PRESIDENT'S REPORT - 2011

It is pleasing to report another successful year. However such a statement requires a definition of what is successful.

Financially we have come through the year with a small profit, smaller than last year, but successful despite increased costs in presenting our shows, increased organ maintenance costs and higher TOSA News expenses.

Our shows have been presented in a manner which has been professional and attractive thanks to hard working volunteers, often using equipment loaned by a number of our members. Our Artists have been entertaining and presented the two WurliTzers most satisfactorily. The projected images of the artist's performance, as well as historical images and TOSA notices before, during and after each show, have enhanced the overall presentation.

Our relationship with the Marrickville Symphony Orchestra has continued and we were invited to participate in their special presentation celebrating the Sesqui-Centenary of the Council. This not only allowed the WurliTzer to be experienced by the Mayor, Councillors and the general public, but also gave us publicity in the official program and on the Council website. John Batts performed a solo selection showcasing the instrument which was followed by a short interview by the

M.C. John also joined the orchestra on one number after just one rehearsal half an hour before the doors opened. A successful evening.

The website has gone from strength to strength while the standard of our advertising has also risen.

The Christie project continues with much enthusiasm under the supervision of Robert Gliddon. Maybe a little background will be of interest. For many years a home had been sought for this instrument. Momentum increased during the last five years and included seriously investigating venues including an ex-theatre now operating as a club, a church on the north side of the harbour, a Civic Centre and finally West Ryde Anglican Church. Each has involved many hours of work and each was suggested by a member of this Society.

Several times at Committee meetings the question was asked whether we should approach WRAC, the last location in which this organ was installed. Late 2009 it was decided that, despite still investigating another venue, nothing would be lost by an approach to WRAC. However we immediately became aware that there had just been a change of Minister and further action was deferred for six months to allow that person to settle in to the job. As that period elapsed and before we could make an approach, Peter Held phoned to advise that he was the technician responsible for the upkeep of the electronic organ installed in the church and that he had talked to the organist, Phil Bongers, who is also a member of

the Society. The organ had reached the place where it was requiring ever-increasing service and both men felt that the Society should consider the possibility of this being a suitable home for the Christie. An initial approach was made to Rev. Mal York who was very supportive and suggested a formal approach be made to the Parish Council. This was done; a meeting arranged with their representatives and a draft agreement prepared. As with most negotiations, these took several months, although we were very encouraged to hear that the congregation was right behind the proposal and the general feeling was that the Christie was "coming home". Some restoration had by now been commenced awaiting formal signing of the Agreement which finally came on 29th August 2011. I believe that is successful.

However much work is required and, to be honest, we require further funds. The space for the chambers exists in the building and it is apparent that the original specifications allowed for the installation of the organ. We have had an Engineer look at the situation and he has advised adding a supporting beam to the rear wall. Also, although the beams are in place, there is no flooring to the chamber space nor walls to form the chambers. Additional sound insulation is required as is an attic-type ladder of sufficient strength to allow access. This is all before any installation can commence. Your Executive and Committee are now asking for your help in meeting the costs of this project. While we are basically in a good financial position, additional funds are required to complete the work and provide for our normal operations. Any contribution regardless of the amount will be gratefully received and can be either publicly acknowledged or treated anonymously. It is proposed to keep members informed on a regular basis of amounts received. Let's be successful in this, also. These are but a few examples of our "success" this year.

There have also been those things which just don't help but, in some cases, are part of life. We have seen Kath withdraw from her position of Ticket Secretary. She has the audacity to want to do other things with her life apart from TOSA!! Theo has some big shoes to fill as he takes over the job. Kath, I would not know where to begin – all I can say on behalf of the members and myself, thank you for a job very well done.

Bob Alleway may have only stepped in as Membership Secretary for a shorter period of time, but he saw that there was a job to be done with no one willing or able to take it on. He helped us out of a predicament and we thank him for his assistance over the last couple of years.

