China's high-speed train breaks record by Malcolm

ON BOARD THE HARMONY EXPRESS

"WOW, It is faster than a helicopter," exclaimed Luo Rong-guang as the Harmony Express eased out of Wuhan station and began to gain speed.

Within a minute the world's fastest train was travelling at 193km/h. By the time the Harmony Express, or Hexie Hao, hit its first bend, it was doing a steady 350km/h. As the lush rice paddies of Hunan province, China's breadbasket, passed the windows in a blur, the inside of the train was eerily still.

Wholly Chinese-built using technology from Siemens and Kawasaki, the Harmony Express is faster than Japan's Shinkansen bullet trains and France's TGVs.

In testing, it reached nearly 400km/h and it covers the 1000 kilometres between Wuhan and Guangzhou, the equivalent of a Journey from Sydney to Brisbane, in three hours. The trip previously took almost 11 [hours].

"It is just amazing," said Mr Lou, 33, a businessman from the eastern city of Ningbo who was visiting factories in Guangzhou. "When the minister for rail said last year that China would one day have trains running at over 300 mph, I thought it was an empty boast. Now I can see it is not a dream at all".

The Harmony Express is just the first step of an epic \$850 billion project to build nearly 30,000 kilometres of railways in the next five years, 13,000 kilometres of which will be tracks for high speed trains.

China, the US and Japan are locked in a race to build superfast train routes. All three countries are hoping that trains, rather than polluting planes or cars, will once again form the backbone of their domestic travel network.

More than 5 million Chinese have travelled by train every day this month in the run-up to yesterday's New Year holiday, always the peak travel weekend.

The high-speed train routes to be rolled out over the next three years will spread economic development to the countryside and bind together unruly regions such as Tibet and Xinjiang.

"I remember taking my first train back in 1989," Mr Lou said.

"It was one of the old green locomotives that roared with noise and travelled at 30mph... The passengers just dropped their rubbish on the floor, so cleaners had to pass through every hour. There was one lavatory for every 200 passengers and the queues were horrific."

But aboard the Harmony Express, and at Wuhan's \$2.7 billion Frenchdesigned railway station, everything is spotless.

For some, it is one of the most visible signs for how far China has come. By 2012 the high-speed line will extend all the way to Beijing.

The manuals are Allen's own adjustable, wooden keyboards. The accompaniment manual has second touch. All preset pistons are "user configurable". The stop controls are traditional, moving tabs.

The beautiful timber console is finished with real walnut.

This instrument is offered with a Five Year Parts / Labour warranty. It has been replaced by a larger Allen theatre organ.

Nathan Avakian: Outside the box--A Celebration of Music and Movement By Mike Bryant From the March April 2010 Theatre Organ Journal of ATOS

This isn't going to be your traditional concert review. That's appropriate, because Nathan Avakian's *Outside the Box* performance wasn't your traditional organ concert.

The Elsinore Theatre in Salem, Oregan, is a beautifully restored facility with Shakespearean decore. It's home to a terrific 3/26 Wurlitzer, installed and maintained by the father and son team of Clayton and Rick Parkes. It boasts a fully equipped stage and a Steinway D concert grand in addition to upright piano that is connected to the organ.

Now, what could an innovative young artist do with all these goodies? Well, if he thought outside the box...

Nathan did, and an audience of 400 saw a program that not only demonstrated the artistry that resulted in his being named winner of the 2009 ATOS Young Organist Competition, but gave a glimpse into what well may be the best chance for the survival of the art form of theatre organ.

You see, what he presented was not an "organ concert," but a true musical event. The organ was the primary focus, but it also served in a supporting role, accompanying dance routines performed by NW Fusion Dance Company, and a vocal solo beautifully performed by Claire Avakian, Nathan's talented sister. We'll get to that Steinway a bit later.

Nathan's selection of music was wonderfully varied, ranging from Louis Vierne ("Carillon"), to Jerome Kern ("Waltz in Swing Time"), to George Gershwin ("Embraceable You"), to Dave Brubeck ("Blue Rondo a la Turk"), to Billy Joel ("Root Beer Rag"), to Aram Khachaturian ("Sabre Dance"), and beyond. Throw in a couple of ballads, and you have a playlist with truly something for everyone.

