

TOSA member, Stephen Dobell-Brown, writes suggesting a school hall as a suitable site for an organ:

I note the changes to the **Orion**Theatre management and the resulting problems for the **Society**, in terms of access to our organ.

I believe the **Society**'s members would be better in this respect if the organ was located in a hall at a school which encourages the musical talents of its students. Such an arrangement would guarantee the long-term viability of installation, tuning, repairs and performance arrangements, compared to the present situation where we are at the mercy of the currently prevailing political wisdom in local council.

I enclose copy of a magazine article which mentions some of the benefits to a school derived from its own organ.

An extract from "The King's School Magazine" of June, 1997:

"The congregation were joined by the String Orchestra and Brass Ensemble, and, after a term of singing in chapel with piano, it was good to have the partially refurbished organ back in action for the first time on that occasion.

"The Futter Hall organ, designed and built by Roger Pogson in collaboration with Keith Asboe in 1967, is most of the reason for the school's fine congregational singing. Set in the echo of the hall, so hated by timid public speakers, its sound encompasses and lifts our worship and has inspired generations of boys to find their voices and participate in the singing of the school.

"After thirty years of trouble-free service the organ needed cleaning and repairs, and this work has now been completed by Pogson. The result is a sound which is acknowledged as being better than the original." Ted Hale writes of another enjoyable Colin Adamson lunchtime concert:

I would like to give a few remarks re Colin Adamson's St John's Cathedral, Parramatta, lunchtime organ recital on the historic J.W.Walker & Son pipe organ on Wednesday, 10th September.

As per my last memo re this young organist, it is a pleasure to see and listen to his ability and the musical, organ renditions on a small but beautiful pipe organ as presented to a few TOSA members and local church enthusiasts.

This recital was not publicised due to time factors, but the program was very good.

The Washington Post (last on the listed program but first on the day) was presented with a real "march" time and registration. Secondly, the Les Misérables selection was a change of time, and well done. Thirdly, a "Tribute to Princess Diana" was received with applause in the Cathedral. Then, The Rose, a nice slow, quiet change.

Finally, the Angel of Music from the **Phantom of the Opera**, and Finiculi Finicula to finish the program.

Overall Colin presented a short but excellent program of music from this lovely organ, with the assistance of a Yamaha keyboard to accentuate modern sounds, i.e. music such as from the *Phantom* and Elton John's Candle in the Wind.

#### RECORDINGS

John Potter of the UK's Lancastrian Theatre Organ Trust is curious about old 78rpm recordings of Australian organs and organists:

Watching the video Palace of Dreams I noted that in the credits Manny Aarons was shown as being the organist whose music was used (apart from the obvious Alan Tranter sections) to provide background selections and it seemed that this came from an old 78r.p.m. disc.

This prompted me to wonder how many 78's were issued of theatre organ material of **Australian** organists and organs? I am sure there must have been some but they are never mentioned.

Yet, over here in the UK, the reissue of such material is big business and, as many of the recordings are out of mechanical copyright, they can be re-issued for nostalgic purposes for small, special-interest groups such as theatre organ societies. Perhaps the copyright laws are different in Australia.

Anyway, I would be interested to know the extent of theatre organ 78's catalogues in the 1920's/30's if someone could come up with such information from their archives.

# A Report on the Bondi Junction-Waverley RSL Club Concert - Saturday, 6th September, 1997

lan Davies apologised for not being able to attend many of TOSA's concerts due to his many club commitments and, to make up for this deficiency, he holds these free concerts at the club for the Society members. They are very popular judging by the large number of TOSA and RSL Club members in attendance.

The first artist to take the console was Bill Schumacher who opened the program with The Song Is You. During the 1970's Debbie Byrne was singing You Light Up My Life, a song which is currently making a comeback. Returning to the 30's Bill played There'll Never Be Another You, initially on untremmed organ, progressively jazzing it up and adding trems and finishing in ballad style.

His final offering for the fist half was selections from the musical Till The Clouds Roll By. This included a lot of golden oldies, such as Only Make Believe, Look For The Silver Lining, I Won't Dance Don't Ask Me, A Fine Romance, Smoke Gets In Your Eyes, All The Things You Are, Who and Old Man River.