The one thing which is a problem but which does not have to be a "part of life" is our declining membership. One of Australia's Treasurers stated that the ideal family included three children – one to eventually replace each parent and one for Australia. If we each introduced one new member to the

Society this year, our membership would be just over 700. And that's just ONE new member each. Can we see what we can accomplish in the next few months?

What's in the pipeline! You would be aware that we have been considering making available Season Tickets. These will be offered for sale following our December show and up to the 5th February 2012, the date of our first show for the year. Watch TOSA News for details.

We are also commencing bookings through an online booking agent. This will be in addition to our present arrangements. A little later in our AGM, and again during the December show, there will be a short audio visual presentation explaining the way in which this will work. The aim is to be more successful this year.

I have been careful not to actually thank anyone other than Kath and Bob. Firstly, I would be sure to omit someone and secondly, there are so many who should be thanked. If I can just say "thank you" - to the Executive and Committee for long, hard hours and always being available; to the many volunteers without whom we could not survive and to you, the members, who support this great organisation. One person I wish to name is my wife who puts up with the inconveniences of late nights, the inability to use the phone so often because it's in use, and being my personal Secretary.

Good afternoon and thank you for attending the 2011 AGM.

Another year has passed and the 2011 Committee has once again worked together to finish a very productive and eventful year.

WILLOUGHBY WURLITZER'S NEW HOME REPORT

From Member Doug Grant dated 8 October 2011

Last night I attended, the inaugural performance of the Willoughby Symphony Orchestra in the new concert hall of the Willoughby Concourse complex. I thought you might be interested to know my opinions of the new venue.

I was amazed at how much 'life' the hall had with a full-house, and how perfectly silent the hall was during the lulls in the music. It is a credit to the designers, and augurs well for the organ istallation. I believe I could see where the chambers will be located. At an incredible height above the stage, choir seating and wall-cladding woodwork, there is total blackness making it difficult to see what is up there. As the choir was singing (Ode to Joy), the stage lighting threw enough light to expose two blocks of 4 orifices (orifii?) behind the black scrim at the highest level of the front stage area, which are probably the locations of the respective chambers. With the ceiling apparently being non-absorbent to provide the 'life' in the auditorium, I would imagine that the sound for the Wurli has the potential to be magnificent. There is no obvious provision for the console but I would imagine it could be wheeled out onto the stage as required.

Chris is in regular demand for shows around Australia and overseas, including New Zealand, United Kingdom and the USA. In mid 1999 he was featured in the American Theatre Organ Society's National Convention held in London, performing on the legendary Buddy Cole Wurlitzer.

Online Ticket Sales for TOSA NSW

Your committee has recently undertaken steps to enable tickets to TOSA shows to be sold online – that is via the internet. The committee understands that this may come as a surprise to some of our members and general audience, however we have provided the "best of both worlds" so as to accommodate the traditional ticket buyers while opening up new purchase methods.

Starting with our first show in February 2012, tickets to TOSA NSW shows will be able to be purchased online. By going to the TOSA NSW website www.tosa.net.au and clicking on the Events link at the top of the web page you will see the next show or shows listed. Clicking on the show of your choice you will also see a link to the online sales. By following the link you will be able to purchase your tickets to the upcoming show using your credit or debit card.

Some of the reasons we are implementing online tickets sales are:

Attracting a new audience by increasing impulse buy from advertising;

Ease of purchase;

Reduced workload for ticket sales secretary;

Implementing modern technology

At the AGM a presentation was given to explain how this will work.

Some "questions and answers" were also discussed and they are listed below for your information.

Question and Answers How will this affect traditional TOSA ticket buyers?

Not at all. If you wish to purchase the traditional way you still can – via Ticket Secretary

Can I choose my own seat using online service?

Yes – part of the booking process requires you to choose your seat/s How will traditional ticket purchasers be assured of their booked seat?

The ticket secretary will be able to block seats from online sales when a ticket is sold by the traditional method

How will this affect season ticket purchasers?

Purchasers of season tickets will have their seats blocked from online sales by the ticket secretary upon confirmation of the season ticket sales – based on their indicated seating preference. This will include Marrickville and Orion shows.

