ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING AND ELECTION

The annual general meeting and election of officers will take place on January 31st 1973 at 8 p.m. It will be held in St. Ann's Church Hall at Strathfield (the same location as last January's AGM).

PLEASE NOTE Members <u>must</u> be financial before the meeting commences in order to have a vote in the elections. The same streamlined voting system successfully used at the last AGM will again be used and a ballot paper will appear on the last page of the January TOSA News. Members should fill this in before attending the meeting and place it in the ballot box which will be at the entrance doors on the night of the meeting. Nominations for all positions on the Executive and Committee will close 6 weeks before the AGM - on December 20th. Nominations must be signed by two financial members as proposer and seconder, and the nominee must have been a financial member for at least six months. The person nominated must also sign indicating his willingness to be nominated. Every member is asked to attend the AGM and vote for the officers of their choice in order that the Society can continue to grow and flourish in the coming year.



THE 1972 ORGAN SPECTACULAR by (Frank Ellis)

The Waratah "Organ Spectacular" staged in Sydney Town Hall on Tuesday 3rd October was, once again, a huge success and a credit to TOSA and all the organ retailers who participated in this annual function now firmly established as a part of the city's Waratah Festival. Compered by T. V. personality, Jim Dibble, a TOSA member for many years, the show was considered by many, to be the best one we have yet presented. The installation of the instruments was expertly carried out despite the fact that the various technicians involved worked under extreme pressure due to insufficient time being allowed for them to carry out their installations, and thoroughly test same. It was entirely due to this lack of time for testing that distortion in the speaker system of one of the organs was not able to be



detected before the show commenced, and it is hoped that the Town Hall will be made available to the Society much earlier in the day for future occasions. The installation of \$30,000 or more of complex electronic equipment is not something which can be accomplished at the wave of a magic wand and organ retailers cannot be expected to loan and install their product unless sufficient time is allowed to bring their installation to peak efficiency otherwise it is inevitable that odious and unfair criticism of a well respected brand will result.

The programmes presented by all six organists showed that each one had devoted a great deal of effort in the selection of a program of sufficiently wide variety to appeal to an audience ranging in age from 16 to 60 and whose musical tastes could be expected to be as widely separated as their ages. That they were able to successfully please all the audience was very apparent from the applause, and reflects their musical good taste.

David Parsons opened the programme at the Grand Pipe Organ and he was followed by Eric Smith at the Yamaha EX42, Cliff Bingham on a spinet model Thomas instrument, Reuhert Hayes at the Conn Organ, Pat Quinn at the Wurlitzer electronic organ and finally Ray Thornley at the Lowrey organ. Each one was outstanding in his own inimitable way - each one showed his command of the instrument featured - and each one received an equally warm tribute from a most enthusiastic audience. The Society thanks, and congratulates organists and retailers for another top class Waratah Festival Organ Spectacular.

T.O.S.A. Negotiates with WILLOUGHBY MUNICIPAL COUNCIL re CHATSWOOD TOWN HALL WURLITZER ORGAN

Negotiations between Willoughby M. C. and TOSA have been in progress and The Council wrote to TOSA offering the use of Chatswood Town Hall for TOSA Functions and functions in conjunction with the Council, in return for which TOSA would be responsible for maintenance of the Wurlitzer Organ installation.

Clarification of some aspects is now awaited but it is hoped that TOSA will present a Subscription series of four concerts and three free concerts and that maintenance by a professional would be arranged.

Further details will be announced as soon as finality is reached.

DAVID PARSONS PLAYS THE BIG ONE

There was a reasonably good roll up of members for an 8 A.M. concert by David Parsons at the State Theatre Sydney on Saturday 4th November. David, (our Honorary member for 1972) had obviously taken great pains to prepare a programme which would appeal to all tastes and he presented it in his customary musicianly manner. He also introduced his numbers with a wealth of information about them thereby creating interest in each item from the onset. Opening with a lengthy selection from "Jesus Christ Superstar" he continued with "Falling In Love With Love", "I Hear A Rhapsody", "Swedish Rhapsody", and the ever popular, "Alexander's Ragtime Band" as his final offering before the interval. The second half included selections from "Annie Get Your Gun", "Solemn Melody", "My Love To You", "I'm Getting Sentimental Over You", "Sentimental Journey", "Light Cavalry Overture" and "Battle Hymn Of The Republic".

David received a warm ovation for his concert which very obviously had been enjoyed to the full by all those present and from the comments heard in the foyer, most would agree that he did indeed get the most out of the instrument. One comment was that the Tibias sounded as sweet as clotted cream and this might well be - they certainly had the lush sound that we have come to expect from the State Theatre's Wurlitzer.

Our thanks are due to the maintenance crew at the State for the long hours of work put in on the organ's care and to Jack Lawson for the operation of the spotlight (with colors) which added so much to the console's new paint work. The compere, was, as usual, Vice-President Frank Ellis.

NATIONAL CONVENTION

A FINE ENDING TO 1972 MARRICKVILLE SEASON!

A long queue of patrons stretching down the steps of Marrickville Town Hall delayed the start of the final Wurlitzer concert of the 1972 season on Wednesday 15th November. The concert, the first one by Cliff Bingham on this organ in a long time, drew a large and more than usually responsive audience. The Wurlitzer, was in excellent voice, obviously betakening "mint" condition, and complimented by Cliff's admirable registrations, was a joy to hear.

Cliff Bingham is a professional musician - his approach to a concert is thoroughly professional in every facet of his rehearsal and his presentation. He can always be relied upon to give a performance of a high standard, and this occasion was no exception. His guest artist, obviously chosen with his own high standards in mind, was a splendid choice and a most deservedly popular one. Margaret Robertson possesses a lovely and unusual voice, well disciplined to suit her style and quite capable of being heard distinctly in the hall without the aid of a microphone, even against a fairly heavy registration on the Wurlitzer. She too received a splendid ovation.

The programme opened with an up-tempo "That's Entertainment" and continued with "42nd Street Overture", selections from Lehar's "Merry Widow", "Piccolino" from Top Hat, "There's A Small Hotel" from On Your Toes and "It's All Right With Me" from Can Can. Margaret Robertson, continuing the music from the shows theme, sang "Climb Every Mountain" from TSOM and "You'll Never Walk Alone" from Carousel. Cliff continued the show tunes theme with "Lady Be Good", "Love Is A Many Splendoured Thing", My Fair Lady selections, Theme from "A Summer Place", "Tonight" from West Side Story and "Superstar". In a second appearance, Margaret sang "I'll Walk With God" and "The Impossible Dream" which concluded the first half of the program.

After intermission came "Married I Can Always Get", "San Francisco" medley and "Knightsbridge March" after which Margaret sang "More" and "I Gotta Be Me". A brief segment displayed Gospel Music from "Go To Whoa" and found Cliff and the audience having fun with the sound of a reed organ after some impressive cathedral tones had filled the hall. Margaret Robertson made her final contribution singing, "I Looked For Love", and an usual arrangement of "The Lord's Prayer". Cliff's final items were "Parade Of The Wooden Soldiers" and "Granada".

In response to prolonged applause he encored with the favourite march "Blaze Away".

Summing up - a first class nights entertainment and a most impressive ending to Marrickville's 1972 season.
