William Alfred Leopold Crowle

William Alfred Leopold Crowle was the Australian agent for WurliTzer, residing at "Wyldefel" Potts Point (a harbourside eastern suburb of Svdney). Crowle had previously lived at Rose Bay, and at another time was at "Toftmonks" Elizabeth Bay (both also eastern harbourside suburbs). His business address "Crowle House" until 1928 was at 161-163 Castlereagh Street, Sydney, but from 1929 was at 105 York Street (cnr. of Market Street). Previously originating from Adelaide (where he had a bicycle and motor cycle shop) he was also involved with importing Denis fire engines, White trucks, Citroen cars, and Goodyear, Redex and Delco products. He was born in 1881 and died in 1948. Crowle was also a philanthropist who funded children's homes and homes for the disabled.

WurliTzer pipe organ (opus 388, built to a special specification likely to have been based on style 185, and described in some records as "House" style) consisting of 2 manuals 7 ranks with a horseshoe type console, left the factory on 31st January 1921 and was installed in the Potts Point residence of Crowle principally as a demonstration unit. There is a record of a concert played there by US theatre organist Eddie Horton on 17th September 1924 (just 2 months before he opened the 2/10 WurliTzer opus 875 at the Prince Edward theatre, Sydney.) Other concerts are certain to have been presented there. The organ was installed by Eustace Dodd, the firm of J.E. Dodd of Adelaide having secured a contract with Crowle for the installation of WurliTzer organs throughout Australia and New Zealand. It is the most historic WurliTzer organ in Australasia.

In June 1928 the organ was sold to Oswald C. Hearne "Montana", Geelong, Victoria, and installed in that residence (again by Eustace Dodd), being in a single chamber playing into the ample foyer, and with a roll player connected. The WurliTzer flute was replaced by a Fincham gedeckt. In 1989 the organ was enlarged to 8 ranks by the addition of a Tibia Clausa sourced from the Lyceum theatre, Duluth, Minnesota.

Hearne was the manufacturer of a noted cough remedy. After his death "Montana" and the organ became the property of his daughter Patricia, and son-in-law Alan Glover (an active member of the Theatre Organ Society of Australia in Victoria). In 2001 the organ was moved to storage; it has now been relocated in a new auditorium at the Geelong College, Newtown, Victoria with a purpose built chamber, and as 9 ranks with the WurliTzer flute reinstated.

Crowle replaced the organ in his own residence in 1928 with Wurl-iTzer opus 1879, an organ originally of 2 manuals 10 ranks, that was eventually installed in the Civic theatre, Auburn, in 1934.

Organ historians had thought this to be WurliTzer opus number 129, built in 1917. Since the organ's removal from "Montana", however, many indications within the organ have proved it to be opus 388 of 1921 vintage.

It's good to be able to report that recent TOSA(NSW) members' afternoons at The Orion Centre, Campsie, have continued without cancellation for many months now. On Thursday, 13 April, we found that the organ-console lift was operational again so that at the end of the session we were able to remove both the Wurlitzer console and the Wurlitzer upright piano from the stage and park them in the garage below. Not that this episode came without dramas. It should be noted that the lift-control now functions slightly differently and is to be operated only by authorised personnel.

The players who took turns on the Wurlitzer bench were: Tom Barber, Deirdre McMullan, Graham Glendenning, Walter Pearce and John Batts. David McMullan yet once more demonstrated his support of these events by being both the eager listener and the attentive helper with the refreshments—unforgettable this time with fresh figs as an additional treat. We were again indebted to David and Deirdre for bringing refreshments.

It is probably worth reiterating that any TOSA members who wish to come along for an interesting and pleasant afternoon should arrive at the Orion in Beamish Street, Campsie about 1.30 p.m. — provided you have checked that the published 2nd Thursday of the month afternoon is still being held. The side doors to the parking area are usually open should the front doors remain closed.

Silent Movies The main reason the Theatre Organ was developed

During the early silent film era, motion picture theatres throughout the USA and Australia engaged pit orchestras and pianists to provide the background music for their stage shows and silent movies. With the escalating costs of musician labour, this monetary constraint was the inspiration for the concept of a "unit orchestra," where one musician could do the work of many.

The *unit orchestra*, later known as the *theatre pipe organ*, was designed with imitative orchestral tones in mind - *The Wurlitzer Theatre Organ* being recognised as the best example - has been described as part military band, part symphony orchestra and part theatrical sound effects.

During the late teens and early twenties, nearly every theatre, large and small installed theatre pipe organs. Though they were manufactured by many companies, the Wurlitzer product was considered by far the best.

David Bailey has been performing at the "Australian Silent Film Festival" events in Brisbane and Sydney and recently accompanied "The Last of The Mohicans" at Pitt St Uniting Church. The festival proper will be in September in Sydney and there are more events scheduled in Brisbane at various locations. David has been the 'resident' organist at GOMA, (Gallery of Modern Art), Brisbane, since it was opened and has provided original scores for over 50 films since that time including early comedies, German expressionist films (including the 5 hour "Dr Mabuse"), Italian cult classics and a host of Hollywood silents.

On **Sunday May 15 David** will play a program of music from movies, musical shows and well known composers such as Gershwin, Jerome Kern and others in the perfect atmosphere of the Orion Theatre at 155 Beamish Street, Campsie.

On **Sat June 4** Australian organist - **David Bailey** - will accompany an early Australian silent film "The Sentimental Bloke" –(transferred to DVD), playing an early Sydney Wurlitzer theatre organ that has been completely restored, using his own Australian score.

