



# From Vice President, John Shaw

# Report on the Survey Taken at our December Concert

As usual, a maximum audience of just over 600 people attended last December's Christmas concert. At that **Tony Fenelon** and **John Atwell** Duo Concert we conducted a survey in which 400 people took part.

The survey was aimed at confirming the following points:

- 1. How many of our audience are members?
- 2. How did the non-members hear about our concert?
- 3. Which source of advertising reaches the largest number of people and which the least?
- 4. Would our audiences like an occasional associate artist?
- 5. Do our audiences wish any changes to be made?


The result was similar to the last survey which was taken 8 - 9 years ago.

Our audience comprises 50% members and 50% non-members, which means we must cater for the general public as well as for our members.

In regard to advertising, following word-of-mouth, **2CBA** reaches the most people, followed by free advertising on commercial stations. However the local press and signage all play a large part and have proven worthwhile.

In relation to the occasional associate artists, over half have voted in favour and this needs to taken into account. For your information, an instrumentalist was voted ahead of a singer, with silent film only scoring 135 votes.

The final statistics show that each member present that day attends 6.75 concerts out of the usual 10 per year and each non-member 4.48 concerts. However, I guess this is purely academic, although it was easy to work out due to the helpful co-operation that



we received from all those who took the trouble to complete the questionnaire.

Some of your comments included an organ concert combined with a dance orchestra, a sing-a-long, more UK organists, TV screen to show close-ups of playing, season tickets, less talk between numbers, shorter interval, programmes listing the numbers to be played, and a show with a local musical society.

On behalf of the committee, may I express our thanks to you all for participating, as the results will be most helpful in making our plans for the future, knowing what our audiences like and dislike.

Once again, many thanks for your help.

With all the media attention on the film "Shine", its winning of Golden Globe Awards and its nomination for Academy Awards, the Ballarat Newsletter's editor, Winston Loveland, found an early appearance by the film's music composer. These items appeared in recent issues of Ballarat's Newsletter, when "Shine" had picked up a handful of awards at the AFI ceremony, and had been nominated for various Academy Awards.

The outstanding Australian film "Shine" won many of the recently announced Australian Film Industry Awards. The film depicts the story of Australian concert pianist David Helfgott; it is a "must see" for all music lovers.

The Award for Best Original Music Score went to DAVID HIRSCHFELDER, which sent me hurrying off to thumb through our Society's archives. There I located the old 1973 press photo of young David, aged 13. Like many other artists who have gone on to become world famous, David Hirschfelder began his musical career competing in the Royal South Street Society Competitions on the stage of Her Majesty's, Ballarat.

The text accompanying the Ballarat Courier photo reads: "A Ballarat boy, David Hirschfelder, on Sunday won the Junior section of the State final of the Yamaha Electone Festival in Melbourne. David, 14, and Gaynor Blanchfield, 14, gained equal first

place in the local section and both competed in the State Final .... a versatile musician, David plays piano and organ and is taking up guitar. He has been learning classical piano for 6 1/2 years but has been playing organ for only nine months ... apart from a few fundamental tips from Ballarat musician Mr. John Gilbert, David's organ prowess is self-taught. David, a Form 3 student at Ballarat Grammar, said that he had no firm favourites in music, but enjoys all types, but he does prefer popular music on the organ".

David's first South Street success was in 1974, winning the 16yrs and under Electronic Organ Solo, the same year that member Mike Conron won the Open Age organ section. The next year he again took out several placings, in both organ and piano sections. In 1976 he was guest organist at the BTOS Outdoor Concert held at the old Smeaton Mill. In 1978 he started a 3 year Diploma Course in Modern Jazz Improvisation and Arranging at Victorian College of the Arts, Melbourne, and freelancing as a professional musician.

Our archives then have a press photo of him as a mature 19yr old (sporting a black beard) at the piano with Warwick Kittson, preparing for our mid-year concert at Her Majesty's, when he and 3 other students played a jazz quartet item as associate artists with Ray Thornley and Edith Dizon.

The rest is history - musical arranger for Johnny Farnham, TV productions, etc., and now this prestigious film award. How thankful we are in Ballarat that our South Street Competitions, with its 19 different artistic disciplines, has been the start of many a successful artistic career.


