
COMING EVENTS.

ANDREW FENNER DUE SOON.

The forthcoming visit to this country, by
the celebrated English theatre-organist,
ANDREW FENNER (as announced by the Vic.
Division) is drawing closer each day.
Although not as well known in this part
of the world as many English organists,
ANDREW FENNER is very well known indeed
in his own country. An L.P. recording
of him playing the 4/15 Compton organ in
the Odeon Theatre Hammersmith, England,
released by Concert Recording, is in your
Editor's possession, and has become a great
favorite of mine. Reprinted hereunder
are some excerpts from the review of this
record which appeared in the pages of A.T.O.

record which appeared in the pages of A.T.O.S. Official magazine, "Theatre Organ" in June 1970.

"ANDREW FENNER - THEATRE ORGAN"

We had never heard of ANDREW FENNER until this recording came along although, thanks to Concert Recording, we have come to expect the unexpected from British theatre organists. MR FENNER lived up to all our "unexpectations".

A veteran of 30 years, he is a master orchestrator and arranger for organ on one hand, and on the other he displays an earthy sense of humour. The selection which entitles him to the former title is a composition most organists would shun as completely unsuited to organ performance - "the Magic Fire Music" from Wagner's opera "Die Walkure". It cues a magic moment in the opera when the God Wotan mesmerizes his daughter and surrounds her resting place with a ring of fire - which only a hero would dare brave to claim her (punishment for getting too friendly with mortals). The music has the qualities of a lullabye, a grim warning and rising flames - plenty of work for a whole orchestra. This is music for which there is a score, and it allows little latitude; to be effective the organ must do everything Wagner's 80 man orchestra does. This is the task MR FENNER has undertaken - and he comes out smelling like a rose. Its all there and just as effective as an orchestral version. A bow to ANDREW FENNER.

Further on in this quite long review the reviewer said, "Sentimental Journey has a drag tempo and nice Trumpet punctuation. Other tunes are Carioca, Can-Can(Offenbach), The Swan (St. Saens), Tango (Albeniz), and Alligator Crawl (Fats Waller). Each is an orchestration unto itself, providing about the widest range (Wagner to Waller) one could hope for, but aparently all in a day's work for this skilful old pro."

With a review like that, ANDREW FENNER is very obviously highly regarded in the United States. His visit to this country around about Easter time, will be a most rewarding one for theatre organ fans. We, in NSW, will look forward to perhaps hearing him at Marrickville Town Hall whilst he is here.

BRUTAL MURDER OF FAMOUS AUTHOR.

TRAGIC LOSS TO THEATRE ORGAN WORLD

It was reported from America, that Ben M. Hall, author of the famous "The Best Remaining Seats" was brutally murdered in his Manhattan apartment. His throat had been slit. The report did not give the date, but it appears to have happened in recent weeks.

Ben M. Hall. the popular Master of Ceremonies for many of the A.T.O.S. Conventions and other functions was a dedicated T.O. fan and a beloved figure amongst the T.O. fraternity, not only in the U.S.A. but to many people in many places.

Reprinted many times, his book, The Best Remaining Seats" is very likely the most complete volume ever written on the movie-palaces of America during their incredible hey-day.

The NSW Division of TOSA extends its sympathy to A.T.O.S. on the loss of their friend and historian.

He will be sadly missed.

WE APOLOGISE FOR AN ERROR.

The January issue of TOSA News reported the formation of a new Organ Society in Auckland, New Zealand. In our report it was stated, "so it can be expected that the N.Z. organ-lovers are in for a better deal in the future than they have had in the past". This should have read, "Auckland organ lovers" and not "N.Z. organ lovers". This error was not noticed until after publication, and so we apologise for the error in order to clear away any wrong impressions which may have been given.

The facts are that New Zealand organ-lovers have had "a very good deal" from our member Eddie Aikin of Tokoroa, who owns the only WurliTzer in New Zealand presently available for concerts. Since he acquired the organ in 1958, there have been no less than 25 National radio broadcasts and 27 public concerts featuring his organ. These concerts have all been presented by Eddie for the public's pleasure, and not as a profit-making venture. So it can be readily seen that New Zealand organ-lovers have had a "very good deal" indeed. TOSA News has, on numerous occasions, chronicled the devoted efforts to the cause, as well as the achievements of Eddie who must be considered as "Mr Theatre Organ of NZ".

