LOOKING BACK AT MARCH.

ERIC SMITH SCINTILLATES AT PARRAMATTA.

A scintillating performance by our Honorary member ERIC SMITH, at the large Yamaha electronic organ, made a memorable evening at the Parramatta Town Hall on 18th March. A large audience were treated to a programme which ran the gamut from Bizet and Lehar to Coates and Gershwin just to name a few of the composers whose works graced the console. To this reviewer, this was undoubtedly the best concert ERIC has played on an electronic organ - it came very close to topping his efforts on the theatre pipe organ, and that is saying something indeed.

The installation of the Yamaha was expertly carried out, and <u>ERIC</u> extracted the very utmost from the instrument, utilising every voice, percussion, and novelty effect. He did not unduly emphasize the gimmicks which is to his credit. His guest artist, tenor, Laurie Beatty, was a splendid choice and his songs were very much appreciated by the audience. Highlights of his programme for me were the novelty number, "Kitten On The Keys" - "Caprice Viennois" by Kreisler - you know who's arrangement of "South" - "I Left My Heart In San Francisco" and his Extemporisation on "lady Be Good". This is not to say that the rest of the programme was not as good - it was, very definitely, but those mentioned had that little something extra in the way of magic.

ERIC'S programme opened and closed with his theme, "Life Is Nothing Without Music" and with this statement I would agree completely for this kind of music takes life and makes it into something worthwhile.

ORGAN PARTY AT WHITEHOUSE RESIDENCE.

John and Marjorie Whitehouse were hosts to the Society for an organ party at their home on the 7th March. It was reported to TOSA News that all present had a very entertaining and enjoyable evening. A few of those who played were our Honorary member ERIC SMITH, PETER GROVES, LANCE WELLS John Castray and Heather Moen. During the evening ERIC and PETER combined in piano and organ duets which were most enjoyable. It was a happy and informal evening and the Society sincerely thanks the Whitehouses for their hospitality. An enjoyable supper was served and the sum of \$31 was added to the Organ fund.

DAVID PARSONS MORNING CONCERT AT STATE THEATER.

Saturday 21st March found an excellent roll up of early morn members at the Sydney State Theatre to hear DAVID PARSONS at the 4/21 WurliTzer. The concert was hurriedly transferred from the Capitol Theatre to the State when the Capitol's blower was taken "ill" a few days before the concert. As it has been some considerable time since we had a morning concert at the State, there was a full roll up of members for the unique occasion. Without going into the sad details, it is fairly well known that the State's 4/21 is not what it used to be, nevertheless, it was in good tune, didn't cipher even once, and what was "on" sounded pretty good - there was, however, quite a lot which was "off" ???? Nothing daunted, DAVID tackled the "beast" with enthusiasm to which the organ responded quite surprisingly, not once letting him down.

Opening with selections from the show "Oliver" DAVID played a very varied and likeable popular programme. Sensibly he refrained from performing anything which would have emphasised the organ's shortcomings thereby helping to show off the organ to best advantage, and in this, he was most successful. After the interval at 9.30am, DAVID played a request section made up of numbers written down by members during the intermission. As on previous occasions, the organ seemed to get better as the concert progressed, and this fact prompted DAVID to present "The Battle Hymm Of The Republic" which was such an outstanding item at a previous Marrickville concert, and this item proved his complete musicianship to the full. To have carried this off, as he did, bearing in mind the condition of the instrument, was quite a feather in his cap, and he well deserved the applause he received for this item. The Society is grateful to the Greater Union Management for making the State available to us and lighting up every one of the many hundreds of lamps in this huge motion picture palace. There is no more lavish setting for a WurliTzer organ in this country, than the Sydney State Theatre.

DENNIS AME CAPTURES SYDNEY AUDIENCE.

Rees Wills Pty. Ltd., Sydney distributors of the range of Lowrey organs must be feeling very gratified at the success of the concert presented by their American Company's travelling organist-demonstrator, MR DENMIS AWE. This was the first occasion that Lowrey have presented an official organist in a concert in this country, and following this auspicious debut, it is safe to say that it will not be the last.

DENNIS AVE, not previously known in this part of the world, left a lasting impression of a fine organist with an engaging personality, a flair for showmanship and a very thorough and comprehensive product knowledge which he imparted to his audience without resorting to the "hard-sell" techniques.

During his concert he used three organs on stage including the Hll and the new instrument with the inbuilt tape recorder. Hany in the audience, who may have perhaps regarded the inbuilt tape recorder as a mere gimmick before his demonstration, would have had second thoughts about it after DENNIS demonstrated the very real practical advantages of this accessory, especially in regard to organ playing lessons. There was a very good roll up of TOSA members as well as the large number of Lowrey customers and all were in agreement that DENNIS AWE is a brilliant and talented organist who will be very welcome to return to Sydney.

"200 YEARS OF MUSIC"

Our member DAVID PARSONS will be heard in a special concert titled "200 Years of Music" at the St. John's Church of England Hall, 87 Oaks Avenue, Dee Why, on May 1st. We of the NSW Division extend our heartiest congratulations to all in Queensland Division on their acquisition - we look forward to the wonderful day when it will make its debut on the Australian Theatre Organ scene.

OVERSEAS TOURS FOR ORGAN LOVERS.

With this issue of TOSA News, you will receive a brochure together with a letter from our member CECIL CRANFIELD, organ manager for Palings, the Hammond organ distributors. The Hammond Organ Society has arranged two overseas tours, one of 23 days to the U.S.A. and the other of 60 days is an around the world one.

The tours are available to anyone at all - you don't have to be a member of the Hammond Organ Society to join in - in fact you don't even have to be an organ lover, although the tours have been aimed at attracting those who love organ music.

At many of the stop-over cities, visits have been arranged to local Hammond Organ Chapters for entertainments and the chance to meet other organ hovers, as well, there will be visits to organ installations both pipe and electronic. An inspection of the Hammond organ factory will be arranged, and the opportunity to meet and hear some world famous organists will be given. Those who do not wish to attend any or all of the organ activities in any place, are free to make their own arrangements. In addition to the many organ activities planned, there has been ample free time allowed for shopping, sightseeing etc. There will also be many conducted sight seeing tours by coach.

Both tours (Tour A - USA only) (Tour B - Round World) will leave Sydney on Saturday 27th June at 6pm and will travel together through the USA until reaching Washington on 13th July. In Washington they part company, Tour A continuing on through the USA before returning to Australia. Tour B will travel from Washington to New York and thence on to London.

The price of both tours is considerably less than would normally apply for such tours, and the organ lover has the added bonus of having his hobby catered for at many of his ports of call. It represents wonderful value for money for any tourist, but for TOSA and Hammond Society members this could be best described as the first "really organized" world tour with organ stopovers all along the way.

Unusual because on the one disc, BILL features no less than six leading makes of electronic organ. I recently received an autographed copy of BILL'S record which is titled "City Of Long Beach". It is a splendid disc in which fine musicianship is complimented by interesting and novel arrangements. Unfortunately, the record is not yet available in Australia, but when it is released TOSA News will run a review.

A recent letter from BILL WORNALL to your Editor, reveals that there are not less than twenty five restaurants, lounges, bars etc around the city of Long Beach where electronic organs are featured. This information I found in a magazine of the Orange County Professional Organists Guild which BILL included with his letter. The magazine listed more than twenty five organists and where they were playing. It certainly makes one envious to learn of the wealth of organ entertainment available to the public in the USA.
