RECORD REVIEWS.

This month's release for members of Concert Recording's "Organ Of The Month" Club is a good one, and is recommended to you as an interesting addition to your record library.

The largest theatre organ in the State of Ohio, is the four manual Robert Morton of 22 ranks, installed in Loew's Theatre Columbus. Played by ROGER GARRETT for this release by Concert Recording, the playing is uniformly good and leaves nothing to be desired.

MR GARRETT has chosen a sure-fire programme of popular theatre organ melodies, which, during his ten years residency at this theatre, he must have featured many times. He presents them with an accomplished ease, born of familiarity. The Robert Morton organ has a sound which is unquestionably its own - even those not expert at recognizing an organ by sound alone, would be able to pick that this was definitely not a product of the WurliTzer factory.

For this recording, the microphones were suspended from the front of the balcony, so the sound comes out much as one would hear it in the theatre. Generally speaking, fairly full registrations were used, the organist seemingly having done his utmost to let us hear the instrument as it would be heard in a "live" performance, therefore one does not hear as many solo voices as perhaps some individuals would like to hear. Highlights of the record are "Jalousie" and the Traditional Medley of Popular Hits No 1. This latter one, has all the nostalgic appeal of organ interludes during Intermission times, and is most enjoyable as each song included in the Medley brings back its own particular memories of Interval times in our own Australian Theatres, as our own organists played these songs.

The Robert Morton organ has a devoted following in the USA, and is a fast, responsive instrument with a sound that is new, perhaps, to most Australian ears, due to the lack of this make of organ in Australia. The instrument, maintained by enthusiastic A.T.O.E. members, is obviously very well cared for. To sum up — a popular programme, nicely played by an experienced theatre organist — "Morton a la GARRETT".

As there is no Alternate release this month, your Editor suggests that this may be an opportune moment to mention Concert Recording's release of English theatre organist VIC HAMMETT which came out a little over a year ago. VIC HAMMETT arrived in Australia a few days ago for a season at the Dendy Cinema WurliTzer organ so those members of the "Organ Of The Month" Club who may have joined recently, can now catch up and have their own disc of this brilliant artist at the WurliTzer of the Buckingham Town Hall, instead of the usual Alternate disc. For the information of new members of TOSA, you may join Concert Recording's "Organ Of The Month" Club also. There is no joining fee, and you are under no compulsion to take each month's records unless you wish. The records will be posted out to country and interstate members. They are in full Stereo sound, featuring beautiful color covers of the organ and organist and are priced at \$4.95 only to members. If these records were available in the shops they would sell at around \$5.75.....so distance is no barrier to joining the club, members of the new Western Australian Division, or South Australia, Queensland or Victoria may all join by contacting our Secretary John Clancy.

AUGUSTPROFILE

THE WILBUR KENTWELL STORY

This month's PROFILE was jointly compiled from an interview carried out by Gordon H. Berry, Vice-President of TOSA's Queensland Division and TOSA News Editor's personal knowledge of WILBUR KENTWELL which extends over 25 years. Sincere thanks are extended to Gordon Berry for his ever ready help to TOSA News.

The life story of WILBUR KENTWELL is a fascinating one indeed, revealing as it does, that enterprise and hard work are the necessary ingredients if one is to climb the ladder of success. WILBUR KENTWELL has climbed that ladder to the top, and stayed there over many years. He was born at Castle Hill, an outer suburb of Sydney, about six miles or so from Parramatta. He started learning the organ at the age of eight years, and was playing the pipe organ for services in a Castle Hill church at the age of twelve years. Two years later, he heard LESLIE V. HARVEY play the WurliTzer organ of Sydney's Prince Edward Theatre Beautiful, and he lost no time in commencing to study the complex techniques of cinema organ playing.

