YOUNG ORGANISTS

The Secretary of the Australia Felix Chapter of the American Theatre Organ Society, Gail Ward, has advised us that any young organist or hobby organist wishing to enter the 1996 ATOS Competition should notify her before the 16th January, 1996, if they intend to enter. This information has to be lodged with Dorothy Van Steenkiste in the USA.

The closing date in the USA is 20th March, 1996, so entries will have to be lodged with the Australia Felix Chapter by the 7th March at the latest. The 4 recorded selections required for entries are:

- (i) an up-tempo number or rhythmic selection that could be used as an opening number in a program;
- (ii) a ballad suitable to be performed on a theatre organ;
- (iii) a medley of 3 songs, no more than 5, from a well-known Broadway Musical. The medley is to be between 5 and 9 minutes in length;
- (iv) a classical work from classical organ literature, or a transcription of a

classical piano or orchestral work.


Unfortunately I don't know the current prices, plus air mail postage, so anyone interested would have to write and enquire. Payment is then made by bank draft.




The new appearance of the church, with additions to the left of the original building

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"PARADISE" RE-VISITED

The invitation stated "Saturday!! July 8, 1995" for this year's "Concert For Life - '95." Once again this celebration of music and beauty was to be presented at the magnificent music salon of Jasper and Marion Sanfilippo, "Place de la Musique", Barrington Hills, Illinois, about 35 miles North-West of Chicago. This gala program would raise money for the Hopeful Heart Foundation Fund, which provides money to those in the arts with life-threatening illnesses.

Was it really 2 years since I attended the inaugural concert featuring the 5 manual, 78 rank (mostly) WurliTzer, the world's largest theatre organ? This concert, however, was going to be a little different. Lyn Larsen again was to be the main artist, and there was to be a special guest artist, noted classical organist Carlo

Curley, direct from England. That was a concern, as I have never been too happy when classical material is introduced into theatre organ programs, unless it is of a particularly melodic or perhaps spectacular nature. However, there was also to be a special "surprise appearance by one of the organ world's brightest stars".

The big day finally arrived and as I strolled down that leafy drive leading to the magnificent Sanfilippo residence, I found it difficult to take in all the beauty of this property on such a gorgeous summer's day. Holding, this time, a ticket for the balcony in the Victorian Palace, I was ushered up the sweeping staircase of the main entrance, to my seat in the second row, right in the centre.

Once again I gazed in wonder around this music room, at the many items collected from theatres from all over the country. There were rows of chandeliers, big and small, balcony railing and seats, bronze and plaster fixtures to name a few. The beautiful,

royal blue scrim curtain (an exact copy of that from the Paradise Theatre, Chicago - only 10% bigger!) has hanging on either side of it the 32 note Deagon Tower Carillons. These are playable from the console as well as by their own roll player.

Then there is the astounding array of musical instruments, all in fully restored, working order, which I understand constitutes the world's largest private collection.

It is showtime, and after a brief welcome from Mr Sanfilippo, Lyn Larsen brings up that glorious 5 manual, gold and burgundy console from the depths, to a rousing version of Veradero. Quickly moving into his next number, a beautiful Crawford arrangement of Isn't It a Lovely Day To Get Caught in the Rain?, which indicated that Lyn was out to show off as many of the wonderful array of "colours" this organ has. Now up to 80 ranks, the organ has had added to it a Vibraphone which sits enclosed, to the right of the console, in its own cabinet

similar to an upright piano. It is playable from the organ console or by its own keyboard. Lyn demonstrated it to perfection with Henry Mancini's Mr Lucky.

Another change was the organ bench - now a gold, enamelled, more familiar **WurliTzer** style instead of the Howard seat, but with a difference - it has an electric height adjuster! Well, why

Lyn concluded his first segment with some seldom heard tunes from Showboat, such as Nobody Else But Me and Hey Mister, all the while showing off his dexterity at the console as it swung from side to side through 180°.

