# LOOKING BACK AT LAST MONTH:

# 1969 CONVENTION OPENED BY CHARLES TUCKWELL.

A splendid concert by our Honorary member CHARLES TUCKWELL was the first event of the 1969 Convention. CHARLES! precise fingers seemed to set the standard for this year's three day organ wing-ding, for there is little doubt that musically, this was one of the best Conventions the NSW Division has yet held.

Opening with a sprightly "In Town Tonight" CHARLES TUCKWELL brought to Eric Coates! piece, a stirring and imaginative approach, whilst at the same time retaining traditional theatre organ registrations. His programme ranged from a quite delightfully played selection of "Lilac Time" melodies, through such favorites as "Manhattan Serenade", "American Patrol", Songs from stage and screen, Gilbert & Sullivan, as well as Hits of the Day. MR TUCKWELL rang the changes well and often. The second half gave us a wide variety also, from "Savoy-American Medley", "Dream of Olwen", "Comedian's Gallop", "Strauss Waltzes" to a Medley of Old Favorites. One of the highlights of his programme, for me, was "The Petite Waltz", and this was a fluffy and lilting confection indeed. T.V. personality JAMES DIBBLE was the compere, and to him we are indebted for the smooth linking together of the entire programme. Thank you JIM. Guest artist was the soprano, Beryl Brownlee, whose rich and lovely voice was a delight to hear - she was an engaging performer throughout, and her warm personallity came across excellently. CHARLES TUCKWELL'S sympathetic accompanniments to Miss Brownlee's singing were in copybook style, and fully complimentary to her well chosen items. Both artists received very warm ovations. The 1969 Convention had been launched right Royally indeed. And so to the next event....

# IAN DAVIES PLAYS CAPITOL WURLITZER: (By R.D.B.)

LAN DAVIES presented a bright and breezy programme at the very much rejuvenated WurliTzer at the Capitol Theatre. Those who braved the early Saturday morning cold and wind were well rewarded for so doing, whilst those who stayed at home are much the poorer for missing this musical delight. From his theme "Cruising Down The River", the programme was one of movement; theatre organ memories included "Good Morning", "Blue Moon" with a particularly lilting upper accompanniment, "Steinsong", "The Storry Of A Starry Night" (with that Capitol ceiling twinkling in time), through a jazzy "Makin' Whoopee" and "Limehouse Blues".

A really thunderous "Road To Mandalay", a romantic "So Deep Is The Night" and "Yeomen Of England" comprised a bracket of ballads, followed by requested items "Lara's Theme", "La Vien Rose" and "Sweetheart Tree". IAN further exploited the organ with "March Of The Toys", "Dancing Tambourine", "Vagabond King", "Sunrise, Sunset" and a "Gondoliers Selection, together with a bracket of current pop hits. A foot-tapping nostalgic section of the programme was IAN'S "Western Selection". Much of the recital was new music from this stalwart member and greatly appreciated by the audience indeed.

# ERIC SMITH PLAYS SILENT FILM.

The third session took place at the Anzac Auditorium at 2pm on the Saturday afternoon. The function commenced with a splendid demonstration of Stereo equipment installed by W.C. Wedderspoon Pty. Ltd. of Clarence Street Sydney, who gave the first hearing for the Society, of the sensational new BOSE speaker system, in association with a high quality amplifier and tape recorder. All those present were very impressed with the quite fantastic reproduction of the BOSE speakers, and many of those present are probably now making a new appraisal of their present equipment. The tape played was a recent recording made by Victorian Division's TONY FENELON and was top class.

# LOOKING BACK AT THE CONVENTION (Cont)

Then came the screening of the Society's archive copies of the ABC TV feature about the opening of the Society WurliTzer organ at Marrickville, and the film which was made prior to the closing of the Prince Edward Theatre, and gave a final look around this lovely old house, now demolished. Next we saw the official color film of the Moon shot landing showing the astronauts and Apollo II. This, in turn, was followed by two organ films kindly made available by Palings Pty. Ltd., and these were greatly enjoyed, particularly the film, "Meet The Organ" with PORTER HEAPS at the Hammond, especially enjoyable were this genial organists many touches of humour.

