### The Breaking of the Drought

Franklyn Barrett's silent film + live music

at The Ritz Cinema, Randwick



Monday 23rd SEP 2019 The Ritz Cinema Randwick, (Cinema 2) --43 St Paul's Street, Randwick - The Spot.

Unfortunately the film would not project at the first date of 8th September and was rescheduled to Monday 23rd September.

Filmed in 1920 by Randwick local, director and cinematographer Franklyn Barrett, it was accompanied by the talented **John S. Batts** on the Allen R311 "Theatre Organ". The owner of the organ who kindly lent it for the occasion played the audience into the theatre in traditional style. There were approximately 80 patrons in attendance and your Editor was kindly allowed by the organiser from Randwick Council, Avril Jeans, to distribute flyers for the David Gray concert to patrons as they entered the theatre.

The Mayor of Randwick, Kathy Neilson, introduced the film with quite a deal of the history about Franklyn Barrett and the fact that his house where the nitrate film was spliced is now a Randwick Community Centre and museum to Barrett's work.

Entertaining historian, Bruce Dennett, continued introducing the film with significant detail about the locations where scenes were shot and answered any questions at the conclusion. The film was made up of two parts that had survived as some of the film had been damaged by moisture from condensation.

The film ran for 105 minutes and TOSA Member, John Batts, did a great job in accompanying the film on the Allen Theatre Organ for that rather lengthy time frame.

# This will be David's last Australasian Tour as he intends to pursue his concert piano career from next year

# A rare opportunity to hear David, master of the Wurlitzer

In 2015 David completed a Master of Arts degree in piano performance at the Royal Academy of Music in London. On graduation night he was awarded the prizes for the highest concerto marks and final recital marks in his year as well as collecting two prestigious Academy prizes. This recognition was extended when he was named the 2015 "Organist of the Year" by the American Theatre Organ Society.

David plays a wide repertoire of music ranging from classics to stage & screen, jazz & swing numbers ensuring something for everyone.

Following David's performance at the ATOS Convention in the USA this year David performed for the Puget Sound Theatre Organ Society on the 3/25 Kimball-Wurlitzer.

Gray opened with Harry Warren's snappy "All's Fair in Love and War," and "Nickel in the Slot," a Zez Confrey novelty tune no less fun for being less known. Then, for a slower pace, the traditional Irish melody "Londonderry Air," also known as "Danny Boy" with lyrics by Frederic Weatherly. Gray then performed the legendary "Slaughter on Tenth Avenue," a short ballet by Richard Rodgers from the 1936 musical On Your Toes, followed by three more numbers maintaining the "feeling low" theme: Piazzolla's accordion tango "Oblivion"; the Davis/Young/Ager toe-tapper "I Hate Myself (For Being So Mean to You)," as arranged by Sidney Torch; and a transcription of the aria "Nel di della vittoria" from the Verdi opera Macbeth. Next were two songs as arranged for organ by Jim Riggs, a major influence on Gray: "Georgia on My Mind"; and Ray Henderson's "Strike Me Pink (If I Don't Think I'm Falling in Love)" from the same-named 1933 musical starring Jimmy Durante. Gray opened the second half with a rousing march, "The Dam Busters". David Gray Thrills Again! Continuing the alternation of moods: the Barbra Streisand hit "People" from Funny Girl; an organ

transcription of Liszt's piano arrangement of Schubert's "Soirées de Vienne: Valse-Caprice No. 6"; Rodgers and Hart's "Manhattan" from Garrick Gaieties; and "A Garden in the Rain," a hit first in 1929 by Gene Austin, then in 1952 by The Four Aces. No David Gray program would be complete without an example of British light music, in this case Frederic Curzon's "Dance of the Ostracised Imp," delightfully sprinkled with sudden modulations. To close the concert, Gray played a medley from the 1934 Cole Porter musical Anything Goes, including variations on the title tune, "You're the Top," "All Through the Night," "Blow, Gabriel, Blow," and "I Get a Kick out of You." Following an extended standing ovation, Gray encored with the 1945 Ellington hit "I'm Beginning to See the Light," predictably followed by another standing ovation.

#### Ken Double Concert Sunday 25th August 2019 Orion Centre Campsie

What a delight to have Ken Double back at our Orion Wurlitzer and it's ten years since he last visited Australia (as he told us). I like the way he often promotes the Wurlitzer as a wonderful instrument and his joy at being able to play the instrument shows throughout his concert. I am also grateful that, whilst I was presenting a theatre organ programme on Community Radio years ago, he gave me two of his CDs to use on the programme.