Our special guest with his dreaded classical music was next. I clenched my teeth - but what was this piece he was playing? It was a whisperingly quiet *To a Wild Rose*. Not so bad. With an assistant on stage

with a mechanical bird in a cage twittering at the appropriate juncture, he followed up with *The Largo*, *Allegro and Two Variations* - different, but pleasant. It wasn't until a very nice version of *Londonderry Air* that Mr Curley confessed that it was the "frustrated theatre organist in him coming out". Perhaps that is why I had enjoyed everything he played so far and even his brief *Fugue in C Major*, his final piece for his first segment.

Lyn took us into intermission with the delightful Victor Herbert Suite, made up of the Spanish, Cuban and Oriental Serenades. We were invited to partake of a sumptuous hot and cold buffet in any of 3 basement rooms which, in his own words, Lyn stated "stretch all the way to Indiana". He was right!

As the audience shared these refreshments so generously provided by the **Sanfilippo** family we were entertained by many of the fantastic music machines around the house. One by one these magnificently restored

instruments burst into play, such as the WurliTzer Band Organ, the Mortier 115-key Dance from Organ Belgium, and the 65-key Gavioli Fair Organ. In other rooms phonographs were playing old 78rpm records and there was the bizarre machine playing a violin and other plucking a ukelele alongside piano roll players.


With one's senses well into "overload", Lyn Larsen heralded in the second half with a cheerful ragtime

number. Lotus Land followed, and showed off the huge Chinese gong. Before handing back to Carlo Curley, Lyn played a number very close to his heart -a gorgeous Lovers Belong to Sorrento, written by none other than the maestro himself,

Mr Curley's large frame again mounted the bench and he began to display once again his flamboyant playing technique. Everything had been melodic so far and none better than Melody in A, with highflying hands but ever so precisely placed fingers as "frustrated theatre organist" admission came out again.

Well, he had successfully "wooed" me so far, but now he was about to "wow" me with a spectacular finale, his "pièce de résistance" - Ride of the Valkyries. The balcony is just THE spot to be for this performance as all FOUR 32' pedal stops came into play. No better piece to display the schizophrenic nature of this organ. The balcony

still shaking as if from an earthquake, Carlo was seen off to a vocal and standing ovation. Well done!

Lyn Larsen returned to the console with a rousing piece of music given to

him by British theatre organist David Shepherd (who was in the audience) called Youth of Britain. As the applause for this number subsided, Lyn stated that not only did he play Youth of Britain but he wished to present in person this "youth" our surprise guest -Simon Gledhill! If ever there was anyone oh my "wish list" to play this 5/ 80 WurliTzer, it was this young man.

With a stunning display of theatre organ technique he


truly brought out the orchestral side of this organ, with an extended medley from *Carousel*, such as *Carousel Waltz* and *If I Loved You* to just name a couple of piece.

It was a splendid cameo performance and Simon was awarded a raucous and well-deserved standing ovation. Good news too, in that Simon has agreed to record the instrument on the Musical Contrasts label.

Sadly all good things must come to an end. Lyn returned and thanked all who had attended, especially those who had travelled many thousands of miles to experience this "Concert For Life".

With tears welling in his eyes and voice cracking with emotion Lyn Larsen took the console down with My Hopeful Heart - a glorious end to a glorious day, and thanks to the Sanfilippo family, artists and crew for a fabulous concert.

What a day!

Neil Jensen, 39, of Ashfield, is renowned for his performances in local clubs and also at the Hayden Orpheum Picture Palace at Cremorne.

Mr Jensen is well known overseas and sells his music to international markets.

The talented organist is also a qualified aerobics instructor and conducts lessons five days a week in a Western Suburbs gym.

He told the Courier he enjoyed the mixture of keeping fit with the combination of exercise and music.

nights a week before the evening films begin.

The talented man was born into a musical family and his fingers met the keyboard of a piano at an early age.

He studied classical piano then turned his creative talents to the organ and became fascinated by the instrument.

In 1983, Neil Jensen extensively toured New Zealand, Canada and the United States where he performed a "whirlwind" concert tour of more than 30 cities.

During the tour, he released his first album Neil Jensen Australiawide.

During a second tour of the United States. he released his second album Neil Jensen Concepts.

Mr Jensen has performed six international concert tours and produced several albums which are marketed internationally.

He recently entertained music lovers with a variety of organ music at the Orion Centre at Campsie.

He told the Courier that he loved his career as an organ player.

