Those of us who are fortunate to have a copy of the late Ben M. Hall's Book, "The Best Remaining Seats", or who subscribe to overseas Theatre Organ magazines such as "Console", will know something of the special type of sorrow felt at reading of the end of a great movie house: the death of a Picture Palace. We read of handfuls of dedicated organ buffs huddled together in the early hours of the morning for a final recording on theatre organs that have seen better days, and occasionally there is the really big farewell performance before an organ is removed to safety, escaping the theatre wrecker's hammer by a few hours. We see the photos of the shells of big moviehouses after the stripping and feel perhaps a little glad that here in Sydney we still have a few of the big ones left.

How such feelings of detached sympathy are suddenly and angrily brought home by news that the Sydney Capitol is to be a cinema no longer. Surely not THE Capitol? Those of us with ours ears to the ground over the past few years have only asked ourselves, "How much longer will she last?" And now we know. This once magnificent cinema modelled by Henry White on the fabulous atmospheric designs of America's John Eberson created a sensation when it opened on 7th April 1928. It's lighting, statuary, stars twinkling in a blue sky with real moving clouds, and the general atmospheric feeling, not to mention the Roman Rotunda, Spanish Garden, Lion's Cage, and trees and birds liberally spread around the interior, were something that those first-nighters and the first-timers for ever after, never seemed to recover from. Even as late as the recent pop shows and transferred Opera and Orchestral series, the numbers of people remarking for the first time upon the effects showed clearly that Eberson's ideas were timeless.

And the organ. On the opening night, ".....Fred Scholl gave a series of pieces on the WurliTzer Organ, he also shooting up unexpectedly from the depths in front of the stage. A transcription of the Rigolatto quartet showed the instrument to possess a full and finely impressive tone, which rang forth vibrantly in the huge building without seeming to blare. In his jazz number Mr. Scholl was obviously at tremendous pains to see how many curious and unusual stops he could use, and for those who love novelty for its own sake, the effect, though wild in the extreme, probably seemed very stimulating. The "Love Call" from "Rose Marie" showed the capacity of the organ in softly sentimental mood .... "

There we were, surprisingly several hundred of us, gathered in the Capitol Theatre on Saturday morning the 5th February 1972, perhaps a little bewildered, and perhaps a little incredulous, but nevertheless, having to face the fact that we were shortly to witness the last performance on this fine WurliTzer organ which we have grown to love over three decades. And did it sound great!!! I have said so before, and I'll say it again: "The finest Theatre Organ installation in Australia." I wonder if WurliTzers can think, for this one gave of its best that morning under the hands of ten of our well-known organists in a memorable tribute to the "3/15 Capitol."

We were sorry that not all those we asked could manage to come along, however, the feast of music and talent presented to us was superb. CLIFF BING-HAM set the ball rolling, followed by BILL SCHUMACHER, RAY THORNLEY, PETER HELD, LANCE WELLS, ALAN TRANTER, DAVID PARSONS, ERIC SMITH, DENIS PALMISTRA, and to "take her down", our beloved Patron, IAN DAVIES.

Vice-President Frank Ellis was Compere for the morning and in his usual cheery manner introduced the organists to us, giving a brief biographical outline of each.

John Gardiner, noted feature writer and cinema historian, gave us a short run-down on the Capitol Theatre and its organists (shortly to be enlarged by John and used as an article in TCSA News), and later the Manager of the theatre, Mr. Shaw, responded to President Tom Halloran's address.

Whoever decided on the final piece of complete and utter nostalgia must be congratulated. With our ears still ringing to the sound of Ian Davies' signature tune "Cruising Down The River", and our eyes unbelievably witnessing the final noble descent of the hoist and console, the motor was switched off. A few handclaps were quickly silenced and then we heard the great blower in the depths beat out its last breaths, and as Ian opened the shutters, the put-put of the tremulants ceased and the reservoirs gave a mighty groan and thump. Then all was still.

The feeling at that moment is hard to describe. It was indeed a sad occasion, but also one of happy anticipation, for we know that the New Life will soon be at hand for this wonderful historic instrument. We wait eagerly for news of the new home and a new lease of life for our WurliTzer: "the Capitol 3/15."

It seems that the interior of the theatre will be granted a reprieve; at least as long as Harry Miller is in possession, for the news reached me today that nearly all the picturesque "decorations of a Picture Palace" described above will be returned, and there is even talk of completely renovating the blue ceiling, stars and clouds. Good news for those aiming to keep this cinema for ever as a monument to the Great Years of the Movies.
