





The mailing label on this **TOSA News** will have informed you if your subscription has expired, but there is still time to renew if you act now! You need not miss even one copy.





At 17 Heath Wooster has successfully completed a Proficiency Diploma in Organ (Practical and Theory), and Diploma in Professional Performance - A Honours. He was presented with his Diplomas and the first Keith Hopkins Memorial Award at the Australian Guild of Music and Speech Annual Graduation Day in April, 1996, at which he was also asked to be guest organist. - See photo right.

Recently in the Young Australian of the Year Awards, Heath was presented with a certificate for outstanding achievements in the Arts Award for his music and photography.

In April he celebrated his third year as Honorary Resident Organist at the **Dendy Cinema**, **Brighton**, where he plays the 3/15 **WurliTzer** every Saturday night to capacity audiences.

It is estimated that he has played to well over 150,000 people in the past three years, as he sometimes plays extra sessions on a Friday or Sunday night for preview screenings of new releases, and on request for organisations like the Australian Ballet Christmas parties or fund-raising film days for the Salvation Army.

This was a joint production with the National Sound and Film Archives, Canberra, who have managed to reconstruct almost all of the previously incomplete film.

The recording was accomplished in a 90 minute, non-stop, marathon performance. David played the premiere live performance of his score in Canberra last December on the TOSA (ACT) Compton.

It was a concert of such delightful variety, That brought a great deal of pleasure to many of us in our Theatre Organ Society.


And especially I loved the tribute to Ginger Rogers and Fred Astaire,

Secretary's Report

The 24th National Convention is now history and I would like to take this opportunity to thank the convention committee and the many members who worked so hard to make it the great success that it was.

All the organs were in first class condition, the choice of the artists appealed to the conventioneers and every one had a great time.

TOSA (NSW Div) has again set another high standard that will be hard to top. Our overseas organists, Nigel Ogden and Barry Baker are keen to return.

We have three great overseas organists in the next three months. Simon Gledhill in June, Jelani Eddington in July and Nicholas Martin in August.

We hope you will support these artists with your attendance at their concerts.

Marrickville Organ Report

The Marrickville Wurlitzer had not had a chance to settle in when it was required for the Convention. All my good intentions, of the instrument having several weeks for playing-in, went out the window when we simply ran out of time.

There were some moments of anguish on the Thursday night prior to the Convention with the combination pistons! However, **John Andrews** was able to locate the source of the trouble and the pistons were back in operation. At the same time, I was having my own fight with the temperamental Diaphone pipes. We finally left the hall at 2am, Good Friday morning!

Since Chris McPhee's concert on Easter Saturday, the organ has been featured in the Marrickville Heritage Society's Awards Night, where it was played by Margaret Hall, and of course, in Tony Fenelon's concert on 5th May. These organists have commented favourably on the versatility of the instrument.

There is still some work to be done, such as bringing the Toe Levers on the


console into operation and streamlining the procedure of starting the organ ready for playing.

Some members have enquired regarding the reinstatement of the members' practice nights, however, there are some hurdles that need to be overcome which I will point out:

- 1. The Hall no longer has a live-in Caretaker who used to lock up after the members had left at 10pm.
- 2. In the two years the organ had been closed down, a community group has moved in and makes use of it one or two nights per week.
- 3. As mentioned earlier in the report, the procedure for starting the organ needs to be streamlined.
- 4. I am looking at ways to make the present lid on the console platform less cumbersome to raise.

I guess we will just have to approach the **Marrickville Council** to see if there are times when the members can have access to the organ.

We are always delighted to hear overseas visitors' comments on our local events. Life-members of TOSA (NSW), JoAnn and Russ Evans from Seattle, were welcome visitors to our 1996 Convention and this is their report, published in their home ATOS Chapter's Puget Sound Pipeline newsletter:

WANT TO VISIT AUSTRALIA? ATTEND A TOSA CONVENTION!

Easter weekend-a four-day holiday for Australians - finds theatre organ enthusiasts gathering annually for the Theatre Organ Society of Australia Convention. TOSA groups in the five or six major cities take turns hosting the event - this year it was held in Sydney, and your editors attended.

The **Sydney** metro area has a population of about 4.5 million - a vibrant, exciting place. Unlike most of the **US**, each city and many suburbs boast a Town Hall - a community meeting place serving as a centre for a vast array of events. It is in these town halls that **TOSA** groups have been able to install theatre organs and retain some kind of adequate access, both for use and for maintenance.