What are the ticket prices?

The normal range of ticket prices will apply and anyone claiming concession or member prices must show proof of this when presenting their tickets at the door

How much does it cost for the online ticket sales purchase?

For each ticket bought, the buyer is charged an additional 30 cents. That is if you bought 2 tickets of any price you pay an additional 60 cents. This is equivalent to that charged now by TOSA for postage of tickets. The 30 cents per ticket is charged as part of the online

ticket transaction.

TOSA NSW pays the service provider 2.1% of the total transaction value + 50 cents per transaction. This is in-line with current bank fees charged to TOSA when we process credit card transactions.

How do I get the tickets?

When doing an online booking you will go through the payment process and when complete you will be presented with an option to print your ticket/s. Bring the printed ticket/s with you to the show

What if I lose my ticket?

A door list is generated and will be available at the Ticket desk for each show. See the ticket secretary as soon as you arrive at the venue if you have lost your ticket/s

What if there is a dispute over someone sitting in my seat?

The door list held by the ticket secretary is the source of information to resolve seat disputes

Can I still buy tickets at the door on the day?

Yes – but all door sales will be unreserved seats

When will tickets be released for online sales?

The tickets for the next show will be available for sale on the evening of the previous show (eg Show is on Sunday 4 December, tickets for February show will go on sale on-line that night)

How will online credit/debit card purchases appear on my credit card statement?

If you purchase tickets using the new online service, they will appear on your statement as coming from Trybooking. You will be notified of this during the online booking process

Can I pay for online ticket purchases other ways? Cheque, BPAY etc?

No, a valid credit or debit card is required to make an online purchase Can I just reserve a seat online and pay for it at the door?

No. If you wish to pay at the door you must use the traditional method and pay at the door. The online process will only complete if you complete payment with a credit/ debit card

Can "first time TOSA show" attendees get their free tickets via the online booking service?

No. If someone wishes to make use of the first time free tickets they must use the traditional method and go via the ticket secretary.

How does TOSA NSW Inc receive the funds for ticket sales?

Upon completion of each show, a transaction process at Trybooking. com will calculate the money due to TOSA NSW and credit it to our nominated bank account.

How does TOSA NSW know about ticket sales?

A comprehensive range of reports is available from the trybooking.com website

How do I contact the ticket secretary via email?

Our ticket secretary, Theo Langenberg, can be contacted via email at tickets@tosa.net.au

We have recently discovered that other organisations similar to TOSA NSW are already successfully using the service offered by Trybooking. This gives us encouragement that we will also have successful results for TOSA NSW.

THE WRAP Australia's Silent Film Festival 2011 In Sydney and the NSW Southern Highlands

This year's Festival commenced at PLC Sydney in early September. In the historic College Hall the audience was enthralled with Maria Okunev's wondrous and lively piano accompaniment to the classic comedy shorts in Laughter is the Best Medicine - Taken Silently, of course. The hoots and roar met Charlie, Buster, Billy Bevan and the Blinking Blizzards full on. The surprise packet for all was the charm and vivacity of Rowdy Ann.

Following that session, in the early evening, the Festival assisted the College in a fundraiser for the music students' 2012 trip to China. With Mauro Colombis accompanying Charlie Chaplin at Mutual, Buster in Cops and Charlie Chase as the Mighty Moose, as well as students dressed in 1920s attire singing songs of the era and dancing, the evening was absolutely sensational! When Buster's short ended, there was a split second pause, then a roar from the huge audience, made up of a large number of students, friends and parents. Thunderous applause followed. This was possibly the most intuitive and responsive audience so far, with a great percentage having some connection with music and other performing arts. The College wants to host future silent film and music delights next year.

The following Saturday brought the Festival to another suburb of Sydney; Epping, on the north side. The Lloyd comedy session, a feature and a short, impressed the audience with the sophistication and varied structure of its humour - a considerable distance from the other two Kings of Comedy and the raw slapstick mechanics of the era. John D'Arcy on keyboards accompanied this session with wit and verve equal to the films, and the audience warmly responded. John also accompanied the next session, the sublime The Peach Girl. This latter session with its beauty and subtle nuances was enhanced by music artistry on offer.

