


TWO PIPE ORGAN CONCERTS

ORIGINAL WURLITZER & ORIGINAL CHRISTIE

First on our list, and heralded by this piece of contemporary artwork, is a free concert - an "early-morn-Capitol." Time-ed to start at 8.00 a.m., our organist at the fabulous 3/15 Wurlitzer of the Capitol Theatre is PETER GROVES. PETER played a highly entertaining programme at Marrickville on 1st November last, so we can look forward to another bright couple of hours, this time at the Capitol-still the finest original cinema organ in Australia. If you have never heard this wonderful organ in its palatial setting, or if you've forgotten about its lush, unimpeded sound, then get yourself down to the Capitol Theatre on SATURDAY 13th MARCH AT 8.00 a.m.

This is a free concert and you may bring as many friends as you wish.

Secondly, another of Sydney's original instruments. This time, an organ which I am sure many members have not heard for a good many years - the 2/8 Christie of the Gordon (Kings) Theatre. Installed in late 1929, the main feature organists here were Idwal Jenkins, Valda Kersey and Muriel Jeavons. In rather poor condition in 1956, the organ was purchased for £300, and after three years' work was at last

re-installed in St. Columb's Church of England, West Ryde. It remains to this day the only Christie Organ in Australia still in its original Theatre Organ condition, voicing, specification (including all the toy counter) and the like.

Now is your opportunity to hear this instrument, in a concert of light music presented by our well-known recitalist, ALAN TRANTER, who incidentally has been organist at St. Columb's for the past six years, on TUESDAY 30th March, at 8.00p.m.

This evening has been arranged by ALAN in conjunction with the Church, and there will be a donation of \$1.00. This money will go into a special fund to help defray costs of complete and final restoration of this organ when a new proposed Church building for St. Columb's is completed.

The programme promises to appeal to all, being a light typical Theatre Organ Music programme. Well-known violinist Sidney Coates will be ALAN'S associate artist.

The raffle of an Al Bollington recording at the "Meet your organ Night" has raised a further \$8.40 for this fund.

As Well, CLIFF BINGHAM generously donated to the Fund the fee to which he was entitled for playing at the Annual Meeting.

WADSWORTH'S INSTAL NEW WURLITZER

Messrs Wadsworth Music Pty. Ltd. have advised the Society that they have just finished installation of a BRAND NEW WURLITZER electronic Full Theatre Organ at the "Burning Log" Restaurant at Dural. The new organ, finished in beautiful Antique White and Gold, is coupled to additional FIVE CHANNEL sound system, also installed at the restaurant.

The new Wurlitzer is owned by Mr. John CONGERT, who will play at the restaurant Wednesdays to Sundays inclusive. Mr. Frank Wadsworth tells us that his company is greatly stepping up their importation of Wurlitzer Electronic Organs, as their last four shipments have all been pre-sold before their arrival. A great number of new models are now available from the two Wurlitzer plants in Germany and the United States, and promise to be very popular organs. Wadsworth's have secured the Sole Agency for Wurlitzer and plan to introduce these, perhaps the best known organ in the world, to the local market with great vigour.

ELECTRONIC INSTALLATION ON THE PENINSULA

Another new Electronic Organ installation has come to our attention, this time at Avalon. At the Pizza Playhouse, Barefoot Boulevarde, Avalon, you can hear Art Kaub at the fabulous Thomas Palace III organ each night till midnight, (Except Mondays.) The Pizza Playhouse is a licensed restaurant and you are assured of a happy time with Dance Music and Sing-alongs etc; go and hear Art Kaub at he Thomas, and you will find out why this is claimed as "The Most Unique Electronic Organ Installation in Australia.

GIFT OF HISTORIC RECORDINGS

A number of historic 78 r.p.m. recordings of various Organists including Jesse Crawford and Lew White, has been generously donated to T.O.S.A. Archives by Mrs. Leon, widow of our beloved late member, Vic Leon.

