Original 1940s Hammond Solovox Organ attachment for piano

This musical treasure was purchased in Shanghai in the 1940s by Raisa Andreevna Dunn and brought to Australia in the early 1950s when she migrated here with her husband and two children.

Raisa's daughter Irina Dunn remembers the musical evenings at home around the piano in Cammeray in Sydney, when Raisa played the piano and little organ simultaneously, the left hand taking the bass line on the piano and the right hand playing the treble on the Solovox.

"We sang everything, from Russian folk songs, to the current musicals, to Australian favourites like Waltzing Matilda, and these are among the happiest memories of my life," she says.

The family's friends and relatives gathered regularly at Raisa's household on Sunday afternoons to sing and to listen to recitals by Raisa and many of her gifted musical friends.

From the age of five, little Irina began to take music lessons and started performing on the Solovox and piano, much to the delight of the music lovers in attendance.

Some guests brought their instruments along, including piano accordions, a clarinet and guitars, and when that happened, the entire neighbourhood of Folly Point rushed to join in. The Aussie housewives contributed plates of lamingtons, sausage rolls and sandwiches to add to the Russian fare Raisa had prepared, while the men in their shorts and thongs lugged Eskies of beer and wine to add to the vodka already on the table.

The resulting parties of native and new Australians were the jolliest ever held on that little peninsula!

Years passed, and in the 1990s, the Solovox was in need of repair and restoration, so when Irina approached the eccentric Jed Stone, "the piano man", for advice, he recommended Hammond organ specialist Peter Held.

This is what Jed wrote to Irina at the time (when letters were still being written):

"The job is beyond me and my mate Robbie, the electronics hobbyist, but I've tracked down a mad Irishman, Peter Held, who specialises in early valve Hammond organs which he repairs for churches. He knows and loves the Hammond Solovox and is prepared to repair your mother's at a Non-Megabuck Rate as long as you're not in a hurry. He has the schematics and know-how to do so. I've checked him out and, although I am Jewish myself, I have many contacts among the

Christian persuasion, and his work is first class and very reasonable as regards rates."

Peter Held did a brilliant job and Irina enjoyed the Solovox for many years until now, when she wishes to sell it and find a good home for it.

As an added bonus, Irina has recently uncovered the original settings sheet for the Solovox, which lists the combination of stops on the side of the little organ to mimic the strings, woodwinds and horns of the orchestra.

In all, there are 77 combinations!

"I would love my Solovox to go to someone who appreciates not only the technical construction of this antique instrument, but also its versatile musical qualities," Irina Dunn adds.



CHRISTIE REPORT. FEBRUARY 2016.

Work resumed at West Ryde on 11th. January following the Christmas break. Prior to this time John Weismantel and myself visited David & Deirdre McMullan's place at Mittagong to remove more of the Christie pipework which has been stored there for some time. The McMullan's storage space is required to accommodate the household effects of one of their family members. We intend soon to remove the remaining Tuba pipes as a few of them will require work prior to installation.


A great deal of time has been expended in re-assembling the Christie Marimba/Harp Unit as there are almost 1,000 screws in it. Final adjustment on wind is currently being undertaken before mounting in the southern end of the Main Chamber.

During the Christmas Holidays I collected the fully restored heavy brass resonators from Lance and Heather Hutchinson's. Their family business (which has been operating for over 100 years) refinishes and/or plates metal and I think our brass

resonators probably didn't look this good when new back in 1930.

The Hutchinsons donated their time and work to the project. A letter of thanks from the Committee to them is in order. If you wish to know further about their business there is a very interesting web site if you Google - S. Cook and Sons.

It has been decided the Kimball Celesta unit (a donation, fully restored, by Russ Evans) will similarly be elevated adjacent to the main swell shutters after the Marimba is mounted.

Restoration of the tremulants is almost complete. The metal supports for the Main Chamber manual pipework have been painted ready for erection when the Marimba and Celesta are in position.

Just this week John Andrews has made a trip to Melbourne including a visit to Tim Gilley the pipemaker and repairer. John transported some pipes for Tim to work on that were badly damaged during storage . These included three Diaphones, 8ft "C" and "C#" Diapasons and seven Strings from the 8' octave. He returned with a repaired "A#" Diaphone which had been badly "hacked about" either in the theatre or in its first installation at the Church.

John also collected the Christie Sleigh Bell Unit (ex Savoy Theatre, Enfield) which is a donation to the project from T.O.S.A. (Victorian Division) They are the only set in Australia and we're grateful for their gift which should be acknowledged by letter.