The main feature however, was a silent film comedy classic with organ accompanniment by our Honorary member ERIC SMITH and this was an hilarious affair with ERIC'S perfectly timed percussive and other effects adding more than just a little to the general merriment. TOSA News congratulates ERIC on his clever handling of this part of the programme. After a brief interval, ERIC SMITH returned to give a well detailed lecture with practical demonstrations on the organ, on the art of counter melody. This was highly interesting, well presented with seeming ad-lib, yet it must very obviously have been well prepared, it was of immense benefit to all present whether organists or not. The organ used during the afternoon session was a Thomas Lawrence Welk model, kindly made available by Winton Music Centre to whom we extend our thanks.

Conventioneers then made their way to Cahills Vintage Bistro, opened exclusively for our use, and in a private room, enjoyed the Convention dinner. There was ample time during and after the meal for members to gather and chat, and from the hubbub of conversation in the room, everyone took full advantage of it. We were pleased to welcome three interstate visitors, Mr & Mrs Harris from the Queensland Division, and Mr Gary Vanderwerp from the South Australian Division. They were made to feel very welcome and met many old and new friends in the Society.

# PETER HELD'S HAMMOND CONCERT.

The fourth session of the Convention featured our Honorary member <u>PETER HEID</u> in concert on the Hammond model HIII equipped with a Series 10 tone cabinet plus a <u>Leslie</u> tone cabinet also. <u>PETER'S</u> was a differing style of programme which was brilliantly played and presented with traditional theatre organ styling and polish.

Opening with his Signature tune, "The Minstrel Boy" <u>PETER's</u> programme consisted of seventeen brackets of items - each bracket having its own style of playing and type of music. <u>PETER'S</u> "dizzy fingers" are devastatingly accurate in their keyboard mastery, and the same could be said of his changes of registration - they were very fast and accurate as well as being most pleasing tonally. His arrangements, particularly in such orchestral numbers as the "Overture Zampa" were outstandingly good and fully revealed his experience as a theatre organist.

It is extremely difficult to select a highlight from a programme which has been of a uniformly high standard, but I would personally feel that Eric Coate's "London Suite" and the "Zampa Overture" would have been the choice of many of his audience, they were certainly highlights for me. In all, it was a most enjoyable musical experience, and judging by the applause which followed PETER'S final item, those attending the concert, thought so too.

#### SESSION NUMBER 5 - JAM SESSION:

On Sunday morning at 10am Conventioneers gathered at Marrickville Town Hall for the Member's Jam Session. This was a very informal affair indeed and those who were there enjoyed themselves fully, it was reported to TOSA News.

## REUBERT HAYES IN CONVENTION FINALE.

The final session took place at Noel Winter's lovely Odeon Theatre at Campsie with our Honorary member REUBERT HAYES at the console of the theatre's electronic organ, and he excitingly rang down the curtain on our three days of organ pleasure. Long known as a perfectionist, REUBERT HAYES has, over many years, set himself a standard of musicianship from which he does not depart. We were once again, treated to a recital in which timing, showmanship and programming matched the organists ability at the keyboard. The only word of criticism I would dare to offer, is that it all ended too soon: The Society extends its grateful thanks to the organists for their dicated work in preparing, rehearsing and presenting concerts that were truly memorable. On behalf of all members TOSA News salutes you all. Congratulations and long my you all continue to play the kind of music which brought so much pleasure to us.

#### HOWARD RUSSELL AT LYCEUM THEATRE'S CHRISTIE.

Promptly at 1pm on Sunday 24th August, our member HOWARD RUSSELL appeared at the console of the 2/10 Christie Theatre Pipe Organ in Sydney's Lyceum Theatre and presented a most enjoyable concert indeed. It is so many years since many of us heard a Christie organ in a theatre that perhaps we had almost forgotten just what this make of organ sounded like in the theatre atmosphere. It was a refreshing experience to say the least. The weight of the 32' pedal was the first thing to impress me - despite its weight it seemed so much more resonant than I remembered it. Tonally, it is a very bright organ indeed and obviously fast and responsive. After listening for only a short time, my eyes closed and I was back in the Roxy Theatre Parramatta - at least in my imagination.