The flagship instrument of the Sydney TOSA group is the Orion Centre 3/16 WurliTzer Style 260 built in 1927. Two of the seven convention concerts featured this instrument. The first was a very English-style presentation by Nigel Ogden, known for his 16-year stint as presenter of BBC Radio 2's longest running, specialist music program, The Organist Entertains. Nigel's concert was a nostalgic "trip back home to England" for a number of folks. The typical English theatre organ style is vastly different from the American style, which was demonstrated so ably by Cincinnati's Barry Baker on the very same instrument later during the convention.

Barry truly did himself proud. Digressing for the moment, Barry's CD now available is stunning evidence that original talent is out there, and his concert was further proof - most of his arrangements are inventive beyond description. He was the only artist who received FOUR encore calls!

Bill Schumacher, who has played several times here in the Seattle area, and who has a marvellous talent for beautiful ballad arrangements, shared a program with Cliff Bingham, a Sydney performer, at Epping Baptist Church. This recently renovated and enlarged building, is home to a fine Christie 2/10 instrument, with adequate resources for both classical

and theatre music. Cliff's program of classics with a hymn or two for good measure was a nice Easter weekend balance for Bill's well-done popular program.

Not far from Sydney International Airport is the suburb of Marrickville. whose Town Hall boasts another of TOSA's beautifully installed WurliTzers. Although not an exceptionally large instrument (2/11), the outstanding acoustics in this building make it a favourite recording organ. (Hector Olivera has recorded on this instrument and raves about the sound). It was here we heard voung Chris McPhee play an excellent program, every bit as tastefully done as the one he did in February for PSTOS (Puget Sound Theatre Organ Society) at the Johnson home.

In February of 1992, PSTOSers enjoyed a wonderful concert at Bellevue Pizza & Pipes featuring young John Giacchi, a then 22 year old Sydney native with extraordinary talent. Since then, John has obtained a law degree and has joined a law firm in the Sydney area. With his studies behind him, he now finds more time to return to his music, and was given a concert slot in the convention line-up. His was the surprise event - no one had predicted that his would be such an extraordinarily creative and well-done concert. Harry Warren is one of John's favourite composers, and a highlight was his medley of Warren songs. Outstanding! The Willoughby Civic Centre WurliTzer upon which he played is a 2/11 with a 16' electronic pedal Tibia added. The instrument underwent a lengthy restoration and has been back in service for less than two years. John made it sound like a giant!

TOSA Sydney has a history of providing variety, and the Neil Jensen / Yellow Rolls Royce Orchestra event was no exception. A few PSTOS members may recall Neil's concert at Greenwood Pizza & Pipes in 1988. Since then Neil has become resident organist at Sydney's Hayden Orpheum Picture Palace, an Art Deco theatre now restored to its original opulence. The 3/12 WurliTzer in this

theatre originally came from the Wilson Theatre, Fresno. The Yellow Rolls Royce group is a stage band specialising in authentic arrangements and orchestrations from the dance band era of 1917 to the late '50s. The combination of organ and dance band was superb contertainment.

Sydney harbour is one of the most beautiful in the world, and a major event there would be incomplete without a harbour cruise. Having hosted numerous conventions, TOSA Sydney knows just how to put the pieces together. The 4-hour, beautifully sunny harbour cruise gave everyone the chance to view some of the most dramatic real estate and homes in all of Australia, sailing under the famous Sydney Harbour Bridge and past the renowned Opera House, around the new gambling casino and touristy Darling Harbour, then concluding with some of the best fish and chips around.

From the dock at which the cruise terminated, it was a walkable distance to Sydney Town Hall in which one of the world's prestigious classical organs is installed. With a stoplist requiring a full page of three columns, one can imagine it requires a highly skilled organist to adequately use the instrument. David Drury is such a man. David has an impressive list of credentials, yet can size up his audience and deliver a program suited to its tastes. And that's just what he did-Even to those who don't especially enjoy heavy classics, this was an exciting program in an exciting building.

Congratulations to the Sydney TOSA group for hosting a truly memorable event. Every detail was covered, the artists and organs were all tops, the camaraderie was outstanding, and we would encourage our US convention planners to consider shortening the duration of ATOS national conventions. The four full days in Sydney left everyone wanting a bit more, yet satisfied, having enjoyed a superb event.




Visit HISTORIC HOBART Easter, 1997

Hobart, Tasmania's capital, lies at the foot of Mt Wellington and spans both banks of the Derwent River. Mt Wellington is one of the State's highest peaks at 1270 metres. A trip to the summit will reward you with spectacular panoramic views.

Australia's second oldest capital city, Hobart was founded in 1804 by Colonel David Collins. When you explore this beautiful part of Tasmania you will be able to experience and appreciate its unique history.

