



Still running the "Castle" and the "Embassy" Auburn, A. J. Benzant, a little later became lessee of the original open-air theatre at Parramatta thus having three theatres under his control.

The success thus won over the past five years had established his reputation in the right quarter, and one day his banker sounded him out about the possibilities of a good theatre at Burwood.


That was near to Alf's heart, and within 24 hours \$20,000 was subscribed. The land was bought and arrangements made to proceed as soon as possible with a modern theatre building.

Continuing to operate the "Castle" at Granville, Alf then brought the Granville Picture Palace and In 1921 the Burwood "Palatial" was erected in Railway Parade. In fairly quick succession he then proceeded with the erection of the Parramatta "Civic" and purchased the Auburn "Embassy" Theatre, also the freeholds of Strathfield "Melba" and Homebush Theatre. In Granville the two old shows were demolished and the more up to date cinema took their place. It was then decided to from one big company, Western Suburbs Cinemas Ldd., controlling the eight theatees and a little later this company purchased the leases of Lidcombe

PICTURED in this special panel are the five organists whose performances are a highlight of the entertainment policy of Western Suburbs Cinemas and associated companies.

"Arcadia" and Guildford "Regent".

By 1938 the circuit had grown to 19 houses all of them very valuable, well conducted properties several of the outstanding. It is needless to add that A.J. Benzant had worked exceptionally hard to see that circuit brought into existance. Several theatres hdd organs installed, and were very popular with patrons as part of the evening's entertainment.

In June 1944"A.J." sold the powerful circuit of 23 theatres to Hoyts Theatres Ltd.,

In 1947 "A.J." started to build up another chain of theatres and was operating then up to the time of his death in May 1950. His passing was a great loss to the picture industry. Of the original circuit only three are in operation today: Parramatta Astra and Roxy also Burwood Theatre (rebuilt on the

site of the mormer "Astor").


POPULAR SYDNEY ORGANIST MOVES TO MELBOURNE


FAREWELL TO HOYTS "REGENT"

PART TWO

7th MARCH OPENING GRAND THE

Amid laughter, the rustle of silks and the shuffle of brocade shoes on the broad marble stairway to the Regal Promenade where, standing on deep pile carpets and surrounded by glinting mirrors, white marbled statues, Louis XIV furnishings and paintings from Italy, Holland and France, it stared in wonderment. The Regal Promenade was set in greater luxury than one could ever imagine. Patrons sat in gilded chairs while alongside them stood graceful The Grand Entaance bronze statuettes which held out ashtrays.

of the "Regent"is a replica of the Great Hall of the Palace of Versailles and the Chandelier is an exact replica of the one which hung over

the heads of the peacemakers of all nations when they signed the memorable peace pact which ended World War 1. Suggestive of a Florentine garden, there is hidden in an alcove on the first landing of the stairway, a beautiful marble group "The three Graces" and the snowy white marble reflects the mellow golden radiance from the great chandelier with its

thousands of crystal prisms.

The theatre had many new innovations in service to the public. During his trip abroad, Frank W. Thring Snr. gave very close attention to details that would make for personal satisfaction of the audience. Take the Regal Promenade for instance; there was a wall plug telephone service by which a patron, desiring to make a call, would give his number and when it was raised a phone was brought where the patron sat. This service was operated also in the car park where a special reserve was kept for car owners who

expected to be called.

HOW THE "REGENT'S" INAUGURAL PROGRAMME WAS ARRANGED: After all the patrons had threaded their way around the theatre's foyers, they made their way into the Auditorium. At exactly 8 p.m. the curtain rose and a short film welcomed patrons to the theatre. Following this, the first presentation was "The Spirit of the Motion Picture Theatre" arranged by Byron Bidwell. David Loffman as the Master of Ceremonies, appeared in court regalia before an artistic backcloth divided into three panels, in the first of which the spirit of music (Madame Tina Cimini-Ulivi) was revealed. The second panel introduced the Spirit of Song (Senorina Gilda Pattini) and the third was the Spirit of Dance which featured a spectacular dance sequence in three different phases; a gracious minuet, an Oriental number and finally a modern dance solo.

