



State Theatre's WURLITZER

Work is well underway with the refurbishment of the 4 manual console of Sydney's famous State Theatre's Wurlitzer organ.

John W. Parker - Organ Builders of Sydney, removed the console from the theatre in mid June, and since that time, have ordered and received most of the imported overseas components. Work has begun on the stripping of over seven coats of paint from the console cabinet, and the restoration of the pedal clavier.


The four manual set of keyboards has been shipped to Great Britain for total restoration by the P&S Organ Supply Company – leaders in the field of keyboard manufacture and refurbishment.

It was found that numerous console fittings and some equipment from within the console had been removed sometime after 1979 and it has been necessary to either remake – or replace such items as the stop tab and piston rail dividers, all the pedal "sharp" keys, the toe studs, one carved cabinet cap, and all the Wurlitzer style engraved department labels.

The complete internal console mechanism for the "Crescendo" pedal has also required replacement due to being "removed" by persons unknown. Due to damage created through vandalism in 1997, the "non original" music desk is also to be replaced.


The project is being directed by Heritage Organ Consultant – Ray Holland, well known in Australia for his input and work on many notable historic pipe organ restorations throughout the country. In consultation with the State's general manager Brian Barnes, and organ builder John Parker – Ray Holland moved that the console should be refurbished with a totally electric action due to future redevelopment plans scheduled for the backstage area of the theatre – plus the requirement that the console be made mobile.

Another major factor in Mr Holland's recommendation was the possibility of "limited use" of the organ – due to long running stage shows at different times. This situation could result in the organ being unplayed for up to six months, and a pneumatic piston combination action



would quickly become unreliable under such circumstances. Also the dampness in the organ pit could not be guaranteed, due to the underground seepage—always controlled by 24 hour pumps.

This decision has resulted in the installation of new direct electric Stop Action Magnet units for every stop tab on the console and the fabrication of new stop bolsters. New stop tablets are being provided by HESCO Inc: of Hagerstown, in authentic Wurlitzer style and engraving. The original State console's thumb pistons



are being retained and have been spun and buffed to new condition. These thumb pistons will adequately match the restored keyboards – recovered in grained ivory resin, and the new stop tablets in ivory colour.

Work has also started in the Solo pipe chamber, with the removal of pipework for inventory and storage. This has proved a most frustrating job, as every "reed" rank of pipes (six ranks with 61 notes in each rank), has been disassembled, and the delicate reed tongues removed and



other associated "speaking parts", placed in tins unmarked.

Many items cannot at this stage be accounted for and the stupidity of the person/s responsible for this can only be described as *vandalism*.

It was also most distressing to find that the mighty Tuba Mirabilis pipes have been almost destroyed. Pipe resonators have been "sawn" from their reed blocks, and had the regulation flaps ripped off. The blocks and boots were stored on the floor in a box that has been trampled on – ruining most of the zinc boots. The tuning wires have been removed from the blocks and at this point in time, cannot be found in the chamber.

It appears the rank is redeemable and will need major restoration by qualified pipemakers, although with the damage sustained, it can only be hoped that the true sound of the pipes can be achieved after repairs and remaking are carried out.

The toy counter is missing items such as the Boat Whistle, Fire Gong, Bird Whistle and Auto Horn. The six top notes of the Brass Trumpet cannot be accounted for – likewise the top octave of the Tibia 2', and assorted pipes from the Kinura, Orchestral Oboe and Saxophone.

The small pressure "winker" bellows feeding the swell shutter actions is missing, and the 4 rank manual chest has been totally stripped down with most internal parts lost. It was intended to replace this chest some time ago, and advertisements have been placed overseas in the hope of obtaining a replacement.

Everything in the Solo chamber has been affected by water damage, with most wind regulators and pipe chests seriously damaged. Most of the pipe rackboards will require replacement due to warping.

It is fortunate that considering the very sad condition of everything in the Solo chamber, the majority of the pipework is in restorable condition—with the wood pipes fairing well under the circumstances.

It will be an enormous project, with much of the work ahead only coming to light as the job is stripped down and removed. We will continue to keep you informed as work progresses.



TOSA member Heather Finch very kindly shares her recent British travels with us. She has had some fascinating experiences, and was always on the lookout for interesting organ encounters and information wherever she went.

While you were at the Easter Convention ...

