Society Patron Ian Davies will be appearing at Marrickville Town Hall in Concert on Sunday 29th October at 2.30pm. Mr Ian Davies is a well respected organist and has been the Patron of the Society since it's inception and played the first public Concert in 1968.

Sunday 19th November. TONY FENELON IN CONCERT.

Australia's own Theatre Organist, Mr. Tony Fenelon will be appearing at Marrick-ville Town Hall on Sunday 19th November. Tony Fenelon would probably be the most popular legitimate Theatre Organist in Australia and has received acclaim each time that he visits America. Tony is a most accomplished musician both on organ and on piano and has some very successful record albums to his credit. This Concert will begin at 2.30pm.

Yes! Ten long years ago the Mighty WurliTzer spoke again in Marrickville Town Hall after much negotiation, much hard work and a great deal of enthusiasm and a bit of help from Lady Luck. Ours was the first such installation in Australia and our WurliTzer is one of the oldest. Well, ten years has now passed since Ian Davies played the first public Concert in 1968 and we have arranged a week end of music at three separate locations over the weekend of Saturday 23rd and Sunday 24th September.

Details were given in the last issue of the T.O.S.A. News but we can go over them again for you.

The first event on the program is a visit to St. Columbs Church, Bellevue and Dickson Avenues, West Ryde, where you will hear a Christie Theatre Organ that is virtually complete and that will be played by a very respected organist, Mr. David Parsons. These afternoons are always enjoyable as one is in company with friends with mutual interests and the value of the work done could not be calculated in monetary terms. Your efforts are required. You may think that only experts are required. You are wrong. Our corganisation began when a few who knew a bit decided to have a go at what then seemed a very large and formidable task. The result is the Marrickville WurliTzer which was the first such re-installation in Australia.

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TOM HAZLETON CONCERT REVIEW. Sunday 30th July Ernie Vale,

Those people who were able to be at the Concert were amply rewarded with one of the best performances we have heard for a long while by one of the most proficient amd versatile artists we have been priveliged to hear at the WurliTzer and he did not hesitate to use his sheet music.

Tom showed great feeling for the instrument and was most aware of the acoustic qualities of the hall using excellent and frequesnt changes in registration. He quite frequently played one chamber against the other with separate use of the swell pedals. Tom's programme was delightful in that it showed us the many moods of the organ with a smattering of classical numbers to which the organ and the acoustics of the hall are particularly suited. We were in for a real treat when Tom's wife, Anne Marie sang beautifully without the aid of a microphone. She was heard to comment that she would like to take the hall home with her because the acoustics were so suitable.

We have indeed been very fortunate to have heard such an accomplished musician in Sydney at the console of our 2 manual WurliTzer about which Tom made some very complimentary remarks. It was quite evident at all times that Tom enjoyed playing the instrument and needed little encouragement to play some most appropriate encores. He has won our hearts, I'm sure, and I hope that he returns to thrill us again with his musical talent.

GLENN DERRINGER IN CONCERT.

Noted American Organist Glenn Derringer appeared in Concert at the State Theatre on Thursday 17th September in the course of releasing the new Wurlitzer Model 950 Console.

This new model by Wurlitzer represents their latest manufacturing and design techniques to date. The instrument is quite impressive and there is no doubt about Glenn's technique as he made maximum use of just about everything that was to be found on the organ. His pedal technique is very good and he has the ability to entertain the crowd. A quite sizeable attendance was noted, with most of the stalls section of the Theatre taken. There were three organs on stage and these were there from the Dealer Convention which had taken place during the day. One small thing that I noticed was not entirely common to Wurlitzer but can be found on other console organs such as Yamaha and Gulbransen, why is it that a manufacturer can spend so much money on design and come up with nice little lights all

around the stoprail and then not include the music desk??. I notice that on these instruments there is not the slightest reason why this cannot be done. How many of us go and buy an instrument such as a large console unit and pay a small fortune for it, notice the lovely lighting around the damn stoprail and then go out an buy a seperate music lamp that either sits on top of or clips on to the organ?. Only one model that I know of has a music light and that is the large Hammond. We sit in our living rooms or whatever, practising our music on a large instrument and then have to make do to be able to read the music. This is not good enough from the manufacturers in this day and age.