Ian now introduced Valda Lang as the next artist. Billy Mayeri is one of Valda's favourite composers and she came prepared to play a number of tunes from the pen of this mighty composer. First, in a bracket of three played on the organ, was Look Lively, and it certainly was. Billy wrote a lot of music about flowers and one of these

was Marigold. For people who like intriguing titles there was Bats In The Belfry.

Moving across to the grand piano, Valda stated that she thought that the next song title was sexist until she learnt that it was about pickpockets. Of course it was Nimble Fingered Gentlemen. It really showed up her nimble fingered piano technique - WOW! This was

followed by Shallow Waters, before taking us for a ride through the countryside on a Railroad Rhythm - especially for some of the railway buffs in the audience.

It was now Ian's turn to take his place at the console but not before telling a joke. Ian is famous for carrying on the old theatre organ tradition of coming up playing a lively march or something in 6/8 time, followed by something good in the middle, and finishing off with a bang. This he proceeded to do, playing I Want To Be Near You, Wandering Star, Beautiful Copenhagen, Canadian Sunset and Heart And Soul in his first bracket. Next he played a hymn in grand organ style followed by My Diane in honour of the late Princess Diana whose funeral was broadcast around the world later that evening. To finish on a happier note he played Happy Days, before announcing a short interval.

Bill Schumacher returned to the console and from the film Daddy Long Legs played Something's Gotta Give. Moving back to the 60's era came those tunes Laura and Ruby. My Fair Lady is coming to the Capitol later this year, and Bill thought it a good idea to play some selections from this great musical. These included I Could Have Danced All Night, Wouldn't It Be Luverly, I've Grown Accustomed To Her Face, I'm Getting Married In The Morning and finishing up with a reprise of I Could

Have Danced All Night.

Bill had to leave early to return to Brooklyn before travelling on to another engagement at Parramatta. This is a busy time for Bill, as besides this show with Ian and Valda, he is also playing for the Selwyn Theatre, then again with Cliff Bingham at Marrickville Town Hall for TOSA.

Valda returned to entertain us, opening with So What's New followed by By The Waters Of The Minnetonka, then the beautiful waltz, Bolores. In honour of Princess Diana she played Meditation and finished off with Canadian Capers.

Back to Ian Davies and his own inimitable style which we all love and appreciate. He played San Fernando Valley, La Paloma and, by request, The Quiet Village, made famous by the great George Wright. I'm Sitting On Top Of The World and a Latin American Selection was followed by the obligatory Fats Waller piece Ian does, and this time it was Ain't Misbehavin'.


Time was getting on and he was quickly joined by **Valda** on piano for a final singalong featuring those ever popular songs, *Red Red Robin*, *Oh!* You Beautiful Doll, Bye Bye Blackbird, and finishing with Side By Side.

As usual Ian closed the concert with his theme tune, Cruising Down The River.

In conclusion Ian thanked the Club

Management for the use of the Auditorium and facilities for the afternoon, and all who attended. Mary made a presentation to Bill earlier, and Valda and the photographer, and also a present from TOSA to Valda, which Bill had brought earlier.

## Cliff Bingham and Bill Schumacher's Concert

Marrickville Town Hall

Opening the programme, on this lovely spring day, Cliff gave us a rousing, toe-tapping march written by Virgil Fox, Prince of Royalty. Not one I'd heard before but I certainly enjoyed it. Cliff introduced his next item, John Stanley's Trumpet Tune, with special thanks to John Parker for the extra work done on tuning the organ - it really did sound superb.

Jealousy followed and it was obvious that Cliff was enjoying this friendly and relaxed concert. Some mention was made of the big ARL football final, Manly versus Newcastle, being played at the same time as the concert. With this in mind, no doubt, Cliff's next choice was Let's Face The Music and Dance. A show of hands indicated a majority of Manly supporters. However, the minority group had their moment of triumph at the end of the day!

As Cliff enjoys, and excels at, playing marches, we next heard an unfamiliar piece by Richard Johnson, quite appropriately called *The WurliTzer March*.

