

LOOKING BACK AT LAST MONTH.

ENJOYABLE IAN DAVIES CONCERT. "What a difference a day makes - twenty four little hours", ran the words of a popular song of yesteryear, and if, as the song says, a mere twenty four hours can make a difference, then imagine what a difference two years can make. The song was of course, referring to the difference twenty four hours can make to a young man when he falls in love, but the two years I refer to concerns the difference IAN DAVIES found in the Society WurliTzer since he played the opening concert almost two years ago.

He found a remarkable difference in every department of the instrument - in tonal qualities, in response, in reliability and in its versatility. He found the benefit of combination pistons which operate perfectly, a refinement sadly lacking on the organ's opening night. IAN was able to approach the concert confident in the knowledge that he could ignore the mechanics of the organ and concentrate only on his playing assured that the instrument would more than equal whatever demands he made on it. Thus, a very relaxed IAN DAVIES set out to enjoy himself as he played, and in these circumstances, "a happy" organist produced "happy" music.

<u>IAN DAVIES</u> style is unmistakably his own - it is traditional theatre organ style with a dash of his own personallity infused, it is as he played it in several of the leading theatres in Melbourne over a period of years. Its basic ingredient is honesty and an unswerving allegiance to tradition with few concessions to the modern idiom in the use of the instrument. When he does depart from this policy, it is only to include an item or two of straight organ playing in order to show the untremmed majesty of the WurliTzer when used as a grand organ. On such occasions, he can be depended upon to display a dazzling pedal technique, for he is no 'mean pedaller' when the occasion requires it.

Some may prefer the modern style of playing with everything but the kitchen sink thown in for good measure, but the traditional style is just fine by me, and, judging by their response, the audience thought the same way. His programme was brimfull of everyone's favorite numbers, and even when he featured a bracket of today's 'pop' songs, his arrangement of these allowed us to see that they did, in fact, have a melody to them, a fact which had so far escaped me whenever I have heard these same songs played on records by various long-haired youths armed with electronic noise making devices more suitable for the creation of space-age blast off sound effects than to the creation of music.

The guest artists were the Bondi Junction-Waverley R.S.L. Club's male choir, who presented, in their two appearances, a wide variety of numbers ranging from, The Sound Of Music selections to a swinging "Delilah". As with IAN, they very obviously enjoyed their work, and this enjoyment was communicated to the audience by way of a happy and pleasingly exuberant performance. All in all, it was an enjoyable evening of popular organ music and singing which pleased everybody.

ANOTHER WURLITZER PLAYING SOON.

It is reported by the South Australian Division, in their August journal, that they expect to have their own WurliTzer organ playing soon. The instrument is the two manual organ formerly in the Plaza Theatre Melbourne and is currently being installed in the Pulteney Grammar School auditorium. It is announced that the organ will definitely be playing in time for the School's Jubilee celebrations to be held in early November. This is good news indeed, and the NSW Division offers congratulations and best wishes for an exciting opening.

ARNOLD COLEMAN PLAYS MOORABBIN WURLITZER.

Vox Magazine reports that the ARNOID COIEMAN concert at the Moorabbin Town Hall WurliTzer, on Sunday afternoon, August 30th was an event not to be missed. ARNOLD of course was appearing at the organ which he first introduced to Melbourne cinema audiences at the State Theatre one morning 41 years ago when he was billed as, "associate organist" to American FRANK LANTERMAN. LANTERMAN didn't stay long, but ARNOID COIEMAN was there for twelve years. Eric Wicks reported that the audience loved hearing ARNOID recreate the WurliTzer organ interludes as he had presented them in the 1930's. It must have been a nostalgic re-union for ARNOLD.

RECORD NEWS.

At long last, there is a release from Concert Recording (Aust)., and whilst this month's release does not qualify in any way, as a theatre organ recording, it does at least, indicate that Concert's "Organ Of The Month Club" may, perhaps, be about to return to a period of more regular releases. Whilst this may be very heartening news, it will do little or nothing to satisfy the appetites of lovers of the theatre organ who are most envious of Club members in America and England who have enjoyed many fine releases in the past eighteen months or so.

For the classical organ lover, this month's release of the organ in the Knox Grammar School Chapel by <u>SERGIO DE PIERI</u> will prove to be a welcome addition to their record collections.

Volume One in the "Masters of the Classic Organ" series presents SERGIO DE PIERI playing the five Vivaldi Concertos as arranged by Johann Sebastian Bach. The artistry of this brilliant organist is beyond question, and this performance can only add to his reputation. The Sharp organ is a splendid example of this type of instrument. It is well voiced and very responsive. The quality of the sound recording on this disc leaves nothing to be desired.

REGINALD FOORT - AUSTRALIAN TOUR ??

It has been reported that REGINALD FOORT will tour Australia next year. Now resident in the United States, where he has given a great number of concerts, he is remembered as one of the top English theatre organists in the organ's hey-day. Few would not have heard of REGINALD FOORT and his giant BBC Moller organ, or of his many records, both on the older 78rpm discs and the more recent microgroove records. A brilliant and well-loved performer, he would be assured of a very warm welcome to Australia, if this report bears fruit.

GEORGE WRIGHT'S WURLITZER DESTROYED.

It is reported from America, that the 3/27 WurliTzer owned by GEORGE WRIGHT and installed in his studio, has been destroyed by fire. It is not known how the fire started. Only the console and some unenclosed percussion units escaped damage. GEORGE had used this instrument to make many LP records and had personally hand picked much of the pipe work over many years, in order to bring this instrument to the high standard he required. TOSA News commiserates with GEORGE on the loss of this fine instrument.