"I enjoy music and entertaining people," Mr Jensen said.

"I like to make a crowd of people happy when they listen to me play.

A Profile of Ian Davies

Our patron, Ian Davies, started to study music at a very early age. He began piano lessons under the tutelage of his mother. Two years later, he became a pupil of Miss K. Cox and continued with her for 3 years.

It was at this point that the pipe organ made its entry into Ian's life. His mother frequently played the organ at St Joan's Presbyterian Church at Essendon, Victoria. Ian persuaded her to give him lessons and after 6 months he became a pupil of the organist of the church.

Ian began his professional theatre organ career in Melbourne, playing the Plaza, Regent and Capitol WurliTzers, and the Hammond organs at Brunswick and Albert Park.

During the war, while serving in the R.A.N. overseas, Ian was guest organist at the Regal Theatre, Grays Forum Theatre, Liverpool, and the Bristol Theatre, Avonmouth, Wales.

Upon arriving back in Melbourne, he returned to the Hoyts circuits, his last theatre organ season being at the 3-manual, 15 rank WurliTzer at the Capitol Theatre, where he held a 5 year residency. He then moved to Sydney and spent some years in the showrooms of Rees Wills Pty Ltd, demonstrating Lowrey and Rodgers organs.

His magnificent opening recital at the 1965 Convention of the Theatre Organ Society of Australia was long remembered by those who attended. He was also the featured opening organist at the 1966 Convention on the Capitol WurliTzer. These are but two of the many memorable programmes he has played and which made Ian Davies so popular with TOSA members. He played over 90 concerts for the NSW Division during his long association with TOSA, always drawing a large crowd of devoted fans.

For many years Ian has been resident organist at the Bondi-Waverley RSL Club, playing each Friday for an hour in the club's auditorium for the pleasure of the club's members and guests.

In 1972 following the retirement of Reginald Dixon from the Blackpool Tower and from the position of patron of TOSA NSW, Ian was elected to the position and to this day he remains faithfully still as our patron.

He has always been ready to give of his many talents for the members of our Society and we are sure that many members will appreciate the opportunity to hear Ian play again at the Bondi-Waverley RSL Club, in the company of some of our other player members. Come along and bring a friend to this special event. The last TOSA visit to Ian's club was appreciated by all those fortunate enough to attend.

Report on the JOHN LEDWON Concert

I first heard John Ledwon in the midsixties, When I acquired a recording of Theatre Organ Overtures played by this young organist 3/15 the WurliTzer in the Plaza Theatre, El Paso, Texas. remember experiencing some pangs of envy listening to this fine player of around my own age, and admiring his digital dexterity registrational abilities. Some 30 years later, on Sunday 3 rd September, 1995, 1

finally had the opportunity to hear John in concert at our own Wurlitzer at Campsie on his first visit to Australia.

From his console-raiser, Man of La Mancha, we realised that we were listening to an artist with a real affinity for the instrument, as **John** played a balanced program of music designed to appeal to all tastes. The first half ranged from old standards such as A

Nightingale Sang in Berkeley Square to more recent music from the pen of Lionel Ritchie. Endless Love and Lady, and a selection from Phantom of the Opera. Perhaps the favourites for theatre organ fans were the 30's and 40's medleys featuring Thee 1 Sing, Night and Day, It's Only a Paper Moon, Two Hearts Beat in 3/ 4 Time, Dancing inthe Dark. Begin

Following refreshments of the customary high standard, John brought the console back up again to the strains of Napoleon's Last Charge by, I believe, E. T. Paull. John certainly

believes giving his audiences valuefor-money, as large parts of his programs consist of medleys, and the second half of this one was no exception. The first was an Andrew Lloyd Webber selection music from shows other than Phantom. The second was a collage of John William's music featuring E.T.and Raiders of the Lost Ark. The finale brought

back memories of that early recording of overtures as John closed the program with a dazzling *Poet and Peasant*. No artist at a TOSA concert has ever escaped without an encore and John replied to the sustained applause with *I Could Have Danced All Night* from *My Fair Lady*.

In spite of the fact that we could only present John on Fathers' Day, a

good audience of around 400 enjoyed a concert from an artist, and real lover, of theatre organ.

