LOOKING BACK AT NOVEMBER.

The organ party held at the home of our members, George & Joyce Walker on 8th of November was a WOW and the fifty odd people who attended, all voted it to be one of the best that our friends, the Walkers have yet held. It was indeed a happy and friendly crowd who were entertained at the organ by Jim Bass, Harold Duffel, Ian Griggs, Joyce was also a popular compere and "organ"iser and Des Russell and Joyce Walker. no one refused her requests to take their place at the console. Finally Joyce called on <u>DAVID PARSONS</u> to play, and to deafening applause, <u>DAVID</u> sat down at the organ, where he was to remain for a very long time, much to everyone's delight. This was his last appearance in Sydney before he left for Japan to compete in the Yamaha Organ contest, and everyone present surrounded him to express their personal best wishes for his success in Japan. DAVID played splendidly and there was so much variety in his programme that no one could have said that he didn't play their particular type of music. As usual, Joyce served a delightful supper helped by her family and some of the ladies and the sum of \$51 was added to the funds. The Society is fortunate to have such loyal and enthusiastic workers as George & Joyce and we extend our thanks to them for a wonderful evening.

Not content with an organ party in November, George and Joyce informed TOSA News that they were prepared to present another organ party in December to help swell end of year funds. However, due to their Xmas decorations, they would not be able to accommodate 50 or more this time - a limit of 30 would have to be placed on the function. Joyce then went on to say that although only 30 could attend, she would hold TWO organ parties on different nights thus enabling 60 members to attend. What a wonderfully generous gesture this is. LOOKING BACK AT NOVEMBER.

SUPERB BIRTHDAY CONCERT. DENIS PALMISTRA, DELIGHTFUL STYLIST.

A large audience gave a warm welcome to <u>DENIS PALMISTRA</u> on the 20th November last, when he played a concert to mark the first birthday of our WurliTzer in the Marrick-ville Town Hall. The evening was an unforgetable musical experience - brilliantly played, superbly registered and imaginatively arranged. His undoubted technical mastery was fully complimented by his polished showmanship at the console - a showman-ship in which hand movements, gestures, the inclination of the head at the right moment, all played a part. His introductions and endings were spectacular in themselves, adding to each item, an entirely suitable individuality.

The programme opened with a lilting selection of Strauss Waltzes - unhurried and in deliberate tempo. The came a more recently written piece, "You Belong To My Heart" and this was hauntingly played with a strong counter melody. Delightful counter melodies featured prominently in "Pagan Love Song", which was the next item. The next bracket of three hits of the late thirties was a real foot tapper and <u>DENIS</u> really lifted this group along. The three numbers were, "It All Depends On You", "On The Sunny Side Of The Street" (shades of Tommy Dorsey here) and "I Don't Know Why", ending with a reprise of "It All Depends On You". Next was the selection, "Holiday In Paris" and the Parisian atmosphere was fully captured with "C'Est Magnificique", "Autumn Leaves" (featuring Vox Humana) "Pigalle", "The Last Time I Saw Paris", "Under The Bridges of Paris", "J'et Andrai" and ending with an exciting "Can Can".

The first guest spot featured Miss Beryl Brownlee singing "Maids Of Cadiz" and "One Fine Day" from Madame Butterfly. Her glorious soprano voice won her a long ovation. She was the featured vocalist during our Convention recently. She was accompanied at the organ by Mrs Cloran, and both artists were extremely popular.

DENIS returned to the console to feature a bracket consisting of "I'll Take Romance" and Richard Rodgers, "Lover". Based on "The Autumn Concerto" the next item, "My Heart Reminds Me" was delightful and deservedly well applauded. The final item before the intermission was Ketelby's "Bells Across The Meadow" in which DENIS added a dramatic symphonic arrangement which gave a new dimension to this well loved music.

The second half of the programme opened with a bouncy "Goodbye My Love" to which <u>DENIS</u> added a touch of audience participation by having his audience clap in tempo. This was followed by a return to romantic themes of which he is the ultimate master. His brilliantly arranged "Beyond The Reef" was one of the most haunting pieces I have ever heard played on a WurliTzer - he painted a musical picture of a tropical paradise and magically brought to life the sounds of wind and sea. For contrast, there was an up tempo "Siboney" to follow before we were taken on a "Holiday In Italy" with a most enjoyable Italian selection which included, "Gelito Linda", "O Sole Mio", "Funiculi Funicula", "La Paloma" and "Come Back To Sorrento" - this item was as warm and sunny as an Italian summer's day and the audience response was equally warm.

