#### **Presidents Report to AGM 2019**

Members – it's been an interesting year – to say the least.. We've implemented some changes; We've changed banks to move away from ANZ and excessive fees – Geoff may talk about that in his treasurer's report. But I can tell you – changing banks when five signatories require identification and form signing and they live on the South Coast, Southern Highlands and Sydney is no easy or fast task!

This also facilitated us changing the way we provided credit and debit card transactions by using the "Square" service which has proven popular. Gone are the days of the old "click clack" credit card imprinter and the roughly \$29 per month that ANZ charged us to have that facility – plus transaction fees! It also means that the handling of transactions is all online and no one has to stand in a queue at the bank to hand over some pieces of paper.

Trybooking has continued to be a useful tool for selling tickets online and I often note that some of our audience turn up with their Trybooking tickets printed ready to show.

A large project resulted in the scanning and uploading of all available archive copies of TOSA News to our website – David Badman sends links in regular emails as you may have seen. It's been interesting looking back over those issues to see news of past activities, concerts and member names appearing – many of them still around today.

We've implemented MailChimp for better distribution of email and the emails are of better value to the recipients as we can even include links to online ticket sales and video teasers. We have the benefit of reporting of activity on emails sent.

Committee is aging and wearing out. Where are the volunteers to keep us going?

This year our committee have all worked hard in a number of ways – but it is not only the committee who can and should do the work. They've also had their own health and family issues to deal with. We have many members who have skills that can help the society and its cause. Where are you?

I would like to thank all this year's committee and ex officio office holders for their efforts:-

Secretary Simon for his ongoing efforts to keep us all informed (according to his daughter Harriet I work him too hard), Treasurer Geoff for his consistent and valued efforts to keep the funds under expert control, our vice Presidents Neil and John for stepping into the void when I can't and for their expertise in maintaining our instruments, Rob for continuing to lead his docents on the Christie project, Ernie for his ongoing work to keep TOSA News being compiled and for his efforts in contacting all manner of media for publicity, Barry for just being there and doing all sorts of things we didn't even realise happened - and he makes great cakes for the committee meetings, Pam for being another power house of organisation and knowledge about the history of the society, David for his energy and enthusiasm in a number of matters, including supporting Margaret as Membership secretary and being the connection between our printer and then assisting with packaging and mailing of TOSA News. Last but not least - Theo for being our ticket secretary. Theo has decided that commitment to the committee is not for him but I am pleased to advise he has agreed to continue in the role of Ticket Secretary.

Of course one of our key projects has continued this year as you can see and will hear later, and I thank those involved for all their ongoing efforts. You may be interested to know that we have actually booked the church for the opening concert next year.

We have five concerts planned for next year and details of those will become available shortly, but I can tell you the international artists will be two Americans we have seen and heard before. In July we'll have Justin Stahl and in October Brett Valliant. Other concerts are on in March, May and December.

Many members are keen to know what is happening at the State Theatre. Of course it is not "our" instrument, so the best and only approach we can take is – gently gently. We've received support from various channels such as OMSS, Ken Double, Peter Jewkes and other people with connection to State Theatre. We would love to have a joint visit with the likes of OMSS to see and hear this wonderful instrument, and I've made overtures on behalf of TOSA regards that matter. I think it's fair to say that State Theatre management don't know what to do with the organ now it's fully

restored.

Personally it's been a tough year for me as you know, but... I'm getting better, and had the all clear as you may know further confirmed by a recent follow up visit to my specialist. Thank you to the committee for keeping things going and for their support. Thank you too to members for their thoughts and wishes during treatment and recovery.

Here's to another year of fine music on the most amazing of instruments. I encourage you to tell as many people as possible about the magic of theatre organs and better yet, bring them to concerts – often!

I should again like to thank all of the members of the Committee for all of the effort that has gone into making the past year another productive one for our Society. I personally have appreciated the support of the regular Committee members, as well as those others who provide their time and expertise from time to time. I also need to take this opportunity, formally to thank all members and volunteers for their patronage and hard work throughout this past year. Gratitude is also due for that extremely dedicated band of experts who maintain the Society's instruments, ensuring that they can be presented and enjoyed in world class condition. I am sure that you will be thrilled by the great progress being made with the installation of the Christie here at West Ryde.

The conduct of Committee business via email between monthly meetings continues to ensure that most necessary decisions can be quickly and thoroughly dealt with, and that those things that "happen" can be communicated without delay.

#### Marrickville Organ Report for November 2019 AGM

Good afternoon ladies and gentlemen.

