




A VISIT TO NOREEN HENNESSY & BARRIE BRETTONER

Last year, when 2CBA's Rev. Vernon Turner asked me to present a new series of broadcasts on the careers of some of Australia's theatre organists, he pointed out to me that little had been done to record their careers for preservation in the National Film and Sound Archives, and this was a situation which needed to be remedied. It was with this in mind I was persuaded to record the series for presentation on 2CBA-FM, after which the tapes would be despatched to the Canberra archives.

In 1968, I interviewed 14 of our well loved theatre organists, and these were published in TOSA NEWS during the six years I was the Editor. Sadly in 1990, only 5 of those 14 organists are still with us. They are lan Davies, Denis Palmistra, Jean Penhall, Noreen Hennessy and Barrie Brettoner.

After I wrote the scripts for the series, I either showed them or read them to each organist over the phone. Ian, Denis and Jean all gave me their approval. However, in the case of Noreen and Barrie, who are both in nursing homes, I did not present the script to them before recording the series.

I had visited Barrie several times in the last few years, on one occasion taking his old friend Denis Palmistra to see him, but I did not know which nursing home Noreen was in. Barrie was in a nursing home at Hurstville, and through my old friend Bill Schumacher, I learned the name of the home which Noreen was in at Manly.

In the last three weeks, I have visited both of them, and the pleasure that my visit gave them was both a rewarding and humbling experience for me. The fact that they are still remembered with great affection by T.O.S.A. members, and that their names so frequently come up in conversation amongst our members, touched both of them very deeply. It is a sad fact of life that even in the very best of nursing homes, patients can feel lonely and forgotten perhaps, and there was no doubt in my mind that my visit and chat with them about the golden days of their careers, brought back many happy memories for them.

During my two hour visit with Noreen, she asked countless questions about the Society, the Prince Edward organ and its condition today, where all the theatre organs had gone to, and she was stunned to learn how few of the organists she had known personally or by reputation, were still alive. As I left her she said she had enjoyed a most exciting morning and thanked me many times for my visit.

Returning to Barrie Brettoner now, he told me he would have to find another nursing home and asked if I heard of a vacancy somewhere to let him know. Through my friend Wal Lockwood, whose wife is in a nursing home at Guildford, we were able to come up with a place for Barrie in that same nursing home, and he has now been transferred there. I visited him a few days ago and he has settled in admirably and was well pleased with his new home.

Restoring my contact with both Barrie and Noreen has not only been a rewarding experience for me, but has also served to remind me of that poignant phrase "Lest We Forget".



REVIEW T.O.S.A. EASTER CONVENTION 1990

Melbourne - Victoria

OPENING DAY (Friday 13th April) at Cinema North

After the registration session, highlighted by smiles, cheery greetings with old friends, and happy meetings with new ones, we adjourned to the theatre proper and the Blackett and Howden, Christie for a musical interlude.

Richard Hore, popular N.Z. organist opened with an appropriate choice, the "Old Comrades March", and during his various appearances at the console, delighted his audience with such numbers as "It's only a Paper Moon", "The Lady is a Tramp", "Masquerade" and many others, including music from a new musical "Aspects of Love". During the afternoon, four young Australian organists also entertained us.

Kylie Mallett, from South Australia, played "So What's New" and selections from "South Pacific". It is obvious this talented young lady is benefiting from frequent playing of South Australia's own theatre instrument.

Glenda Kubler from Queensland gave us "Serenada" and an interesting arrangement appropriately called "All Aboard, Anything Goes".

From Terry Georgeou, a young Melbourne lad, a spirited "Invercargill March" and a very nicely registered "In a Monastery Garden".

A Ballarat member, Brett Anderson opened with "Smoky Mokes" and then used the organ in excellent theatre style with a Richard Rodgers composition "Victory at Sea".

The theatre organ will always stay alive while there are young musicians of this calibre playing for us.

Following a delicious buffet dinner the convention was officially opened and the opening concert introduced. Four organists, Carole Wyatt (Pinches), Sean Henderson, Bruce Ardley, and John Ferguson playing a feature segment in each half.

Their individual styles provided a bright and entertaining opening concert, the accent being on popular, toe tapping music. I have not attempted to list all of the numbers played but, being an 'oldie' I liked Bruce Ardley's opening piece "We'll All Go Riding, Riding on a Rainbow" and his lively selection from the 1920's.