There was no point in Nathan's program where one would say "this sounds like the (insert artists name here) arrangement." While there were a couple of instances where a registration associated with someone's recording of a number popped up, it was transitory. The arrangements were fresh and, I'm told by Donna Parker (Nathan's teacher), his own.

Three numbers deserve special mention. "Waltz in Swing Time" was one of the numbers performed by NW Fusion with organ accompaniment. With the overlaid rythms, this is not just a tricky number to play, but is

also tricky to dance to and to use as an accompaniment to dance.

Nathan had limited rehearsal time with NW Fusion, but you'd never have known it. NW Fusion is described as a "pre-professional" company for dancers 14 to 18 years of age. Well, pre-professional must mean only that they aren't getting paid, because there was absolutely nothing amateur in quality about their performance.

Dave Brubeck's "Blue Rondo a la Turk" is in 9/8 time (mostly), but not in the typical 3-3-3 accent pattern. Instead, the main theme is 2-2-2-3. The sax and piano solo parts shift to 4/4 time signature, which alternates with the main theme -- sometimes shifting nearly every measure. There is a solo section on the original album recording ("Time Out," 1961) that gave Paul Desmond and Joe Morello opportunities to display their improvisational chops. The temptation for some would be to duplicate Desmond's sax solo, as it is well known from the Brubeck recording. Instead, Nathan took off down his own path and demonstrated some very advanced improvisational techniques.

No dyed-in-the-wool Brubeck fan would be satisfied with "Blue Rondo" being played on, let's say, a Vox and String combination. You pretty much need a piano connected to the organ to pull it off. Sadly, many organ attached pianos are either too slow responding or suffer from inconsistent regulation. The Elsinore's piano kept up with the rapid passages Nathan threw at it with no problem at all. Clayton and Rick Parkes have put a lot of work into that piano, and it has truly paid off.

Joseph W. Clokey's "Jagged Peaks" showcased the organ's quieter sounds beautifully and effectively captured the mood of this seldom-heard piece.

A word about the organ installation is in order. The organ is installed in three chambers above the proscenium, and it speaks through a reflective grillwork which directs the sound to the main floor and first balcony. The console is located house left in front of the stage, where it doesn't receive much of the reflected sound. The organist simply can't hear the balance of the instrument well. As a result, quiet, subtle accompaniment combinations such as Nathan used in "Jagged Peaks" are tough to keep balanced against the melody. Nathan adapted nicely, and his lighter registrations worked very well.

So what about this Steinway? Nathan's program included a dramatic scene entitled "Too Late for Happiness" which he performed with Signe Larsen, a student at Cornish College of the Arts in Seattle. The stage was set simply with only a park bench and a piano. Ms. Larsen was on the park bench, and Nathan was on the piano bench with his back to her. The piece alternates between the two characters' dialog and monologue

He has played in numerous venues locally and interstate, both as a solo artist, and in a 'duo' capacity. When he can find the time, Ryan enjoys 'dabbling' in photography, aquariums, and camping.

His popular, Liberace style of piano playing is always extremely popular with audiences who are also impressed with his Robert Goulet/Mario Lanza style singing! "thoughts" of the characters. The piano accompanies the "thought" sections. Near the end of the piece, the two characters sing their thoughts in a duet.

Two things make this number noteworthy. First, while some organists think they can sing, Nathan really can. Second, he composed the music for the piece. Although this is a commercial one-act with a published score, when Nathan first performed it the publisher was late in sending the music. Nathan wrote replacement music in case the score didn't show up in time to be rehearsed (it didn't). It is difficult for me to see how the original music could fit the piece any better than Nathan's composition.

Nathan's stage presence no doubt comes in part from his background in performing arts (he attends a performing arts high school). His demeanor on the bench exudes a quiet confidence, and his casual ease with the audience had them in his pocket right from the beginning.