One thing that was quite upsetting was the fact that the State Theatre appears to have now joined the long list of silent Theatres around the world as, at the time of Glenn Derringer at least, the Theatre is not being used at all.

Unfortunately on 22nd August there were two interesting evenings, both of which we had had not enough notice to publish, our member Peter Held gave a Concert in a Church at North Sydney on a Classic Baldwin Organ as well as the Family Organ night mentioned above.

This is one of the reasons why we are trying to get this information from all sources, we also could not publish the details of the Glenn Derringer Concert time for release.

Unfortunately we are not able to publish the photographs that were taken at the Tome Hazleton Concert as they were taken in Colour and as many of you may know, at the moment we are using a commercial printer and also a commercial platemaker and the cost of making suitable black and white from colour would add considerable cost to the magazine production costs. Our previous platemaker is not now available and this is one reason why we have not had that many photographs this year.

A LAYMANS DIGRESSION ON THE TONE OF THE CHRISTE ORGANS.

Rod Blackmore.

I can't tell you much about the difference in the actions of the Christie and WurliTzer organs - others who have worked on these organs can do that - but I have listened to and played on most of the Christie organs which were installed in Sydney, I've done a little research, and think I can point to some interesting facts.

What's in a name anyway? As most of us know, Christie organs were built by the organ firm of Hill, Norman and Beard. Wm Hill & Son (builder of the 5/127 Grand Organ of Sydney Town Hall), was founded on the business of one John Snetzler in 1755. In 1916 Wm. Hill and Sons amalgamated with Norman and Beard Ltd. In 1923 on the death of Dr. Arthur Hill, one John Christie became chairman of directors of the company, and it was his name that made their cinema organ famous.

One of the basic tonal differences between the Christie and the WurliTzer is the fact that Christes are founded more strongly on Diapasion stops, whilst the WurliTzer has the strong Tibias. WurliTzers have their Diapasions too, and Christies have their Tibias, but the emphasis are different.

Let me illustrate. That well known 2/8 Christie now at St. Columbs Church, West Ryde, has no less than two diapasion ranks - 2 out of 8 isn't a bad predominance! - labelled on the stops as Open Diapasion 1 and Open Diapasion 11. Open Diapasion 1 is a true Open Diapasion and is situated in Chamber No.1., whilst Open Diapasion 11 is a Geigen Diapasion and is situated in Chamber No 2., (The Geigen Diapasion is a stringy-toned Diapasion). The Christie of the Lyceum Theatre began life as a 2m/8r instrument in 1930 with one Open Diapasion. Let me digress historically; the Lyceum dates back to the last century, when it was a large Theatre with two galleries. It was purchased and settled on the Central Methodist Mission in 1908, since when it became the church-in-a-theatre on Sundays. It was later modernised with a single balcony and for many years until destroyed by fire early in 1964 was known as the New Lyceum. Now of course we have a new, new Lyceum.

A LAYMANS DIGRESSION ON THE TONE OF THE CHRISTIE ORGANS. (Cont.)

What prompted the Mission to buy a theatre organ I have not been able to ascertain, nor have I read of or heard of the names of any famous organists of yesteryear being associated with it's use in theatre programmes. Manny AArons, however, was conductor of the orchestra at the Lyceum in the early thirties and no doubt used the Christie as a grounding for his later theatre organ career. Instead of having right and left hand chambers, the Lyceum Christie had one chamber on top of the other and placed at the back of the stage. In the midthirties on L.C. Smith was the manager of Hill, Norman and Beard, (locally), and had some bright ideas of his own; for instance, the pipe organ in the Wesley Chapel, (both swell and great), being on the left hand side of the church, but on the right hand side over the console, is a single rank in it's own swell box a "Flute D'Amour"; that organ also had stop switches, arranged like drawer stops, but consisting of a mechanism which when depressed lit up to indicate that the stop was 'on'. All very well until the bulb fails and you don't know what stop is on or off!, and later replaced by stop tablets. About the time Hill Norman and Beard, (per Smith), added a further Diapasion (Open) rank to the Lyceum Christie; this added stop was completely unenclosed and largely formed the exterior of the organ "case" which on Sundays gave the theatre stage a more churchy look. At the same time the shutters were removed from the lower chamber, leaving unenclosed the Clarinet and Flute ranks. So we had one Diapasion anclosed, and one unenclosed. When the organ was re-installed in the rebuilt Lyceum Theatre of to-day, and with it's new 'straightened' console, part of the organ' remained unenclosed. An interesting but typical Christie story.