It was not too long before he attained the standard neccessary, and he was featured in duet work with well known <u>DES TANNER</u> at the Roxy Theatre Parramatta, where a three manual Christie theatre organ was installed. In 1937, he was appointed pianist-accompanist to Radio 2KA at Katoomba, in the heart of the famous Blue Mountains tourist mecca. In 1938, he was selected to be organist at the Savoy Theatre New Lambton, Newcastle, and signed a contract for six months with a further six month option. Such was his popularity in the city of Newcastle, that his contract was renewed several times, and he remained in residence for several years.

The Savoy Theatre, designed along ultra modern lines, was strikingly lit by tube lighting recessed into troughs in the ceiling and was a lovely theatre, which retained its intimate atmosphere, despite its largish size. The organ was a Hammond electronic one, equipped with an elaborate glass console, indirectly lit, and with full color changing effects. In addition, a full set of real chimes was installed on the right hand side of the procentum about half way up, and was in full view of the audience, who could see them operate. The chimes were played from a set of white buttons located just below the music stand of the organ, and were a most effective asset as electronic organs at that time, did not possess the electronic chimes now standard on almost every make of electronic organ.

Newcastle citizens were extremely organ minded and were very appreciative of the "organ spectaculars" which <u>WILBUR</u> presented from time to time. In one such "spectacular", a recording of Sir Malcolm Sargent conducting the "William Tell Overture" was played through the theatre's sound system as <u>WILBUR</u> accompanied the orchestra on the organ. On stage, a forest setting with large trees made a most effective backdrop to the music, and in the finale, artificial rain came pouring down whilst lightning flashed during the storm sequence. This presentation so pleased the patrons, that it ran for several weeks.

WILBUR also featured at the theatre's grand piano for specialty presentations. This was located on a dais close to the organ console. Four or five mornings each week, WILBUR broadcast "live" from the theatre's organ at 8.15 am playing for fifteen minutes, and he also broadcast again from the theatre for a further fifteen minutes on the same number of evenings. This latter broadcast took place during the 6pm to 7pm time slot and usually found WILBUR playing the grand piano, although the organ was used on some occasions. This meant that WILBUR was "on air" ten times each week without taking into consideration the special feature broadcasts which he did from time to time.

During the War, <u>WILBUR</u> saw Military service and rose to be a Sargeant. He was connected with the production of visual training films screened to servicemen. In 1945, he returned to civilian life again, and settled in Sydney, where Radio 2CH signed him as staff organist and he played Hammond organ for the famous "Humphrey Bishop" shows, as well as appearing in numerous other productions. He had his own weekly thirty minute programme, sponsored by the Farren Price Watch Salon, and aptly titled, "Music Timed For A Lifetime" which ran for two or three years.


As well as his radio work <u>WILBUR</u> became resident organist at the Vogue Theatre at Double Bay, once again at the console of a Hammond organ which was located in a recessed organ loft high on the left side of the procenium. <u>WILBUR</u> has many recollections of climbing the steep steps to the organ's lofty position from the darkened backstage. During this same period, he became organist and speciality pianist at the Trocadero Ballroom in Sydney. TOSA News Editor, Frank Ellis remembers a number of occasions when he drove <u>WILBUR</u> in his car from the Vogue Theatre to the Trocadero Ballroom, then back to the (continued on page 9)

AUGUST PROFILE THE WILBUR KENTWELL STORY

Vogue Theatre, and finally back to the Trocadero Ballroom again. This was necessary so that he could do his solo presentation at the theatre around 8.10pm, dash to the Ballroom to play for dancing during the orchestra's fifteen minute break, return to the theatre to play the intermission music, and be back at the Ballroom in time for the orchestra's next break around 9.45 or 10pm.

