Vale Phyl Wilson

Phyl and Ron Wilson started attending theatre organ concerts with their friends Leigh and Gwen O'Hanlon in the late 1960s or early '70s. At the same time Janice was having organ lessons and naturally they had an electronic organ and a player piano in their home at 120 Dennis Street, Lakemba.

Never ones to stand back and "let someone else do it" they were soon actively involved with the Society. At our regular Sunday afternoon concerts Phyl became involved with the afternoon teas and soon afterwards took responsibility for organizing that essential aspect of our shows. The funds raised in selling teas over the years amounted to a very considerable sum. Phyl organized a fete at Marrickville Town Hall which was the centre of the Society's operations at that time. Ron was always there with his expert knowledge and access to machinery at his factory to make any specialist frames and fittings we needed.

Another method of fund raising was having "home organ parties" and as you would expect the Wilsons hosted many of these. Summer was the favourite time at Dennis Street and good use was made of the pool.

Ron & Phyl built a pool room at the bottom of the back yard and T.O.S.A. Committee were invited to hold their regular monthly meetings there. On retirement Ron took over the editorship, typing and printing of the Society's monthly newsletter. In addition keeping the aged, ailing printing press operational. Phyl, Ron and a few others used to collate and fold the publication for mailing.

In 1983 a trip to the West Coast of U.S.A. was organised and of course Phyl and Ron together with 15 others visited Honolulu, Los Angeles, Las Vegas, Seattle, Portland & San Francisco. At every stopover except Las Vegas we were invited into people's homes to hear and play their home theatre pipe organs. The variety was beyond everyone's imagination from modest average sized homes to those of several multi-millionaires - what a great time we had being warmly welcomed wherever we went.

Phyl and Ron continued to be actively involved with the Theatre Organ Society and were awarded Life Membership in recognition of their enormous contribution to the Society over many years. Phyl served one term as President of the Society just prior to their move to Tweed Heads.

Correction re the Saxophone purchase for the Orion Wurlitzer

The rank purchased by the Society was from a British Wurlitzer (unsure which one) and was imported by the late Bill Glasson probably back in the 1960s. The original Sax from the "Capitol" Wurlitzer was traded for the Krumet which had been ordered for the Adelaide "Regent". The legend goes that Fred Scholl the opening organist at the "Capitol" preferred the Krumet to the Saxophone and did the exchange as both instruments were imported around the same time. Until both instruments were rebuilt they had the original stopkeys which proved the exchange. The Krumet is now on the Marrickville organ replacing the Kinura which is stored in a crate in the chamber. The Krumet has a sound more suitable for the live acoustics at Marrickville.

First task of the day was for John Weismantel to refit the sand block that ciphered during Martin Ellis's concert in October. While that happened I got things ready for the console to go up ready for playing. David and Margaret Badman and Tom Barber arrived about this time and soon we had things ready to go.

As soon as John gave the signal he was finished the blower ran up and the Uniflex computer was started up ready for the day.

Players for the day were David Badman, Tom Barber and a recent new member Doug Matthews (not the cricketer) plus yours truly. 15 minute playing slots were allocated and tunes flowed.

Listeners included listening stalwart Kevin Clancy, Margaret Badman and John Weismantel.

While some of us played John took the opportunity to investigate some of the stage lighting and control systems installed at Orion. This was a great learning experience for John and we are confident that future concerts at Orion will see better lighting of the console and maybe even some additional colour and movement. We wait with 'bated breath!

Special visitors for the day were my brother-in-law, Steve Robinson and his teenage daughter Rebecca. They were on a road trip together and were on their way from the Blue Mountains to my home in Gerringong for a visit. I invited them to drop by so that both of them could see and hear a theatre pipe organ for the first time. Both were fascinated and as Rebecca has an engineering and electronics interest and likes music she was especially interested. When I showed them the chambers the looks of amazement were great to see.

A good day was had by the small crew but we missed regulars John Batts, Graeme Costin and Simon Ellis. Next month maybe?

A reminder that the days at Orion Centre and Marrickville Town Hall are open for all members to come along – even if you don't wish to play. Its a social day and all TOSA members and their quests are welcome.

Christie Organ Report January 2017 *Rob Gliddon*

CONSOLE The console has been positioned on the new dolly and bolted down to same. Wooden Stop Divisions are being made and the stop actions will be realigned to their final positions. Console sides and back have had their final coats of polish. Lid has yet to have its final few coats. Music rack fixings have been made and the rack finishing is progressing.

