The World's Strangest WurliTzer

Dateline: February 25, 1925, and the U.S. press reported the following:-

A special 12-car train, containing the mammoth Wurlitzer Unit Organ for the Roosevelt Memorial Park in Los Angeles, has started on its transcontinental journey from North Tonawanda, New York. H. C. Wittler, representing the Roosevelt Memorial Park Association, will accompany the organ. At each stop, he plans to give a short talk on the project, including the organ's part of the plan.

It is said that President Roosevelt on hearing the strains of "The Rosary", played on a Wurlitzer organ, declared that if everybody could hear such music each day, the world would be a better place in which to live. Consequently, the association is installing the organ in an outdoor shell so that each evening at sunset, the strains of "The Rosary" will peal out with volume enough to be heard over a radius of five miles. It will also be broadcast.

The cost of the organ, the largest ever built, is \$150,000; 300 miles of wiring are used and 150,000 electrical connections enter the console. The largest pipe is 32 feet long, 40 inches square at the top and weighs half a ton; the smallest is 3/4" in length and weighs half an ounce."

The newspapers as often happens had most of the facts wrong. It is true that this "mammoth" organ was installed in a Cemetery, and its still there and playable in 1985! Typical of the reporting of the size of theatre organs back in the 1920's most other facts were grossly exagerated which leads one to believe that much of the false information was "fed" to the newspapers by over enthusiastic businessmen.

The Wurlitzer Company by 1925 had built organs almost twice the size of this 4-manual 17-rank Wurlitzer, the cost was initially believed to have been around the region of \$50,000 or less, the wiring and electrical connections would have been about 10% of that quoted. The only fact they did get right was the size of the larg-

est pipe - the 32' Diaphone which is a massive 42 inches square at the top of the pipe!

The pipework is located in a large two storey purpose-built organ loft. The console is in a separate partially sunken cubicle about 75 feet away. The organist opens the windows to hear himself, although the closed cubicle offers some protection from the blast of heavy combinations. (it can be heard up to half a mile away).

Wind pressures to the pipework vary from 15 inches to a massive 50 inches. (The maximum pressure at Marrickville is 15 inches and the minimum 6 inches) As can be seen from the accompanying photographs the pipework is of massive scale as one would expect with an open-air organ on such high wind pressures.

The organ was plagued by mechanical failures from the start, mostly connected with the unusual pressures. Primary valves and magnets designed for 10 15 inch pressure were unstable on the higher pressures. Wurlitzer contracted with James H. Nuttall (a well respected local organ builder) to correct the condition. Nutall rebuilt the chests to get the high pressure off of the lower pressure primary valves, thus solving the action problems. However, the 50 h.p. blower required a fine water spray to cool it. It worked fine until someone forgot to shut off the water one day. Part of the chamber roof fell in during the Long Beach earthquake, damaging the pipework. Little by little more and more of the organ became inoperable. It went entirely dead in 1959. Then patient hobbyists came along and today nearly all of it is in playing shape. It is heard on Sundays when the weather is good, played by local organists - classics and pops alike.

On the Wurlitzer shipping list it appears simply as "Opus 998, 4-manual special, 2/18/25". The organ as previously stated cost in the region of \$50,000, but it was a financial loss to the Wurlitzer Company which spent easily

another \$50,000 rebuilding and revamping it during the first years after installation. Tonally it is more majestic than theatrical but it mellows as the listener backs off. At 500 feet it begins to sweeten. Even the full sets of percussions (which include a set of large "tower" scale Chimes and a huge scale Marimba Harp) sound better at a distance.


Included in the relay room is a Wurlitzer Roll Playing Mechanism which has been unplayable for many years, as usual when this unit is included it has been "ratted" for magnets to keep the remainder of the instrument in serviceable condition. Presumably the daily "sunset performance" of "The Rosary" would have been rendered by this unit in days gone by.

The Roosevelt Memorial Park Wurlitzer would certainly have to rate as the World's strangest pipe organs.




A view of the pipe chamber building at Roosevelt Park Cemetary Gardens.



DOWN MEMORY LANE

Number 20 of a monthly series by

FRANK ELLIS

A journalist, interviewing organist Barrie Brettoner one evening at the Savoy Theatre Enfield, found his task very difficult and frustrating. One of the projectors was giving serious trouble that night, and every few minutes the screen went blank. Barrie had to make a hurried dash to the console to "fill in" with music until the projector reluctantly began to function again.

It was not a very satisfactory way of interviewing an artist, about his views on what made up a great organ presentation to a cinema audience of mixed ages and tastes. Still, broken down projectors were a very real part of being a theatre organist in those days, and when it happened, the poor organist had to play continuously until repairs had been effected. Heaven help the poor organist caught with a limited and un-rehearssed repertoire.