However, since the removal of the WurliTzer from the Civic Theatre in Auckland, the residents of that city have had no mighty WurliTzer to enjoy at all - and this very unfortunate situation means a "very poor deal" for them, especially as Eddie's WurliTzer is located well over 100 miles away in Tokoroa. The formation of a new Organ Society in Auckland should therefore result in "Auckland's organ-lovers receiving a better deal in the future" This is the thought that TOSA News intended to convey in its comment.

As we would not like Eddie to feel slighted by this unintentional error, your Editor hastens to clarify the matter.

THE CASE OF THE LOST TREMULANT.

An American correspondent reported to TOSA News that GEORGE WRIGHT made a last minute switch from pipes to an electronic instrument at a recent concert in the Rialto Theatre, Pasadena. GEORGE is currently doing a concert season at the theatre, playing one concert each month. The organ, a 2/10 WurliTzer has had three extra ranks added to it especially for his season.

At the December concert, a tibia tremulant on the WurliTzer refused to work at the last minute, and GEORGE did the show on a Hammond X 66 organ. My correspondent reported that there were quite a few disappointed people including a number who had come hundreds of miles to hear him play the Rialto's famous little WurliTzer. He described GEORGE'S performance on the X 66 as excellent and an education to all who heard him. GEORGE WRIGHT, of course, always gives a top-class performance whatever the organ, so their disappointment could only have been because of the lack of the "real pipe" sound. I'll bet those trems are working well for his next show!

S.A. DIVISION'S WURLITZER KEPT BUSY.

Following the successful opening of their 2/12 WurliTzer now installed in the Pulteney Grammar School auditorium on December 12th, the S.A. Division are keeping their organ busy with a full schedule of concerts. The opening, which featured KNIGHT BARNETT and TONY FENELON drew a full house for this important occasion. On December 30th, NSW Division's PETER HELD appeared in concert for them, thus becoming the first NSW organist to try out the installation in a concert appearance. With two concerts in the space of less than three weeks, this augers well for the future.

South Australian Division have officially announced that they will be holding a Convention in Adelaide at Easter this year. They will feature a number of guest artists in concerts at both the ex Regent/St. Peter's 3/15 WurliTzer and their own 2/12 instrument at the Grammar School. NSW members who plan a motoring Easter, should keep this function in mind. They will be welcomed by the S.A. Division. If you plan to attend make your reservations through the Sth Aust. Secretary.

CONCERTS IN ENGLAND & AMERICA FOR WILBUR KENTWELL.

Queensland Division's Honorary Member WILBUR KENTWELL takes off on Friday 26th by Qantas jetsbound for London. He will break his journey in Rome for a few days rest (he'll probably fling "Three Coins In The Fountain" whilst he's there) and then continue on to London where he is to make nine appearances before joining

WILBUR KENTWELL CONCERT TOUR.

American organist DON KINGSTON for a heavy schedule of concerts in the U.K. He is to include Edinburgh in the tour, which will last three weeks. Together they cross the Atlantic to New York and during April DON KINGSTON will leave for Alaska, Japan, Singapore, arriving in Australia in May. In the meantime WILBUR will concertise from the East coast to the West finishing up in San Francisco. WILBUR then rejoins DON in Brisbane for further concerts. This is an exciting tour indeed, and TOSA News, on behalf of NSW members wishes him 'bon-voyage' and good luck.

QUEENSLAND NEWS.

The Queensland Division have announced the safe arrival on January 11th of their Christie Theatre Pipe Organ from England. The hall, in which their organ will be installed, is, I understand, nearing completion, so we in NSW send our congratulations and extend our best wishes for the work of re-installation.

Queensland also announces that their "Tibia" Newsletter Editor, Mr Tom Ellis has been forced to retire from his post due to ill health. Tom suffered a heart attack not so long ago, and his doctor says he must take it easier in the future. Tom has done a great job for the Qld.Division - he has also given the utmost in full co-operation with this journal. We will all miss his dynamic 'to the point' style of Editorial. WORLD RECORD. JIM BARRON, a member of the Gold Coast Chapter of TOSA has broken the record for continuous organ playing. JIM took the record with a shattering run of 46 hours non-stop. He played from music supplied by friends in order to help him to remain awake by concentrating on the sheet music. He experienced some trouble with his feet swelling across the instep but after playing 350,000 pedal notes, this is not surprising. Later a check taken over a particular period of time showed (on estimation) that he had played (in addition to the 350,000 pedal notes) some 2,500,000 notes with the left hand and 3,500,000 wwth the right. Congratulations JIM - may your record stand for a long, long time. Phew11