A lament heard all too often, in one form or another, is "Theatre organ is dying. We used to fill the house, and now we're lucky if we get 100 people to a concert by a top artist." Those who were fortunate enough to attend this event have seen one of the best counters to that mindset to come along in recent years.

Nathan Avakian is a multi-talented artist who, no doubt, we'll hear a lot about and from in the coming years. His next program will almost certainly be different, but I think we can count on him to bring his love of theatre, dance, and the performing arts in general into the theatre organ world in new and innovative ways.

If you will indulge me a minute of editorializing...it is programs like "Outside the Box - A Celebration of Music and Movement that will attract new and larger audiences. Most of this audience consisted of people I'd never seen before, not just "the usual suspects" that show up at organ events. The average age skewed far younger than any organ concert I've attended in years. No doubt some of the great attendence figure can be attributed to the performance being on Nathan's home turf, but the fact that it was an event that combined the organ with other performing arts speaks volumes about the worth of pursuing such combinations as a matter of course.

Theatre organ groups around the country and other parts of the world have found success coupling organ with silent film, big bands, jazz bands, dance groups, live radio re-creations, and the like. The young artists of today are our future, and outside the box is where we need to look to ensure the continued life of theatre organ.

Closing Chords

from Pipes & Percussion, the Newsletter for the Friends of the Wurlitzer & the "KIWI Chapter" of the American Theatre Organ Society

In early March, the theatre organ world lost one of its gems from the "Golden Years", when Britain's **Arnold Loxam** passed away at age 93 and closer to home, one of the great gentlemen of pipe organ building here in New Zealand also passed on - **William (Bill) Croft** saw 96 years of life. His family company George Croft & Son were responsible in the early years, for looking after Auckland's two Wurlitzer pipe organs while in their respective homes of the Regent and Civic Theatres.

Thomas Edison's Concrete Piano

When Edison was 52, his iron ore mining operation, ran with his own ore crushing invention, ended in massive failure and he was flat broke. But Ole Tom was not easily deterred. He put the defunct machinery to use in the production of cement instead. His patented improvements to the efficiency of Portland cement production led to overproduction in the industry, and finding alternate uses for his product became a sensible business strategy. Edison went with the flow. He proposed that concrete be used to make just about everything, from roads, to houses and furniture.

The great man's intentions were honourable; concrete is desirable building material in many respects. And Edison believed wholeheartedly that a parlour piano was a healthy addition to every family. He wanted to provide America with an affordable instrument of high musical quality. Unfortunately for Americans, Edison's concrete plans did not make it far off the drawing board. Eleven of his concrete houses were built, but the public rejected them; despite their low price tag, they sat abandoned for months.

All over the world, press laughed at Edison's plans for concrete appliances, and his application for a furniture patent was denied. The concrete piano died before it had been born. But then...in 1931, the Lauter Piano Company took up the cause, and patented a process to build Edison's concept. They then built and sold many of them. The model looked for all intents and purposes as any other 5-foot baby grand, albeit heavier. Kim Hunter of Orange Coast Pianos in Santa Anna, California has played one. He says "the piano sounded like a terrible spinet" with no musical value, and it would be" better as an anchor."

It seems logical that the sound of a piano depends on the properties of the piano body. Whereas the wood body of a wooden baby grand resonates with the wooden soundboard, the concrete of a concrete baby grand absorbs the sound, deadening it. However, Professor Joe Wolfe, a physicist who specializes in music, points out that "the properties of the case contribute little to the acoustics (apart from its geometry). Theoretically, then, it should be perfectly feasible to produce a concrete piano with a wooden soundboard that mimics the sound of a normal piano.

Ironically, Edison's own creation, the phonograph, contributed to the ultimate demise of the parlour-room piano. In 1909, 374,000 new pianos were sold in America. Only one hundred thousand were sold in America in 1999, despite increased population and household income. None of them were made of concrete.

The Orion Centre is located at 155 Beamish Street, Campsie. Disabled access is available at the Beamish Street entrance.


Buses to Campsie Station (on the Bankstown line):