David, now aged 37, the father of two children and living in Melbourne, has been nominated for one of Hollywood's greatest accolades, an Oscar, for the Best Original Dramatic Score in the Australian hit film, Shine.

He has already achieved fame as a musician, producer and composer of John Farnham's albums. He holds the 1993 British Film and Television Academy Award for Best Original Music in the Australian film, Strictly Ballroom.

His gift for music is inherited from both sides of the family - his grandmother had been a concert pianist in Germany before World War Two. While being educated at Ballarat Grammar, he trained on piano for nine years from age seven, with Ballarat's Sister of Mercy teacher, Frances Lynch, whose musical teaching he described as "wonderful" and contributed to much of his musical success.

Right now he is working on a recording with his former Ballarat school friend and star of Opera Australia, David Hobson.

TOT, sponsored by THE WORLD and Station 2UW, is the first completely juvenile broadcasting station world.

Although the competition for child artists to appear with TOT closed over a week ago with over 800 entries, appli-

cations are received being daily from children who want to be on the station.
The children who will be heard have been selected exhaustive after elimination tests.

Every from the smallest five-years-old to the biggest 14years-old,

Marjorie writes: "I trust that the photocopies of press cuttings, chosen from my scrapbook covering the years from 1930 until the 1960's, will be of interest, as well as showing why I have an interest in TOSA.

As a child performer in the late 1920's, I took part in stage presentations in city and suburban picture theatres and in the 1940's had my seasons at the Prince Edward, Regent, State and Capitol Theatres.

Attending TOSA's Chris McPhee concert brought back many memories. As well as my memories of seeing that very WurliTzer rising from the pit, I recalled the many times I heard it as I waited in the dressing room. Not to mention the memory of Noreen Hennessy at the Prince Edward Theatre as she turned to greet her audience with all her charm!"

# More from MARJORIE PROWSE's Scrapbook

# REG. LEWIS BAND PRES AT "PRINCE EDWARD" IS A HONEY!

TOR his current musical presentation at the Sydney Prince Edward Theatre, Reg, Lewis offers as fragrant a musical bouquet as we have savoured for quite some time. Featuring his Show Band and singers Marjorie Prowse (who recently returned from Hongkong, where she appeared at the British Centre) and Geoffrey Moore, young New Zealand tenor, programme opens with an excellent arrangement of American Patrol, which has more snap than a prewar girdle, with saxes bouncing a clipped accent and hitting the rhythm right on the nose.

Marjorie Prowse follows this number and charms with a golden version of You Are The Echo Of My Song, displaying excellent production but just a trifle too much vibrato in one or two places. The shimmering beauty of Miss Prowse's image then makes way for Harry Willis, who trundles his bass down to the mike and delivers himself of a laugh-making morsel, You're Bound To Look Like A Monkey When You Grow Old. Harry really rings the bell with this number, and his voice has a lot of Waller's infectious mischief.

Piece de resistance, for my particular taste, is the really lovely presentation of Symphony. Reg. Lewis takes most of the first chorus on piano, using only rhythm accompaniment for 16 bars and carrying the melody in the dulcet left-hand position: brilliant ensemble leads up to a satin-smooth vocal by Johnny Wade, with Reg. floating some florid chords on piano against the band and voice in the Duchin manner, after which Neville Thomas picks up the melody line on tenor and hands it to Jack Hanson's trumpet; band later builds up to a soaring climax and pulls a surprise fade for Johnny Wade's vocal to coda. This is a most effective piece of scoring, and the whole thing dripped class.

Geoffrey Moore then makes his appearance, bringing his rich tenor voice to bear most effectively on the ever-popular Donkey's Serenade. Moore has spiendid control, and makes tough phrases sound easy.

Finale is most spectacular, employing both singers and the Show Band in a particularly clean-cut arrangement of Song Of The Dawn, in which several members of the band—notably Colin Bergerson—lend some distinctly effective harmonised vocal support.

No newcomer to the business, Marge has an act which combines classics, musical comedy and pop songs with fast changes of costume and lively patter.

In her early days as a child performer, she appeared on 2UW's first children's session, "Station TOT".

After studies at the NSW Conservatorium of Music, Marge embarked on a career of musical and recital programmes. Later she was a permanant member of the AWA Light Opera Company, under Humphrey Bishop's direction.

During the war, Marge branched into vaudeville, working as a straight singer, soubrette and doing "bits".

