

This Wurlitzer Theatre Pipe Organ was first installed in the Prince Edward Theatre, Castlereagh Street, Sydney in 1924. With the closure of the theatre and to ensure its preservation, the organ was purchased by the Theatre Organ Society of Australia (NSW Division) in 1965 and over a three-year period was restored and installed in Marrickville Town Hall. The organ contains 827 pipes ranging in size from approximately 5 metres to around the size of a pencil and represent the various tonal families of an orchestra: brass, woodwind, strings. The pipes are divided between two "chambers" on both sides of the stage behind decorative grilles. Also in the chambers are real percussion instruments including xylophone, drums, cymbals, tambourine, castanets. Sound effects include a bird whistle, vintage car horn and horses hooves as theatre organs were originally designed to accompany silent films.

Members visit to the magnificent J E Dodd/Whitehouse organ in the former First Church of Christian Scientist, Corner of Forbes and Liverpool Sts., Darlinghurst Sunday 23rd October

Around 30 people comprising members of OMSS and TOSA attended a most interesting afternoon at this venue. Robert Fox had arranged the visit on behalf of the Organ Music Society of Sydney and gave us a history of First Church of Christian Scientist in Sydney and of the building and organ. The organ chambers were designed into the building and when the organ had been installed and the building completed it was virtually impossible to remove any of the ranks and hardware for restoration.

President of OMSS, Greg Cunningham, welcomed everyone followed by a tour of the organ ranks and a short performance by Robert Fox. There were many comments about the good quality and excellent sound of the pipe work. OMSS Secretary, Geoff Lloyd, then called on those present who would like to have a short play on the organ for 5 minutes each. He recorded about 12 players who wished to have a go including some TOSA members. TOSA member, Kevin Clancy commented that TOSA had included a visit to the church in it's Convention programs in the 1960s.

It comes complete with registration tabs, buttons sliders, keyboards (non-midi), speakers, wiring harnesses and a technician's manual.

Tony Fenelon & John Atwell

Tony's insatiable interest in lighter music and a love of the majestic sound of the Wurlitzer Unit Orchestra (Theatre Organ) led to his "other" career, leading to his appointment in 1965 as the resident organist at Melbourne's then prestigious Regent Theatre. **Tony** made his first tour of the United States back in 1969, and has returned at least 30 plus times. He has performed at some of the most prestigious theatre organ venues in the U.S. including, the Oakland Paramount, the Ohio Theatre, Columbus, San Sylmar, the Sanfillipo residence, the Orpheum Phoenix, the Pasadena Civic Auditorium, Seattle Paramount with **John Atwell**, and at the Dickinson High School Kimball to mention a few.

In 1999, **Tony** returned to his old stamping ground to be featured in the Inaugural Concert of the Regent Theatre Melbourne's new Wurlitzer Pipe Organ. This concert was an overwhelming success, drawing an unprecedented record attendance since the civic reopening of the Regent. In 2014 **Tony** returned to the Regent again with Richard Hills in presenting the "Tale of Two Organs" to a very appreciative audience of some 1,500 people from Melbourne and interstate.

John Atwell receives repeat invitations to play concerts at theatre organ venues around Australia both as a solo performer, as well as in piano/organ duo combination with his long-time colleague and friend, **Tony Fenelon**.

John has also taken his talents overseas on many occasions, playing performances in the USA, Canada, the United Kingdom Europe and New Zealand.

John's musical activities have not been limited to theatre organs. He is an experienced classical organist and pianist. In 2012 John accepted the invitation of the City Organist, Robert Ampt, to play a lunchtime performance on the Sydney Town Hall Grand Organ and was very well received by the large audience. **John** has performed overseas on many occasions in recent years playing theatre organ in Europe, the UK and USA. Make a date to come and enjoy two of Australia's outstanding keyboard musicians.

Review of TOSA concert Sunday 4th September, 2016 – Chris McPhee and Simon Ellis

What a joy to be back in the auditorium of the Orion Centre now that it has had a tasteful paint job which included highlighting the art deco features and also the removal of those metres and metres of tulle! Also a joy to be hearing organ pipes (of the theatre organ variety!) after some months being kept busy in the Highlands, and unable to get to TOSA concerts. Who said retirement means a break from lots of work. Just about all of my retired friends, like me, wonder how we fitted work in before we retired!

Both artists are known to me – Chris McPhee for having arranged access to the Capri organ when I was visiting Adelaide some twenty or so years ago and who I recall Tony Fenelon first introduced to us at the Orion a long time ago. I thought then that Chris showed great talent with the instrument. Simon Ellis who lives a short drive from me in the Highlands and who (as I have mentioned in a past review) has given me many fine tips and advice on playing the theatre organ. This may have increased my limited talents ever so slightly (not Simon's fault that I am a slow, lazy learner!) and Simon's vast experience in theatre organ technique has been a joy to behold and enjoy at his own magnificent George Wright Allen 4/34 enlarged with midi to a 4/72.

Chris opened the programme with a delightful bright *Powder your face with sunshine*. Chris then reminded us it was Father's Day and of his family, his wife with us at the concert, and two daughters back in Adelaide. Chris also mentioned the well known Adelaide organist Knight Barnett who started his career in Sydney so may well have known the Orion Wurlitzer in its previous incarnation at the Capitol Theatre Sydney.

Eric Coates music then next and no, not one of his famous tunes eg Knightsbridge March, but *Birdsongs at Eventide*, a gentle Coates composition. Who now recalls Floyd Kramer from our "much younger" days? One of those many novelty "brassy" numbers of the period - *Java*. Next, something that I can relate to as a sometimes church organist, a selection of hymns, though these were more in the gospel style and included, *In the garden*, *Great is Thy faithfulness, and Amazing Grace* [with a bagpipe interlude. I hate bagpipes (a long term malady of mine) but if we have to have them, let's have them imitated on the Wurlitzer!]. Nice choosing of registrations for these which all sounded great when played on our Wurli.