Off to a fine start with "It's Today", the Jerry Herman composition from the show "Mame". (Therein lies a tale that in the 1960s I somehow finished up in a chorus line of a revue in Brisbane and we featured just that tune!)

Accepting applause, Ken launched into "My Heart Belongs to Somebody Else" which made a delightful contrast to the opening piece. Ken then welcomed us to the Orion and our 3/17 gem. In introducing us to some Strauss next, "Waltzes of Spring". Ken first mentioned that the Wurlitzer used to be known as a Unit Orchestra and that he wanted to show off the orchestral sounds of the instrument. This piece did that well. Always good to have a

light classic as part of the overall music. I was once told by a revered ABC music presenter that "the listener" likes to hear familiar tunes with surprises of the unfamiliar every now and then. To a Jazz mode and "Cry Me a River", a Julie London favourite of many years ago that those of us of a certain age remember well. I liked Ken's registrations and key changes.

Ken then gave us a demonstration of how an organist approaches the instrument ie use of right hand/left hand/pedals etc. I've come to the conclusion that three manuals are about right but then (and thank you, Simon Ellis) four can be great – or even five - for the more talented organists (unlike me!!)

On to "Londonderry Air/Danny Boy" and Ken pointed out that this music was well out of copyright so there were no problems in worrying about copyright matters. (I had personal experience of problems with copyright a couple of years ago when I tried to help English friends print up some locally (UK) composed new hymns and discovered the "joys" of trying to get copyright permission. It ain't easy!)

Oh, sugar! Ken's selections to remind us of the problems with too much sugar in our food/drinks these days were "When I Take My Sugar to Tea" and "When My Sugar Walks Down the Street". No need to worry about the possible damage from that kind of sugar! Ken wanted to use the bird whistle on the instrument and let us know that different Wurlis have that particular button in odd places. I know I've mentioned this before but I still can't help be amused by people referring to the latest PCs/iPhones etc as having "all the bells and whistles". We theatre organ lovers have known about bells and whistles for 100+ years and what that statement refers to!!

Ah, the Music Man. Memories of Robert Preston and those wonderful tunes "Seventy-six Trombones, Till there was you, and Lida Rose".

Second last before Interval was a "party" piece of mine "Try a Little tenderness". A pretty song and I'll one day try it in another key rather than my usual laziness in "C"! To take us up to tea time Ken played "Cumana" (which is a town in Venezuela), music of Jazz pianist Barclay Allen and in mambo rhythm.



Part the Two. Ken walked on stage to the Wurli playing and immediately burst into song, *All of me*. I once had thoughts of playing and singing at the Wurli organ but decided that I'd keep that to my church organ playing and only sing with my playing when I thought the congregation needed some help in getting familiar with the tune! Ken followed this up with another song, *You're nobody till somebody loves you* a la Dean Martin and with both these vocals perfectly timed by taking over the computer prerecording and playing the last part of the tunes live. Very smart!!

"To the land of my own romance", a Victor Herbert composition and a piece made famous by soprano Beverley Sills and the orchestra of Andre Kostelanetz many years ago. (Hands up those, again of a certain age, who collected Kostelanetz LPs in younger days?). Ken's interpretation of this music was excellent.

Come in now Frank Sinatra and a selection of his well known and played songs including "I've got you under my skin, You Will be My Music, That's Life (with the Wurli temporarily converted to a Hammond B3 sound) and Chicago". And, no, you can't have "My Way" at your funeral (especially if you belong to my church in the city).

Ken hails from Georgia in the States and wanted to give us a taste of that State. "Hard Hearted Hannah, Sweet Georgia Brown" and

Hoagy Carmichael's "Georgia on My Mind". I love the first piece and used to feature it more than occasionally on my days on radio with the theatre organ programme.

Now to a selection from the Jerry Herman musical Mack and Mabel. "Tap Your Troubles Away". This 1974 musical told the story about silent film star Mack Sennett and his "lady" Mabel Normand.

Before his final musical offering, Ken again thanked us for being in the audience and reminded us that our instrument is over ninety years old (it will be 100 in 2024!!). It had performed well with only the occasional computer glitch. Also good to be reminded by Ken that the Wurlitzer organ is one of the best kept musical secrets and we should share its joy with our friends.


Ken's final offering was an offering for our troubled world at this time, a piece composed in 1955, "Let there be peace on earth". Sixty-five years have gone by since that song was written and still no nearer peace on earth!

Great applause for Ken's concertising on the almost perfectly behaving Wurli, and he sent us home with his encore "If you knew Suzie". Light and fun.

Thank you Mr Double for a most enjoyable afternoon's entertainment. Don't wait another ten years!