Carole Wyatt was very expressive with "Answer Me", and her George Wright type "Jealousy" was very well received.

Sean Henderson, not yet 12 years old, showed an amazing ability to handle the theatre organ. I liked "Baby Elephant Walk" and his "Victor Toccata" brought the house down.

John Ferguson, a bright bubbling personality, entertained us with many lively numbers, among them being "Coronation Rag", "Take the A Train" and the old "Boston Two Step". I also enjoyed "Salute d'Amour" by Elgar.

All in all the day was a very nice start for the coming week end.

MAIN CONCERT - Featuring Dan Bellomy at Moorabbin Town Hall 4/22 WurliTzer Organ (Saturday 14th April)

The absolute highlight of the week-end was Dan Bellomy, International Artist from Portland, Oregon. The job of reviewing his concert was easy:- "in the bag" as one might say.

Dan played the Moorabbin WurliTzer with flair and pizzazz befitting his reputation. The first four numbers were played in traditional Theatre Organ style of the highest standard. It was well into the programme before we discovered Dan's first love of music, namely Jazz. His Jazz rendition of "Lullaby of the Leaves" in the first half had me in no doubt that, "this man knows his stuff". His use of the Grand Piano with untremmed Reeds and untremmed Diapason was only the beginning --- his harmony and subtlety of phrasing in the Ballad from "An American Tale", - "Somewhere out There" with Tibia, Vox etc. was something to make you know why we like the sound of the Theatre Organ, and why it is so worthwhile to travel so far, 1750 km to hear these sounds.

The first half was also filled with such gems as Tony Fenelon's arrangement of "Cosi Cosa", the "Shadow Waltz" (open voiced harmonies), "Lambeth Walk", "La Danza". From "La Cage aux Folles" came "Song on the Sand" (very slow with tender loving care ending with strings vox etc.). In "Second-time Around", his use of the pedalboard as a string bass was as authentic as any sounds could be. The first half concluded with a medley from "The King and I","I have Dreamed", "Getting to Know You", "Kiss in the Shadow", "Shall we Dance", "Hello Young Lovers", "Whistle a Happy Tune", "Something Wonderful". "Something Wonderful" was exquisite, with his slow build up using a tonic pedal point in the final bars to the climax. What a high we were on to go out to interval!

The second half began with "Waltzing Matilda" played first as a march, then as a slow ballad; a George Shearing and Mel Torme inspired version of "A Nightingale Sang in Berkeley Square", with beautiful handfuls of chords. Then came Duke Ellington's "I'm beginning to see the Light", featuring the piano with bourdon in the pedal, just to show how the organ in the Sydney State Theatre could sound.

"My Romance" was in typical lush Theatre Organ style; followed by "Willow Weep for Me" with its Post Horn opening, followed by Buddy Cole type sounds from Diapasons and Tibias. You must be made of tough stuff if this did not melt your insides.

Next was George Gershwin's "Someone to Watch over Me", and "Lady be Good", then "The Night is Young", and the concert finished with "It's Today". The first Encore was "Undecided"/"Moonlight in Vermont"/"Cosi Cosa". The second, "Swinging Shepherd Blues", showed off the organ's variety of sounds, albeit quiet and restrained, but large in number of ranks.

We must congratulate the people responsible for arranging for us to hear first hand this talent. Dan's flair with his use of full chords at breakneck speeds was remarkable; chords so unusual that a simple touch on a note not intended would have broken the magic. But the magic flowed through a concert programme that will be hard for any artist to better. We heard unusual combinations from an American organist, which also included much use of solo sounds. These were always taste-

fully used, and that big "Hammond Sound" which Dan produced with the pipe organ during some of the Jazz numbers, can only be described as "Wow!" Yes we certainly were treated to a renaissance of organ playing. For me, the whole Convention was worth the trip just for this one concert.

Congratulations, Dan Bellomy.

DALLAS BROOKS HALL - EAST MELBOURNE Featuring Tony Fenelon & John Atwell (Sunday 15th April)

This evening concert featured musicians Tony Fenelon and John Atwell in Organ and Piano solos and duets.

The layout of the hall is not unlike that of our own Opera House and it has superb acoustics. The organ has an attractive 3 manual Compton Console and pipework assembled from many different organ makers. It presently has 13 ranks with 6 more to be added.