In 1949 <u>WILBUR</u> was appointed Musical Director to Macquarie Broadcasting Service of 2GB and associated network stations. He was closely associated with the great Jack Davey Shows, which were probably the most listened to programmes ever broadcast on Australian Radio. He was a personal friend of Jack's, and when the Davey shows originated from cities other than Sydney, which was quite often, <u>WILBUR</u> was there on hand at the keyboard to provide the musical part of each show. During the time he was Musical Director at Radio 2GB, he was **assoc**iated with, and played for, many of the "big" stars who came to Australia including such names as Ann Ziegler & Webster Booth, George Formby, Wee Georgie Wood, Allan Jones, Joe E. Brown, Nat King Cole, Johnny Ray, Bob Hope, Donald Peers and many others. He also played for many famous Australian stars such as Gladys Moncrief, John Fullard and Strella Wilson.

In August 1959, the opening of QTQ Channel 9 Brisbane, coincided with the Royal National Show Week, and Queensland citizens got their first glimpse of the wonders of television.

WILBUR was appointed Director of Music at the Channel, and under his capable guidance, many noteworthy productions came to light. It has been said, that he was one of the few who did not get a blast from newspaper critics during those early days of T.V. in Queensland. In 1967 WILBUR was invited to become Musical Director at TVQ Channel 0, and is currently in residence there. He presents a regular show entitled, "Musically Yours" in which he plays request numbers for viewers and also features a guest artist. For his Channel 0 appearances, he is seen at the console of his own Conn 640 electronic theatre organ. He also plays for five pre-school shows called "The Wonder Shop" and a one hour talent seeking show called "New Faces". He is also featured in a 2½ hour Children's show televised "live" every Saturday morning. He also appears nightly at the Regal Motel in Brisbane, thus rounding off his busy day.

WILBUR KENTWELL was the first Australian organist to make a Long Play Microgroove record in 1950, and he was also the first organist to make a multiple track recording in Australia. On that occasion he was heard playing organ, piano and celeste simultaneously. It is also claimed, that he was the first Australian organist to be recorded in the Stereo process. Together with the late Flo Paton, one of Sydney's best loved and most popular pianists in the 1940's, he was responsible for many wonderful organ and piano duets on radio and on 78 RPM records. He was the first to use the Bourne Electronic organ on an L.P. record. This album, entitled, "Strolling Down Broadway", was an outstanding success. The organ was manufactured by a Newcastle firm trading as Bourne Organs Newcastle, and your Editor had the pleasure of accompanying WILBUR to Newcastle one weekend sometime in 1955, when he went to try out the Bourne organ and decide whether it was to be used for the "Strolling Down Broadway" recording. A tape recording made during that memorable weekend is still in my possession and is a valued souvinir indeed.

WILBUR is a most active and popular member of the Queensland Division of TOSA, giving frequent recitals for them, always to a capacity crowd. Possibly the most recorded organist in Australia, he is a polished performer on both organ and piano, with a flair for producing musical arrangements which please and delight his many fans. He is friendly, natural, and easy to get along with. This then is WILBUR KENTWELL - our PROFILE FOR AUGUST.

QUEENSLAND DIVISION NEWS. (Reported by President Bob Smith)

The June meeting of the Queensland Division, was held on Friday 28th at the residence of President Bob and Mrs Smith. There was a very large attendance of members and their friends, and a delegation from the newly formed Gold Coast Chapter of TOSA were specially welcomed. As announced, there were two surprises in store, firstly an inspection of the Remand Section of Brisbane Prison, reputed to rank among the best in the world, according to overseas visitors. The modern design of Prison building, gave those priviledged to view it, a glimpse of what is being done for inmates in this State.

After the inspection, the visitors returned to the residence, where the second surprise was a Leslie Tone Cabinet attached to the Conn Serenade. The offer of the Leslie was made by Arthur Roberts, Organ Manager for Paling's, who kindly loaned it for the occasion. The result of this demonstration ????? as you can guess, the Smiths bought it and it is now permanently attached to the organ.

As mentioned last month, Whitehouse Bros., "The Organ Centre" had rebuilt a large Carousel organ for me Les. Short, and this was inspected and heard by members in May. Certain further work, has been performed by the firm, and the organ now sounds better than ever. Arrangements have been made to tape and photograph this instrument, so TOSA will have a permanent record of it. The venue of the meeting for July has not been confirmed on going to press.

