


Changing to a lighter vein, he gave us some chinese music and finished up with Hey Good Looking for intermission.

Now that winter is upon us, perhaps we could think of spending a nice evening at home with a few of our organ friends present to have a play and occasionally hear someone sing a good song. In other words, just the time to have a Home Organ Party!!

When I recently visited the Northern part of this state, I was present at an OLD TIME evening where everyone dressed up for the occasion and the first prize was a bottle of Champagne and also a very lively (and very discrete!) pyjama party, which was a great night of music and fun for all. Maybe you have more suggestions to give, so I think that we could come up with some good social nights if we put our minds to it.

Sunday 16th May saw the eagerly awaited concert by Neil Jensen take place and it was a thrilling occasion..thrilling, because it clearly demonstrated the fact that Neil has joined that most exclusive group of musicians, the "top bracket" of Australian Theatre organists and these are probably numbered on the fingers of one hand.

Neil not only dazzled us with his technical expertise and crisp clean playing allied to frequent registration changes made at lightning speed, but also with his quite extraordinary talent for showmanship. Many years ago, one of Sydney's best known Theatre organists told me about a theatre manager who had no musical training or appreciation whatsoever, yet he was entrusted with the task of auditioning any new organists for their theatre. He always engaged the artist who was busiest at the console, on the grounds that showmanship was more important than musicianship. "Put on a show-give them something to look at" was his stock remark. Had he been lucky enough to audition Neil Jensen in those far back days he would have been estatic, for Neil has an abundance of both.

His programme was widely varied and opened with I Know That You Know and continued with Black Moonlight, When The Leaves are Turning, The Galloping Comedians, A Tribute to a Beatle consisting of five Beatle songs, Masquarade Walz, Dance Macabre and Phantasy Impromptu.

After interval, came Bojangles of Harlem, Here's that Rainy Day, Cheek to Cheek..a Gershwin bracket of six numbers ending with the famous Rhapsody in Blue. Then came two of the Hungarian Dances by Brahams, The Poet & Peasant Overture, and a final encore of Thanks For The Memory. A splendid feast of organ entertainment which, with the exception of the Beatles songs, I enjoyed to the full. For my taste, the Beatles have, with the exception of the haunting Michelle, produced nothing of any musical note whatsoever. But that is only my opinion, and despite the obvious work put into the arrangement of these tunes by Neil, I personally found them the least interesting of his otherwise superb concert.

I look forward to a future return appearance, perhaps in 1983, when the house will, I'm sure, be full to overflowing, for those who attended will surely tell those who did not, that they missed an outstanding concert by a young and assured artist.





DETROIT FOX SILENT FILM SHOW - WILL FEATURE ORGAN AND ORCHESTRA.

Detroit's biggest downtown deluxer, the Fox Theatre will be the scene of a return to the glory of thrilling full organ and orchestra accompaniment to a major silent photoplay. Motor City Theatre Organ Society and Downtown Theatre Enthusiasts present the 1922 silent film "Robin Hood" starring Douglas Fairbanks Snr., Wallace Beery, Alan Hale and Enid Bennett, July 9th at 8 p.m. Dennis James, who has scored the film, will preside at the console of the 4/36 Wurlitzer and play with a 36-piece orchestra. The show is part of the 1982 A.T.O.S. National Convention, but will also be open to the general public. Tickets will cost \$12.50, \$9.50, and \$6.50 it is reported. Footnote: Prior to the performance in the theatre the 3/12 Moller lobby organ will be heard in recital.

SIMONTON ORGAN HAS TREMENDOUS NEW SOUND.

Revoicing and final finish work on the Simonton 4/36 Wurlitzer by Lyn Larsen and Ron Mitchell over the past month have resulted in a new tone for the internationally known instrument that is installed in the North Hollywood Residence of the late Richard C. Simonton, it was learned this month. The organ has been undergoing a complete refurbishing that has restored it to full playing condition. The announced plan at the time the initial rebuilding was started was to create a new tonal quality with Lyn Larsen in charge of the effort.

NORDWALL WINS ACCLAIM FOR "COLD CONCERT"

Arriving late from Portland, Oregon, Jonas Nordwall was taken to Indianapolis' Manual High School without delay and sat down at the console of the School's Louisville Uniphone theatre pipe organ without time to try the instrument. He played a concert that won raves from his audience.

SAN FRANCISCO'S GRACE CATHEDRAL UNUSUAL VENUE FOR SILENT MOVIE.

By popular demand the silent film classic starring Lon Chaney, "The Hunchback of Notre Dame" was shown again at Grace Cathedral in San Francisco; it had been screened during the concert series last year. Cathedral Organist John Fenstermaker provided the accompaniment on the five-manual Ruffati console and John Renke played the huge carillon on cue to complete the total accompaniment of the photoplay.

EASTMAN HOUSE AEOLIAN RESTORATION WELL UNDERWAY.

