

When the music stopped, Mr. St. George stepped up to the microphone to do a commercial. As he intoned plummily with the gallery looking on, Miss Rio stole up behind him, unbuckled his belt, unzipped his fly and neatly dropped his trousers. Then, according to Mr. Maltin's book, she started on his undershorts.

What happened next is unrecorded.

# The First Church of the Nazarene 3/20 Wurlitzer, Spokane, WA

from Tuba Mirabilis by Jonathan Gradin

Dave Wickerham -- artist-in-residence at the famed Milhous Museum collection in Boca Raton, Florida -- gave an excellent concert Monday afternoon, June 28, to a nearly full house. 214 people arrived from Seattle on the buses; several drove or took their own transportation from Seattle; many locals attended.

The organ behaved itself very well, considering the soon-to-be-replaced console; the only major problem --- which Wickerham deftly worked around --- was that the Solo Chrys-

oglott stayed on toward the end.

After opening remarks by Ken Double, ATOS President and CEO, Wickerham --- appearing resplendent in a black coat over a colorful vest and white shirt --- opened with a rousing medley of "Cheek to Cheek" and "I'm in Heaven." I was just short of the Pearly Gates, though, because my camera died just before he started playing and I didn't have a back up battery.

Anyway, the song went well and displayed the theatre organ ensemble and reed sounds that have been coming together very nicely recently with tonal finishing by Ron Mitchell and Lyn Larsen.

"[The organ] gave me a big hug!"
Dave said. In honor of Hoopfest,
held over the weekend, Wickerham
played "Sweet Georgia Brown,"
theme song of the Harlem Globetrotters. This jazzy tune allowed
the exhibition of many of the organ's percussion and solo voices;
Dave is a master at jazz-band style
playing.

Ken and Carol Fuller, Spokane First Nazarene's organist and pianist respectively, celebrated 50 years of playing for First Nazarene last year. Dave honored their commitment with two of their favorites in a medley: "My Funny Valentine" and "Moonlight in Vermont," both of which were ecstatically received by the (mostly) above -50 crowd.

Next a demonstration of the Tuned Doorbells, excuse me, Saucer Bells followed in a sprightly 1920s song "Playmate," the chorus of which sounded remarkably similar to another old favorite, "Red Wing." The other bells received a workout.

To show how well suited the instrument --- with its more orchestral voicing --- is to liturgical use, especially with gospel/old-time hymns sung by the Nazarenes, he played a medley of "His Eye is on the Sparrow" and "Great is Thy Faithfulness," the former of which he had used as his offertory on Sunday. This brought a great reaction, particularly from the church members and leaders, who are growing more appreciative of the organ.

Wickerham changed pace with "Midnight in Mayfair" rendered a la British organist Sidney Torch. While technically and harmonically very interesting, it was very easy listening, not an example of "ear aerobics" as some TPO showpieces seem to be.

First Nazarene organ curator, Clint Meadway and his wife will celebrate their 50th wedding anniversary next month, so Dave graced them with a smooth, flowing medley of "Moon River" and "Always," which was followed by a very snazzy, extremely well received medley that included "It's De-Lovely."

The highlight of the concert was a multifaceted arrangement of the "Bells of St. Mary's," originally composed in 1914, the same year the organ was built, then featured some 30 years later in a Bing Crosby film of the same name. Wickerham's rendition included

some tasteful uses of the bells, as well as many of the original, more classically oriented voices of the instrument. Starting quietly almost prayerfully like a chapel organ at twilight, it grew in grandeur and majesty until --- against a massive string-vox chorus in the right hand and fairly powerful pedal --- the stately, round, smooth off-trem Tuba Mirabilis came sounding forth in the tenor range, a sound which sent chills up and down my spine. This, and some of the other Hope-Jones-influenced ranks, makes this instrument unique in the world of theatre organs. While capable of producing sounds like most theatre organs, the original Hope-Jones sound has not been lost, testament to the renovation crew.

Wickerham appropriately ended his concert with an Americana medley that opened with a pipe-and-drumband cadence. The full range of registrational sounds, from pure theatre to classical/symphonic, were displayed, particularly in the last two songs, "America the Beautiful" and "America."

Wickerham's encore was DeSylva, Brown and Henderson's perennial favourite, the "Varsity Drag." This upbeat, rousing finale provided an excuse to use the Klaxon/Ooga Horn and Siren on the newly restored toy counter, as well as showing off the snappy reeds. The 32' Diaphone was also featured at the end, showing off the range and sheer power of the organ.

# Members Play the Prince Edward Theatre Wurlitzer to raise funds for the Christie Organ Restoration Fund Sunday 25 July

TOSA extend our thanks to all those members and friends who came to the fund raising afternoon to hear seven of our members play the Wurlitzer in Marrickville Town Hall. There was over 100 music lovers in the audience who were treated to a feast of musical styles and interpretation of the numbers presented.