OLD PHOTOGRAPHS DEPARTMENT.

Our member Ian Griggs, deep in research for the souvinir book to be issued in time for the opening of the Arcadia WurliTzer in its new Chatswood \$1,000,000 Town Hall setting is still trying to find several important photographs. He feels that perhaps somebody may have photos amongst their collections which he could borrow and copy. How about looking through all your old albums including the dusty ones up in the attic, in case you can help him out. He requires the following in order to complete the history of the Arcadia's WurliTzer. CHARLES TUCKWELL - IDWAL JENKINS - EDDIE HORTON - STAN CUMMINS - PAUL CULIEN. The photos he requires must show these organists AT THE ARCADIA WURLITZER and not just at the console of any other organ. The original theatre was demolished in 1921 and was replaced with the present Arcadia theatre building. In 1936 the building's exterior was remodelled to its present style. Ian has pictures of the original theatre, and as it is today, but he requires a picture of the theatre's exterior as it was between 1921 and 1936. How about it members?? Can anyone produce any of the above photos to assist Ian with this historic record of the Arcadia?

MEWCASTIF & YAMAHA'S ORGAN CONTEST.

Keith Joice, Secretary of the Newcastle Hammond Organ Society reports that the first places in the Yamaha Organ Playing Contest, in <u>EACH</u> section, were filled by members of the Newcastle Hammond Society. Two of their successful members are also members of the NSW Division of TOSA. (We are happy to extend TOSA congratulations to them all. Ed) In the junior section, Roslyn Pavey, whose mother June, is the Editor of the Hammond Society Newsletter, won her heat. In the Intermediate section, Yvonne Evans was placed first, closely followed by Roslyn's

brother, Colyn in second place. The senior section again this year was won by their President, David Pitts who was placed third in the State finals in Sydney last year. The most exciting part is that Roslyn Pavey aged 8, has been asked by Yamaha and Rose Music, to play at the State finals in Sydney and the Commonwealth finals in Melbourne, as a guest organist and not as a competitor. They ultimately hope to fly Roslyn to Japan to compete in the world finals in that country, which is pretty astounding for an eight year old.

NEWCASTLE HAMMOND - FOURTH BIRTHDAY CONCERT.

The Newcastle Chapter will hold its Fourth Annual Concert at Newcastle's newest theatre, the Kensington, at 1.30pm on Sunday 1st November. This concert has been specially programmed for a Sunday afternoon in order to make it easier for Sydney members of TOSA to attend, and to that end, even the commencing time of 1.30pm has been arranged to enable visitors to arrive back in Sydney at a convenient hour. Their previous Birthday concerts have been of an exceptionally high standard, and this will be maintained. Seating in the theatre is limited to 480 only and the plan is now open at the theatre and at David Jones in Newcastle, so if you plan to attend this function, your Editor says you'd better get busy now and make a reservation. OUR PATRON SETS US RIGHT.

NSW Division's Patron, <u>REGINALD DIXON</u> has written to us after reading a report in the June TOSA News relative to the BBC London, buying several theatre organs, one of which, it had been reported to us, was the famous Blackpool Tower WurliTzer. His long and interesting letter gives the facts, and also makes it clear how TOSA News' informant made his error. The organ purchased by the BBC was the one from the Empress Ballroom which was partly the original instrument which was installed in the Tower in 1928. This was enlarged and transferred in 1934 - 5 from the Tower to the Empress Ballroom where it was broadcast and recorded on by <u>HORACE</u> <u>FINCH</u>. The WurliTzer now in the Tower Ballroom was installed at that time also. The rebuilding of the Empress Ballroom organ is now almost finished. It is being installed in the Playhouse at Manchester reports <u>REG</u>. He also hopes to renew his acquaintance with this WurliTzer, which he describes as "an old friend".

REGINALD DIXON was also very pleased with the full page story with picture in the June edition of TOSA News, on the occasion of his retirement from the Tower organ. He expressed very sincere thanks for our interest.

Your Editor is grateful to <u>REG</u> for the opportunity of getting direct information from him - there is no one more qualified to give the facts on these particular organs than our Patron.

QUEENSLAND DIVISION VISITOR.

Your Editor was very pleased to receive a visit from David Sacre, a member of the Queensland Dvision of TOSA. David, on holiday, was returning to Brisbane after a visit to Adelaide. A young and enthusiastic member of the Society, he was able to give me the latest news of doings in the North, andproved to be a friendly likeable bloke interested in organ doings of all kinds. He delivered a parcel of the Queensland Division's LP record of the "Warana Organ Spectacular" which I gave prominent mention to in last month's TOSA News. MSW members who would like to have a copy of this record can obtain it from me direct for \$2.99. This will save members the trouble of sending money to Brisbane as well as the postage costs which would have been involved. STATE FINALS OF YAMAHA CONTEST.

On Saturday 3rd October at the Conservatorium, the Semi-finals of the Yamaha Organ Playing Contest will be held during the afternoon. Admission to this is FREE. At 8pm on the same day, also in the same building, the State finals will be held. The six finalists selected during the afternoon will appear on stage in the quest to find the best organist to contest the Commonwealth Finals to be held in Melbourne. The eventual winner will be flown to Japan to compete in the world Finals. During the State Finals at the Conservatorium on October 3rd our Honorary member ERIC SMITH will be heard and also the eight year old Newcastle organist Roslyn Pavey mentioned elsewhere in this issue, will appear as a guest. Admission to the night session will be \$1 each.