The Roxy, Parramatta, Christie Piano has been inspected recently and the "player action" removed for restoration. Likewise the rotary pump will need rebuilding. The piano whilst it needs the cabinet refinished is in quite good condition and the piano action which received attention from David Cross sometime ago only requires minor adjustments.

CHAMBERS

Thanks to David Badman, together with his equipment and expertise, last Wednesday saw the positioning of the very heavy Kimball Celesta Unit. It would have been impossible without suitable lifting gear to locate the unit in the corner of the Main Chamber.

Russ Evans has been notified and thanked for his donation of both the unit and its restoration prior to it leaving his workshop. He has expressed great pleasure at being able to contribute to our latest instrument.

- Full rebuilding of the Sleigh Bell Unit (kindly donated by T.O.S.A. Victorian Division) is almost complete.
- The Tuba rank has been transported to John Parker's Workshop at Ermington. An assessment of repairs has been completed and will be the subject of a separate paper to be presented to the Committee on Monday night. This is the final rank which requires a good deal of restoration necessitating work by Melbourne Pipemaker Tim Gilley.
- We have removed the final items stored at McMullan's in Mittagong and we thank them for their participation in our project.

- The 37 note (from Middle "C") Chrysoglott original to the instrument has been stored at Betty Weismantel's.
- Making of muffler covers for the Marimba/Harp Unit is well underway. The Marimba hammers will need to be refaced to increase the volume from that unit. Once these two items are done the Marimba will be positioned on legs already constructed adjacent to the Diaphone/Diapason Offsets.
 - Rebuilding of the last tremulant is nearing finality.

• Two pipe feet from the 16' octave of the Tibia which have been missing for sometime have been located on the roof of the Main Chamber at Marrickville.

Hector Olivera plays The Sydney Town Hall Grand Organ

Monday 7th March at 12:30pm saw many organ enthusiasts and lunch time patrons assemble in the Town Hall to experience the musicianship and mastery of one of the world's most dynamic organists - Hector Olivera from Argentina.

It was some 30 years since Hector had played in Sydney and Queensland. Those members of the Theatre Organ Society of Australia (TOSA) who attended the American Theatre Organ Society (ATOS) Convention based in Philadelphia last year enjoyed Hector playing the Kimball Theatre Organ at Dickinson High School as part of that convention program. We certainly looked forward to hear Hector on the magnificent Sydney Town Hall Grand Organ. Thank you Robert Ampt - City Organist - for inviting Hector to give this organ a work out.

Hector entered the Buenos Aires Conservatory as a child prodigy at the age of six and since then Maestro Hector Olivera has become one of the world's most sought-after concert organists.

America's The Times-Reporter describes an evening with Mr. Olivera as:

"An event, a happening, a joyful celebration of the sheer power and pressure that a true virtuoso like Hector Olivera can unleash in a concert hall."

Born in Buenos Aires, Mr Olivera began playing the organ when he was three. At age five he played for the legendary Eva Peron. At 12 he entered the University of Buenos Aires and by 18 had performed for heads of state and celebrities throughout Latin America. When offered a scholarship at the renowned Juilliard School of music in New York, he moved to the United States. Three years later, Mr. Olivera's outstanding professional career was launched when he won the American Guild of Organists' National Improvisation Contest.

Mr Olivera has performed solo concerts throughout the USA, Europe, Asia, Australia, Central and Latin America and as guest soloist with prominent symphony orchestras world wide.

He has performed in venues from Carnegie Hall, the Royal Albert Hall, Cathedral of Notre-Dame in Paris, Constitution Hall to the Walt Disney Concert Hall in Los Angeles, as well as major events like the Olympic Games and the Newport Music Festival.

Hector Olivera

Hector was given free rain at the console, having to select all the ranks he wanted to use as he played each piece of music as well as having to turn the pages of the music himself. Thankfully he had been able to spend several hours practising the pieces of music and familiarising himself with the organ the day before. From where I was sitting he appeared to use every rank on the organ at various times during the performance, including the 64ft reed. It was an absolute treat to see this master organist at work fully utilising all the sounds available to him as appropriate to each

piece in the program. At one point during the Prelude Fugue and Variation his registration seemed somewhat muddy and Hector quickly closed several ranks to bring back a better clarity of sound. It was a truly dynamic and fearless exhibition of an artists enjoying the instrument including some magic pedal work throughout.

Thank you again Robert Ampt - City Organist for the opportunity to hear a master at work on one of the world's best concert organs. Thanks must also go to Sydney City Council for the restoration and maintenance carried out on this organ over recent years and for continuing the Free Lunchtime organ recital series.

Hector remarked as he left Sydney Town Hall - "Unbelievable".
