We have been grateful to 2CBA for the opportunity to promote our Society via the radio programme each Monday evening at 9pm and this was a chance for us to assist them in return.

Our artist for the afternoon main was Jean Penhall who has been well known as a theatre organiste (and indeed I remember years Jean as the 'lady at Palings' the six free lessons me 'electronic' the first organ I ever bought - many moons ago). She gave many theatre organ favourites played with velvet smooth all and touch and a feeling for what the majority of the audience was wanting to hear. Jean played four 'spots' in the afternoon and her popularity was made obvious by the spontaneous response of the over 500 strong audience.

A highlight of the programme the duo of Leonard Lee and Valerie Hanlon, who delighted us with many from the last popular numbers decades. These two people have been singing together for many years is evident in their precision and the way in which each compliments the other's talents. Everybody loved their particularly performance and I was impressed with their medley from Camelot. It should also be said that Cliff Bingham, who supplied the accompaniment to our vocalists, did a marvellous job being both precise and audible but unobtrusive.

The second half of the programme was compered by 2CBA FM radio David Lloyd, whom announcer are used to hearing on 'air' in the evenings. It was a wonderful afternoon of variety and the Reverend Vernon Turner expressed his thanks to TOSA for the contribution to their network of \$2,500 - a most encouraging result to us too!

### REPORT ON THE SPECIAL GENERAL MEETING HELD AT MARRICKVILLE TOWN HALL

Wednesday 12th June 1985 (by Norm Weismantel)

The main purpose of the meeting was to ratify the Final Draft of the Constitution discussed at a meeting of members on the 6th February 1985. As no further changes to the wording of the Constitution were proposed the motion to ratify the Constitution was put to the meeting and passed unanimously. It was then moved and passed that the next election of Officers be held at the 1985 Annual General Meeting.

The Secretary reported on the supply of solid state electronic components for the Marrickville Organ. The first circuit boards are expected printed to be delivered about mid-July 1985. installation of the equipment avoid will be timed to disruption to our Concert Programme.

The President reported that the following work had been done on the Marrick-ville Organ:

- The piston action was removed from the console, overhauled and restored.
- 2. Preventive maintenance was done on the pipe chests to correct potential faults.
- 3. George Stephens of Adelaide spent four days on the pipework correcting faults and tuning the organ.
- 4. The opening of the inner bank of swell shutters on each chamber was reversed in operation. This has improved the delivery of sound to the centre front of the Hall.
- 5. The Toy Counter was removed, renovated and lifted to brackets on the back wall of the solo chamber. This move was necessary to provide floor space for the installation of a newly-acquired multiple pipe chest. New wind trunking to the Toy Counter and Marimba Harp was also installed.

The President also reported that a visit to Mastertouch had been arranged for the next Club Night on 17th July.

A motion expressing appreciation to those members who had worked so hard on the maintenance and restoration of the Marrickville Organ, the organisation and running of the Convention, and publicity of the NSW Division, especially on 2CBA-FM, was carried with applause.

In response to member's questions the following information was given:

- 1. A new console enclosure and platform have been constructed for Marrickville Organ. However, some aspects to ensure ease and safety of operation still need consideration.
- 2. The Orion Centre Project some parts of the ex-Capitol organ are stored in the organ chambers.

  The Toy Counter has been restored. A re-leathering training session will be held on Saturday 15th June next. The Console has been repainted and is awaiting electrical wiring and electronic components.

The members present extend congratulations to popular organist David Parsons on being awarded the O.A.M. in the Queen's Birthday Honours List.



#### DOWN MEMORY LANE.

Number 16 of a monthly series by Frank Ellis.

In December 1939, there was not a great deal happening on the theatre organ scene, and the year came to an end on a rather quiet note. The Australian Music Maker and Dance Band News magazine on 1st. January 1940 carried a series of adverts in the form of a greeting from many theatre organists wishing their fans a "Merry Christmas and A Happy New Year". These were in the form of a one inch panel, nicely bordered, although one organist, Jim Williams, ran to a two inch spread. However, Stanfield Holliday really let his head go and upstaged them all with a 2½"x  $4\frac{1}{2}$ " spread, complete with his photograph, in which he wished, quote, "his many friends and admirers the Complements of the Season". Unquote. That would have cost Stanfield pre-inflation bundle even in those days. Well, if it pays to advertise, then Stanfield Holliday was well to the fore compared to the more modest one inch panels of the rest of the organ fraternity.