The Ritz (Concord)-Melba(Strathfield)-C.B.A. 2m/8r Christie had a 'Phonon Diapasion'. This is said to be a 'very powerful diapasion made by leathering the upper lip of a thick metal, large scale open stop and increasing the wind pressure'. William Sumners book 'The Organ' says, "The stop is associated with the name of Hope-Jones. It is difficult to think it has any artistic value". The Burwood Palatial Christie had a 'Violin Phonon'; you can work that out for yourself.

I digress again. The Victory, Kogarah, Christie had a Violin Diapasion. In earlier articles in "TOSA News", I have seen this organ referred to as possesing 7 ranks. My records say 8 ranks: Bourdon Tibia, Violin Diapasion, Celeste, Clarinet, Tuba, String, Flute and Vox Humana. Perhaps Alan Tranter will set us straight.

Well all these Diapasions sounding forth are why it seems that Christies make a better transition from a theatre to a Church, than a WurliTzer does, if that is what must happen to a disused theatre organ. Compare the Uniting Church WurliTzer to see if you agree.

Whilst the purists look down on the 'gimmickry' of the unit or extension organs, using one rank where four or five 'should do' Christies have exploited the potential of getting the utmost out of a small organ more so than WurliTzer.

Let's illustrate that statement by reference again to St. Columbs. Here you will find a Solo stop labelled 'Alto Saxaphone'. This single stop really performs the function of two stops, operating the Tibia and Clarinet ranks together. Of course, if you already have the solo Tibia and Clarinet 'on', then you don't get anything extra by using the Saxophone. This is a fairly common ploy with Christie organs.

Whilst the 'Mighty WurliTzers' like the Capitol, Regent and State organs have their genuine massive 32ft. pipes, Christies were not to be outdone. Even a comparitively small organ (like St. Columbs), boasts a 32ft. pedal stop, but has no 32ft. pipes!

This is a harmonic or 'acoustic' bass, a device whereby a resultant 32ft. effect is obtained by playing a sixteen foot open pedal with a corresponding fifth usually obtained from a rank of Bourdon pipes; sometimes the effect is obtained from a single rank of bourdon pipes by taking the note of the interval of a fifth above or a fourth below the given note which is to be 'quinted'. In the St. Columbs instrument the Open Diapasion and the Bourdon ranks are controlled by the 'Harmonic Bass 32' ' stop to give this effect. Sumner, (spoilsport), says.. "the resulting 32 foot effect lacks the subtlety of the genuine stop... The effect is usually not good and tends to destroy the pedal line."

Wurlitzers provide stop pitches of 32'16'8'4'22/3'2'and 1 3/5'. But have you ever seen a 3' or a 6' stop? Christies had 'em!. Just think about that for a while! The Roxy (Parramatta) Christie had 6' Quint stops whislt the Palatial (Burwood) had both 6' and 3' Quint stops. I must confess to being perplexed; a true "Quint" is usually 5 1/3' stop on the manuals, or a 10 2/3' stop on the pedals. Perhaps someone will enlighten us. Incidentally there was one Sydney WurliTzer which had other pitches, but by way of modification rather than standard: it was the Regent organ. The upright piano had been disconnected from the organ and was in fact helping the Arcadia (Chatswood) WurliTzer along quite nicely behind it's own little grille. During Reupert Hayes' reign at the Regent he rewired the unused piano stops to provide Tibia pitches at 10' 5 1/3rd' and 2/2/3rd' to both Great and Accompaniment manuals. This reulted in the most beautiful Tibia chorus, being available at 16' 10' 8' 5 1/3rd' 4' 2 2/3rd'., not forgetting the Octave and Sub-Octave couplers.

Having now cyphered at length, I will apply the Ventil - a truly useful Christie device!!
