Christie report for May 2018

Work done since last report includes:

Supports for Clarinet made and installed by John Parker and bottom octave of pipes planted to complete the set.

Manifolds for Tibia manual chests windline and tremulant completed and installed.

Ventils removed from all manual chests and blanking plates made & installed.

Wiring error from output board to Kimball Celesta corrected; tested ok from console.

Tibia Clausa all chests wired to Uniflex chamber output boards; sequence tested ok.

Vox chest wired to Uniflex chamber output boards and tested; some ciphers to be resolved, but wiring sequence tested ok.

Krumet chest restoration completed. Now tested and adjusted ready for installation.

Orchestral Oboe chest restoration is in progress.

Tuned Birdwhistle set moved from storage to Solo chamber ready for installation. Relay follower set made and installed. Connector socket fitted. Matching plug fitted to wires from Uniflex outputs.

Wiring ducts installed and wiring tidied in Solo chamber.

Swell and crescendo pedals wired to Uniflex input board.

Swell & crescendo pedal friction units are undergoing

re-felting.

Braces for 8' string pipe supports made and installed.

Relay follower units made for swell engines and installed alongside relevant Uniflex boards in Solo & Accompaniment. Electrically tested ok & Uniflex Definition File updated.

Effects unit in Solo wired to Uniflex output board.

Uniflex Definition File sent to Dick Wilcox for evaluation and comment.

Miscellaneous:

Orion Sand Block Unit modified to improve knife valve seating and cure ciphering.

New spring blocks made for Orion Piano pump regulator spring.




The committee hopes that you and your friends will come along on June 3 to help celebrate and to welcome John Giacchi back to Sydney and Marrickville Town Hall.

JOHN GIACCHI

John Giacchi's style at the keyboards is distinctive and individual and reflects his affinity for the orchestral repertoire gained from an early age. It was obvious that the theatre pipe organ, as the original "**Unit Orchestra**" was the very vehicle upon which he found his musical home.

In 1990, **John** became the first of a slew of Australian young organists to earn a place in the Senior Division of the American Theatre Organ Society's Young Organists Competition which entitled him to perform at the national convention in Indianapolis that year. Since that time, he has played concerts on every major instrument on the Australian concert circuit, has performed in New Zealand, the United Kingdom and, more proliferously, the United States where he will return next month to perform at the American Theatre Organ Society's national convention in Pasadena, California.

John has released 5 commercial recordings to critical acclaim: *Nightmoods* (1991), *Beyond The Blue Horizon* (1995), both of which were recorded at the Wurlitzer in the Orion Centre, Campsie, NSW, *Journey Into Melody* (2000), recorded on the 4/29 Wurlitzer-hybrid in the Capri Theatre, Goodwood, South Australia, and *Xanadu* (2 volumes in 2001 and 2003) on the 5 Manual, 80 rank organ in the Salon de Musique at the Sanfilippo residence in Barrington Hills, Chicago – the largest residential instrument in the world.

By vocation, **John** is the General Counsel for a large rural organisation. Avocationally, he tends to an extensive garden at his residence in Mount Macedon, Victoria and regularly participates in the CrossFit sport. John is also equally at home in the organ chambers as he is at the keyboards, and created a pipe/digital hybrid instrument of some 48 channels and 8 ranks of pipes, all playable from a 4-manual Wurlitzer console from the Chicago Theatre, Chicago, synonymous with the famed organist, Jesse Crawford. Having sold that instrument in 2017, he plans on embarking on a larger purely acoustic instrument at his Mount Macedon home.

The Marrickville Wurlitzer - a brief history

When the **Prince Edward Theatre**, Sydney opened in November 1924, among its features was the then new-to-Sydney **Wurlitzer** pipe organ with its curved stop-rail console. The Wurlitzer model chosen was a style H 'special' consisting of a two-manual (keyboards) console and ten ranks (sets) of pipes. Its opus number is 875 (the 875th Wurlitzer theatre organ off the production line). What differed to the standard style H model in this instance is that the pipes were to be installed in three chambers as follows:

SOLO

Harmonic Tuba16-4'
Tibia Clausa 8-4'
Orchestral Oboe 8'
Kinura 8'
Xylophone
Glockenspiel/Bells
Traps & effects

MAIN

Clarinet 8'
Open Diapason* 16-4'
Salicional 8-2'
Voix Celeste 8-4'
Bourdon/Flute 16-2'

ECHO

Vox Humana 8' Chrysoglott Cathedral Chimes Sleigh bells

Traps & effects (*Bottom 12 notes metal Diaphone pipes) Piano (possibly unenclosed) As it transpired, the Echo chamber space was not provided for so the Echo chamber contents were installed in the Main pipe chamber. Additional relays were provided for a roll player unit but it is unknown whether this was ever utilised. An unusual feature is that this was **one of five Wurlitzers** imported into this country that were voiced high-pitched.