The concert got underway with a duet of "Tonight" from 'West Side Story'. This was followed by the "Tritch Tratsch Polka". John Atwell took over for a short bracket playing "I feel a Song Coming On" and "I've got the World on a String". Tony then took his place at the console and moved Wright into "Bojangles of Harlem", followed by "Sophisticated Lady".

John returned to the console and started with Reginald Foort's arrangement of "Destiny Waltz". This was followed by a Medley of Richard Rodgers' tunes and Jesse Crawford's arrangement of "It all Depends on You". The Xylophone intermittently sounded on its own account during these pieces.

Tony then appeared on stage and did a piano solo on the beautiful Steinway grand, an instrument worthy of his talent.

John reappeared at the organ console for some duets to close the first half. These were "An Affair to Remember" and the rarely heard Gershwin piece "By Strauss" which was cleverly interwoven with Strauss music.

During interval the kiosk facilities were not open to delegates.

Tony opened the second half with Cole Porter's "From this Moment On" and then a pretty arrangement of "Skylark", followed by "People" from 'Funny Girl'. Tony then announced he was going to play the piece that Rossini stole from the "Lone Ranger". Yes, the "William Tell Overture". He said he had not practiced it on this particular instrument, but gave us a thrilling rendition of it.

John Atwell came back to the console and played a medley of Harvey Warren Songs, Tony came

back to the piano for some more duets. "Mazurka" by Khatchaturian, a Mozart influenced arrangement of "They can't Take that Away from Me" was next followed by "Cavatina" from the film 'The Deer Hunter' and the Whitney Houston hit "All at Once".

The finale was Rachmaninoff's Piano Concerto No 2 in which Tony did a brilliant job of the solo parts and John provided some very orchestral accompaniment to it. A sustained applause brought them back on stage for "Little Rock Getaway".

I found out later that most of the piano/organ duets were arrangements by John Atwell. Hats off to John for a job well done.

All in all this was an excellent performance which I would gladly sit through again on a different organ.

(Monday 16th April)

Still suffering the shock of a car break-in, and its aftermath of a head cold/sore throat, I arrived into the warm cosy atmosphere of "Hancocks", and suffered the rigours of some 12-year-old Dewar's very early in the evening. I very soon forgot my troubles and settled into the old world charm and intimacy surrounding me (actually, I had no choice - the tables were so close to each other that I had no chance of escape - at least, not without disturbing a lot of people!).

We were offered quite a choice on the menu and although I didn't eat anything that night, I have been assured that the food was quite satisfactory.

Soon the show was underway. PROFILE OF PHIL KELSALL

Resident Organist at Tower Ballroom Blackpool, England.

Born on Friday 13th July 1956 in Warrington, Phil Kelsall's first memories of Black-pool are as an 8 year old listening to the legendary Reginald Dixon.

He took no great interest in music till his secondary school years in Southport, where he opted for piano as an extra "artistic" study. A family move to Blackpool at the age of 15 saw Phil attending Rossall School studing for "O" levels in academic subjects.

Leaving school at 18, Phil made his way in the world as a clerk at Barclays Bank, but studying for his ALCM privately. Reginald Dixon's successor Ernest Broadbent was established as Tower organist at this time and it was he who introduced Phil to the Tower Company's musical adviser. This led to a post, playing electronic organ for the Blackpool Tower Circus.

It was not long before Phil was deputising for Ernest Broadbent and in 1977 at the age of 21, Phil was appointed resident organist of the Tower Ballroom on Ernest's retirement.

No-one could have guessed the extent to which Phil Kelsall's career would blossom in successive years. Radio and television appearances have been crowned by national accolades such as the title "Organ Personality of the Year" and being voted 'Patron of the Theatre Organ Club' no fewer than four times - three of them in the last three years.

As well as eleven best selling albums, he has consolidated his fame by becoming one of the first non-pop artists to seize on the potential of the video age as a means of show casing his dramatic and highly visual performance.

Every winter Phil Kelsall tours all over Britain. He has also travelled to Holland and is soon to visit the U.S.A. From Worthing to Glasgow, and from London's West End to Norfolk, his personal appearances are now among the most eagerly awaited events on the concert calendar.

Many of his concert appearances now feature Phil performing on his own electronic organ, which has added an exciting new dimension to his playing.