The year commenced with the re-leathering of the 12 note pedal Diaphone chest secondary pneumatic motors. In August 2018, one chest motor had to be re-leathered prior to the September concert and it was felt that the remaining 11 motors should be re-leathered sooner rather than later. Thanks to Ernie Vale and John Batts for their assistance with this.

An electronic relay has been installed for the doorbell effect so as to provide full voltage to the bell from the organ's action power supply to rectify the problem of inadequate volume.

The striking pneumatic for the cymbal action had burst and despite the hole in the leather, was still operable. This has been re-leathered.

David Badman is constructing a steel frame with castors to support the organ's piano so that it will be relatively easy to move out of its on-stage storage cupboard. David is also constructing the mounting hardware to support the electric motor and vacuum pump so that these can be contained within the bottom of the piano.

Our usual Monday access to the organ for members practise or maintenance has been restricted while a lift is being installed in the front section of the building. Due to occupational health & safety the foyer and hall are out of bounds while tradesmen are present.

I move acceptance of this report.

#### **ORION WURLITZER REPORT AGM 2019**

After last year's refurbishment of the keyboard stack the past year has continued to present us with a few challenges on Opus 1813 – aka the Orion Wurlitzer.

Sadly these challenges have appeared by way of the Uniflex system "locking up" whilst being played. During concerts this is

usually shown by the console continuing to be playable but not responding to the pushes of combination pistons and other commands. This was most evident during recent concerts with Ken Double and then David Gray. I must say that both artists were quite patient about the matter but to me and others involved it was quite embarrassing and frustrating. Fortunately it is quickly and easily solved by undertaking a quick process on the Uniflex computer.

We initially thought it was a computer failure causing the issue, so we swapped over to a backup computer that we had in storage for situations such as this. Alas that too was presenting similar problems. So, as a last resort the David Gray concert was operated via a laptop computer I had available - but again similar problems. There must be something else! Between a few of us we agreed that it must be the network that connects the console and computer together and then feeds the signals to the chambers as these were the only things that were common. I resolved to change the network components to alleviate the issue. Fortunately, I had at home a spare unused network router and a data switch that were perfect for the job. At a special event last Saturday for a private function at the Orion, Neil Palmer and I had time to swap over the network components before Simon Ellis and I undertook some practice before the event. It was a little problematic at first but after a couple of reboots it settled down and went on to perform faultlessly for the few hours we had it in practice and performance.

Future member days next week and during December will give the system further testing. I'd like to personally apologise to members for the interruptions to the recent concerts. These "things" do happen from time to time with theatre organs – but they're more typically pipe ciphers and not computer hissy fits.

The organ is due for some other maintenance and we hope to have a two day workshop to address some issues with wind lines and chests in the chambers, checking and rectification of issues in the console such as faults with tabs and lighting. A small crew will be assembled to undertake these tasks.

As per last year's report, the relationship with Orion Management continues to be friendly and cooperative. Thanks to all the people who assist in maintaining and presenting Opus 1813 – your efforts and time commitment is greatly appreciated by all the committee, members and audience.

#### **Tony Fenelon & John Atwell**

**Tony's** insatiable interest in lighter music and a love of the majestic sound of the Wurlitzer Unit Orchestra (Theatre Organ) led to his "other" career, leading to his appointment in 1965 as the resident organist at Melbourne's then prestigious Regent Theatre. **Tony** made his first tour of the United States back in 1969, and has returned at least 30 plus times. He has performed at some of the most prestigious theatre organ venues in the U.S. including, the Oakland Paramount, the Ohio Theatre, Columbus, San Sylmar, the Sanfillipo residence, the Orpheum Phoenix, the Pasadena Civic Auditorium, Seattle Paramount with John Atwell, and at the Dickinson High School Kimball to mention a few.

In 2014 **Tony** returned to the Regent again with Richard Hills in presenting the "Tale of Two Organs" to a very appreciative audience of some 1,500 people from Melbourne and interstate.

**John Atwell** receives repeat invitations to play concerts at theatre organ venues around Australia both as a solo performer, as well as in piano/organ duo combination with his long-time colleague and friend, Tony Fenelon.

**John** has also taken his talents overseas on many occasions, playing performances in the USA, Canada, the United Kingdom Europe and New Zealand. John has just completed another playing tour of the UK this October 2019.

#### Christie report for 2019 AGM.

Despite unforseen gaps due to individual medical conditions, 2019 has seen significant visible progress in the Christie installation:

During the first half of this year all final chests and pipework were installed in the Solo Chamber, joining those already in the Accompaniment Chamber.