The console was placed on a fixed platform to the right of the stage. American organist **Eddie Horton** was brought out to open the organ and, it was claimed, to also supervise its installation. Other American organists to grace the console were **Leslie V. Harvey** and **Julia Dawn**. The first of the Australian organists at the Prince Edward was **J. Knight Barnett**. He was followed by **Leslie Waldron** then **Kurt Herweg**.

But it was **Noreen Hennessy** who is the best remembered of all the organists who appeared there, no doubt due to her 19 1/2 year residency at the theatre commencing in August 1944 until February 1964. The organ then fell silent except for the occasion when it was played by **Bill Schumacher** for the premier of the

film Becket in September 1964.

After TOSA NSW had negotiated purchase of the Wurlitzer, It was presented for one final time with **Noreen Hennessy** at the

console in August 1965.

It would appear that the piano and roll player unit had previously been removed as they were not in the theatre when the organ was removed and the disused piano stops had been converted to inter-manual couplers i.e. Solo to Accomp at various pitches.

After negotiations with the then Marrickville Council had been successful, the organ was installed at Marrickville Town Hall over a three year period where it opened on 27th November 1968.

Noreen Hennesy had been invited to open the organ but after initially trying it, declined. The acoustics in Marrickville Town Hall were so different to what she had been used to at the Prince Edward. Former Hoyts organist Ian Davies opened the organ with associate artists, the St Bridget's (Marrickville) Ensemble and Julie Carr (Soprano). Proceeds went to the Children's Medical Research Foundation. As part of the opening celebrations, organist Charles Tuckwell was featured the following Sunday.

It soon became apparent that there was sound loss from the Main (right) pipe chamber down the stairwell and through a window, particularly from the bass registers. This was rectified by walling in the back and one side of the pipe chamber with several thicknesses of plasterboard. This meant that the electro-pneumatic relays were now segregated from the pipe chamber and it also provided some welcome workshop space.

During the mid 70's the pitch of the organ was lowered to the universal A=440 so that it could be used alongside other instruments, particularly a piano. This work was undertaken by **George Stephens** of Adelaide. As a workaround to the problem of the high-pitched percussions, the tonal percussions from the then stored Capitol Wurlitzer were installed at Marrickville.

Jonas Nordwall (USA) performed on the Marrickville Wurlitzer in 1974. On his return visit in 1976, he recommended changes to some of the winding circuits. For example, the Tibia, Oboe and Kinura ranks originally shared the one regulator and Tremulant but it was now desirable for the Tibia to have its own regulator and Tremulant (on Wurlitzer instruments of 15 ranks and greater, the Tibia has its own Tremulant.) This was achieved on the eve of the 1976 Convention concert with **Jonas** directing and physically helping with the changes. Also all 16' bass extensions were put onto a steady wind supply as previously they had been affected

by the Tremulant. The Tremulants were all adjusted for depth and speed. The Tibia, which had previously been available at 8 & 4' pitches was now available at 16' (to tenor C) 8, 4, 2 2/3, 2 and 1 3/5 pitches on the Solo manual. Twelve borrowed pipes were used to extend the Tibia to 2'. The inter-manual couplers were re-wired to provide the more useful intra-manual couplers: Solo Sub Octave, Unison off, Solo Octave, Solo to Pedal, Accomp Octave. Apparently to those who attended the 1976 convention, the improvement to the sound of the organ was quite dramatic. It was also during this time that a Christie Orchestral Trumpet rank was trialled to give the organ more "bite". This eventually led to the organ acquiring its own English Post Horn rank which started out as a church organ oboe but was modified into the English horn by **George Stephens.**

While the ex Capitol Wurlitzer remained in storage, its Marimba-Harp and Krumet rank were temporarily used at Marrickville (Krumet in place of the Kinura). Organists who played Marrickville during this time noted how much more versatile the Krumet rank was compared to the Kinura.

Once installation of the ex Capitol Wurlitzer commenced at the Orion Theatre, Campsie, Its Marimba and Krumet were returned for installation there. This also meant that the other percussions on loan to Marrickville had to go to the Orion. The original Marrickville high-pitch percussions had their pitch lowered to match the pipe work and were installed. A Marimba-Harp from the USA was acquired for Marrickville sometime in the mid 80's and was paid for by the generous donation of a member.

WHAT'S HAPPENING IN NEW SOUTH WALES IN MAY WEDNESDAY 15th MAY AT 8pm. There will be a recital by member **DAVID PARSONS** at St Johns Church of England located in King Georges Road Penshurst. This is the largest electronic church organ installation in Australia. The installation was designed and supervised by our Honorary member **REUBERT HAYES** who will be present to give a commentary on the features of the installation which is a Conn Classic organ. A charge of 50c will be made to enable the Society to make a donation to the Church funds. Members may bring their friends to this function. All welcome.