Placido Domingo came to mind with the next choice -a very beautiful arrangement of *Perhaps Love*. Well done, Cliff.

It wouldn't be an organ concert without an Eric Coates item. So, from The London Suite, Cliff played Covent Garden, which finished his first segment.

Popular Bill Schumacher then came

to the console and zipped straight into Swanee, played as you've never heard it played before - a really bright and interesting arrangement. This was followed by Michel LeGrand's What Are You Doing For The Rest Of Your Life? - an excellent arrangement and choice of registration. This was quite beautiful.

Always a popular choice, we heard next the lovely ballad from Student Prince, Deep In My Heart. There are so many ways to present this music and

Bill's arrangement was a real winner, helped as well by John Parker's attention to the organ.

Still drifting back about 50 years, we heard a selection of ever-popular oldies from the film Love Me or Leave Me - Love Me or Leave Me, Mean To Me, Ten Cents a Dance, You Made Me Love You.

If **Bill** could only have seen all the girls at the Tea and Coffee Bar during this number - all in line behind their table doing their own little dance, swaying to and fro, their hands beating time! Good show, girls! You didn't know you were almost on "telly", did you?

Bringing this bracket, and this half of the concert, to a close **Bill** went back to a more up-beat version of *Love Me* or *Leave Me*.

Following the break for tea, coffee and raffle tickets, **Bill** came out to open the second half of the concert with another well-known oldie - *Heaven*, *I'm In Heaven*. Both **Bill** and **Cliff** are sounding better than ever on this beautiful **WurliTzer**.

A tune made famous by **Debbie Boone** was featured next, *You Light Up* My Life. Played at just the right tempo, with just the right registration, **Bill** made this simple tune sound like we've never heard it before.

Leroy Anderson, always popular, was the next composer - this time his Serenata. The title may not be familiar to all but the melody is very well-

known. Just a few (?) years back, as a young girl, I used to spend weekends with my friends on **Newcastle** beach. There we heard amplified music played and **Leroy Anderson**'s music was featured frequently.

A bright up-tempo beat next for music from *The King and I-I Whistle a Happy Tune*, a change of tempo and registration for the romantic *We Kiss In The Shadows*, *Getting To Know You.*- many lovely tunes were played from this show, concluding with *March Of The Siamese Children*.

Cliff returned and his first announcement was to tell us the Rugby League scores and his first item for the second half - Nicholas Lennon's Fanfare in D, played as only Cliff can play classical music.


At the other extreme, we next heard the ever-popular New York New York, followed by the bright and breezy Dizzy Fingers. A march with a difference next Woman Forever March by E.T.Paull. From Aspects of Love came Love Changes Everything and then, to finish off the programme, that grand piece of music by Elgar, Pomp and Circumstance No.4.

Bill Schumacher came back to finish off his part of the programme appropriately with I'll See You Again. Bill also remarked on the outstanding quality of the sound of the instrument"It far exceeds the sound it had years ago when it was in the Prince Edward Theatre". This I could believe, although I was not fortunate enough to

have seen these instruments in those years.

This concert was a happy and relaxed time for audience and performers, thoroughly enjoyable and entertaining. Both artists did an excellent job. Bill, Cliff and John can feel well pleased with their efforts for this concert.

Thanks must go to the friendly and happy audience we had there too-so many take the time to come and say hello.



# OUR NEXT ARTIST: TONY FENELON

Tony Fenelon can be described as both a local and international artist local, because he was born and raised in Melbourne and achieved outstanding success in his home town; international, because he has earned his 'spurs' and 'stripes' on the international concert circuit, and is up with the best of them in the esteem in which he is held by international concert goers.

Many members would have closely followed Tony's musical career since his early days at the Melbourne Regent Theatre. For the sake of the newer members who may not be so well acquainted with him and to enable other members to catch up on what he has been doing more recently, these are Tony's biographical notes.

