

Proceeds from the day will benefit Disabilities Unlimited, a Charitable Organisation providing transport for the Disabled.


CONCERT BY JOHN ATWELL March 21st (a rhyming review by John Clark)



KNIGHTHOOD TO FAMOUS BRITISH ORGANIST.

The British "New Year's Honours List" in past years has had many famous organists found in it. Several of the great cathedrals have had knights as principal organist.

In recent times, however, organists have tended to be overlooked, and there was one glaring omission many organ lovers had thought about. The "Doyen" of British concert organists in our present day society, and so delighted are we all, a new Knight of the organ - arise - Sir George Thalben-Ball. A sprightly 85 years young, still making records, Birmingham City Organist, and leading recitalist.

He must make history with the fact that at the end of 1981 he retired from one of his jobs - that as organist of the world famous Temple Church in London - a staggering 62 years, no less!

FAMOUS LONDON WURLITZER MOVING TO A NEW LOCATION.

For the last few years the London Chapter of A.T.O.S. have held their concerts at the suburban Gaumont-State Theatre, Kilburn. The cinema was "listed" as of architectual merit and this meant it couldn't be pulled down without a Government enquiry first. Apparently this also listed the contents and the 4/16 Wurlitzer which was originally made famous by Sidney Torch. The owners, the Rank Organisation have closed the cinema as a great lossmaker. They wish to sell the building. Nobody, it appears, wants to try to operate it as a theatre. After considering many tempting offers from both Australia and the U.S.A. Rank have decided not to sell the organ. They have discussed ideas of installing it in other theatres, but in the present climate of patronage loss, and the new video home attractions which will probably wipe out completely cinema operations even quicker than ordinary T.V., their idea to keep it is wise. The latest plan is that they intend to "loan" the organ. It is due to be installed in a 'purpose-built concert hall' in the Midlands near Northampton. I'm told that Lord Spencer, father of the Princess of Wales, is one of the people behind this scheme. The console has already been disconnected and moved there from Kilburn, we understand.

A.T.O.S. CONVENTION FOR DETROIT THIS YEAR.

Detroit's Convention Committee this month released the names of six artists who have been signed to play for the National A.T.O.S. Convention in July. They are: Don Baker; Kay McAbee; Charlie Balough; Lyn Larsen; Lowell Ayars and Dan Semer. It was also announced that Fr. Jim Miller, who made such a hit with Seattle Convention audiences in 1981, will be Master of Ceremonies.

Show spots for the meeting include the Fox Theatre, with two performances scheduled there; Detroit Theatre Organ Club's Senate Theatre, also two performances; Redford Theatre; Royal Oak Theatre; Punch and Judy Theatre; and in Ann Arbor, the Michigan Theatre.

Part of the meeting will be aboard the "Bob-lo", a 1895 Steamer for a cruise. There will be four organs on the trip.

It has also been disclosed that the "Afterglow" will be an afternoon (July 10th) at the Dodge mansion "Meadowlark", where there is a 66-rank residence organ installed.

LYN LARSEN WORKS ON THE SIMONTON RESIDENCE WURLITZER.

Lyn Larsen flew into Los Angeles from Phoenix the last weekend in February and was joined by Ron Mitchell, Reverside (Calif) organ enthusiast/technician, at the Simonton residence in North Hollywood to start tonal finishing work on the 4 manual 36 rank Wurlitzer that has been undergoing restoration. The organ, it is reported, sounds much different since the two have worked on it. They plan still another session to complete their work.


FOX DETROIT GETS TOO FEW TENANTS.

Robert K. Werbe is trying to give away his recently refurbished Fox Theatre and Building, property estimated to be worth \$20,000,000. Werbe had hoped to show family movies and stage shows in the 4,000-seat presentation palace but except for a few special shows, nothing much has happened. He has tried to interest the City of Detroit in taking it over, but to no avail. (This grand structure still houses the last in theatre installation of the famous 4/36 Wurlitzers specially designed for the large Fox houses built in the late 1920's) -Ed.