As each organist mentioned the theatre in which he was then appearing, it enables me to pinpoint just who was where at that time, so here for your information is a list of some of the residencies in January 1940. Not all the organists inserted greetings in the magazine so the list is not a complete one, but it does give us a great deal of important information.

Ron Boyce - Vogue Theatre, Double Bay: Stan Cummins - Arcadia Theatre, Chatswood: Clarence Black - Astra Theatre, Parramatta: Knight Barnett - Palatial Theatre, Burwood: Les Waldron - Plaza Theatre, Sydney: Ray Chaffer - Roxy Theatre, Parramatta: Jim Williams - Savoy Theatre, Enfield: Cyrus J. Tuckwell - Duke of York Theatre, Eastwood: Bert Myers - Victory Theatre, Kogarah: Paul Cullen - Civic Theatre, Auburn: Kurt Herweg - Prince Edward Theatre, Sydney: Charles Tuckwell - Regent Theatre, Melbourne:

Reg Maddams - De Luxe Theatre, Wellington, New Zealand: Stanfield Holliday - Ambassadors Theatre, Perth: and Idwal Jenkins then working at the ABC on a Hammond.

The War was, at that time, in early stages, but even then, it was obvious that it would bring changes to the theatre organ scene as it progressed. It was also expected there would be a decrease availability of organ records England as shipping space declined for non-essential cargoes. Enlistments and Army Call-ups would also have an effect on the theatre organ scene in Australia too, particularly in Sydney which had about half of all the instruments in this Country, but at start of 1940, although these threats were real, they were still some distance down the track, and it was still business as usual with the theatre organ profession.

Bert Myers who was then probably the youngest theatre organist, celebrated his 21st. birthday on December 3rd. 1939. Des Tanner was reported as having had a day or two off work whilst he recovered from the effects of severe sunburn. Many of the organists were patriotically playing "We're Gonna Hang Out the Washing on the Siegfried Line" as part of their feature presentations, and this did seem to bring the War closer to home.

Music Maker magazine, Writing in Ronald Roberts said there had been outstanding presentations the Sydney cinemas in the previous few weeks. He named Jim Williams for a special arrangement of "Boomps-A-Daisy" played "a la Strauss waltz, march, and in practically every form except a fugue". He went on to say, quote, "Knight Barnett's 'Rose Selection' was a gem of subtlety and colour. He gave hackneyed numbers, a new freshness, a new loveliness. I've heard a number of organists on the Burwood job, and still Barnett was able to thrill me with new tone colours. Of Palmistra, need I say much? He goes into the byways of melody and seeks finds a great many pearls of presentations. Palmistra favours

medleys, and always manages to play something which will please each section of the audience, be it slightly highbrow, middlebrow, or any other kind of brow. Palmistra is one of Western Suburbs best bets" Unquote. Denis had featured a selection of Gypsy melodies.

#### REGINALD DIXON DIES

Reginald Dixon M.B.E., organist at the Blackpool Tower Ballroom died on the 10th May 1985. Officially known as Mr Blackpool, Reg presided over that famous Wurlitzer's console for forty years. He died at the age of 80 years.

During his long residency, he rose to the top in each of three different facets of his profession - namely, his personal appearances at the Tower, his many broadcasts of the theatre organ - and his prolific output of recordings.

The numbers who saw and heard him at the Tower are almost beyond counting, whilst his worldwide radio listeners ran into untold millions.

In 1966 he was honored by the Queen with an M.B.E. for his services to the entertainment world. In the same year he became Patron of the N.S.W. Division of T.O.S.A., and continued in that post for four years. No other organist has done so much to popularise the theatre organ. He retired from the Tower in 1970.

A special program, "Tribute To Reginald Dixon", will be presented by Frank Ellis in TOSA'S own program on Radio 2CBA FM Stereo 103 at 9.00pm on Monday 24th June.

The music continued well into he evening and a good time was had by all. Thanks so much to Niki Katris and Ron and Phil Wilson for their generous efforts.