Chris took a break here and Simon took to the console. From the 1972 movie of the same name starring Liza Minelli, we heard *Cabaret*, a great opener with a big finish showing the rich sounds of the 3/17 in the Orion Centre.

Why not now some music of Richard Rogers? Simon obliged with *Spring is here* (played in the style of that great Radio City Music Hall organist Ashley Miller, and *It might as well be Spring* (all very well if you believe Spring commences on 1st September!) It might as well be Spring comes from the more than once made movie State Fair but I'm only (just) old enough to remember the 1962 version starring Pat Boone.

A favourite composer of mine next – Ray Noble – and probably his best known number, written in 1938, *Cherokee*, started at a gentle pace with a jazz tempo in the middle. Next a number I first came across on an LP of the San Francisco Fox Wurlitzer – *Slow Poke*. As Simon related, our English friends didn't know what the title meant so it became "Slow Coach" in the UK. It was played on the recording mentioned above by Everett Nourse and I've tried to mimic it without success over the years. A pretty little tune and Simon did it justice, also utilising the piano attached to the console.



Chris returned following this to give us the well overplayed on radio in its heyday *I remember you* and the version that we will hum in our minds till we go to the grave was sung by Frank Ifield. Actually, it was nice to hear it again sans Frank and what better interpretation than on a Wurlitzer with Chris in charge adding some percussion. We heard from Chris that George Michael also recorded this number but I am not a GM fan so haven't heard it in its later version.

Thinking on films again and Chris took us back to 1938 (well, not me as I'm just a little younger than that!) for the novelty number as sung by Shirley Temple, *At the codfish ball*. Right then up to the 1990's and music from the 1994 Italian film, "Il Postino" (the Postman) played in a dramatic style by Chris.

Last before Interval Chris entertained us with music from the 1936 Fred and Ginger movie "Swing Time", *Bojangles of Harlem*, modelled on the George Wright arrangement and superbly interpreted. Music for the movie was written by the inimitable Jerome Kern.



Simon opened the second half of the programme with the *Flying theme from E T,* a very familiar John Williams composition from the 1982 movie I was not greatly enamoured of, though, then again, to just hear the atmospheric music is enough for me without having to sit through the sugar-sweet movie! The Tchaikovsky 1869 composition *None but the lonely heart,* was a delight to listen to played in symphonic style by Simon. Right up to 1948 next before dropping back to 1941. The John Benson Brooks composition made famous by Della Reece, *You came a long way from St Louis.* Della according to my sources is still with us at 85 but not at all well these days. (Who of us at 85 will be operating on all cylinders??). 1941 brought the Duke Ellington hit sung by many famous names – Frank Sinatra, Ella Fitzgerald and

Nina Simone to name just three, *I got it bad and that ain't good*, and I liked Simon's interpretation.

Camille Saint-Saens has an almost unpronounceable surname (unless your French – and in that respect the name of our Mittagong property Chinoiserie has to be spoken by a French speaking person to sound just right). Saint-Saens 1886 composition *Carnival of the Animals* is a masterpiece and especially the Danse Macabre. This is a long piece and one that an organist has to put a great deal of preparation into. I know Simon did. The music as Simon interpreted it reflected very much the intention of the composer and is an excellent piece for the wide ranging capabilities of the Wurlitzer as a Unit Orchestra.

Chris then re-entered taking to the console for the last few items of the programme commencing with another novelty number -*Baby's Birthday Party*. Next - *If I loved you* from the 1945 stage musical of Rodgers and Hammerstein "Carousel" later to become a hit movie in 1956 starring (as many of you will remember, Gordon MacRae and Shirley Jones). Last of this trio of numbers was the Gracie Fields hit of 1938 *The biggest Aspidistra in the world*. (I must check if there are any aspidistras in Chinoiserie's garden!)

Many a tribute has been made since the very recent passing of Gene Wilder and of course the movie he is most well known for - Willy Wonka and the Chocolate Factory. The beautiful composition given delightful treatment by Chris *Pure Imagination* reminded us of Wilder's talents. Chris's last concert item was the 1932 composition *Granada* and this old warhorse was given a good work over. One good thing of not being able to get to all organ concerts is that such tunes do sound refreshing if one hasn't heard them for a long time which was the case here for me. Many the voices that have sung this famous tune, among them Mario Lanza, Placido Domingo and Luciano Pavarotti.

The audience decided that both artists deserved an encore and first Simon returned to the console and played the Cole Porter melody *Every time we say goodbye* and Chris played appropriately for Fathers Day, *O my Papa*.

So nice to have the ears stretched with a most enjoyable afternoon of theatre organ again. Thanks very much to Chris and Simon for all their hard work in providing us with a most entertaining afternoon's music. *Chris Styles*

This Wurlitzer is an original installation running on the original relays. The chambers are located above the proscenium and speak straight into the auditorium. WOW!!!! what a beautiful sound. Bob advised that they now have an organ builder looking after the instrument and have a concert once a year specifically to raise funds for maintenance.

Bob asked if I would like to have a play and took me down to the organ bench. I quickly advised him I am not a player however agreed to have a go if he would set some stops. A poor attempt at playing Alley Cat convinced Bob that I should let him play whilst we listened to the marvellous sound of the Wurli.

Bob obliged by playing a range of music for 30 minutes prior to opening time at 7:00pm