SATURDAY 25th MAY AT 8am AT THE CAPITOL THEATRE There will be another of the very popular "Four Star Surprise Jam Sessions" featuring the mighty WurliTzer organ. The show commences at 8am, Admission will be a nominal 50c per person to cover costs and current membership cards MUST be produced at the door, The Society reserves the right to refuse admission to anyone unable to produce a current membership card. The Society hires the theatre for the benefit of TOSA members, and it is for this reason that membership cards must be shown at the door. A membership card covers the member, his wife, and student children.

SATURDAY 25th MAY AT 8pm. There will be a special demonstration of a Schober Concert organ in the Presbyterian Church Hall, 74 Bowden Street Ryde. Bowden Street crosses Victoria Road about half way between West Ryde and Top Ryde. The organist will be our member **LEN BADMAN** who will provide a variety programme of both popular and classical music including some vocal items. Every effort is being made to equip the Schober with the Schober Reverb-a-tape unit for the occasion. Admission is free, this is another FREE night for our members and tape recorders and cameras are welcome.

FRIDAY 5th APRIL THE JACK MALMSTEN CONCERT.

Presented by Steadfast Enterprises, The Winton Music Centre, and the Thomas Organ Co., **JACK MALMSTEN's** concert, at the Anzac Auditorium, was also played to a packed and enthusiastic house. **MR MALMSTEN**, the Company's official recitalist, was in Sydney for a few days only, during a globe-trotting tour on behalf of Thomas organs.

No less than five models of the Thomas range were on stage, and **JACK** featured each one, in turn. For the most part, he chose to play the theatre model, 811. Having attended the concert given for the Society, during his last visit here three or four years ago, we knew that JACK MALMSTEN was a most gifted performer indeed, and that we might, therefore, expect to hear some very fine playing on this occasion. We were not to be disappointed, In the years between, his dazzling technique has been even further tended, so that it may safely-be said, that his ability to exploit the many improvements and gimmicks, added to the Thomas organ during the last few years, has more than kept pace with these new developments. As well, his presentation technique has undergone a sucking up treatment, resulting in a more pithy, and crisper line of patter, that was as entertaining as it was informative. To carry off a recital such as this one, the artist needs enormous ability, musically and technically allied to the witty line of patter one expects from a TV compere, and JACK MALMSTEN revealed that he had both these qualities. Under his deft fingers, the 811 was revealed as a most versatile instrument, capable of a wide range of theatre organ sounds, straight organ tones, and also as a gimmicky instrument, more than usually adaptable to combo work, Bandleader, Lawrence Welk uses one in his orchestra for this purpose.

The Society extends its thanks to Mr Bruce Myers of Steadfast

Enterprises, The Winton Music Centre, and to the Thomas Organ Company, who brought JACK MALMSTEN to Australia. We greatly appreciated the opportunity of hearing this brilliant artist, who is so very able to bring forth from the Thomas organ, the best of which it is capable. The Society hopes to be included in any future visits to Sydney by JACK MALMSTEN. It was very obvious from the delighted applause of the audience, that this artist is a most popular one with members of the Society'.

THURSDAY 11th APRIL NOREEN HENNESSY SLAYS 'EM AT STATE THEATRE PREMIERE.

At very short notice (a couple of days only) our Honorary member, **NOREEN HENNESSY** as engaged by Greater Union Theatres, to play their 4/21 WurliTzer organ for the Australian Premiere of the film, "How To Save A Marriage And Ruin Your Life". The occasion was distinguished by the personal appearance on stage, of one of the film's stars, **Miss Stella Stevens**, and Greater Union turned on a Hollywood style premiere, to make it the glittering occasion that it was.

A Royal Australian Navy band played outside the theatre, under a battery of Kleig lights. The red carpet was rolled out to the kerbside, police controlled the milling excited crowds, and every nook and cranny of the Stat's enormously long fover was densely packed with moviegoers. A quard of honour, consisting of about a hundred lifesavers, all dressed in swim suits, and carrying their club's banners and pennants, lined each side of the red carpet right through from the street to the Mezzanine foyer, making this one of the most colourful premieres yet seen in Sydney. The theatre's management had invited members of TOSA to have an organ concert in the theatre from 6pm until 7pm, after which members of the Society were to remain in their seats as quests of Greater Union for the Premiere at 8pm. This wonderful gesture by the Management, gave our members a wonderful night's entertainment for free, and the Society expresses its deepest thanks for such an exciting evening. And exciting it really was, with the great ivory console up from the pit no less than 4 times during the show. Despite the fact that the announcement of this Premiere was made only the night before at the IAN DAVIES concert at Chatswood, there were at least 150 of our members and friends, present in the theatre at 6pm for our special concert by NOREEN HENNESSY.