From David Badman following Rob Gliddon's Report: Last night I finished assembling the console, sans music stand to be veneered and fitted this week.

Dimmer unit and under stop shelf lights have been installed and work with two spare channels available. Each channel is individually variable plus a master control. The remaining channels can be used for drawer lighting and original console lights. Horseshoe, traps, trems and pedals are all individually adjustable for balance at this time.

Original console lighting is still to be re-installed. Pistons to be fitted.

Swell and Crescendo interfaces to be decided on and fitted.

Drawers still to be completed.

Skirt for dolly to be made.

Special thanks to David Badman for his special skills and the many, many hours he has expended on the project.

MAIN CHAMBER All manual pipework has been racked as this is the safest place to store same.

Chest wiring is very close to completion.

Accompaniment non-tonals have been mounted and in most cases winded.

SOLO CHAMBER It has been decided to change the position of the Glockenspiel unit to adjacent to the Xylophone.

All the regulators which are stored in the Solo will be moved to the Main in order to commence mounting the Solo manual chests.

A Nutcracker Fun Fact from Virtual Sheet Music

I have a bit of a Nutcracker confession. Until doing some research for a Fun Fact about Tchaikovsky's beloved holiday masterpiece, I had always thought the Dance of the Sugar Plum Fairy featured a xylophone, when in fact, it is a celesta. Who knew! A celesta is a percussive instrument that resembles an upright piano, but functions similar to a glockenspiel. The sound produced is other-worldly and mystical, perfectly evoking the delicate droplets of glittering sweetness the Sugar Plum Fairy personifies.

Tchaikovsky discovered this brand new instrument when he visited Paris in 1891, and in hopes of being the first among his rival composers to use it in an orchestral piece, he asked his publisher to secretly transport a celesta back to Russia for the Nutcracker's premier in 1892. That Ernest Chausson was actually the first to use the celesta in his 1888 incidental music for The Tempest hardly seems to matter, as Tchaikovsky's Dance of the Sugar Plum Fairy really put the celesta on the map, and succeeded in seamlessly blending the instrument's unique timbre with a beloved character who has stood the test of time and place.

The TOSA Christie at West Ryde has a celesta in it's repertoire so The Dance of the Sugar Plum Fairy should sound just as it was written by Tchaikovsky when played on the TOSA Christie at West Ryde. (Editor)

It is time to get organ-ised for 2017

Only a full orchestra can match the thrilling sounds of a theatre pipe organ in full voice.

The theatre organ is a pipe organ in the real sense, with row after row of pipes replicating the voices of brass, woodwind and strings together with various percussion instrument ranks including a toy counter with drums, cymbals, castanets, tambourine etc. Together these unified sounds make for a delicious blend of heartwarming music - powerful enough to lift the roof one minute, fading to whisper quietness the next.

The Australian Songwriter Association (ASA) Awards Orion Centre Theatre December 2016

A few months ago, TOSA Video Operator, Russell Smith contacted me with an idea. For those that may not know, Russell is on the Board of Directors at West Tigers Leagues. The club usually hosts the Australian Songwriters Association annual awards event. However this year it was not possible due to ongoing renovations at the club which meant the event would not fit. Russell suggested the Orion Centre would be a great place – but he had a good reason for doing so.

Russell's idea was that the Wurlitzer could be used in some way at this event as there are many entertainment pieces during the evening performed by Australian music industry professionals. As Russell has worked with the awards operators he had good inroads to discuss the ideas.



Chairman of ASA, Denny Burgess (yes from Master's Apprentices) and his partner Clare came along to the end of the Tony Fenelon and Dr John Atwell concert a couple of Sundays prior so that we could show them what our Wurlitzer could do.

Prior to this though, there was some preparation work to happen. Russell originally thought that the end of a long Gershwin medley that Dave Wickerham played in 2012 could be used. The end piece being "Strike up the Band". He was going to use some

archival video from the day and run that vision through the event's multiple video screens while Uniflex played the organ back in synchronisation. I sent a message to Dave to seek his approval and received an immediate approval. Then we struck a hurdle... During research (aka asking questions on Facebook and emailing Dick Wilcox at Uniflex) I discovered that you cannot start a track playback at a certain point and you also cannot pause the track and have it commence playing again at the chosen point. Blast! Brain scratching was required.

The best option I could think of was to contact Tony Fenelon and ask him for his assistance prior to the concert on December 4th. A phone call and an explanation and Tony knew exactly what we wanted and agreed to record the piece for us prior to audience entry on concert day. Some early arrivals on the day may have heard the tune emanating from the auditorium and wondered what was going on. Now you know! On concert day Tony did two "takes" while Russell recorded the required video vision. Tony is such a master that both his runs were perfect and were exactly the same length 3:02 minutes.

