

PROFILE

MARGARET HALL

MARGARET HALL commenced learning popular organ at the age of nine years. After three years study she moved on to classical piano and organ studies.

During Christmas 1976, Margaret took up the position of resident organist for Mecca Theatres, being featured mainly at the Kogarah Mecca Theatre. Margaret has also performed two concerts at the Marrickville Town Hall Wurlitzer and during the National Theatre Organ Convention held in Sydney in 1980 over the Easter Week-End, she played a great concert at the Mecca 3/8 Wurlitzer which received noted acclaim of the visiting organ enthusiasts from around Australia.

Early in 1982, Margaret moved to Auckland N.Z., and since then her organ career has blossomed. Her first appearance at the Tauranga Town Hall Wurlitzer Organ late March, took the local audience by surprise. Early in April, Margaret played to a large crowd of 600 at the Auckland War Memorial Museum during a promotional concert. On May 2nd, at the Hollywood Theatre in Avondale, the Wurlitzer rose in the spotlight with Margaret playing 'This Could Be The Start Of Something Big', and the response from the audience was terrific!

Margaret has been in popular demand for organ recitals and has to fit them in between classical studies. October has already seen two concerts by Margaret, one on a large Rogers Classical organ and the second on the largest Allen Digital Computer Organ to come to New Zealand. Since her advancement in classical organ, her Theatre Organ style has seen a noticeble change in interpretation and presentation. Margaret will be visiting Sydney during January 1982 and we are delighted to have her playing once again at the Marrickville Wurlitzer.

LEN RAWLE FINE PERFORMER AND ENGLISH GENTLEMAN.

One of the largest crowds (approx. 600) ever seen at Marrickville Town Hall came out on a rainy Sunday afternoon of November 22nd to hear an excellent concert of 'good old theatre organ' music from a fine musician and a true English gentleman..Len Rawle.

Len had arrived in Sydney several days earlier with his wife (and chief record seller!) Judith. In this time he was featured in a thirty minute interview on ABC radio with Caroline Jones and in another interview with our own member Cliff Bingham on radio 2CBA-FM. Both interviews provided excellent publicity for the concert in particular and our own Society in general and featured some good tracks from Len's new recording.

The concert itself was quite a departure from the usual type of programme. Len's musical offerings were presented in the format of several long medleys rather than a lot of shorter numbers. As a result, Len was able to talk to the audience a little longer between items and quickly established himself as a showman with a personality capable of overcoming that invisible barrier between the console and the first row of seats.

The music was bright, well played, well registered and was obviously enjoyed by the c rowd who enthusiastically demanded and received an encore. A good measure of this enthusiasm was, that all of Len's records (personally autographed) were sold out completely at the end of the concert.

In short, an excellent performance from the organist, the organ (no ciphers) and a great audience turnout. Len, you are welcome back, anytime!

YES! ANOTHER NEW PIPE ORGAN.


In August 1980 the Queensland Conservatorium of Music took delivery of a new baroque type pipe organ designed and built by Peter Collins, the English organ builder.

A recording of the instrument has recently been issued by the Conservatorium on its own label MUSICON and is entitled: 'Gillian Weir plays the organ of the Conservatorium of Music', which has a selection played by Miss Weir during Organ Celebration Week, 14th to 21st March 1981.

The music comprises the Kenneth Leighton Concerto for organ, strings and timpani, op.58. Prelude and fugue in E minor by Nicolaus Bruhns, J.S.Bach's "Sei gegrusset, Jesu gutig" variations BWV 768, and a short Offertorio in C major by Zipoli.

Orders for the record may be placed with the Queensland Conservatorium of Music, P.O. Box 28, North Quay, Q, 4000. The cost is \$7.50 with \$2 for handling and postage.

FAREWELL CONCERT FOR ANOTHER RANK CINEMA.

Rank Organisation closures of cinemas continue in Great Britain due to "falling attendances, availability of leisure alternatives, home video films, and the 'mixed' reaction of British audiences to the glut of American films." Latest in the folding circuit to shutter is the Luxor/Odeon in Twickenham. A local newspaper said it is too early to speculate on the future of the site, but no matter what happens, a farewell concert is being planned to wrap up the 2/6 Compton pipe organ that has been used fairly regularly in the past few years. After the show, the organ will be removed and added to an exsisting Compton organ still installed in another Rank house that remains in operation.