Rochester (New York) Theatre organ Society personnel are currently working on the large Aeolian pipe organ that was installed by the late George Eastman, founder of the Kodak Company, in his Rochester mansion many years ago. This month the Pedal organ has been reconnected, now joining the playable Swell and Great Organs. The Echo division apparently has not been playable since 1918, when the cable for this organ was used to play an organ harp installed at that time.

It was also reported in "The Blower" official publication of Rochester Theatre Organ Society, that a copy of Gounod's "March Romaine" is being sought for possible use when the Eastman organ is re-dedicated. This is the music Eastman requested to be his 'funeral' march.

MILLER RELEASES "SHOWTIME" AGAIN.

Ashley Miller has re-released his popular "Showtime" recording for the benefit of those who have become organ enthusiasts since the famous of famous Wurlitzers left its original home in Manhattan's beautiful Paramount Theatre and finally ended up in Wichita, Kansas. It was the final recording made on this organ that was regarded as "the" Wurlitzer by which all other Wurlitzers were measured as it was installed in the Broadway/Times Square house. Miller's concert on it is tops and this pressing is every bit as good as the original which came out on Command label. The organist has acquired all rights to the record and is issuing it under his own Milco Music Company label, although the Command Records jacket design was used without colour as on the first pressing.

Miller's masterful handling of the Paramount Wurlitzer and the great music he brings to listeners are well known by most enthusiasts. Historically and musically it's a collector's item and also just for those who enjoy fine organ music. (Hopefully Ashley will bring plenty of copies to sell during his forthcoming concert tour - Ed.)

CARTER ON COLLEGE CAMPUS CIRCUIT IN CALIFORNIA.

Organist Gaylord Carter has recently been appearing at several small or intermediate size colleges in the central region of the State Of California presenting his "Flicker Fingers" silent film shows. He reports that "college kids have enjoyed seeing their first silent film show, or at least a great many students have never witnessed them prior to the Carter visit, and they have totally enjoyed the pictures without the usual sound track dialogue and music."

The famed Flicker Fingers artist has announced he is now arranging his Autumn and Winter schedules and that it appears he will be as busy as ever travelling around the country with his productions.

FAMILIES OF TONE

Since the organ is usually considered an orchestra-at-the fingertips instrument (Wurlitzer called it the "Unit Orchestra"), it follows that, just as there are sections of instruments in an orchestra, there are sections of instruments in a theatre organ. On the organ, this is called "families of tone." There are four-string, diapason, flute and reed.

The string section is usually noted by yellow stops, (Colour of stops vary in other makes) but look for them also in white ones. These are the stops with such names as viol, cello, violina, viola, gamba and salicional. On a pipe organ with multiple string ranks, one is tuned on pitch, the other ranks are tuned either sharp or flat (celeste) When they are played together, they produce a warm shimmering effect.

The diapason family (pronounced dye-ah-PAY-sun) also called principal, is the foundation of the church organ tone. The tonality of a diapason is mellow and round, but with character. Some make good solo stops, and usually are good combining stops for the accompaniment instead of the breathy tibia. The 4' diapason is often called the octave.

The flute family consists of just that--flutes. You may find also, gedeckt, clarabella, bourdon and melodia, each with a different voicing. The orchestral flute and the organ flute have a very similar tonality, although the organ flute lends itself more to accompanying.


Included in this family is the tibia, the "foundation stop" of theatre organ, although some class it as a fifth family. However, the tibia is defined as "an ancient type of flute, originally made from an animal's tibia" (which is a leg bone). The tibia, with lots of tremulant, produces the throbbing, lush, melting sensual tone we've grown to love. It's common to include a tibia in a theatre organ combination. But please remember that, although the rich lustrous tibia may be unified to any pitch, it isn't the only stop on the organ.

The reed section includes all the red stops. Yes, ALL of them. This is because the pipes used to produce these tones employ reeds. Trumpet, french horn, trombone, tuba, English horn, oboe, clarinet—all these are reeds in the organ. Also included are vox humana, posthorn, and kinura and krumet. Unlike stops of other families, each reed has a personality all of its own, ranging from the mellow French horn to the nasal kinura and the biting post horn.

As you've read this, you may have wondered how to apply this new knowledge to your organ playing and how it will make you sound better. In combining stops from the four families, remember that you are conducting an orchestra. Listen to a good easy listening orchestral record, and get a feel for the orchestral tonality. The music score <u>registers</u> the <u>orchestral</u> just as you will the organ.

Within our membership we are blessed with many professional musicians as well as those who play as a hobby and those who dont play but just love to tinker. Some take lessons and some play by ear. It's these folk we're attempting to aid. The professionals (we hope!) have reached the stage where the ideas here are second nature. For the amateur just having fun, however, the ideas expressed here will hopefully be of some help in advancing from one plateau to the next.


24 year old Miss Konishi has been playing piano and organ since she was 6. She now teaches keyboard in Japan and performs all over the world.

Miss Konishi will also be a guest artist at the Australian Final of the 1982 Yamaha Organ Festival in July. Held at Sydney's Seymour Centre, twelve State Finalists (six senior and six junior) will be competing for the National Title. And the chance is to represent Australia in Japan for the World Final later this year.