The recordings are most interesting, and arrangements are being made for transfer to tape so members can share the listening pleasure and own a piece of history by purchasing the tapes. More details later when the news comes to hand.

ANDREW FEMMER AND REGINALD FOORT VISITS POSTPONED

Jan./Feb. "Vox" magazine reports that due to inability to arrange suitable dates around Easter for Concerts for the eminent visiting English Theatre Organist, Andrew Fenner, his visit has now been postponed until June or July this year. However, arrangements are now proceeding smoothly and it shouldn't be long before we can give you definite dates and places. Something to look forward to.

Because Andrew Fenners tour was shifted on to June of July, the proposed visit of the famous Reginald Foort cannot now take place till next year. More later on this tour also.

VICTORIAN DIVISION NEWS

ARRIVAL OF NEW PIPE ORGAN

It is reported that the Vincent Organ which was purchased last year arrived some little time ago from England, and the problem arose as to what console and other missing equipment could be utilised to complete the unit, and where would one start looking for such pieces of organ mechanism.

Coincidentally, it appears that the original console of Sydney's Lyceum Theatre Christie Organ will do the job, and because the right people happened to be at the right place at the right time, these arrangements have been finalis—ed. If you remember, when the Lyceum Theatre was all but destroyed by fire some time ago, the console was miraculously saved and except for a little water damage, was virtually intact unbarmed. It was bought by G. Miles Brown, who later sold it to a syndicate. Eventually it passed into the hands of David Cross, who has kindly offered the console to the Vic. Division to complete their 2/8 Christie/Vincent, for a period of five years, with the option of later purchase. Mr. Cross also happened to have other parts which were needed so everything has ended happily. Whether it's "ever after" depends on whether a suitable home can be found for the composite instrument. Sites in some of Melbourne's Northern Suburbs are being investigated, and all being well, the Division will have another fine installation which should enjoy similar usage opportunities as the Dendy WurliTzer.

A PICTURE PALACE FADES AWAY

The mighty Melbourne Regent/Plaza complex has been closed for some time now, and with the news of Auctioning of furnishings and effects we sense that it won't be long before the site is vacant land once more.

On December 1st and 2nd last, the auctioneers hammer was kept busy with the sale of curtains, carpets, seats, lights, period pieces and all the other items which went to complete the scene of a Picture Palace of the twenties. Among the more spectacular items sold were the Regents focal piece, the famous Czechoslavakian 72 branch 3 tiered festooned crystal chandalier, which went for a mere \$5000.00. Ordinary bracket lights from the interior went for a minimum of \$40.00 each, and someone bought the "House Full" sign, which I would say hadn't been used for many a long day, for \$10.

VISIT OF A.T.O.S. PERSONALITY

We have been notified by a Mr. Carr (an intending member recently settled in Australia from U.S.A.-) that a former executive of the American Society, Mr. Dick Symondton is expected to arrive in Sydney for a month's Visit. Dick Symondton is an enthusiastic organ owner very much involved in A.T.O.S., and it is anticicipated that he will be inspecting, hearing and perhaps playing some of installations. We will do our best to accomodate our visitor and trust that he will return to his hometown convinced that our Society is really moving. We hope to be able to share with him some of the joys of being associated with the Theatre Organ and its music.

ANOTHER NEW ORGAN MUSIC PROGRAMME

Last month we told you about 2NC's new organ music session; now we have another, this time across the Great Divide, but not out of reach of Sydney's receivers; Station 2PK sends out a session each Tuesday night at 7.00 p.m. This is quite a powerful station and is often heard clearly in Sydney. You will find it on your dial at 1400 Kcs, between 2SM and the far end.

The programme is sponsored by Ellis Musical Enterprises of Forbes. Mr. Gordon Ellis also writes to let you know that he is organising a concert by ERIC SMITH at Forbes on Friday 19th March.