Mrs Cloran then appeared at the console to accompany the St. Brigid's Ensemble in a bracket of items, the first of which was one with the theme of Xmas, and was entitled "The Three Ships". The ensemble, five charming young ladies, possessed of really beautiful voices, sang delightfully, and with close harmonies in perfect balance and pitch. They were an exciting interlude in an evening of excitement.

From the French and Italian holidays DENIS whisked us away to Hawaii for yet another interlude of atmospheric musical enjoyment. This opened with a near full organ treatment of a portion of "Bali Hai", richly chorded and building up to a dramatic climax which suddenly melted away to a lush sounding "Blue Hawaii" which in turn, modulated into the lovely "Moon Of Manakoora". Then came "Lovely Hula Hands" in which one could almost see dusky maidens performing their traditional dance with its expressive hand movements, and continuing on to a hauntingly played "Song Of The The organ then built up to its full capacity in a majestic interpretation Islands". of "Bali Hai" in which the tremulants were frequently "off" only to be brought back on for a theatrical emphasis as required as well as for the final chord. Holiday In Hawaii was indeed a memorable one. Finally the famous "Czardas" by Monte - a fast moving, beautifully registered item which fully exploited this wild gypsy music as a vehicle for the WurliTzer. In reponse to prolonged and enthusiastic applause DENIS returned to encore with some Xmas music and, as a tribute to member Maurice Carbines who came over from New Zealand for the concert, he ended with the ever popular "Maori's Farewell".

Our WurliTzer installation at Marrickville is now one year old - as it enters its second year, we can look back on an exciting first birthday concert by DENIS PALMISTRA.

Vox devoted its front page entirely to an excellent photo of <u>DAVID PARSONS</u> winning the Australian Final of the Yamaha Organ Contest at the Dendy Cinema on Sunday 26th of October, as well as about two thirds of a page in a review of the concert.

A full write up on the TONY FENELON concert at the Dendy WurliTzer following TONY'S return from America was also given in detail, and this appears to have been a very exciting concert. It was also reported in Vox that $\underline{\text{TONY}}$ had played several organs in USA which were extra to his tour. These included the 6/66 Chicago Stadium Barton instrument, and the $\frac{1}{56}$ Radio City Music Hall WurliTzer.

It was also learned from Vox, that the <u>WILBUR KENTWELL</u> concert at the Camberwell Civic Centre on the 2nd October attracted an almost full house. <u>WILBUR</u> played the two and three manual Conn Theatre organs - the larger instrument being complete with a large battery of electronic pipes.

The date and venue of the West Australian Division's December function was not given, so we regret that no further information can be published, in sufficient time.

PATRON PROBLEM PERSISTS.

Oh dear, oh dear, the confusion over our revered and beloved Patrons, of whom we are all so proud, apparently still exists. Before I too become confused, lets get the whole deal straight. I say this, not to be nasty or critical, but merely to let members — especially the new ones — know just who is Patron of which Division.

In the October issue of Queensland Division's "Tibia", Editor Tom F. Ellis noted that TONY FENEION had been appointed Patron of the West Australian Division. He went on to say he was a little confused as he thought that REGINALD DIXON was the nationwide Patron of TOSA, and asked could anyone explain. This was how it all began.

N.S.W. Division's TOSA News did explain also in October, listing each Division's Patron and ending with the hint that Queensland, being the only State without a Patron, might perhaps like to pender the matter.

In the November "Tibia", Tom Ellis acknowledges the receipt of letters from Irene Veale of Victorian Division and Doug Miller of West Australian Division, which corrected him by advising that REGINALD DIXON was not, nor ever had been, the National Patron of TOSA. Tom then stated that it appeared that the Queensland Division did not have a legal Patron at all, as they had just "pinched" REG DIXON from we New South Welshmen. I had thought the whole matter had resolved itself and we were all now aware of just who was who, but the November issue of the South Australian Division's News made mention of the confusion and their Editor, W. RECORD NEWS.

The latest release by Concert Recording's "organ of the Month" Club was of famed American theatre organist BILLY NALLE. This was released last month to members. Titled "BILLY NALLE THE WIZARD OF ORGAN" the record number is CR-0043. The recording comprises three segments taken from 'live' concerts by this artist described as "America's Most Exciting Theatre Organist". It would be safe to say that in this recording he does indeed generate a whole lot of excitement. The first segment was taken from a concert at the Auditorium Theatre's 4/22 WurliTzer - the second, from a concert at the Senate Theatre's 4/34 WurliTzer and the third segment from a private concert for officials of the Allen Organ Coy, was performed on an Allen Electronic instrument.