Chosen to jopin the British Centre Entertainment Unit, she toured South Eas Asia with Wilfrid Thomas, Joe Lawman, Joy Robbin, Barbara James, Ron Jackson and others.

After visits to Hongkong and Singspore, she returned to Sydney to join Reg Lewis' Band at the Prince Edward Theatre.

She later joined Stanley Mackay's shows on tour, and has been heard frequently on national and commercial radio.

As a singer of traditional Scottish songs, Marge is a regular artist for the NSW Highland Society concerts at Sydney Town Hall.



# Mighty Wurlitzer will move to town hall ballroom

STOCKPORT has beaten off the challenge of Manchester to become the new home of the Free Trade Hall's mighty WurliTzer organ. Owners the Lancastrian Theatre Organ Trust decided that the great "organ transplant" should be from the Free Trade Hall to Stockport Town Hall's magnificent ballroom rather than rival contender. Gwythenshawe Forum.

And the £200,000 project to move the £250,000 organ which is expected to take two years—will not cost Stockport's hard-pressed council tax payers a penny.

Don Hyde, of Bramhall, chairman of the organ trust, said: "We are paying a lot of the cost of moving the organ ourselves.

### Lottery

"We have already received a grant of £60,000 from the Sports and Arts Support Fund, run by the football pools organisations.

"We have also applied for £65,000 from the National Lottery for work which will have to be done to the ballroom before the organ can be moved there."

The organ, almost twice the size of its famous Blackpool Tower Ballroom counterpart, and at 14 tons the biggest ever shipped from America to Europe, will be divided into small parts for the restoration work which will have to be done.

"We have professional restorers in many parts of the country who are going to do the

work," said Mr Hyde. "If we did it ourselves it would take four years."

The organ is still in the Free Trade Hall, which closed last summer when the Halle Orchestra moved to the new Bridgewater Hall.

But there is no danger it will deteriorate as the heat-ing is switched an because the Royal Exchange Theatre holds rehearsals there.

The organ was shipped to Manchester in 1930 for the Odeon Cinema, then known as the Paramount.

### Loan

The Lancastrian Organ Trust, which has 1,000 members and associates, was set up in the 1970s to save the WurliTzer when it had to be removed from the cinema. The

organ, which has been at the Free Trade Hall since 1977, will be on loan from the trust at the Town Hall as it was in Manchester.

It was made by the Rudolph Wurlitzer Company in New York State to whom organ patents originally drawn up by Robert Hope-Jones, who came from Cheshire, were assigned.

Bramhall Conservative Councillor Ken Holt, who came up with the idea that the WurliTzer should be moved to Stockport, was delighted: "This will not cost Stockport taxpayers a penny and will bring prestige to the borough," he said.

The final organ concert at the Free Trade Hall was last September when one of the soloists was Nigel Ogden. He will be playing again at a concert in aid of the WurliTzer "transplant" fund at the Bridgewater Hall on February 15. The Lancastrian Theatre Organ Trust (UK) has published an interesting review of the recent video, ONCE UPON A DREAM, which tells the story of Sydney's Capitol Theatre and its WurliTzer organ. The video is now on sale in the UK, but can also be bought from the TOSA Record Bar for \$25 (+ \$6 postage)

### VIDEO REVIEW

"ONCE UPON A DREAM" - The story of Sydney's Capitol Theatre - VHS, approx. 60 minutes.

Exactly two years ago we reviewed "Palace of Dreams", an Australian video on the history and restoration of the State Theatre, Sydney, and now comes a similar, but longer, production covering the same city's Capitol Theatre, considered by many to be the finest in the Southern Hemisphere.

Atmospheric in design and with a striking proscenium, the walls extending to the back of the circle resemble a **Florentine** garden amphitheatre, complete with birds, trees and statues from various periods of history, while stars twinkle in the blue sky.

The history of the **Capitol** site is well covered, and includes some turn-of-the-century black and white footage.

It started in 1893 with the building of the **Belmore Fruit Market**, which by 1918 had so outgrown the available space that a replacement was built elsewhere.