After the concert we demonstrated to Denny and Clare how the console would rise on the lift and the music would play. They were amazed!

On the day of the awards event, TOSA personnel (Ernie Vale, Barry Tooker, Debra Keller and I) were on site at 2pm ready to set up for rehearsal of our piece. Russell was already there as part of the ASA/Club team.

We had everything ready to go at the appointed rehearsal time and did two run throughs of the ascent, play and descent of the organ including one run where the console was removed from the lift and the lift sent back to floor level. That all went fine. Organisers were very happy with our "bit". It was essential to rehearse the lift going back to floor level as the floor area was required later during the ASA event.

By 3:30 or so our rehearsal was complete so we all left for a while as the setup and rehearsals for other matters continued. Some cooling drinks were in order so Ernie, Deb and I went to the pub for a couple of squashes and air conditioning. We returned to the Orion about 5:30 to make sure we were back in plenty of time.

There was lots of interest from crew and performers about the Wurlitzer so a few "tours" were conducted. As we all know, until you open the chamber doors people have **no idea** of the extent of these instruments. They often think the console is "it".

Our communications setup was highly technical. During rehearsals and our piece, Deb and I had our phone headsets on and I phoned Deb. I brought along two handheld UHF two-ways and I communicated with Barry and Ernie in the basement via these.

Deb was the cable feeder as we still have to feed the power and communications cables up and down if the console is on the lift. Ernie and Barry were in the basement as lift drivers and console movers. I was at the computer backstage driving Uniflex and directing the team.



The theatre was laid out with 40 round tables and 10 seats per table and it was packed! It also looked quite fancy with large glass candelabra on each table, cloth napkins, wine glasses etc. The clear framed chairs with black cushions that were laid out for our last concert were also in use and looked quite decent - it's a pity the same cannot be said about their suitability for sitting on for long periods. During the afternoon Ernie also laid some TOSA business cards on each table so that if by chance someone was curious they could grab one.

Our piece was the show opener and seconds past 7pm the signal was given for everything to commence. Seconds later as the puffs of smoke from smoke machines happened, the drums and music sounded and the console rose through the smoke there was enthusiastic applause from the audience.



"Strike up the band" played through with no incident and 15 seconds prior to the track ending I signalled for the lift to descend and once again the audience applauded as the Wurlitzer console disappeared slowly into the depths. During the playback live video taken by a cameraman was projected including glimpses into the lit chambers. Russell's video of Tony playing was also synchronised for part of the playback. Post descent, Emcee, Mike Bailey, spoke about the organ and TOSA and gave it a great spiel. Thanks to Mike!

As soon as cables were detached, Deb guided them as I hauled them back to the stage. During this time, Barry and Ernie removed the console and I dashed downstairs. By the time I arrived Ernie was ready for the lift to ascend to floor level and he drove it back to floor and stopped it bang on the mark. Deb then closed the chamber doors and gates.

It was interesting to see the Orion in use in this way and we learned a little more about the house lighting that is there. Overall I think this was an excellent opportunity for exposure of TOSA NSW and theatre organ to an audience of 400 music industry professionals.



Thanks to Ernie, Barry and Deb for being essential parts of the team and to Russell for making it possible for TOSA NSW and theatre organs to be utilised in such an innovative manner. Further thanks to Tony Fenelon for his participation by recording the track for us prior to the Dec 4th concert.

Review of the Christmas Concert 2016 – Tony Fenelon and John Atwell Orion Centre Theatre, Campsie, NSW Sunday 4th December

What a pleasant afternoon when Tony and John returned once again to the hallowed hall of the Orion Centre Theatre in Campsie to play our prize 3/17 Wurlitzer and the Grand Piano. A good sized crowd of TOSA members, fans and friends gathered for the varied programme and were not disappointed in any way, shape or form.

I'm greatly enamoured of our professional organists (both theatre and classical) as to how they can re-present old favourites with a freshness that is most enjoyable. Of course this will always be the case with a Christmas music programme given that there is an inexhaustible list of Christmas music that we will hear many times throughout our lifetime, and so many musical items of a Christmassy nature are very familiar to us, but we are always happy to hear them again at this time of year.

Dear Tony was suffering somewhat health wise but this never showed (as we would always expect) in his playing at both piano and organ. John had the longer time at the Wurli and they both presented a wide and varied programme of Yuletide music as well as other joyful melodies.

