Our M.C., Frank Ellis advises the audience that cassette tapes of the concert will be available for ordering, and to save any further confusion, a table will be set up at the reas of the hall where order forms can be filled in for your requirements. The cost of a normal concert tape is \$11.00, which covers approximately 2 hours of the complete presentation.

Dont forget, tapes are available ONLY to financial members of the Theatre Organ Society, and if your friends are disappointed, they can join the Society and get their tapes also!


KEYBOARD WORLD MAGAZINE.

REVUE OF CONCERT, Sunday 21st February. (by Peter Held)
Beverly Kennedy, Patricia Guthrie, Neil Palmer.

Despite a playing commitment that same evening, I resolved to make time to be present for most of the tripartite musical afternoon on February 21st at Marrickville.

The youthful trio had obviously worked in preparation; registration changes were deserving of praise; here I think Beverly

Kennedy showed most promise.

It was a pity that Patricia Guthrie did not spot the Chimes tab being on, before beginning her opening march. I am told it was her first appearance at Marrickville. On further mitigation I must tell our readers that this organ feels and handles quite differently when there is an audience present from when the building is empty!

Neil Palmer, despite an uneasy posture on the bench was well controlled in his playing. I liked his 'Stars fell on Alabama' best.

I feel constrained to comment that I wholeheartedly endorse the concept of encouraging and promoting the younger recruits to the 'business'- whereby they can 'serve their time' as I and others before me did, playing a real cinema organ before live audiences. I do feel that they should not try to play works that are, to me, beyond their reserve of TECHNIQUE. Beverly Kennedy's 'Skaters Waltz' was just not Emile Waldteuful- that type of music is supposed to 'bubble along'. Till one can do this with ease before an audience, it should definitely NOT be attempted.

Student pianoforte technique (on the manuals) wont do for presenting music of this calibre on a pipe organ and, please, younger organists, be concious of the IMMENSE dynamic range this organ can now unleash. Believe me, it CAN be played with only a

couple of units in each hand!

Frank Ellis, dapper and eloquent as usual was the compere. My compliments and approbation!





DONATION OF THREE MANUAL CONSOLE TO CARNEGIE HALL THEATRE.

Manhattan's Little Carnegie Theatre, New York, home of the late Ben M. Hall's "Little Mother" Wurlitzer, may soon become a twin console venue. Donation of a three-manual console will make it possible in the near future to add the larger unit to the organ. Initial plans call for the added console controlling the present 12 ranks. The original console, which is a two-manual job, will be wired into the five rank instrument it played when the organ was installed in the Garden Theatre. It can then be heard in its original state.

The organ is heard frequently by patrons when it is used for silent film presentations with Lee Erwin at the console. Members of New York Theatre Organ Societ- frequently hold concert meetings at the theatre and also have open console sessions. The instrument is owned by the A.T.O.S. National.

DINNER-DANCE HELD ON STAGE OF THE RADIO CITY MUSIC HALL.

Radio City Music Hall, New York, was aglow from cellar to ceiling on January 19th and some 250 hoi polloi from the business and theatre world were on hand to help the grand dame of theatres kick off its Fiftieth Anniversary with a black tie gala.

Following cocktails in the spacious art deco foyer, dinner guests were treated to an experience few non-professionals have ever had; the view of Radio City's cavernous dimension as seen from the 144-ft. wide stage. With a Manhattan skyline backdrop, guests were served a five-course dinner and danced to the flawless music of Radio City's Jack Schnupp Orchestra, and also saw a mini show. Honorary co-chairmen of the bash were former New York Mayors:- Robert F. Wagner, Vincent Impellitteri, John Lindsay, and Abe Beame, who lent the affair a sense of heritage from the years gone by.

The Hall was opened December 27, 1932 and has since admitted 255,000,000 paying customers. (The twin console 4 manual 58 rank Wurlitzer is featured at every session - it is the World's largest Wurlitzer - Ed.)

KILBURN STATE WURLITZER STAYS IN U.K.

Turning down several tempting offers from the U.S.A. and Canada, Odeon Theatre in London have announced the Kilburn State Wurlitzer organ will remain in Great Britain and be donated for installation in a "purpose-built hall" in Northampton to be disclosed publicly when legal agreements are executed by both parties.

UCLA, PACIFIC THEATRE OFFICIALS WILL TALK ABOUT KIMBALL.

Initial talks regarding the 4/37 Kimball organ now stored in the former scene dock at Pacific's Hollywood Theatre was due to take place February 5th. between Pacific Theatres and the University of California Los Angeles officials. The talks will centre on some type of arrangement to re-install the huge organ in the Wiltern Theatre which will be used by the University as a performing arts facility.

Gene Davis, past chairman of Los Angeles Theatre Organ Society, engineered the meeting. The organ is owned by the theatre chain and officials of the firm have indicated they desire to see it put to use rather than continue to store it.

OLD TOWN MUSIC HALL TO HAVE NEW RELAY SYSTEM.