BILLY NALIE'S playing style is crisp, modern and imaginative whilst leaving little doubt, that you are listening to an artist who knows and loves the traditional theatre organ style. Registrations are impeccable, and his artistry and experience exploit each one of the organs played to its best advantage. This disc could be described as a showcase for BILLY NALLE and a showcase for each organ he played. corded 'live', one hears the spontaneous applause afforded the artist and this helps tremendously for those who like to re-create the excitement of a theatre organ concert. BILLY NALIE is a member of the NSW Division of TOSA and we would look forward to the day when perhaps he will visit us here. Reports that he will visit this country have been circulating for a considerable time - even going so far as to state when and where, but in a letter to us a couple of weeks ago BILLY does not mention any Australian tour. His latest record, mentioned above, has a well varied programme of established favorites and is strongly recommended to all record collectors. If you think the above spiel is an advert for the American ATOS Convention in 1970, then you're only half right Any wealthy members of TOSA visiting the USA may like to arrange their trip to co-incide after reading the above. If that should happen, then I guess you'd say that TOSA News advertised the event, but your Editor after reading about all these goodies to take place next year, felt that you would all like to know just what is going on in other parts of the world. This makes it news.

It was also reported in TO-B that GEORGE WRIGHT was to play a concert on the WurliTzer of the Oriental Theatre in Portland, Ore, on Sunday 2nd November at 2pm. All seats were announced as \$3 each with no reserved seats, and GEORGE was scheduled to play a silent film comedy in addition to the concert. This is the WurliTzer heard on the Concert Recording label played by DON FRENCH. It has a unique sound quite unlike other WurliTzers - it would be interesting to hear a tape of what GEORGE WRIGHT gets out of this instrument.

BILLY NALLE AT ARTS FESTIVAL (special New York news release from Arthur Zinberg)

The first theatre organ concert as an official event of an arts festival in the United States proved to be a smash hit for soloist BILLY NALIE. The concert took place on October 14, 1969 to a packed house with standees at the 2000 seat Palace Theatre in Canton Ohio. Manager Ralph Russell attested to the performance being the biggest hit at the theatre since the days of stage presentations. Big publicity for the event resulted in a sold out theatre three weeks prior to the concert. Several civic organisations gave dinners in NALIE'S honor and the Mayor of Canton, Stanley Cmich, issued an official proclamation designating October 14 Theatre Organ Day.

BILLY NALLE was presented on stage with a plaque, engraved to commemorate this National First in theater organ as part of the Canton Festival of Arts. There is a possibility that this was an International First as well, says Arthur Zinberg's news release.

HOWEVER, TOSA NEWS SAYS THAT AMERICA WAS NOT THE FIRST TO PRESENT THEATRE ORGAN MUSIC AS PART OF A FESTIVAL OF THE ARTS. I BELIEVE THIS HONOR BELONGS TO THE QUEENSLAND DIVISION OF TOSA, WHO, ON SEPTEMBER 30th PRESENTED AN ORGAN SPECTACULAR FEATURING SIX ELECTRONIC ORGANS IN THE BRISBANE TOWN HALL AS PART OF THAT CITY'S WARANA FESTIVAL.

TO DRAW A DISTINCTION BETWEEN THE AMERICAN AND THE CLAIM I MAKE ON BEHALF OF THE BRISBANE MEMBERS, THE AMERICAN CONCERT PRESENTED THEATRE ORGAN MUSIC, ON A THEATRE ORGAN, INSTALLED IN A THEATRE. THE BRISBANE CONCERT PRESENTED THEATRE ORGAN MUSIC ON SIX ELECTRONIC ORGANS PLAYED BY SIX ORGANISTS BUT THE EVENT TOOK PLACE IN THE CITY HALL. NEVERTHELESS, BRISBANE'S CONCERT TOOK PLACE ON SEPTEMBER 30th DURING A WEEK-LONG FESTIVAL AND THE AMERICAN ONE ON OCTOBER 14th JUST TWO WEEKS LATER.

No matter who was first, both events were spectacularly successful, the American concert attracting an audience of 2,000 and the Brisbane one 1,500. It has been predicted by interested parties that both functions look like going into orbit again next year, which after all, is the most important thing.