Phil Kelsall has literally rocketed to the pinnacle of his profession, and has firmly established himself on the coveted bench of the Tower Ballroom WurliTzer organ. Thousands who hear Phil play during his Tower seasons will tell you exactly the same thing the Mighty WurliTzer and the legendary Reginald Dixon are in safe hands for years to come.

PROFILES OF OUR TWO ARTISTS

MARGARET HALL

Born in 1963, Margaret Hall began learning popular organ at the age of nine. After three years she moved on to classical piano and organ studies.

Since then Margaret has enjoyed a diverse musical career. For four years she was resident organist for Mecca Theatres in Sydney, presiding over a three manual eight rank WurliTzer from the time she was fourteen.

Margaret first performed for T.O.S.A. in 1977 at Marrickville Town Hall and since then has performed on numerous occasions. At the National Theatre Organ Convention in Sydney in 1980, Margaret's concert at the Mecca Theatre at Kogarah was very favourably received and from that time on, her name became familiar in the contemporary theatre organ world in Australia.

From 1981-1983 Margaret resided in Auckland, New Zealand and soon became involved in the restoration of the WurliTzer organ now installed in the Hollywood Theatre in Avondale, Auckland. At the opening concert of this instrument in November 1982, and again in July 1983, Margaret was the associate artist with Tony Fenelon, performing both solo items and piano and organ duets.

Margaret returned to Sydney to begin her Bachelor of Music in 1984. Four years later she graduated 'with merit' majoring in classical organ. Her tutors, whilst studying at the Conservatorium, were Robert Ampt and David Rumsey.

In the classical sphere Margaret has performed with the Sydney Youth Orchestra both at the Opera House and at the Sydney Town Hall. She has given recitals for the Festival of Sydney and the Sydney Organ Society and has been a prize winner in two of Australia's major organ competitions.

Whilst maintaining a church position and teaching organ and piano, Margaret is now increasingly in demand for Theatre Organ concerts around Australia. She was one of the four artists who participated in the opening of the Orion Centre WurliTzer in October 1988, and has now performed solo concerts in Adelaide, Melbourne and Canberra. Later this year she makes her debut in Perth.

DAVID DRURY

David James Drury was born in 1961 in Coolamon, N.S.W. He gained the B.Mus Degree in organ performance from the N.S.W. State Conservatorium of Music in 1984. At that time he played the Poulenc Organ Concerto with the Elizabethan Sydney Orchestra in the Sydney Opera House. He also worked with the Sydney Symphony Orchestra as well as appearing as soloist in the Sydney Youth Orchestra Prom' in 1983. Later he was awarded the 'Vasanta' Scholarship for overseas study and subsequently went to London to work with the Professor of Organ at the Royal Academy of Music, David Sanger.

David Drury has been a prizewinner in a number of competitions: Brisbane Pipe Organ Prize (1983), Wollongong Organ Competition (1984), English Organ Festival, London (1985). In 1987 he became the first Australian to win the coveted 'Tournemire Prize' (for improvisation) at the St.Albans International Organ Competition. He was also joint winner of the first Sydney Organ Competition (1988).

In his three years in Europe, David Drury was much in demand as a counter-tenor and choral accompanist and gave many recitals on well known organs including St.Paul's and Westminster Cathedrals in London and Notre Dame, Paris. Also during this time he earned the Associate Diploma in organ and the Choir-Training Diploma from the Royal College of Organists.

In the United States, he has toured as a recitalist, tutor, accompanist and choral director. He has also given masterclasses and performed on U.S. radio and television.

David Drury's repertoire reflects his special interest in 19th and 20th century French and English organ music. Improvisation is also a feature of his concert programs.

Since his return to Australia in 1987 David Drury has appeared at the Melbourne International Festival of Organ & Harpsichord, the Sydney Opera House, Sydney Town Hall and has broadcast for the A.B.C. and other F.M. radio stations. He is organist at Christ Church St.Laurence, Sydney. In August 1989 he again gave recitals in the U.S.A., U.K. and on the Continent.

During May 1990, Mr. Drury made the first compact disc on the Sydney Town Hall organ. This is due for release by the A.B.C. later this year, and will mark the centenary of the 1890 William Hill & Son organ.

In 1989 Mr. Drury instigated a lunchtime series of organ recitals at Christ Church St.Laurence which are held every Tuesday at 1-10pm.