Despite the fact that this theatre is used as a church on Sundays HOWARD RUSSELL, by his programme content, made it very clear that he enjoys playing theatre organ as much as he does when he uses the instrument for church services, many of which are broadcast widely in this State. Those accustomed to hearing this instrument over the radio as a church organ would have been very impressed had they been in the auditorium and heard it as a theatre organ. And what a variety of fare HOWARD offered us.

Opening with a nicely played "Showboat" selection we were treated to such offerings as Moon River, Five Foot Two, Eyes Of Blue, The Impossible Dream, Bells Across The Meadow, Ave Maria, Toccata, Obla-Di, Ob-la-da, Love Is Blue, Georgy Girl, Hernandos Hideaway, and Never On Sunday. (Never On Sunday??? - well on this occasion - yes definitely.) In his Light Classical Section, HOWARD featured Traumerie, Blue Danube Waltz, Wine, Women & Song, Trumpet Tune, followed by the popular King & I Selection, High Noon and I'll Walk With God. As a final concession, perhaps, Onward Christian Soldiers and The March Of The War Priests, both played with full regard for the organ's straight potential. HOWARD RUSSELL'S concert deserved to have had a full house, for it was a splendid performance characterised by a lot of preparation and hard work. We could not have had a better re-union with such an old friend as the Christie theatre pipe organ than this dedicated organist gave us, and the Society extends its sincere thanks to HOWARD both for his playing, as well as for making this visit possible. We also wish to thank the Church authorities for inviting us to visit their Church In A Theatre - Sydney's Lyceum.

#### AUSTRALIA'S YOUNGEST THEATRE ORGANIST.

Our member <u>RAY THORNIEY</u> must surely be the youngest theatre organist in the country at the present time. He now plays regularly each Saturday night at the console of the Christie theatre pipe organ in the New Victory Theatre at Kogarah. It would appear that <u>RAY</u> is following in the footsteps of very many of Australia's theatre organists of the "golden days" a large number of whom played seasons at this well known house, the only suburban cinema which has retained its pipe organ. The term "New Victory Theatre" probably refers to the management's policy of presenting the organ, rather than to the building, to make the situation clear.

# VICTORIAN DIVISION NEWS. (From Vox Magazine)

September issue of Vox reports an outstanding concert at the Dendy Theatre by TONY FENELON prior to his taking off for America. It was held on Sunday 31st August and TONY left shortly afterwards to fulfil his USA tour which extends from September 12th through to October 12th. His final concert will be on Sunday 12th at the Wiltern Theatre Los Angeles on the 4/37 Kimball organ there. This takes place in the morning and TONY leaves on his return by QANTAS at 8pm the same night.

The Victorian Division have purchased the grand piano formerly in the dressing room of their late Patron STANFIELD HOLLIDAY when he was organist at the Melbourne Regent Theatre. It will be kept on stage at the Dendy Theatre and used in concerts for the Division in association with their WurliTzer. It was used in the farewell concert by TONY FENELON and is a definite asset to the Division.

# QUEENSLAND DIVISION NEWS.

The Queensland Division's biggest function to date is the Warana Festival Organ Spectacular which takes place just after we have gone to press. Presented in the Brisbane City Hall, there will be no less than six electronic organs on stage, all played by famous top line organists, plus the City Hall Pipe organ. TOSA News understands the proceeds go to the Queensland Division's pipe organ purchase fund, which should receive a healthy boost from this well organised concert.

Another item of wide and exciting interest, is the announcement that WILBUR KENTWEIL will be featured in a concert at the lovely Regent Theatre Brisbane on Sunday 28th September. This event also takes place after we have gone to press. After a rest of six years an organ will once again rise from the pit in this movie mansion. It will not be the theatre's WurliTzer however - this being removed several years ago, but a Conn electronic theatre organ. The thrilling part of this news item is that the console will be placed on the lift thus enabling members of the Queensland Division to savour the excitement of witnessing this most impressive piece of theatrical showmanship. The man who first thought of placing an organ on a lift was indeed a genius, the impact that it made in those less sophisticated days still tains its magic in the jet age of today. Verily, was he not ahead of his time??

Tom F. Ellis, Queensland Division's "Tibia" News Editor, noted that TONY FENELON had

been appointed as Patron of the Western Australian Division, saying that he was a little confused as he thought that <u>REGINALD DIXON</u> was the nationwide Patron of our Society.