To 'ear 'er voice! Its gentle sorter tone, Like soft dream-music of some Dago band.

An' me all out; an' 'oldin' in me own 'Er little 'and.

An' 'ow she blushed! O, strike! it was divine The way she raised 'er shinin' eyes to mine.

'Er eyes! Soft in the moon; such boshter eyes!
An' when they sight a bloke ... O, spare me days!
'E goes all loose inside; such glamour lies
In 'er sweet gaze.

It makes 'im all ashamed uv wot 'e's been To look inter the eyes of my Doreen.

Visit to Simon Ellis music room, Balmoral, Southern Highlands Sunday 17 April 2011

Last Sunday, the Selwyn group visited Simon Ellis at his home in Balmoral, Southern Highlands, to hear the only four manual Allen organ in Australia.

It was quite impressive and apart from sounding great, it looks just as impressive as a real Wurlitzer console. A number of TOSA members were present and some had a play on it. It speaks through 16 speakers and has quite a bit of power.

Simon also has a straight sampled organ which once resided in a Catholic Church in Melbourne, whilst their pipe organ was being restored. It also sounded just as good.

The accompanying photos indicate other activities in which members of TOSA can participate. I feel we were privileged to have heard the biggest Allen in Australia, and Simon was a generous host for the day.

Australia's most relocated WurliTzer theatre pipe organ

(opus No. 1868) has travelled yet again - this time out of the country to the Gulangyu Island Organ Museum in Xiamen, China.

Originally of 2 manuals and 10 ranks this organ was installed in the Kings Cross Theatre, Darlinghurst, in 1928. It was relocated to the Savoy Theatre, Hurstville, opening there on 4th August 1937 with renowned organist Knight Barnett.

In 1958 it was sold to the Congregational (now Uniting) church, Burwood - remaining there until 1992 when it was bought by Steve McDonald for his residence at Banksmeadow. That installation was never completed, and having been enlarged to 12 ranks was sold to Howard Terrill of Heathcote, Victoria for his former-church residence in 2004. Many recitals took place there until September 2010 when the acquisition occurred for the Chinese museum.

The transfer to China has been facilitated by Wakeley Pipe Organs.

This little gem comes from the "Barrier Miner" at Broken Hill for Wednesday 26th June 1940:

"MUSICIAN ASSAULTED -

SYDNEY, Wednesday - Manny Aarons, organist at State Theatre, Sydney, was last night brutally assaulted by a man who he disturbed in his dressing room. As he entered the room a young man sprang from behind the door and kicked him in the stomach. Carrying away Aarons' typewriter, the intruder attempted to run past him into the corridor. Aarons grabbed the typewriter, but was unable to capture his assailant."

An eleven-rank composite instrument that is controlled from a three-manual Marr & Colton console Johathan Ortloff will preside at the console.

Ned Niemiec Residence, Lakeville, Massachusetts

Wurlitzer Style R16, modified by Wurlitzer to become their board-room roll-recording instrument. The console is wonderfully ornate and the organ speaks with a pleasant authority. Ron Rhode will entertain at this venue.

Lincoln Pero Residence, Providence, Rhode Island

A two-manual, seven rank Wurlitzer Style EX (originally installed in two chambers). This instrument is exquisitely tonally finished and is one of the finest examples of a small Wurlitzer in a home. Brett Valliant will be at the console.

Opening Day, Thursday, June 30

Following the reception and dinner on your own, you board coaches to ride to the newly-reopened Hanover Theatre for the Performing Arts in Worcester, Massachusetts for the

official world premier of the Hanover 4/35 Wurlitzer with Ron Rhode at the console.

Friday, July 1

In the afternoon you will travel to Babson College in Wellesley, Massachusetts to hear the finalists of the 2011 Young Theatre Organist Competition and the Young Organist Showcase. From Babson, half the group will travel to the Shanklin Music Hall in Groton, Massachusetts to hear Dave Wickerham at the fabulous 4/34 Wurlitzer Unit Orchestra. The other half journey to the Bull Run Restaurant in Shirley, Massachusetts for a delicious dinner. The groups will then reverse.

Saturday, July 2

Takes you to the Zeiterion Theatre in New Bedford, Massachusetts where Brett Valliant will play the 3/9 Wurlitzer. In the afternoon you will head to the Hanover Theatre where Simon Gledhill will present a show. After dinner it is a short walk to the Providence Performing Arts Centre where Jonathan Ortloff will perform for you on the 5/21 Wurlitzer which is the only remaining unaltered five-manual Wurlitzer in the world.

Sunday, July 3

In the morning there will be Seminars and workshops at the Westin Hotel and the opportunity to purchase from the record shop. In the afternoon you will ride to the Stadium Theatre at Woonsocket, Rhode Island where Chris Elliot will accompany a silent film on the Stadium's original 2/10 Wurlitzer.

For those who are interested in the ATOS Awards Banquet this will be held in the Venus De Milo Restaurant in nearby Swansea, Massachusetts.

Monday, July4

The morning is free to enjoy the sites of historic downtown Providence. In the late morning half the group will travel again to Shanklin Music HII to hear Jelani Eddington and Chris Gorsuch play the world class Shanklin Music Hall Wurlitzer and the Mason and Hamlin/Ampico concert grand piano. The second half of the group will then swap over with the first group to hear Jelani Eddington and Chris Gorsuch.

In the evening everyone will visit the Providence Performing Arts Centre for the final convention concert featuring David Peckham and the American Band. The combined talents of master musician David Peckham and the fifty-five member American Band (the oldest organised concert band in the United States) will provide a thrilling finale to a wonderful convention.