The final session at Epping allowed the Festival to utilize the mighty Christie theatre organ with the very experienced Cliff Bingham at the helm. The fare? Charlie's Immigrant, Fatty and Buster dancing in The Cook and the explosively funny and engaging Danger Ahead. The Christie took its large audience on a whirlwind sound and visual pleasure trip. Hairbreadth Harry, Relentless Rudolph and Beautiful Belinda, the Boilermaker, schemed and fought: the winner? The Christie, an outstanding theatre organist in Cliff, and the forces of good over Rudolph and his gang: curses indeed!

The final session in Sydney the following Saturday took place in the city. Starting off was Hitchcock's The Lodger, a masterpiece eagerly anticipated by the large audience. This film had drawn a strong buzz from its first announcement, and the gorgeous restored version confirmed from its dramatic opening scenes that the hype was justified in the eyes of the absorbed audience. The Festival is proud to announce that there is another young silent film accompanist of the highest quality, namely Greg Smith. His outstanding keyboard skills brought to this classic an astonishing range of responses. Greg's layers conveyed the power, the subtlety and the deftness of touch that the master director was presenting on the screen to the spectators.

Sharolyn Kimmorley, as she did last year with The Italian Straw Hat, provided silent film and live accompaniment of the highest order in the next session. Bed and Sofa, largely unknown to an Australian audience, is a gem. This film, with its timeless themes exploring society and gender with transcendence and empowerment glimpsed at in its astonishing conclusion left the audience awestruck. They knew that they were witnessing film-making of the highest order with matching musicianship. Sharolyn enhanced a film that stayed with the audience for a considerable time afterwards.

The closing Sydney session was introduced by the warm friend of the Festival, the US Consul in Sydney, Niels Marquardt. He spoke compellingly of the mastery of Borzage, the achievements of Janet Gaynor and the splendour of Lucky Star. The Festival appreciated the kind words of Niels and his lovely wife, Judy, at the session.

Lucky Star? A large audience, a beautiful film from Fox, a master silent film director and actors and brilliant cinematographyand Mauro Colombis, the premier silent film accompanist in the country. Mauro's playing took us into this magic world where love has to battle the elements in every sense before a transcendent conclusion. The audience again roared its appreciation. They seek out Mauro's performances and they are never disappointed. As he did with 7th Heaven, Chicago and the masterpiece Sunrise in years past, he delivered to the Festival's closing session a degree of magic and enchantment mirroring the treasure on the screen. The film and the audience demanded such a performance from Mauro, and he delivered.

The following weekend found the Festival with four sessions in the beautiful NSW Southern Highlands to the south of Sydney. The weather was ghastly but brave Highlanders ignored the rain and wind. Louise Bell on keyboards and numerous musical instruments and gadget sound effects salted throughout the audience took us on a rollercoaster of delights and hoots. This was a very entertaining session with spectators grabbing their moment of immortality to join Charlie and the usual suspects of the Kings of Comedy with every sound imaginable - and some not imaginable! John D'Arcy reprised the Harold Lloyd session and The Peach Girl with great sensitivity and strength. Some audience members traveled from Sydney to see these delights again.

The Chinese film was a revelation to this regional audience.

A strong audience was stunned by another session John accompanied: Dreyer's sublime achievement, the Parson's Widow. This film and the finely layered and beautiful musicianship combined to present an unforgettable moment of film for those fortunate enough to be in attendance.

The comedies pleased the audiences but the Chinese and Scandinavian films impressed them on a much more profound level. They departed, wanting more.

Next year's Silent Film sessions are taking shape and on Saturday February 11 there will be two delightful programs at the renowned Sutherland Entertainment Auditorium.

The earlier program at 11 am features two wondrous Charlie Chaplin shorts and the Buster Keaton feature, Steamboat Bill Jr, accompanied by Australia's leading silent film accompanist, Mauro Colombis.
