## 10th Anniversay of Marrickville Installation Weekend of Music. Saturday 23rd and Sunday 24th September.

The very first public Concert on our WurliTzer Pipe Organ took place during 1968, with our Patron, Mr. Ian Davies at the Console.

This was a very historic occasion, and marked the culmination of much hard work by many skilled and unskilled organ builders trying to work things out who had dismantled the Organ from the Prince Edward Theatre and had re-installed it in the Marrickville Town Hall. This I believe was the first such installation in Australia of one of the oldest instruments in Australia so the very incident was quite unique. Looking back, we have come a long way in knowledge of WurliTzer Pipe Organs and many people have had the chance to play an instrument that they would not have otherwise had the chance to and we are now starting to see the younger people take an interest in the Theatre Organ. How coincidental is it that ten years after our installation a Sydney suburban cinema has just completed it's own installation of an imported WurliTzer pipe organ.

We have had many Concerts, both with free and paid audiences, both with free and paid artists, with what has afterwards been decided as artists of all calibres, we have seen good attendences and poor attendences, and yet in all of these years it has been interesting keeping a Society of friends with mutual interests in good going order. In that time another instrument has been purchased and we are almost back where we started from and when details of where we are going to place our 3/15 are known it will be like the old song, 'Here we go again, happy as can be'.

Anyway, a celebration is most defintely called for, and after much discussion we were able to arrive at the following:-

THIS IS SOMETHING THAT IS BEYOND THE CONTROL OF THE SOCIETY BUT ANYONE WHO HAS SEEN THE TOWN HALL RECENTLY WILL AGREE THAT IT IS LOOKING MUCH BETTER THAN IT HAS EVER DONE BEFORE.

MISS NOREEN HENNESSY. Appearing at the 'Organ Stop' on Saturday 5th August.

Miss Noreen Hennessy was born in Brisbane and first began playing the piano at three years of age under the guidance of her mother, who was a famous concert pianist and organist. Her name was Mary Agnes Mogan. At the age of six Noreen Hennessy commenced the study of the violin and one year later appeared as a guest artist with the Queensland Symphony Orchestra, and by this time was known as a child prodigy on both piano and violin. Within the next decade her musical studies progressed to the cello, church organ and singing at the N.S.W. Conservatorium of Music. As a singer she appeared in leading roles of productions of 'The Giesha', 'The Toreador' and 'The Country Girl'.

Early in 1944 she commenced the study of advanced Theatre Organ technique on Australia's largest Wurlitzer Organ, at the State Theatre, Sydney, under tuition from the great Master, Mannie Aarons; and on the 18th August 1944, she was appointed organist at the Prince Edward Console. Here she had the distinction of being the youngest theatre organist ever appointed to a large city cinema, and was to remain at the Prince Edward Wurlitzer for 19½ years, the longest residence of any of the eight organists of the Theatre. She became as much a personality in her own style of presentation as her predecessor, Eddie Horton, part of whose original programme she introduced during the run of the later version of the 'Ten Commandments' of 1958.

It has been estimated that during her appearances at the Prince Edward Theatre,  $2\frac{1}{2}$  million people heard her play the WurlitZer Organ. She played three times a day, six times a week - a real achievement. She made many broadcasts from the Prince Edward Console, and accompanied world famous artists such as Danny Kaye, Bob Hope and Shirley Abicaire.

A beautiful blonde, Noreen Hennessy always dressed in the most becoming of gowns, and, seated at the Console with the spotlights playing over presented a picture of grace and elegance, while the lush sounds of the WurliTzer flooded the Theatre. As well as her musical accomplishments, Noreen Hennessy has a delightful personality that endears her to all that meet her. In 1962 she was paid the highest compliment that the Theatre Organ Society of Australia can bestow when she was made an Honary Member of the Society, in recognition of her efforts in preserving the tradition of the theatre organ.

#### YAMAHA ELECTONE FINALS: Sydney Conservatorium Sunday 23rd July.

The evening began with a full house with the Young Organists showing the people to their seats in a very efficient manner and the evening proper got under way with a Mr. Phillip Burn doing a very good job as compere.