President Geoff Brimley gave an update on the search for a home for the Christie Organ advising that a number of possibilities have been explored to date. A venue that is currently under proposal is looking promising however TOSA know from experience that we have to move one step at a time and hope for a positive outcome in this instance.

The funds raised on the afternoon will enable TOSA to start budgeting for the various aspects of the restoration project.

Christopher Waterhouse opened the show by giving some background to the purpose of TOSA and the desire to keep the theatre organ art form alive. He introduced each player by outlining their background in learning to play music and where they are involved in the music scene. All the members who played love

the Marrickville Wurlitzer and take every opportunity to keep their skills honed by attending the players evenings at Marrickville.

**Tom Barber** opened the show with a number from the movie"Top Hat," - "Cheek to Cheek." Then his program included "Dreaming", "Vienna, City of my Dreams", "Dancing Tambourines", and a medley of English tunes including - "Lets All go Down the Strand."

**Craig Keller** then entertained with "If I Were a Rich Man" from Fiddler on the Roof. Then being a country boy living in the big smoke of Sydney he played "Far From the Home I Love" followed by "Anything Goes" and "We're in the Money."

Ron Ivan, dressed for the part with check jacket and felt hat, opened with "That's Entertainment" followed by a medley of Harry Warren numbers, then "Chatanooga Choo Choo", "One Day When We Were Young", "When You Wish Upon a Star" intermingled with "Somewhere over the Rainbow", "Irish Eyes", "On the Road to Gundagai" finishing with "Till We Meet Again."

Graeme Costin opened with the Toccata in D minor "Three Blind Mice" then changed the mood to play themes from television shows and movies which reminded me of the ABC's popular show "Spicks and Specks" quizes. He played the theme from "Dad's Army", "Who do you think you are Mr Hitler", the theme from "Gilligan's Island", and themes from "F-Troup", "The Mickey Mouse Club", "Pink Panther"

with some very clever pedal work, "Mash", and "The Good, the Bad and the Ugly." He concluded with the Hallelujah Chorus.

During intermission the audience had the opportunity to enjoy a cup of tea or coffee and a biscuit whilst chatting with friends and looking over an excellent display of photo's and news articles about the Prince Edward Theatre and the Capitol Theatre.

In addition there was information about the next shows at Marrick-ville Town Hall on August 8th with the Scottish master of the Wurlitzer, David Gray and on 26th September with the UK wizard of the Wurlitzer, Simon Gledhill.

Following intermisssion, Christopher welcomed John Batts to the console to play "Spanish Gypsy Dance" (1932) a "Paso Doble" ... Pascual Marquina. A theatre-organ classic, as well as being a nod to the recent World Cup winners, Spain. This time heard without the pain of vuvuzelas! A fast and exciting "paso doble". Then "Everything I Have Is Yours" (1933) ... Burton Lane. A reminder of that time of year! By title this ballad is the Tax-man's song. Otherwise, a romantic ballad with heart-tugging sentiments calling for the use of the Wurlitzer's "sobbing Tibias."

This was followed by "El Cumbanchero" (1943) Raphael Hernandez and "Dream a Little Dream of Me" (1931) Gus Kahn & Milton Adolphus. By contrast, a gentle, emotive ballad popularised by The

Mommas & Pappas (Cass Elliott). Another piece of music to explore the gentler sounds of the theatre organ.

A swing number: "It Don't Mean a Thing If It Ain't Got that Swing" (1922) Ervin Mills & Duke Ellington. A jazz standard from the Twenties with plenty of current appeal. A toe-tapping piece of music. This piece was a great success for an English organist who recorded it on a Christie theatre organ, Sidney Torch.

Then Film Music: "East of the Sun" (1935) [Use Surf & Birds] "evocative" ...Brooks Bowman. I hope to remind you that the theatre organ's resources can transport the listener, evoke moods etc. This music has a haunting melody and reminds me that not everything has to be played at a hectic pace.

A Piano Novelty: "Dizzy Fingers" (1923) Zez Confrey. A flurry of notes in the tradition of piano novelties – an occasion for "busy fingers -- & feet" i.e. about 100 seconds of agreeable musical madness.

Peter Held was then introduced by Christopher and opened with a trio of Irish Tunes followed by the "Festival Toccata" then the Overture "Morning, Noon and Night in Vienna." Through his selection Peter was able to contrast the program by demonstrating that the Wurlitzer was quite capable of playing classical music as well as modern theatre styles.

It was now **Christopher Waterhouse's** time to entertain us and he showed us his theatre styling when playing "Somebody Stole My Gal", "Strangers In the Night", "I'll See You Again", a medley of tunes (Blackpool Style) - "I'm Looking Over a Four Leaf Clover", "Baby Face" & "Five Foot Two." **Christopher** closed the show with "Three Coins in the Fountain" and "Side By Side."

There was something to please everyone in the selection of music played and TOSA thank sincerely all the members who played for the show. They had all prepared well. A special thanks to TOSA Committee member Craig Keller for proposing the idea of members playing a show and to Marrickville Council for making practice time available for them.