Music has always been a significant part of Tony Fenelon's life. As a child, he showed astounding talent as a pianist. In later years he studied at the Conservatorium of Music in Melbourne under famed teacher, Roy Shepherd, where his successes led to spectacular public performances at the Melbourne Town Hall as a finalist in the ABC Concerto and Vocal Competitions with the Victorian Symphony Orchestra, winning the Victorian Final on one occasion with the Liszt Piano Concerto No 2. In 1961, he was winner of the Open and Bach sections at the National Eisteddfod in Canberra, at the same time obtaining his Licentiate Diploma in Performing Piano the Melbourne Conservatorium.

After completing his BSc degree at Melbourne University in 1963, he commenced full-time work as a medical electronics engineer at the Royal Melbourne Hospital, a career which culminated in his appointment as head of the Department of Biomedical Engineering in October 1991.

Tony's interest in lighter music, and a love of the majestic sounds of the theatre pipe organ, led to his "other" career, culminating in his appointment as the resident organist at Melbourne's then prestigious Regent Theatre.

Now an internationally acclaimed artist, Tony has completed twelve

major concert tours overseas including the USA and UK. In 1980, Tony first visited the UK where he performed at several venues, including an invitation to perform for the Lancastrian Theatre Organ Trust at the Free Trades Hall WurliTzer in Manchester. In 1992 he revisited the UK to take part in the reopening of the same rebuilt Manchester Granada WurliTzer, now installed in the Granada Television Studios Tours complex.

Tony has released seventeen record albums in various countries - his first at the Regent Theatre, Melbourne, earning him four gold records. He has also recently been exploring the world of electronic music and computers, and some of his arrangements have already been featured on FM radio in Australia. He has recently been performing promotional concerts throughout Australia on Roland keyboards.

Tony's concerts provide a tasteful balance between popular tunes and light classics and include music from the films, stage shows, jazz and great standards. As the piano has always been his first love, his extensive repertoire of piano classics now forms an increasingly large proportion of his concerts, a feature widely requested by his audiences.

In recent years, Tony has been featured regularly as solo pianist with the Australian Pops Orchestra in works ranging from Rachmaninoff to light classics and pops. His most recent performances included Gershwin's Rhapsody in Blue, Rachmaninoff's Concerto No 2, and a specially arranged tribute to the dance music associated with Fred Astaire and Ginger Rogers.

Also on piano, he has performed in duo concerts with musical associate and friend, Lyn Larsen. Tony and Lyn have performed duo concerts both in the USA and Australia.

Throughout Australia, Tony has performed on countless occasions with longtime friend and fellow keyboard musician, John Atwell, performing duo works featuring everything from classics to popular music on both electronic keyboards and theatre pipe organ with grand piano. During April

and May 1995, **Tony** and **John** completed a duo tour of the **USA**, performing their large repertoire of piano/organ duets and solos at major locations across the country.

Tony's latest CD Tony Plays Duo received great acclaim in the US and is enjoying a similar reaction throughout Australia.

In recent years, Tony and his wife, Nola, have travelled as guests on several cruises in many parts of the world, with Tony as invited artist for the well known Sea Safari group of keyboard enthusiasts, with whom they have become firm friends since 1984. Tony has entertained guests on board ship at some of the world's most exciting locations, from Alaska to French Polynesia, Norway, the British Isles, Bali and the South Pacific

In September last year Tony took part in the launching in the USA of the Rodgers 360 Electronic Theatre Organ at the Home Organ Festival in Asilomar, California. The new Rodgers theatre organ is said to be the closest that a manufacturer has come to emulating the sound of the real thing. Tony also presented outstanding concerts on the new Roland Atelier keyboard.

With the reopening of Melbourne's Regent Theatre and its newly acquired WurliTzer organ scheduled for later this year, there is no doubt whatsoever that Tony will be retracing his steps, not only renewing many musical memories of the past, but moving even further in musical achievements which he left unfinished a quarter of a century ago when the Regent closed.

A man of great versatility, Tony's dedication, energy, musical integrity and personality make him an artist in constant demand throughout the world. Tony plays a lot of concerts, at home in Australia and internationally, on a variety of instruments. On Sunday, 5th May, 1996, Tony played for TOSA (NSW) on our newly refurbished WurliTzer in the Marrickville Town Hall. 