The Wirth Brothers' Circus had long been popular in Sydney, so next on the site was the "Hippodrome", and to meet the requirement that the decorative exterior of the old market must be retained, it was rebuilt as the upper part of the new building. The Hippodrome was a fully equipped theatre with stage and fly-tower, and in the stalls area was a circus ring, the floor of which could be lowered and filled with water for aquatic shows and the performing seals

Ten years later the circus was in decline, and application was made to convert the building into a cinema, which resulted in the 2771-seat Capitol, opened in 1928. Again, the historic exterior had to be retained, as was the fly-tower, but the auditorium was close to the atmospheric theatres of the U.S.A., and it was not until the 1970's that researchers discovered it to be the work of John Eberson, one of American's leading theatre architects. He was given no credit at the time, the plans and design drawings showing only the name of Australian architect, Henry White.

Opening in the silent film era, the theatre boasted a 30-piece orchestra and a sizeable three manual WurliTzer organ which was played by American organist Fred Scholl, who is seen in a still close-up and at a distance in movie shots showing the rising console. The organ was allowed to deteriorate, and in 1964 local enthusiasts became responsible far maintaining it in playing order, but with the theatre lease expiring in 1972 and the possibility of demolition, the New South Wales Chapter of the T.O.S.A. purchased the WurliTzer, which started a new lease of life in the Orion Theatre, Campsie.

The video takes us there to hear the appropriate march "Theatreland" excellently played by John Giacchi, who handles the console beautifully and appears to be an unassuming young man. Included are brief chamber shots, all in perfect synchronisation.

The Capitol has not had a smooth life, the lease having passed to various operators over the years, and it has had periods of closure - the first time only four years after its opening, due to the depression. In later years it became used for various functions, including rock concerts, at which damage was caused, and due to lack of funds for maintenance, by the start of the 90's it was shabby and starting to crumble in places. With demolition on the horizon, a scheme

for a complete restoration as a fully-fledged theatre was proposed and sanctioned. The task was tremendous, large parts having to be rebuilt, and an adjoining site was acquired on which to build new foyer, sales areas and bars. The stage was rebuilt in enlarged form with a new fly-tower, and boxes were added in the completely refurbished auditorium. Found beneath the stalls floor was the **Hippodrome's** circus ring, and it has become the band room which is so necessary with an orchestra pit now housing over a hundred musicians.


While it is a pity that the organ is no longer there to share in this new life, it would not have fitted into the new regime, and must therefore be more secure in its present home.

Shortly after the reopening, the spectacular "Miss Saigon" was staged some short extracts being seen and heard, and lots more music is heard in the course of the video. We recognised some tracks from the Chappell and Bosworth recorded music libraries.

Both sound and picture quality are superb throughout, and telling the story is the charming singer turned actress Lorrae Desmond, who for many years appeared as Shirley Gilroy in the T.V. soap "A Country Practice".

There are contributions by architects, actors, musicians, etc., and all who appreciate cinema and theatre history will find this video of absorbing interest. So will many others, for it is a superb production - 100% professional, and perfect in vision and sound. We enjoyed every minute, and would sum it up as a video not to be missed - so do order while copies remain available.

The recent restoration, only briefly covered here, fills one with admiration, and after spending so, much money and effort, it is to be earnestly hoped that the Capitol's future will be more secure than its past.



# Report on David Johnston's Concert

# Sunday 2nd March

From the moment John Parker asked us to put our hands together, to welcome David Johnston back to Sydney, we experienced a roller coaster ride through a vast variety of musical entertainment.

David rose into the spotlight playing Hey Look Me Over. This was followed by beautifully played selections from a musical written in the 50's, but set in the 20's, The Boyfriend. Selections included I Could Be Happy With You, Poor Little Pierrette, Perfect Young Ladies, Fancy Forgetting, It's Never Too Late To Fall In Love and a reprise of The Boyfriend.

Speaking to a lady in the front row, **David** enquired her name. It was **Daphne**, whereupon he declared that this was his favourite name - he even had a cousin with the same name but *HE* wasn't too happy about it!

Amongst David's father's music was a piece called *Intermezzo* which he proceeded to play with great sensitivity.

Charlie Chaplin was a famous silent film comedian and three tunes from Chaplin films followed. The Biograph Girl started with the xylophone and gradually developed into a novelty number bringing in the piano, bells and a number of quieter pipe ranks. Smile is a rather sad sounding tune but This Is My Song lifted our spirits again as the music flowed on.

