FINAL NOTES ON CONVENTION.

Applications for Convention tickets should reach Oscar Moen by Saturday, 14th April at the latest. Earlier booking is strongly advised in order to facilitate catering arrangements and seating plan for the Convention dinner. Every member is asked to support this National Convention which will be the most exciting and costly Convention ever staged by N.S.W. Division. Remember too, that it will be 3 or 4 years before another such Convention can be held in Sydney. No Convention was held in Sydney in 1972 so that we could concentrate our efforts toward a spectacular National Convention this year, so all members who have joined the Society in the last 18 months or so will have the opportunity of attending and enjoying their first TOSA Convention.

An Information Sheet will be supplied with Convention tickets and this gives full directions on how to get to the various locations by car. Due to a "one way street" which was not known at the time of printing the Information Sheets, members should make the following corrections to their own copy of the Information Sheet as follows:-

A to B. On line 4 delete the words "White City Stadium on your right," and substitute, "Lodge 44 Motel on your left."

On line 6 delete "Elizabeth Street" and substitute "Jersey Road" which is one street further along Paddington Street.

B to C. On line 4 add the word "Randwick" to the Boys' High School on the corner. Please note that you will pass another Boys' School before reaching the Randwick Boys' High School, and this should not be confused with the correct one which is on the corner of Rainbow Street.

Our New Zealand member, Maurice Carbines from Auckland, is flying over to attend the Convention and the President of the West Australian Division, Ray Clements, is driving over from Perth with his wife and parents. A chartered motor coach will bring the South Australian party of about 40 members to Sydney for the event but it is not yet known whether Victoria and Queensland Divisions will be chartering coaches for their members. It is understood that a goodly number of our members in Newcastle will be attending as well as a party from our

youngest Division at Canberra, A.C.T. So this will be the largest gathering of Australia wide TOSA members yet held in Sydney. Don't miss this outstanding event - order your tickets now for the Second National Convention on April 21st and 22nd.

Our thanks should go also to Eric Smith for making this opportunity available to his associate.

JOH CONGERT PLEASES AT MARRICKVILLE.

At the first free concert of the 1973 Marrickville season, a most appreciative audience gave Joh Congert an enthusiastic reception, and there was little doubt that they went away very well pleased with the musical fare provided for their entertainment.

The program was richly endowed with a number of old favourites not often heard these days, and these came across with a new and quite delightful impact because of their long absence from concert programs. They were treated with great respect by organist Joh Congert who selected a wide variety of solo stops which did much to enhance the melody line of each of these items. He also employed a considerable number of highly unusual registrations throughout his playing, thereby creating interest in the music being performed.

A bracket of two numbers made famous by the Great Glenn Miller orchestra, brought back very vividly the sounds of the "big band era" in a very authentic way indeed - probably the closest approach to the Glenn Miller sound that one could expect from a Wurlitzer organ. These were "Moonlight Serenade" and "American Patrol" the first mentioned being taken in perfect Glenn Miller deliberate time.

Two or three marches with unfamiliar names, but which nevertheless did seem familiar, were presented with a typical German band sound, or something as close to it as the pipework of Wurlitzer would allow.

Memories of Marlene Dietrich were revived in a brachet consisting of "Lilli Marlene" and "Falling In Love Again."

Romantic Vienna was remembered with "Vienna, City of my Dreams" and the "Blue Danube."

Space does not permit a full listing of the entire program which concluded with a warmly nostalgic "We'll Meet Again."

In response to prolonged applause he encored with the almost forgotten "Smile A While" which, like other old favourites already mentioned, came up all the more appealing because of its long silence.

In all a most enjoyable afternoon and a fine start to the 1973 series of free concerts.

CHATSWOOD CONCERT PLEASES.

Tuesday evening, 6th March, saw an appreciative audience enjoy an interesting and entertaining evening of organ music presented by two of our more useful members, Heather Moen and Cliff Bingham.

Heather's programme was made up of two segments of classic organ music, which included "Nun Danket alle Gott" by Karg Elert (a very impressive piece with which to begin the evening). This was followed with works by Mozart, Mendelsohnn, Handel and Bach, including the very beautiful "Sheep May Safely Graze". The magnificent "Gothique Suite" by Boellmann concluded a well-played programme from a talented young musician. Mention should also be made of the excellent stop registration employed by Heather (in spite of several ciphers from the organ.)

Cliff's programme was in the traditional theatre idiom and included "That's Entertainment", "Clarinet Polka", "Twelfth Street Rag", and the "Washington Post March". A dashing "Chit Chat Polka" ensured an encore and Cliff responded with a very grand and moving performance of "Amazing Grace".

Associate artist for the evening was popular soprano Julie Madden whose presentation included "Summertime", "I could have Danced all Night", "Climb Every Mountain", and a beautiful "Danny Boy". She was very tastefully accompanied by Cliff at the Wurlitzer.

To sum up, an enjoyable and varied evening of music from three talented young musicians.