The contestants played well, particularly Mr. Rodney Smith from Tasmania who played a now superseded model Yamaha E5AR to advantage with the film score of Starwars using the various effects that were on that model to great advantage. Each contestant appeared twice, the first time played their own free choice of some six minutes, the second time around was the more difficult as each contestant had to improvise on a motif of some twelve notes only and make this into a full piece of music. The contestants only had ten minutes with the motif prior to going on stage and they were not allowed to take any notes on stage with them at all, only the actual motif itself. The only allowance was the fact that there were three motifs that they could chose from.

As a bit of a diversion two very excellent guest artists appeared in the form of Don Burrows and George Golla, neither of whom would need any introduction both being excellent artists as well as ambassadors for this country who have recently come back from an overseas tour.

There were six finalists and the winner of the evening was Cheryl Smith from Wollongong, second was Stephen Russell from Queensland and third was Joan Campbell from Victoria.

This function at the Conservatorium represents the final of the Yamaha Electone Festival for 1978 as far as this country is now concerned and it all started out some time ago with the various Dealer finals, progressing to the Area finals, then to the State finals and last of all the Australian Final. The winner of the Australian Final goes to Japan where they have a chance of entering the Grand Prix.

Congratulations to Cheryl Smith and one day we may even get to hear her on our WurlitZer at Marrickville Town Hall.

## FOR SALE.

Conn Martinique Model 644 with 2 x 61 note manuals, 25 pedals with sustain, One man band unit, Tuned percussion voices, calliope tuning, 5 preset pistons, 4 accent pistons, string bass, reverb and sustain. This model first appeared in 1976 and also features tremelo and chorus. The organ is for sale from member Mr. Lancaster on 524-8917 and the asking price is \$8,000.00. The replacement value is much more than that.

Tuesday 25th July saw a reasonable crowd attend a concert given by Keith Beckingham for Palings on the Hammond organs. The venue of the concert was the Recording Hall of the Sydney Opera House and the acoustics were superb. Keith opened up the first segment of the concert on the Hammond 'Aurora' which is only a spinet but nevertheless a spinet which has quite a formidable array of stops as well as presets as well as having a music lamp built in, (how many of us spend a fortune on an organ only to have to stick a music lamp on top to read the music with?), and Keith certainly proved that a good spinet is as good as any console.

Keith next moved on to the latest range of Hammond 'Romance' series, Models 123J2, 124J2,125J2 and the 126J2 and it was only in this area that the concert was a bit dissapointing because when people pay \$3.00 to attend a concert the last thing that anyone wants is to be given a sales pitch for the latest models of organs to come on to the market. People who are interested in seeing the latest models simply go along to the showroom and hear it from the salesman. One does not expect to pay for this type of sales blurb.

After interval, (no refreshments available at the Opera House at all!!), Keith went on to play the Hammond Concord and proved that he was a good player and quite at home on the instrument.

Quite an few notable people were seen at the concert including Les Flanagan, Don Jenkins to name a few and a good evening was had by all. I did comment on what appeared to be the austerity of the Recording Hall and was told that the space the Recording Hall is situated in was originally the machine room for the Opera Hall before the design modifications were made. It had been intended that all the machinery required to change the scenery, rotate the stage and raise and lower curtains etc., would have been installed in this space but during the design alterations the larger hall of the two was turned into the Main Hall and the smaller hall was made into the Opera Hall and hence the space that was vacant and thus the Recording Hall. Walking into the Recording Hall gives the impression that it was built in a bit of a hurry but, as pointed out earlier, the acoustics are superb and the small Hammond 'Aurora' could be heard with no difficulty without a tone cabinet being fitted.

#### THE SOCIETY PRINTING PRESS.

The Society is the owner of a Remington 'Rotaprint' which is currently undergoing repairs having been out of order for quite some time. This machine has saved a lot of money in the past by printing both the T.O.S.A. News and anything else that the Society required such as 'handout sheets' envelopes etc., and will shortly be operational once more.

For quite some time now, this machine has been stored at Ernie Vale's residence in Haberfield and, considering that Ernie Vale has most of the Capitol Theatre Organ there also he is finding that the printing press is now getting in the way as the space that it is taking up could be used for the pieces of the organ. The press is not that large and the member who can assist would also no doubt be able to assist in the production of the newsletter and various other things that are done from time to time.