Five regulators were assembled in the Accompaniment Chamber, 3 of which necessitated manufacture of custom interface boxes, to feed the Flute/Diapason, Strings, Clarinet, and offsets of the Diapason/Diaphone, Flute and 16' Violone. One of these 5 is to feed the 16' Tibia, Bird Whistles, and the 16' Tuba extension in the Solo Chamber.

One winker was mounted on the wall to feed the shutters and non-tonal percussions, and another on the main trunk to feed the Marimba/Harp and Kimball Celesta. A further stand-alone interface box has been installed for a custom half-size regulator being manufactured to feed the Orchestral Oboe in the Solo Chamber.

In the Solo Chamber installation has commenced on the wind supply for the shutters, tonal & non-tonal percussions. Shortly installation will start on the regulators for the Vox, Tibia, and Krumet/Tuba, as well as installation of vibratoes (tremulants) in both chambers.

The rare and historic Christie piano has been refinished and was recently delivered to the church. Its vacuum pump is to be rebuilt, and interface mechanism to be installed with wiring and control gear. A custom padded cover has been made by Graham Glendenning, matching the one he previously made for the console.

Last week organ builder John Parker attended and performed preliminary tuning of some of the Accompaniment ranks; Flute, Diapason, Clarinet, and part of the Strings. John will soon be called in to voice several repaired pipes and tune the basses. The temperature in the chambers has been stable at 18° C for an appreciable amount of time which bodes well for future stability of tuning.

There is still an appreciable amount of work to be done before the instrument is deemed fit for concert performances; most notable would be tonal regulation to suit the acoustic of the church space, once all ranks are winded and settled in. Grateful thanks go to all those who have helped so far, particularly Graham Glendenning and Theo Langenberg.

#### Treasurer's Report for year ended 30th June 2019

Good afternoon: thank you for the opportunity to present the financial details of the past financial year.

The financial statements were audited by C M Pitt & Co, Chartered Accountants and I would like to place on record my appreciation of the assistance always readily available from Mr. Charles Pitt.

A loss of \$4,777.89 was incurred compared with a profit of \$658.60 in 2018. I will elaborate on this a little later.

From trading , that is sale of recordings, raffle tickets and afternoon teas (but excluding concert ticket sales) a profit of \$1,937 was earned. Many CD's tapes and LP's have been donated, the sale of which has contributed to this figure. Also, some of the afternoon tea items have been cost free. Thank you to those donors.

Overall Income was down approximately \$7,500. General Donations were down by almost \$2,600 and for the Christie restoration \$1,700. You will recall that during 2017-18, donations were specifically sought for replacement of the Uniflex system at Campsie and for continued help towards the Christie project. Through members' generosity at that time, higher than average donations as reflected in the 2018 figure were received. From the figures shown, one gets the impression that membership is down considerably. This is not the case. Historically, membership fees have been included in the financial year they were received regardless of to which year they referred. Ticket sales have remained static.

Expenditure decreased by just over \$2,000. Advertising reduced slightly with the method of advertising being adjusted from time to time in line with feedback on what is proving successful or otherwise. Artist Fees and Expenditure also is slightly down. These figures are influenced by costs associated with overseas

artists and other variables. Hire of Venues increased by \$2,800 which reflects the higher costs incurred at Campsie and the actual timing of concerts through the year.

Organ Maintenance and tuning is down almost \$3,000 and reflects the unfortunate need to utilise people at WRAC to the detriment of other instruments. It is abundantly clear that funds will need to be expended soon rather than later.

Christie Just over \$4,200 was spent during the year on the restoration of this instrument. This item does not appear in the Profit and Loss figures, rather it is applied directly to the value recorded in the Balance Sheet.

So reverting to my earlier comment re the loss of close to \$5,000 for the year, it should now be apparent how this occurred. Income down approximately \$7,500 and a decreased expenditure approximately \$2,000 and a turnaround from \$658 profit in 2018 to a loss of \$4,777 this year.

Thanks must go to you, the members, for continued support by way of membership and concert attendance, to those who have generously donated to the work of the society both financially and their time, and to the multitude of volunteers, who man the various sale points, who serve, tea, coffee and cake, who give us lighting, sound and video and who see us safely to our seats. Then there is the editorial, print and posting of TOSA News. I'm sure I have not included everyone (my apologies), but I make the point – "What would our costs be, if we had to pay for these benefits?"

In closing, I again remind you that you are welcome to enquire at any time regarding the financial side of your Society. A copy of the financial statements is available to any member upon request to me.