Old Town Music Hall's Wurlitzer in El Segundo, California, which is owned and operated by Bill Coffman and Bill Field, is scheduled later in 1982 to have a new computer control system to replace the present ailing Wurlitzer switch stack and combination system.

FAMOUS WURLITZER TO BE INSTALLED IN PERFORMING ARTS CENTRE.

Reversing the trend of removing theatre organs from theatres, one of the U.S.A.'s most publicized instruments will be removed from a residence and re-erected in a former motion picture palace. A televised newscast of January 12th. disclosed that Byron Carlson, owner of the former Chicago Marbro Theatre 5 manual 21 rank Wurlitzer pipe organ (one of only 3 ever 5 manual organs built in the Wurlitzer Factory), has sold the instrument to the Ocean State Performing Arts Centre, in Providence, Rhode Island. Sale price of the organ was reported to be \$85,000 and the final total including installation will be in the neighborhood of \$115,000. The Performing Arts Centre was originally the Loew's State Theatre.

Purchase of the organ was made possible by grant of \$50,000 from the City of Providence. Balance of the money will be raised through a series of events designed to generate the necessary money to pay for the complete installation.


COST \$69 per person.

The final decision is up to the members to make, and their does exist many reasons for and against each preference. I appeal to you to remember where the console will be placed and used, how it will stand out against the background, the fact that we rarely have night concerts, and dont forget the dust situation, of which there is plenty at Marrickville. The general usage that a console will receive at Marrickville is 'often' and small chips and tiny scratches dont show out on polished finishes as readily as on white.

However, the console is at present done out in its White and Gold finish (even though a bit dull, at the moment) and perhaps you would prefer it to remain that way, as in the Capitol Theatre, for the sake of posterity. There's no doubt that a White & Gold console shows out to extreme under a spotlight, but I'd hate to see a nasty scratch on it (accidental of course) which couldn't be readily covered up with Mr. Sheen!

AN HISTORICAL NOTE Just for your own personal interest, the Capitol Organ Console was polished when it first came here, and was re-painted White & Gold AFTER it was installed in the theatre.

CLUB NIGHT Wed. March 10th at Marrickville.


PIPE ORGAN DEFINITIONS

Ballarat recently printed some very informative pipe organ definitions and I am taking the liberty of re-printing them here, for the benefit of our members who are always anxious to learn.

PALLET The valve that admits wind to a pipe's foot.

- FOOT OF PIPE The conical portion at the bottom of a pipe, supporting the pipe, and conveying wind to the flue. It forms a valuable resonance cavity.
- The 'wind-way' between the languid (or block) and the lower lip (or cap) of a flue pipe. The flue's design is of great importance to timbre.
- TIMBRE Tone quality...depends upon the pitch, number, relative loudness and design of HARMONICS present in a stop.
- BOOT A cone-shaped enclosure of a reed pipe containing the shallot and its reed. It permits pressure to be built up around the reed.
- REED STOPS The opposite to'flue' stops, which have no moving mechanical parts in their interiors, the reed stops have vibrating tongues of soft brass, each one held up against its shallot by a wooden wedge.
- SHALLOT A hollow, conically shaped brass tube mounted on the bottom of the block of a reed pipe. Its larger diameter is towards the bottom of the boot, in which it is enclosed, and is sealed by a cap. The smaller open end, is inserted in the block and serves as the bottom of the air column of the resonator.
- RESONATOR The 'pipe' of a reed stop, designed to keep under control the reed's motions, and at the same time give strength by resonance to the important harmonics created by the reed. The resonator cannot create any musical tones itself, it merely resonated by sympathy those created by the reed.
- FLUE PIPES Organ pipes that sound their notes from edge-tones supported by air columns within the bodies of the pipes. This air-mechanism is so efficient that the whole eleven octaves of the organ can be so produced. Flue stops consist of non-reed stops- Foundation, Flute, and String families.




Neil Jensen is unquestionably the most exciting young talent to emerge on the Australian Theatre Organ scene since Tony Fenelon rose to international prominence in the mid sixties.

A good stage personality combined with superb musicianship and obvious dedication to the instrument make Neil an outstanding favourite with audiences everywhere. His programmes are packed with variety and interest, and always include new material. As a result, Neil's repetoire is rapidly coming to rival those of artists who have been around for decades. He does the old favourites (which enable the organ buffs to compare him with other artists doing the same material) but he also performs tunes that leave other organists exclaiming, "why didn't I think of that".

Neil was born in Brisbane only 25 years ago. He studied piano and vocal throughout his school years, then went on to qualify as a graphic artist. Neil fell in love with theatre organ the first time he heard it, and at only 18 years of age he was to give his first concert at Brisbane Town Hall. His performance there brought him instant acclaim, and since 1973 his career has blossomed. Neil gave concerts throughout the country, but because of the relatively few pipe installations around Australia, he developed his stagecraft and musical abilities by also touring for various electronic organ companies.

Neil is an unusually talented freelance performer who is equally at home on theatre organ and piano; beyond that he is an accomplished arranger and composer whose work is increasingly in demand in these fields.