ORGAN LITERATURE FOUNDATION HAS NEW CATALOGUE.

The Organ Literature Foundation, 45 Norfolk Road, Braintree, Mass. U.S.A. 02184, has just released its latest listing, Catalogue P which is in new format as a booklet instead of single letter-size sheets. The catalogue lists books, pamphlets, classical and theatre organ records. Established over 31 years ago, the Foundation is the largest supplier of organ material in the World. In the new catalogue are listed 40 new books and 103 recordings not previously available. The new issue is available for \$1.00 (U.S.) which is refundable with the first order received.

ROSEYEARE PLAYS CASTRO ORGAN PREMIERE.

SAN FRANCISCO, October 9 - Jim Roseveare last night premiered the extraordinary Wurlitzer - a purist's dream - which Dick Taylor and Ed Stout are installing in the Castro Theatre here in the City. Although only eight ranks are now playing, these eight sets comprise a complete small organ, one that is even now a completely satisfying instrument. The crucial capped metal pipes from C# through F# are particularly successful in the Solo Tibia, and like the Oakland Paramount Wurlitzer, the dynamic and coloristic terracing are truly artistic.

George Cukor's "Rich and Famous", starring Candice Bergen and Jacqueline Bisset was the screen premiere and with the organ unveiling it was a marvelous evening. The crowd went wild over the organ, as well it should have. In the opening night crowd were organ nabobs Ron Downer, Gary Baumann, Jack Bethards, Ed Stout, the Raymond Taylor family, and the outstandingly inspired keyboard virtuoso, John Seng. Performing flawlessly, the crowd went wild when Roseveare brought the organ up playing that time-honored Jesse Crawford arrangement of "I Love To Hear You Singing". The entire evening was an immense success and Roseveare"s almost hour-long "entry" music, a solo, and playing the stars onto the stage, using a mezzo combination on the tune "You Oughto Be In Pictures" helped produce an unbeatable combination of feeling and ambience that was perfect - a real high. Praising the installation, Roseveare said, "This is going to be one of the best Wurlitzers ever to speak. And it's interesting to note that both the Paramount and Castro theatres were designed by San Francisco Architect Timothy Pflueger - the Castro early in his notable career, the Paramount about 10 years later. The two organs are very similar, with the exception that the Castro boasts a Krumet and a Lieblich Flute, while the Paramount has an extra pair of strings. The Castro is about

a third smaller in cubic volume than is the Paramount, and thus is more intimate. But the two installations complement each other perfectly, and when both are finished, we will have at two ends of the Bridge the two really definitive Wurlitzer installations in the Country."

SEATTLE PARAMOUNT OPEN DURING REFURBISHING.

SEATTLE, Wash., October 9 - New owners of the Paramount Theatre are Israel and Norm Volotin, father and son. They purchased the ornate movie palace last June and started refurbishing work in July - first job was a cleaning of seats in time for the ATOS National Convention. The two have scheduled a line-up of talent and on Sunday, October 11th it was announced that a free preview would be held "to preview the magnificent interior of the newly refurbished" theatre and hear the mighty Wurlitzer which has had a great amount of restorative work done on it, come alive again. It was learned after this new announcement was made that the show was free of charge, but tickets had to be obtained. The evening was a sell-out.

For the opening show starring Mitzi Gaynor, Ron Baggott, who was one of the team of "Ron and Don" at the opening of the big theatre in 1928, will again be at the console playing "Blue Skies" to open the show - just as he did 53 and a half years ago.

DOWNTOWN DELUXER SPRUCES UP SATYRS AND SYLPHS.

United Theatre have just unveiled a \$1 million rejuvination of their Imperial Theatre in downtown Montreal, Canada, a 68 year old palace that originally played first-run photoplays and vaudeville. It was the firm's decision to refurbish all the highlights of the palace. Satyrs and Sylphs, murals and sculptures of godesses continue to look down from gilded pillars rather than replacing them with unimaginative decor of the present plastic generation.

WHATEVER HAPPENED TO THE MIGHTY WURLITZER?

taken from a newspaper

Tucked away in a number of otherwise quite ordinary homes around Sydney, the massive theatre organs of a few years ago have become the hobby and delight of a few enthusiasts.