In speaking of his organ playing days in England and Denmark, Barrie praised the Compton theatre organ but with some reservations about THAT peculiar stop, the Mellotone - so often overused by many organists, including some who should have known better. Like Vegemite, too much spoils the flavor, but used with taste, it had some merit.

Asked about up and coming organists in England at that time, Barrie nominated two - Ray Baines and Stewart Barry as being well worth watching.

In May 1940, which, by the way, is the month I'm reminiscing about in this issue of TOSA NEWS, it had been announced that Des Tanner had received an extension of his contract with Hoyt's Theatres by a further twenty six weeks. Des, of course, was playing Hammond and had appeared in more than one of their theatres, one which comes to mind was the Century, where the console was situated in a niche on the left hand side of the proscenium. He also appeared in the Embassy where the organ was on stage.

May 1940 being the early days of the war, there was a great deal of patriotic music being played by the theatre organ boys, however, Owen Holland outdid them all and received rave notices for his presentation at the Regent of "There'll Always Be An England" into which he skilfully wove Elgar's "Land Of Hope & Glory". On the Regent Wurlitzer with its very lush Tibias, Owen made "Land Of Hope & Glory" a thrilling musical experience. Owen was said to be playing better than ever at that time.

Clarrie Black at the Parramatta Astra was reviving many of the beautiful waltzes of yesteryear, and doing it very well indeed. His audiences really ate it up. In his last week of relieving Manny Aarons at the State Theatre, Jim Williams played the "Minuet In Jazz" in a way that had audiences clamouring for more of the same.

Also in the same month, at the State Theatre, Flo Paton and Mamie Reid were featured at two grand pianos playing Gershwin's "Rhapsody in Blue" accompanied by the State Symphony
Orchestra Yes I did say symphony
orchestra and not the State Theatre Band. At that time, stage bands such as Tiny Douglas and the State Orchestra and Bert Howell and his band, had not arrived on the scene - well not at the State Theatre, which, after all, advertised itself (and rightly so in my opinion) as "The Empire's Greatest Today in 1985, its the greatest, but alas, the Empire has long since disappeared. However, after its complete restoration 4 or 5 years ago, the State is back in all its pristine glory.

A photograph of the Regent Theatre's stage show at that time revealed that, including Owen Holland at the organ, the orchestra boasted no less than 17 musicians including two grand pianos.

Them wuz the days, them wuz!!! More bits and pieces next month.

I'm told that this lovely house has a swimming pool and that a summertime party is being contemplated. If it's on, put my name on the list please. . . and many thanks again to "Edna".



Ron also supports me in many other ways too, even attending the studios with me to give whatever other assistance may be needed.

Being a thoroughly proficient musician, John usually provides the names from memory, but if research is necessary, then it is carried out willingly and promptly.

There have been other members too, who have helped in various ways on some occasions, and to all of them

my grateful thanks - but especially to John, Ron and Bill.

I shall be continuing with the program up to and including number 80. After that, well, I will have to consider whether I will continue on or whether the series will come to an end. It is a very time consuming project when added to the other TOSA activities I am involved in. Perhaps some other TOSA member may be found able to carry on the show, but, that of course would need the approval and co-operation of 2CBA.

Its been a very rewarding and pleasant task for me, made easier, because of the loyal help of the TOSA members of whom I have spoken - thanks again everybody.

CONCERT REVIEW

ORGAN RESTORATION REPORT

By Norm Weismantel

THE ORION CENTRE PROJECT:

The floors of both chambers at the Orion Centre have been covered with light coloured vinyl flooring for ease of cleaning and to make it easier to find small items that may be dropped on the floor. Those who assisted me to do this job were Jim Bennison, Clarrie Stuart, Russell Robertson, and Bill Bullock.

Recovering of the 2000 odd primary and secondary air motors for the pipe chests is in the capable hands of Robert and David Cook, Jim Bennison Beryl and Clarrie Stuart, Russel Robertson, and Bill Bullock, and is more than half completed.

The pallets from the pipe chests have to be machined square so Alan Rennie and Bob Robinson have removed the operating levers from the 15 ranks of pallets.

Bill Bullock, and Athol Phillips with his VW Kombi, assisted in the dismantling of the large swell shutters and the removal of all eight sets of swell shutters from storage at Haberfield to a Church Hall at Kingsgrove. The shutters are to be modified to suit the Orion Centre.

Following the installation of the stop switches in the fully restored stop rail by Ron Wilson and Robert Gliddon, the fitting of diodes and the wiring of the stop rail is being done by John Weismantel. The organ console has been painted by Ian Palmer and is ready for assembly.

All members who attend the A.G.M. at Campsie will have the opportunity to inspect the organ chambers and to learn what is proposed, to install the organ. Perhaps you may be enthused to join the happy band of workers.