It was lovely to hear Tony acknowledge that we (his audiences) had supported him for over fifty years. The main reason of course is that Tony (and John) are such great talents that we can't but

help encourage them more. Their playing justifies their international reputations. They are world class.

I'm not going to go through all the items they both played as we know their talents so well.



Highlights for me were: Tony playing the music of Irving Berlin. Irving passed the 100 year mark before he left this mortal coil. Is this something we musicians can look forward to? Are we musician types in for a long stay in *Shady Pines*? (I am sure most of the readers of this review will have watched TV's "*The Golden Girls*" in a past life and know of "*Shady Pines*").

I also enjoyed Cole Porter's "It's De Lovely" and recalled the movie of similar name with so many of Porter's lovely melodies, even though they were presented by current performing artists.

Having Julie Andrews in the country directing the latest production of "My Fair Lady" encouraged Tony to play the show's overture and later on John played from "Sound of Music" the song especially written for the movie – "Something Good".

I enjoyed John's version of "Angels from the Realms of Glory", a fanfare introduction, lots of straight organ and some fugue type sounds.

Who remembers Harry Belafonte and "Mary's Boy Child"? John obliged with memories of one of Belafonte's greatest hits. (I remember Harry Belafonte's "Mary's Boy Child" very well as it was played every Christmas at the Jeldi Factory at Punchbowl where we visited friends. Editor).

A Christmas concert wouldn't be complete without John and Tony's duet "Sleigh Ride". Also included was an annual airing of those mysterious Wurli sleigh bells.

More mention of Julie Andrews and her starring role in the Gertrude Lawrence bio "Star". I recall this movie was a box office flop. I managed to collect some of the sheet music from the show though and John's interpretation of the show's title song was a pleasure to hear.

Tony gave us an *Abba* medley. That group has sure had a long run and their music is still around after all these years.

I did enjoy Tony's playing of three Australian Christmas carols – "The Three Drovers", "The Silver Stars are in the Sky" and "Christmas Day" (the North wind is tossing the leaves). In my organ playing for Christmas Eve Christmas carols here in the Southern Highlands we had "The Three Drovers" and my other favourite Australian carol is "Our Lady of December" which Jonas Nordwall recorded some years ago.

After the above Tony and John returned to duets to complete the programme and we were treated to some wonderful Chopin, Harry Warren's composition "An Affair to Remember", the traditional carol "O Holy Night", and to finish the concert the most well known music of the British composer and conductor Charles Williams from the movie While I live - "Dream of Olwen". How delightful to hear all these beautiful melodies played orchestrally – piano and the Wurli orchestra. As always, thanks to Tony and John's massive efforts over many years in transcribing these for piano and organ.

The audience cried - Encore, encore - and our artists sent us off with their wonderful arrangement of "We Wish You a Merry Christmas".

As always, our deep thanks to Tony and John again for gracing the stage of the Orion Centre Theatre, Campsie for our Christmas concert and also to Simon Ellis for stepping up to the microphone to introduce the artists.

TOSA needs to grow our audiences

What a great audience came to the Christmas concert at the Orion Centre Theatre last December with Tony Fenelon and John Atwell at the Mighty Wurlitzer and Grand Piano. There were many new faces along with some TOSA members we had not seen for a while. Some of the new faces were a result of the promotion through advertising.

Good audiences for local artists have been achieved when there is a promise in their promotion and program of something more than a solo performance. It could be a dual bill of top artists and instruments, an appealing support group, or a theme that promises interest and engagement.

This indicates that contemporary audiences are wanting more than just 'organ' or 'organist' no matter how pre-eminent they may be. The days of the 'theater organ Johnnie' devoted to the sound are dying with those who knew and loved the era of "The Best Remaining Seats." The contemporary audience, for better or for worse, demands 'entertainment' which is about more than the skill of the artist or the grandeur of the instrument, even less about the sensationalism of the offer.

It is about the ability of the promotion and program to reach some internal motivator and/or interest in potential respondents which may have little to do with the theatre organ as an instrument. It is something in a potential attendee's life experience that is triggered by the promise in the promotion. The program and performance must of course live up to its promise which involves top playing and great sound. But it must have something more, that sends people home 'with a song in their hearts' and a lilt in their steps. It will be something in the audience member more than in the artist or instrument.

It is time to leave aside introspection about the glories of the past and think like the next generation if TOSA is to survive. Let it be the norm rather than the exception.