Going back to an era before the silent films, David elected to play a Trumpet Minuet written by Jeremiah Clark, using the trumpet and flute upper work. Then without pausing he went straight into Till I Loved You.

To tease us, Melbournian David jokingly spoke about the "We Gots" - Melbourne has got the Princess Theatre, the Regent Theatre and its biggest WurliTzer organ in Australia, plus all the sporting events that Premier Kennett has filched from other states.

To demonstrate the organ's versatility he now played a jazzy version of *Taking A Chance On Love*, featuring the quieter stops non tuned percussions and piano, much the same

as a small jazz group would sound.

By way of introduction to the next composer, David told us that because of the Gay Mardi Gras, he was able to get a Mardi Gras special flight fare, saving TOSA \$50 in air fares. (David was a bit worried about what was expected of him on board the lovely pink plane !!) Classical church organist Richard Armitage composed a number of popular songs under the name of Noel Gay, and in the lead up to interval we were treated to a Noel Gay selection. These included such great favourite English songs as The King's In Town Again, All The King's Horses And All The King's Men, You Do Something To My Heart, There's Something About A Soldier, The Moment I Saw You, and finishing up with the Lambeth Walk including the "Oi's".

Ex-president **Jack Lawson** drew the raffle after interval. All the proceeds of these raffles go into the **TOSA Building Fund**.

The organ rose from the pit again to the sounds of 1929. If the minister is having a bad day in church, **David** likes to cheer him up with the *War March Of The Priests*. During this number a bit of comedy was introduced when **David** turned a page of music, backwards, forwards and sideways, which led to him proposing a theory that if you know the tune but require the music as a prop, perhaps blank pages of different coloured paper could be used for different numbers, thus saving the problem of misplaced pages!?

received at interval a jazzy version of Sweet Sue was played. At the completion of this a lady named Lorna was moved to sing out "I love you". Not surprisingly, Lorna happens to be David's second favourite name!! A deep red spotlight enveloped him as he played When I Fall in Love.

David then told "A Musical Story", accompanied by sound effects and musical commentary on the organ: A man who wanted a pet, bought a Hamster from a pet shop. He took it home but it died overnight. Undeterred he chopped it up, put it into a pot of boiling water and made jam out of it. Next morning he buttered a piece of toast and spread the jam on it but it tasted so awful he threw the jam out the window. Next morning the lawn was covered in daffodils. Thinking this was strange he returned to the pet shop and told the owner, who replied, "that's strange, we usually get tulips from hamster jam (Amsterdam!)". One really needs to hear the musical patter with the recitation to appreciate this great novelty item.

It Had To Be You was played next. Since the day before the concert was St David's Day - we didn't know that did we? - David played a Welsh selection.

Jesus Christ Superstar never sounded so good. When the show was playing at the Sydney Capitol, if the organ had still been in place, I'm sure David could have replaced the orchestra.

Of course after this, our artist was recalled to play an encore. We do like to get value for money, don't we? He said, "I never get asked for an encore and I have been practising this piece for years just in case." Claiming we were the best audience he had played to this week, he played *Mack And Mabel*, from the story about *Mack Sennet* and *Mabel Norman*.

We loved you, **David**. Come again and treat us to a form of musical talent and comedy which we have not heard for years. From the comments I have heard, this concert was a gem and everyone would love to experience more concerts like this.

John Atwell is well-known to us for his fabulous duo concerts with Tony Fenelon, but this time we welcome John back once again to play for us what we know from past experience will be an entertaining solo concert.

- \* presenting a concert on the Cassavant organ in the Melbourne Concert Hall during the month-long opening celebrations in 1982;

- \* opening Adelaide's Capri Cinema's WurliTzer, with Tony Fenelon and Ray Thornley in 1983;
- \* recording on the Capri organ as part of the "Five Alive" album in 1985;
- \* participating in Melbourne's "Carols by Candlelight" each Christmas Eve on piano or organ;
- \* presenting, with Tony Fenelon, highly-successful duo concerts with piano and organ duets for the past 17 years.

He has had a hand in the tonal design and console lay-outs of several theatre organ re-installations, including Dallas Brooks Hall, Melbourne, the Capri Adelaide, and Marrickville WurliTzer's recent refurbishment. He has also been the editor of Vox, Victoria's excellent answer to NSW's TOSA News!


