Frank Ellis Back at 2CBA!

Nearly two months ago, TOSA life member and resident compere, Frank Ellis, was approached by 2CBA FM to record a one hour long special program on the history of the theatre organ in Australia, and the organists who played them, in our theatres. After the program has been put to air, the tape is to go to the National Film and Sound Archives in Canberra, as a part of 2CBA's contribution to our entertainment history, in this the Bi-centenial year.

After spending six weeks assembling early records and tape from various members, Frank recorded the program at the 2CBA studios on Tuesday 11th October.

Frank told the TOSA NEWS editor that he has included in the program some really amazing items from the early days of cinema organ in Australia, including, (believe it or not), the Prince Edward Theatre's very first organist, the well remembered Eddie Horton, recorded in the theatre in 1925. And that's just one of the many surprise items that will be heard in this one hour special.

As this article was going to press, news was received that the broadcast will be heard on 2CBA FM (103.2Mhz) commencing at 9.00pm on Monday 14th November 1988.


Congratulations Keith, it is good to see a member supporting the society and getting enjoyment from it at the same time.

RAIL TRAVEL

TOSA (WA) have advised the following details relating to Rail Transport for the Perth Convention.

Railways of Australia, through local Westrail, have advised that a group discount of 10% off full fare is available to our common interest group.

The group may comprise pensioner concession travellers for the purpose of achieving the minimum number of six persons, but the pensioner concession travellers are not entitled to the 10% discount.

Apart from the group concession, Railways of Australia also offer a discounted advanced purpose fare called CAPER FARES. These fares offer discounts from 20% - 30% and have special conditions.

There are a limited number of Caper Fares available for both berths and sit-up seat accommodation on all interstate trains in Australia and are available between capital cities.

You should ask for "Caper" at the time of reservation and be prepared to pay the fare in full within 14 days of making the booking.

International & Interstate News

The Chicago Theatre

A short time ago in TOSA NEWS an article was reprinted from "Theatre Organ" on the Chicago Theatre in the United States.

An article in the October issue of "International ATOS News" advises that in early September the theatre was once again closed down. Organ concerts are still going ahead, but the future of this beautiful picture palace certainly looks doubtful.

Opus 1482 To Play Again

Opus 1482, originally installed in the Tauranga Town Hall on New Zealand's North Island and now reinstalled in the community performing arts centre "Baycourt" will be opened by Dennis James over the weekend of December 17-18.

This instument, a 2/10 style 'H' WurliTzer, originally installed in the Deluxe Theatre in Wellington, was donated some years ago to the Tauranga City Council by a community based entertainment club. Both Margaret Hall & Neil Jensen have played the instrument in concert when it was in the Town Hall. Your editor used to play the organ occasionally due to the fact that Tauranga was his home town.

T e organ was opened by Dennis and Heidi James in 1972 following the original installation by Mr. Rex White. Now, sixteen years later, Rex aged 68 and his band of volunteers, many of whom are women, are completing the re-installation. It is very appropriate that Dennis James is once again presiding over the organ for the opening.

The City Council has provided funding to the sum of NZ\$85,000 for the installation of glass fronted chambers and a hoist to lift the console to the auditorium. Both the Xylophone and the Chrysoglott will be unenclosed as the chambers do not have sufficient room to allow their installation.

TOSA (N.S.W.) sends sincere congratulations to our friends across the Tasman. We wish the Tauranga Theatre Organ Society well for the opening in December. Believe us, we all know what you must be feeling like at this moment.

Another organ is saved, and after all, isn't that what TOSA and like societies are all about!

The Ballarat Compton

Members may have been aware that the theatre in which the Ballarat Theatre Organ Society has their Compton Organ installed is being completely restored. The following is an article from their September 1988 journal.

'When Tony Fenelon took the Compton down on 8 November 1987, the lift and sound chutes were covered with carpet and sheeting, relay racks and blower sealed with plastic, the chambers locked up and every effort made to protect our organ from the holocaust that was to folwhen rebuilding works were halted and the theatre cleaned up for the South Street Competitions, it was with some trepidation that the blower was switched on, and organ tuner David Cross checked every rank and note, and declared the organ to be in excellent shape! The lift was uncovered and the console rose up into the theatre, the first time for 10 months. The theatre manager and a few technicians were lighting audience for a few muted numbers as the sound chutes were still cluttered with this and that. During the competitions the Compton played without a hitch and its tone is still magnificent!'


Where is the museum?