RAY THORNLEY IN CONCERT AT MARRICKVILLE 31st JANUARY

Despite the nasty weather when "Raindrops were falling" on everyone's head, the first TOSA concert for the year, a free one at our own Wurlitzer, proved to be an overwhelming success. To a crowd of nearly three hundred, the FANTASTIC RAY THORNLEY played a concert so capably, and so dazzalingly colourful, that the audience was rapt in spellbound wonder. This boy has really "got something". It is joy indeed when a concert critic can write such words, and genuinely mean what he says.

Almost every piece <u>BAY</u> played contained some passages of sometimes weird, but always wonderful improvisation. And what a beautifully rich full organ tone he brought forth. Was that "Scarborough Fair" he was playing, or was it a complex Bach fugue, with melody on the pedals reminiscent of Boellmann?

RAY'S programme extended through all eras of modern music; Another opening, I'll never fall in love again, This guy, Raindrops keep falling, Danny Boy, Greensleeves, "Pie in the Face" Polka (Mancini), Begin the Beguine, The Swan (Sana Saens), Mrs. Robinson, Sounds of Silence, Scarborough Fair, Those Magnificent Men, Just a Wearying for you, Hello Dolly, selections from Paint Your Wagon, The Impossible Dream. RAY'S encore, (The audience wouldn't have let him get away without one,) was "Birth of the Blues."

Great credit is due to young RAY THORNIEY for the manner he played this concert and introduced his numbers, especially considering his out-of-action left hand index finger. I have a feeling he'll stay away from car doors for a while! If you remember, RAY'S first appearance for TOSA was at Marrickville late in 1969, when he appeared as associate artist to DAVID PARSONS.

This time it was RAY'S turn to introduce a younger organist, HEATHER MOEN. Many of us have heard HEATHER before, and have been delighted at her Theatre Organ sense and technique. This was the first time however that we have heard her at "the Big One", and judging by her performance at this debut, I have no doubt that we will be hearing her again soon.

HEATHER handled the big 2/10 Wurlitzer with full confidence, and gave us some interesting contrasts of style. Commencing with "Dream a little dream of me", HEATHER continued with I could have danced all night, Trumpet Volontary (Clarke), Bridge over troubled water. In her second appearance, we heard I know a place, Cavatina in F (Rheinberger) Oob la di, Oob la da (with some Mozart and Schubert mixed in for good measure.)

HEATHER also had the honour of being broadcast over the A.B.C. last week. On the 2FC Session "Young Australia", she was heard at the famous St. Andrew's Cathedral Organ, Sydney, playing Prelude & Fugue in A (Bach) and Sketch No. 4 in Db (Schumann.) From what I heard of this broadcast, HEATHER appeared to handle this difficult instrument with ease, and succeeded in filling the Cathedral with delicious sound. A young organist with a future, I am sure.

Congratulations to the brilliant RAY THORNLEY and his able assistant HEATHER MOEN for such a wonderful afternoon, this our first function for the year.

CAPITOL THEATRE SURPRISE RECITALS

Lance Wells and Ray Thornley, 22nd Jan., & 29th Jan., resp., each had the thrill of "playing in" the morning session at the Capitol after their usual practice periods. With spotlight and all, the Manager requested that they continue playing till "Curtain up" at 10.15 a.m. This sort of thing is just what we need to show the general public that Theatre Organs are not dead, but are well and truly alive, and from what I have heard, sets people wondering and asking questions, and before long, we have perhaps a few new members. I hope this kind of little boost keeps up. The Capitol Theatre seems to be used for all types of entertainments recently, like Sunday night 31st January's Channel Ten Show, when Ray Thornley appeared at the Wurlitzer for a mini-concert from 7.00 p.m. till 8.00 p.m. Let's hope all this is a sign of future increasing use of the only two Wurlies left in the City.

ARCADIA WURLITZER RESTORATION - NEW CHATSWOOD TOWN HALL

At last, the contract has been signed for the work to be done onthis historic organ. I spoke with Mr. Noad last week who stated that work will commence very shortly. The official opening date is somewhere between July and September, and I hope to keep you posted on details for the opening night of the organ. Hope to get some really great organ V.I.P.