#### STATE THEATRE COLLECTION.

Acknowledged world wide as one of the most beautiful cinemas ever built, the State Theatre, venue for the 25th Sydney Fil Festival, has been classified by the National Trust of Australia as - - "A building having great historical significance and high architectural quality, the preservation of which is regarded as essential to the heritage of the State".

The State Theatre opened on June 7th, 1929 and was the last of the great movie palaces built in Sydney. Today, the State stands as a monument to Stuart F. Doyle and the pioneering Australina Film Industry. Stuart F. Doyle, then a Director of Union Theatres Ltd., personally supervised every detail of construction and decoration of the State Theatre.

Doyle was an artist keenly aware that someday the Australian public would come in greater numbers to see a local film than they would for the latest American blockbuster. As well as championing production at Cinesound in the early 1930's Dyle was directly concerned with establishing a continuously productive industry and in giving Australians a screen identity.

Lost for many years were the personal collection of photographs and artwork on the Sydney and Melbourne State Theatres. Owneddby the late Stuart F. Doyle, the collection consists of hundreds of original photographs and sketches bound in a number of hand printed books.

Brilliant American Organist Glenn Derringer will be appearing in Concert at the State Theatre, Sydney on Thursday 17th August and this will be the introduction of the Model 950 which is the latest Wurlitzer console model. Your Editor has had a sneak preview of this model some time ago and it is this model which will be installed in Mike Walsh's Regent Theatre in Richmond and was ordered some time ago but could not be supplied until it was officially released by Glenn Derringer. Proceeds of this Concert have been donated to the Young Organists Association and the prices are: Adults \$2.50, Children \$1.50.

This will give members who have not been inside the State Theatre an excellent opportunity to have a good look around. Unfortunately the WurliTzer 4m/21r will not be used on this occasion.

THE AUSTRALIAN MUSIC TRADES FAIR. 22nd July to 24th July.

This was the first trade fair that was put on by a purely Australian organisation and, in keeping with the event, the public was not allowed in to see the show. What an opportunity was lost by this wonderful piece of logic. Anything and everything that was new and on the market was all under one roof at the A.M.P. Pavillion and we, the buying public, could have collected all the brochures in one hit instead of going from this dealer to that dealer and wasting a weekend or two going from one location to another. Public exhibitions of this nature are needed from year to year. While ever this type of closed house system is in operation people will be denied the right to see at the one time just what is offering.

#### OVERSEAS NEWS....

For those of you that were lucky enough to purchase the Doric recording of the 'Magnificent Moller' as recorded in the Organ Power Pizza from distributor John Atkinson you now have quite an historic recording. The organ has now been removed from the Organ Power Pizza. A brief history of the instrument is outlined below. Back in the 1930's, BBC Organist Reginald Foort had an idea that paid off. That was in thr decade during which the theatre organ was in it's ascendancy in Great Britain, in contrast with the abandonment in the U.S.A at the time. Noting that many British variety theatres were not equipped with organs, Reg decided to do something about it. He envisagned a 'portable' organ, a conception that ran counter to all previous experience with pipe organs, which generally are best adapted to permanent locations. He got no encouragement from British organ builders, but the Moller Co., in the U.S.A., was willing to try out the idea. Moller was quite successful in assembling a 5 manual, 27 rank instrument in several chamber boxes which were connected by cable and hose. The organ was premiered by Foort in a London Theatre in 1938. It was an immediate hit and the procession of trucks which carried the dissassembled giant across the English countryside became a familiar sight on British highways. War clouds put an end to the 'portable organ' idea, and when the Luftwaffe made a direct hit on the B.B.C organ studio, Reg offered his instrument to replace the loss. It survived the war unharmed and remained the 'BBC organ' for 18 years. After a few years of neglect in a Dutch broadcasting studio, it was purchased by Preston 'Sandy'Fleet for use in the Organ Power pizzery in San Diego. One Major tonal change made in the installation was the substitution of the the Tibia Clausa, (on 25" wind) from the Brooklyn Fox theatre for the original Moller Tibia rank, a move which gave the instrument a much more theatrical make up tonally. The organ also has the standard Toy Counter common to all Theatre Organs of the era. In addition a 6 rank style D WurlitZer was installed in the back of the Power Pizza which could also be played from the console of the Moller.

The refurbishing of the instrument will cost in excess of \$40.000.00 and the organ will be installed by the Moller Company which is still in existence and doing quite well.