SOUTH AUSTRALIAN DIVISION NEWS.

It is reported that the WurliTzer organ formerly in Adelaide's Regent Theatre is now fully installed in its new home in the College, where it is in daily use. However, it is understood, that no inspections of the organ are permitted.

During July three functions were presented for the members. The first, took place at St James Parish Hall and featured three organs no less. There were also concerts at the Strathalbyn Theatre, and the Ascot Theatre which both have electronic organs. On Sunday 4th August at 8pm, there will be an organ concert at the St James Parish Hall, and on Sunday 25th August at 3pm an organ concert at the Wonderland Ballroom in Victoria Terrace Hawthorne. On the holiday weekend in October, a visit is planned to the Port Pirie Organ Club, and this should prove a veryemjoyable weekend indeed.

FACTS & FIGURES DEPARTMENT.

Member Arthur Spring has supplied TOSA News with some very interesting facts, which we hasten to publish for members information. From the Commonwealth Statistician's Office, the figures cover the nine month period ending March 1968, relating to electronic organs imported into Australia during that period.

These figures being for nine months only, would seem to indicate that the yearly import value of electronic organs is running around \$1,000,000 This is an increase of 50% on the previous year, which in turn, was up 43% on the year before that. As Arthur so aptly puts it, "What a growth rate ???"

Whilst on the subject of facts and figures, it may be appropriate to quote the following information the Magazine "Electronics" of October 30th 1967 which states:-

HITTING HIGH IC

The giant organ at New York's Radio City Music Hall is famous for its size. Last week, the maker of that organ - WurliTzer - introduced a model it hopes will be famous for its compact size. What WurliTzer has done is produce the first commercial electronic organ using monolithic integrated circuits. While there is an IC designed specifically for the electronic organ industry - Motorola's MC-1124P, a four flip flop frequency divider, (Electronics, July 24th Page 196) WurliTzer's 24 pound organ employs 36 standard dual flip flops - Motorola's MC-790L - as frequency generators. Each IC replaces 24 transistors and 32 resistors reducing the size of the instrument to 4x14x36 inches while maintaining its seven octave keyboard. Price is \$695, less amplifier.

Now that WurliTzer has paved the way, other producers can be expected to follow soon. With the organ industry gobbling up transistors at a rate that reached a peak of 26.8 million transistors last year, every major microcircuit producer can be expected to go after the industry which last year sold 124,000 electronic organs for \$192.6 million.

NEW CONSOLE TO BE BUILT FOR PARAMOUNT WURLITZER.

A new four manual console will be built by William Bunch, head of the organ firm of Balcom & Vaughan, Seattle, to replace the original WurliTzer keydesk of the famed New York Paramount Theatre organ that was destroyed by arsonists, Sunday night February 25th in Wichita. Time required to put the new console together will be approximately one year, it was noted by R.C. Simonton who has been aiding the Wichita Theatre Organ Inc. group since they purchased the instrument from Simba. Insurance funds will cover all costs.

NEW YORK CAPITOL THEATRE TO CLOSE.

Ben M. Hall, world's leading theatre and theatre organ buff, has been named by Loew's Inc., to the Committee now planning a gala benefit performance that will close the New York Capitol Theatre next September. The theatre is to be demolished and a new office building errected on its site. It will include, according to reports, a smaller theatre.

The first real great theatre palace, the Capitol was, for many years, the largest motion picture house in the entire world. Opened in 1919, it was the mecca for tourists, much as Radio City Music Hall is today, and featured the largest Estey pipe organ ever built and installed in a theatre.

In contrast to the sad news in the above story, there is joyful news from San Francisco, where the famous Avenue Theatre, San Francisco's only remaining house with a WurliTzer installed, has re-opened, and features organ concerts several nights weekly.