In the opinion of this reporter, the concert is best summed up by the words "Light and Shade". John has a real talent for extracting a wonderful range of tone colours from the organ, and this talent was more than a dequately displayed this afternoon.

Don't wait for another 30 years before returning to Australia, John.

When Len Rawle last toured Australia in late 1993, the South Australian T.O.S.A. News carried the following article about the installation of Len's WurliTzer. TOSA (NSW) was unable on that occasion to fit Len into our busy schedule of Orion concerts, but to the delight of many he played brilliantly on Epping Baptist's Christie Theatre Pipe Organ.

LEN RAWLE AND HIS HOME ORGAN INSTALLATION

At the age of four, Len Rawle began studying piano and continued until he was called up for National Service aged 18.

Music changed the course of Len's life. Because of his ability as an entertainer and accompanist, he remained at Aldershot for the next two years organising and appearing in all the entertainments designed to keep the troops happy.

It was at Aldershot that Len first saw a cinema organ - a seven rank Wurlitzer housed in a theatre. He was allowed to play the instrument and immediately was inspired by the Wurlitzer sound. He became fascinated with its orchestral qualities and spent much of his spare time finding out how many different sounds he could obtain - a characteristic for which he has become famous. In Len's words, he "dissected what it was all about."

Some time later, after completing his National Service, the Granada, Wandsworth Road, was flooded and he and his father Les bought the cinema's 3/8 organ and installed it in Les's house.

In 1961 Len heard that the Empire, Leicester Square, was to be pulled down. That cinema had been the home of a 4 manual 19 rank Wurlitzer since 1927 when it had cost £35,000 to install. This organ was unique in that it was a "special", particularly in its console design and percussion.

Len's bid was accepted because "the management were pleased that the instrument was to be preserved in its entirety." However, there was a time limit of three weeks in which it had to be removed as the demolition squad was due to move in then.

At a time like that you really find out who are your true friends and Len must have been thankful for his popularity! Removing six 16ft ranks alone is not a job for the faint hearted, much less the handling of monstrous wind chests. However, succeed they did, with two hours to spare!

Perhaps the most significant thing about the whole operation was that Len met Judith who became his bride three years later in 1964. He is quick to point out that Judith has been as involved as he has in the whole project. He must surely be the envy of many organ enthusiasts to have marital co-operation to that extent!

Having removed the organ from the Empire, they were faced with the problem of what to do with it. For the next four years all the pieces were stored in Len's father's house whilst a home for its re-installation was sought. With an almost total lack of interest from schools, town halls etc. there was only one thing to do - build a place. Fortunately for Len his "normal" occupation was that of a surveyor, so that building his own house was not as daunting as it might have been to a man with no connection with the building trade.

For the next two years Len and Judith physically laid 65,000 bricks and did numerous other jobs to make the unique, two-part house. Half was for the organ and the remainder was for living purposes. One of the problems of designing such a space is to contain the sound within the pipe chamber. This needs to be done for two reasons - if it was not well insulated the swells would lose their effectiveness, but equally importantly, the sound had to be contained to keep the neighbours

happy. Success was achieved by building the walls of the chamber 18 inches thick and pouring the ceiling with concrete 11 inches thick. The ceiling had to withstand the unusual weight of the relay racks.

In all, it took two years to install the organ, during which time another five ranks were added, making it the largest Wurlitzer in Europe. The task was a family affair, although all the electrics and wind were done by Len alone.

Then came the huge task of balancing the organ. For this, recordings of the organ whilst at the Empire were used and Len claims, justifiably so, that it is now perfectly balanced. So good was the final outcome that the installation has become the yardstick by which almost all other home installations are compared and upon which many others are modelled.

Visitors from every country where theatre organs are known have visited the house in Chorleywood to see how it should be done.

It is interesting to note that the name of the house is *Tonawanda* which all enthusiasts know was the town in New York State where Wurlitzer organs were built.

During all this pandemonium the Rawles found time to raise a family of three children. The whole Rawle family has continued to encourage and help others to preserve and present the theatre organ for the past 40 years.

Len's musical ability, his capacity to present quality workshops to appreciative listeners and his friendly personality have endeared him to many people.