The following attractions are located in the Greater Hobart area:

Cascade Brewery, South Hobart




Australia's oldest brewery is open for inspection. You can watch the beer being produced and take a tour of the Museum which houses an extensive display of historic pieces. You can also enjoy the Woodstock Gardens which have been described is the finest in Australia

Tasmania Distillery, Gasworks Shopping Village

Savour the sights, sounds and smells of a bustling, working distillery. At Australia's only commercial whisky distillery you can also visit the museum which features memorabilia and artefacts from Tasmania's distilling past.

Battery Point



Originally the location of Hobart's

seamen's quarters, historic Battery Point has hardly changed since. It gets its name from a battery of guns set up on the promontory in front of a small guard-house in 1818. This became a signalling station and is now the oldest building in Battery Point.

Today the **Point** is home to restaurants, antique shops, galleries and colonial accommodation houses. There are many heritage sites and attractions, including **Arthur's Circus** and **Kelly's Steps**.

Royal Tasmanian Botanical Gardens

The gardens are the second oldest in Australia. Features include many cold climate and deciduous plants, the largest collection of conifers in the Southern Hemisphere, Tasmanian native plants, a Conservatory and Japanese garden.

Tudor Court Model Village, Lower Sandy Bay

This beautifully crafted model village is the work of the late John Palotta. Crippled by poliomyelitis when a young boy, John spent some 12 years creating this model of the village of Chilham in Kent, England. The model buildings include a manor house, coach inn, shops and miniature figures.

Narryna Folk Museum, Battery Point

Narryna, Van Diemen's Land Folk Museum, is located in a beautiful Georgian sandstone and brick house

with walled courtyard and a coach-house. The Museum is home to some of the most enthralling and significant colonial treasures in Australia.

Richmond

The historic town of Richmond dates back to the early days of settlement. Richmond Bridge, which crosses the Coal River and forms the main road through the town, is the oldest bridge in Australia, the first stone being laid in 1823.

Go back in time and visit the oldest Roman Catholic Church in Australia.

Richmond Gaol Historic Site

Built in 1825, the gaol was home to many male and female convicts. See relics and displays of the convict period. Don't get too comfortable someone may lose the key!

Richmond Toy Museum

A truly marvellous collection of toys from 1890 to 1970 and a delightful look at childhood memories

Richmond Maze


A chance to get lost in history. Don't worry. There is the promise of a cup of tea at the end.

OUR NEXT ARTIST: Nicholas Martin

Our next artist, Nicholas Martin, first fell in love with the theatre organ at the age of 11, after initially studying the piano. Whilst on a visit to the seaside resort of Blackpool with his parents, he overheard the organ being played in the Ballroom of the famous Blackpool Tower, and from that moment it was always his ambition to play there.

This ambition was realised in 1981 when he was still only 17, and he became a resident organist there for the next two summer seasons, playing the WurliTzer made famous by his late idol, Reginald Dixon, for dancing and concerts. Naturally working at Blackpool, Nick has gained vast experience in all types of organ work and obviously he finds this had benefited him enormously over the years.

During the second season at Blackpool, Nick was approached by Nigel Turner from Northampton - a new entertainment complex was being built there and Mr Turner wanted him to become the resident organist on the 3/19 WurliTzer that was being

specially installed. The new venue was to be called **Turner's Musical Merry-Go-Round**, and it opened its doors officially during April 1983 with Nick as the principal resident organist. He is now in his thirteenth year there.

Since then, Nick has been playing constantly to full houses at Turner's, but has also found time to make many records, cassettes and CD's. Throughout this period of time at Turner's, Nick has managed to record over 20 albums on their WurliTzer. He has been seen on TV and made numerous recordings for BBC radio. He is also in great demand for concert appearances throughout Great Britain and other countries.

One of the major highlights in Nick's career came in 1985 when he was invited to perform on the 4-manual, 100-rank organ which is in the Kirk of Dunedin, on the west coast of Florida, USA. Since that first visit there, due to public demand, he has consistently been asked to return, and regularly enjoys playing to nearly 2,500 people. February 1996 saw his seventh trip across the Atlantic Ocean to entertain

his many American admirers.

He has played in the Channel Islands, Germany, Holland and Spain, as well as touring Australia and New Zealand. In July and August of 1993, he undertook a tour of the major theatre organ installations in Australia and New Zealand, and also made a "live" video recording on our Orion WurliTzer. During this year's English summer he is again returning to the same venues, as well as to some new ones as part of a hectic 5 week tour.

Nick is pleased to be able to tour around the Electronic Organ Clubs and Societies with a Technics GA-3. His very latest recording (and incidentally, his first on electronic organ) is called *Hi-Tech-Nick* and features this incredible instrument.

Amongst many accolades he was honoured in 1992 and 1995 to be elected the Patron of the Theatre Organ Club of Great Britain by its members. In September 1995 the Nicholas Martin Fan Club was formed.