Heather Finch visits England and Scotland and has some organ adventures.

This year, Good Friday saw us arrive, weary but excited, in London. We took the new Heathrow express train to Paddington Station, and then a cab to our apartment. On the way, we passed a long wall, topped with barbed wire, and looking very "secure". Our surprise at this was surpassed when we rounded a corner, and found ourselves looking at the front of Buckingham Palace, and the Victoria Memorial!

So, it was "down the Mall from Buckingham Palace", through Admiralty Arch, into Trafalgar Square, and straight ahead to our apartment in Northumberland Avenue, where we would have an easy walk to many of the city's traditional tourist attractions.

We were some 5 hours too early for admission to our apartment, so we checked our bags and headed for **Nelson** and his column.

I was well aware that Westminster Abbey is not open to tourists on Sunday, or during services, except for those who wish to attend a service. Before leaving home, I had e-mailed the Abbey to ask the times of Easter Services, as well as the times available to tourists. Their public relations people are friendly and more than helpful.

Thus it happened that, just before midday, we joined several hundred people outside Westminster Hall, the Methodist building opposite the Abbey, preparing to join the Good Friday Procession. I had been a little apprehensive about this, as I thought perhaps it might be a "parade". However, my fears were completely unfounded.

As the last chime of Big Ben announced midday, the proceedings commenced. There were prayers, Bible readings, hymns, and a "meditation", a short sermon. We then walked, in silence, along Victoria Street to Westminster Catholic Cathedral, where further readings, prayers, and a meditation were said and hymns sung. Returning along Victoria Street, we noticed, in a wheelchair, the very familiar figure of Sister Wendy Beckett, known to many of us from her art programmes on television.

The burgeoning crowd assembled on the lawn outside St Margaret's Church, next to Westminster Abbey, for another short programme, before moving into the Abbey building. By this time we must have numbered some thousand people, bathed in a soft afternoon light which filtered through the beautiful windows. We stood while the final prayers and readings were said. The meditation was delivered by Sister Wendy, a frail little woman, who stood throughout, and talked of the JOY of Good Friday, and of Jesus' joy, as his work was completed.

We sang the final hymn, When I survey the wondrous cross, to the accompaniment of the Abbey's grand organ.

Saturday saw us at the Tower of London, a place of such history and legend that it is difficult to comprehend. A unique experience was to hear a 62 gun salute, fired at 1p.m. on an Easter Saturday.

The Queen's birthday, for the first time, had been on Good Friday, but as it coincided with the religious ceremonies, the birthday salute was given on the following day. "Sixty-two guns?" I asked. "Yes, madam, we have twenty-one guns for Her Majesty the Queen, twenty-one for this Royal Palace, and twenty for the City of London," was the reply from the Yeoman Warder, who wore campaign medals from both Kosovo and Ireland.

"I've been in a lot of silly places," was his answer to my question about

his medals.

On Sunday morning, I was awake early, so I headed for the Easter Vigil at St Martin-in-the-Fields at 5.30 am. The church decor is very simple, and the grey light through the clear glass windows barely illuminated the interior. There were about fifty people there. We heard some Bible readings, then we proceeded to the porch, overlooking Trafalgar Square, as the early workers were stirring and on their way to their jobs. Kindling had been set in a brazier in the centre of the porch. It was lit, symbolising the resurrection of Christ as the Light of the World, and as it crackled and sputtered, a Paschal candle was lit. We followed it back inside the church, where we lined the centre aisle. Each of us was given a small candle which we lit, in turn, from the original Paschal candle. We sang a number of hymns, and further simple ceremonies took place, before we were all invited to the church hall for breakfast.

The organist in me could contain herself no longer. As my candle was collected, I asked if I might see the organ in its gallery at the rear of the church. "Certainly," was the answer, "just go out this door and up the stairs."

The organist, **Paul Stubbings**, very kindly showed me the beautiful **Walker** pipe organ. It is a completely new instrument, built in 1990, with digital technology.

I was asked if I'd like to play it, and at first was too embarrassed to do so. Then I stopped my protestations. "What am I saying? I pass this way but once, and this opportunity will never again present itself!" Off came the joggers, and I was on the stool in a trice, to play a couple of verses of *Thine be the glory*, before floating down to the church's Easter breakfast of painted eggs, sausages, raisin toast and tea.