Following a quick blackout, David Loffman spoke as the unseen Spirit of Management. The next segment was an MGM Newsreel Minen a master picture, "Faust" by Gounod. As soon as this was finished, the giant gold drop curtain rose on the prison scene enacted on stage by Signora Gilda Pattini as Maguerite, Signora Allesandro Barbares as Mephistopheles and Mr. Robert Harper as Faust. The conclusion brought an ascent of angels through a transparency. An UFA: gem "Jewels of Venus" was then accompanied by Roy Devaney at the new "Wurlitzer" organ with Signor Kost leading his specially hand picked orchestra of 30 continental musicians which closed the first half with operatic selections. During intermission, patrons were admiring the ceiling in the Back Circle which was painted in Dark Blue on which clouds and stars floated. This was the first taste of an atmospheric house that Sydney had witnessed although Union Theatres 'Capitol" outstripped it one month later. MGM's :The Flesh and the Devil" starring John Gilbert and Greta Garbo was the main feature which occupied the entire second half. At its conclusion, for the opening night only, there followed a film of crowds entering the "Regent" together with close-ups of the various celebrities.

MASTER ORGANIST: Roy Devaney, the American organist who repalced Samuel Mensch (see details in Part One) was a master at the "Wurlitzer" console despite the problems encountered at the "Regent's" then tiny organ. In the USA Roy had been the resident organist at the "TOWER" Theatre, Los Angeles and had also played on the West Coast Theatres Circuit. His organ tuition came from two of America's No.1 cinema organists at the time; firstly H. Keats and later Jesse Crawford. Roy was organist in the "Regent" Theatre, Sydney for nine months and in December 1928 was transferred to the "Regent" Theatre Perth where he finished the remaining three months of his twelve months contract and then returned to the US.

three months of his twelve months contract and then returned to the US. THE "REGENT" SYMPHONY ORCHESTRA: Elaborate musical arrangements were originally carried out by Signor Kost and his orchestra of 30 musicians. The original orchestra was mainly made up of string instruments but, as conductors changed

so did the instrumentation and over the years almost any type of music was presented in some form or other. An air of opposition from the Musicians' Union surrounded the imported orchestra; this may explain why it was broken up only after four months and a local one put in. The contracts for the musicians were for twelve months so Hoyts installed the best part of the orchestra at the "de Luxe" across the road, while the remainder went to suburban shows.

On July 1st. 1928, Joe Aronson's Syncopated Symphony made its first appearance at the "Regent" as well as the "Regent Corp de Ballet". However, this was not a great success and, in November, Hoyts engaged Ernest Mitchell who had formed a brand new 35 piece symphony orchestra . He took the baton from Signor Kost at Hoyts "Paramount" Theatre in Bourke Street, Melbourne in 1927 and opened the "Regent" Theatres in both Melbourne and Brisbane. The orchestra, big as it was, became redundant at the "Regent".

From 29th of December, 1928, the only music provided was from recodds. NEW ORGAN ARRIVES: At this time a new 3/15 Style 260 "Wurlitzer" was being installed; This project was completed within 12 weeks which also involved the removal of its predecessor, the 2/8 job which was packed and transported to Melburne by train where it was enlarged to 12 ranks and installed in Hoyts new

Plaza, Melbourne.

American organist, Wallace Kotter opened the new "Regent" organ on March 11th 1929. He was sent out with the new organ which was the policy then. Wallace Kotter, along with Stanley Wallace, exchanged places a few times during 1929 at the "Regent" while Stanley Wallace opened both...the 4/21 at the "Regent" in Melbourne March '29 and the 3/15 at the "Regent" Brisbane in November, 1929 When Stanley Wallace left for Brisbane, Wallace Kotter remained at the Sydney

"Regent "until December, 1929.
FIVE BIG SILENTS...THEN TALKIES ARRIVE! At the conclusion of "The Flesh and the Devil", the spectacular production of "Metropolis" was screened, following it came United Artists' "My Best Girl" starring Mary Pickford and Charles "Buddy" Rogers (which was described as the perfect Picford picture). After that came Douglas Fairbanks and Lupe Velez in "The Gaucho" (a tale of the Argentine Pampas and Andes) to be followed by Charles Chaplin in "The Circus"/ Other silent productions were screened but they were soon phased out when, in early December 1928, the "Regent" had installed a "Western Electric Sound Reproducing Plant" and its first day in public use was the 29th December, 1928. The main feature being Dolores Del Rio and Charles Farrell in "The Red Dance" as this film was accompanied by music only with NO dialogue. The first half had contained a newsreel, followed by two short subjects "Family Picnic" add "The Music Shoppe". The original sound plant had teething problems. Three 16" diameter turntables were installed at the back of each projector arc for each reel, there would be a large acetate disc which had to be synchronised with the picture. A special monitor for the sound was employed by the management to keep constant check on the sound level as well as seeing that it was in "sync" However, this system used to go haywire especially if the needle were bumped. Twelve months would pass before any improvement was done. It was not until late November, 1929 that the new "Mirrorphonic Sound" was installed. This system employed was far more complex than the previous idea. The film sound track was imprinted on film itself as a stripe on one side only; to look at it, it contained different shades of light. Actually, it was light waves which were transformed by means of the photo electric cell in the projector to sound waves. The first picture screened at the "Regent" in this manner was "In Old Arizona" a Fox Film starring Warner Baxter, Dorothy Burgess and Warner Oland. ILLUSTRATIONS: 1. The "Regent" Crest