The heyday of these formidable instruments was all too brief, cut short by the advent of television and the consequent economies enforced upon most of the Metropolitan Cinemas. But what a heyday it was! Dating from the twenties, it arose out of the steady increase in the size of the Cinemas. The pianos, which had done such noble service providing background music in the earlier days, were quite inadequate for the larger auditoriums, while orchestras were unsuitable and too expensive. So the theatre organ took over the task.

One of the first cinema organs in this country was installed during World War 1, in the Pavillion Theatre (later the Rex) in Rundle Street, Adelaide. Today, this theatre is a commercial centre. Typical of the older kind of theatre organ, this instrument was played from a piano type keyboard. Dorothy Dempsey from Newcastle, one of the star organists of the silent picture era, played this organ for twenty years and was known for her skill.

Horace Weber was another of the leaders. Born in Adelaide, he took his place among the top five organists in the world during the early twenties. He too, played for some years in Adelaide at the Grand in Rundle Street, where another of the early piano-console organs was in use. It was Horace who commissioned and played the first of the giant Wurlitzers in this country, which came into use at the Melbourne Capitol in November, 1924. This was the instrument which set the pace and resulted in a race among the larger theatres to add this attraction to their billboards. Among the early stars in Sydney were Rene Lees at the Lyric and M anny Aarons at the Crystal Palace. (Remember the Crystal Palace?) Here too, were incomparable exponents of the small theatre organ, the instrument which was soon to be swept away by the larger Wurlitzer.

Once the Melbourne Capitol had led the way, the giant Wurlitzer came in with a rush. Sydney followed soon after, the first being that installed at the Prince Edward theatre in 1925. Oddly enough, this organ was also the last one still to be used. Next was that installed in the Arcadia, Chatswood in 1926. In 1928 and 1929 the State, Regent, Capitol and Plaza brought four more to Sydney, while several others were introduced to Melbourne, one each in Adelaide and Brisbane and two in Perth. The Sydney Regent organ demonstrated one of the faults of this 1928 instrument which, being one of the smaller models, was hardly audible. In 1929 it was removed, enlarged and transferred to the Plaza in Melbourne.

Wurlitzers were not the only theatre organs on the market, the Christie organs being a very strong competitor. Most of these organs were on a smaller scale than the Wurlitzer and found popularity in the suburban cinemas. The Parramatta Roxy and Astra, Drummoyne Astra, Burwood Palatial, the Victory at Kogarah and Enfield, Strathfield and Gordon cinemas adopted them and found them to be a most effective drawcard. It was unfortunate that of the larger instruments installed in this country, few were ever heard at their best. Those at the State and Regent possessed magnificent tone colour, and in an accoustically ideal location would have ranked with the finest. Conflicting demands on the architectural side robbed them of this opportunity. By contrast, those at the Capitol and Prince Edward were installed to much better advantage, with corresponding effect on their performance as heard in the auditorium.

With the spectre of cost in the late fifties plus the coming necessity for 'wide' screens etc. the cinema organ was forced into a rapid decline. The smaller organs were first to go, as with the likelihood that most of them would end up in churches with little adaption. The sheer volume of the larger instruments being offensive for religious use.

At first, Australian theatres were not prepared to sell the larger organs even though these were not in use. The enforced idleness was unfortunate. When 'talkies' appeared on the cinema screen, the organs which had formerly provided the background music were relegated to 'chatter' music during intervals, and a few feature items. In this minor role, many did not receive the necessary maintainance and complete idleness carried the deterioration process still further. But where, precisely, does one find a market for a disused cinema organ, large enough for an auditorium seating 2000 people? Some of these instruments, too large for Church use, were snapped up for installation in private homes. In one area of Sydney alone, there is four theatre organs all within one block! These were mostly purchased from the Western Suburban theatres and were of the smaller scale. Many others had gradually been bought, and some have actually been restored, but sadly, many others are hidden away under basements or garages, locked away from everyone and secretly admired by their well meaning owners. They had hoped when they became the owners of these gems, that they would somehow bring them back to life. But, the cost has become far too high, and finding the right auditorium to give just credit to these massive instruments is virtually impossible.

Until recently, some of the very largest of the theatre organs were still 'not for sale'. However, within the last few weeks, the Sydney Regent organ was disposed of for twelve hundred pounds, and will be dismantled for erection in a private home.

GOLD COAST CHAPTER THEATRE ORGAN SOCIETY OF AUSTRALIA.

The Gold Coast Theatre Organ Society are planning their very first Organ Spectacular on Saturday 13th February 1982.