NEWS SNIPPET

We have been given for publication a small item from a newspaper written around the time covered by the above article. This piece was supplied to us by Ian Hanson too:-

3.3.0 a seat for Charity
An interesting record that the Regent management can claim is having sold seats at a price unheard of in motion picture circles.

Many patrons paid as much as # 3.3.0 a ticket for admission to the lounge circle at the premiere, while the average price for the dress circle was 10/-.

The whole of the proceeds will be devoted to charity and £700 has already been paid. In return the institutions will present the Regent with a handsome plaque as a token of appreciation. The ordinary price scale is from 1/- to 2/5 at the day sessions, and from 2/- to 4/4 at evening performances. There are three sessions daily, commencing at 11 a.m. 2.15 p.m. and 8 p.m. The deluxe performances are at 2.15 and 8.

DURING FEBRUARY THE HOYT'S REGENT CLOSED AND IS AT PRESENT UNDER NEW OWNERWHIP BEING RE-ARRANGED TO ACCOMMODATE A LIVE PRODUCTION "SGT. PEPPER'S LONELY HEARTS CLUB BAND ON THE ROAD" WHICH WILL PREMIERE ON 6th MARCH.

SOME ADDITIONAL DATES FOR YOUR DIARY

We have had word of two functions which sound extremely worth-while attending the first is an Organ Recital by Christopher Dearnley who is the Organist and Master of Choristers at St. Pauls Cathedral, in London. QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS - by Judd Walton Ack! U.S. "Theatre Organ".

Q. In preparing plans for the addition of several ranks of pipes to my theatre organ which is installed in my home, I have been told that I should install only components of the same make as the original instrument. It has been said, for instance, that a Robert Morton-built pipe will not sound the same on a Wurlitzer Chest as on a Morton Chest Etc. Further that a Morton or other make reservoir and tremolo will not give the same results on a Wurlitzer as matching Wurlitzer parts will. Are there any conclusive answers to these questions?

A. Informed pipe organ authorities agree that changing components changes tonal structure of the pipes so affected. However, this answer will get you an argument quicker than a tremolo on a church organ! It has been conclusively proven, however, that a pipe rank will sound different when blown in a chest constructed differently than the one on which it was voiced. This is due to the defference encountered in valve construction and the resulting valve opening

characteristics.

Also important in this regard is whether or not one is a purist. On the one hand a hobbyist would no more think of installing anything but original matching equipment than he would of trying to combine the parts of a Model T Ford and a four cylinder Chevrolet. Others put any old thing together just so long as it plays. Who is to be the judge of the result? As many as who hear it, I guess! A few years back a hobbyist who belonged to the 'any parts will do' school requested permission to use the Wurlitzer trade mark on a recording of his organ soon to be released commercially. The Wurlitzer Company reviewed the circumstances and denied the request on the basis that the organ recorded was not on a complete Wurlitzer.

Recently a pipe voicer familiar with theatre organs as well as concert organs was introduced for the first time to a recording by a well known organist performed on an organ that had pretty much mixed up pipe work. After quizzically and intently listening his comment was, interestingly enought, "He certainly can play, but what is he playing?" This should not be construed to mean that he sound was not pleasing, necessarily, but that it was unidentifiable.

Contrary to what some would would have us believe, tonal structure in a theatre organ is very important. Just as rebuilds in many cases have almost totally destroyed the beautiful baroque ensemble of the early Schnitger organs built in the Bach era, so likewise do the combining of various makes of parts into a theatre organ destroy the characteristic tonal structure established by the builder. And how do you take your tea, with or without?

Q. Are new replacement parts available for Theatre Organs?
