Everything we had heard of his musical ability is true and you are in for another great show October 19th. But a quote from a reviewer of the Karrinyup WA show:

"....In short he is a master of registration but not to the point where there is a loss of melody. Sounds were produced that have never been heard before. The music programme included marches such as Hands Across the Ocean with piccolo parts and drums other numbers such as Hi Lili Hi Lili Hi lo used glockenspiel and harp to great effect. For those who like soft shoe music Cuddle up a Little Closer was on the musical menu along with Sugartime. This was a thoroughly enjoyable concert where the audience left in a happy mood." I humbly suggest you not miss this show.



TOSA MEMBERS' EVENT AT MARRICKVILLE 22 SEPTEMBER, 2014

The fourth Monday of September this year marked the anniversary of what had begun as an experiment of making an earlier start to the Members' Playing event at Marrickville Town Hall. You may recall that this extension of hours was formulated to allow members the choice of coming for the afternoon or the evening or both – even dropping in whenever it was convenient.

So on Monday, 22nd September, the Wurlitzer was singing away by 2.30 p.m. And it was just after 9.00 p.m. when the music faded, the console was boxed in once more, and the remaining group of enthusiasts left the organ breathless in darkness.

The day was unusual in that the occasion produced an accomplished theatre organist, Dwight Beacham and his charming wife Gini, brought along by Dorothy & Peter Robinson. The Beachams had arrived in Sydney only the day before, but – testimony perhaps to its international repute – Dwight was keen to avail himself of TOSA's access to the Marrickville Wurlitzer. His public performance in Sydney will be at the Orion in October, at which point he will have completed many of his shows on the playing tour of Australia & New Zealand.

Those who took turns at the Wurlitzer were: **Tom Barber**, **Dwight Beacham**, **Graeme Costin**, **Kevin Eadie**, **Ian Georgeson**, **Peter Robinson** and **John Batts**. We listened with great interest as Dwight made himself at home during his couple of 20-minute slots and most of us enjoyed chatting the theatre-organ talk in between, with news of American instruments and those who play them. Dwight was the gracious guest and no-one seemed unduly nervous at playing in his presence. Some of our members made only temporary appearances, so numbers fluctuated. However, it was reckoned that everyone had a chance to spend a significant amount of time at the console. Listeners included **Gini Beacham**, **Dorothy Robinson**, **Ernie Vale** and **John Wall** An unusual range of light refreshments were available; in sum, thanks to individual generosity we did ourselves proud. Starvation was not an option!

Don't forget that all members (& guests) of TOSA(NSW) are most welcome to attend on Players' occasions. A phone-call or email to Neil or me will confirm that the event is about to take place. As I must have stated many times before: You don't have

to play, but there's ample opportunity to chat in agreeable company, exchange views with fellow aficionados, and to hear at first hand those pipe sounds which are so rarely heard in Sydney these days.

Dwight Beacham

Dwight Beacham has been playing theatre organ concerts for over 45 years starting with his concert on the 4 manual 37 rank Kimball theatre organ then in the Wiltern Theatre in Los Angeles, California. Concerts all across the US and England have included such venues as the Coronado Theatre, Rockford, IL (4 manual 17 rank Barton); the Auditorium Theatre, Rochester, NY (4 manual 23 rank Wurlitzer); Mundelein, IL (4 manual 19 rank); Berkeley Community Theatre (4 manual 42 rank Wurlitzer); the Palace Theatre, Hilo HI (4 manual 20 rank Morton) and many others.

He has 7 recordings to his credit. In addition, **Dwight** was featured organist for over 20 years in a series of Community Band with Organ programs in the Allentown, PA area. However, most of **Dwight's** contributions to the organ world have been "behind the scenes." He was employed by the **Allen Organ Company** for over 30 years and was the driving influence for their continued interest in theatre organ. As Vice President of Product Development he was able to create projects like the George Wright Signature Series.

Dwight has been a theatre organ enthusiast for as long as he can remember. Growing up in Los Angeles afforded **Dwight** the opportunity to see and hear many theatre organists perform live in concert. George Wright, Lyn Larsen, Gaylord Carter, Bill Thomson, Del Castillo, Ann Leaf, Buddy Cole, Loren Whitney – those were "heady" days – and this does not even include the numerous "out-of-town" visiting theatre organists. As a teenager he even convinced his parents to let him fly up to San Francisco to attend the Farewell to the Fox George Wright concerts prior to the Fox theatre becoming a parking lot! All these experiences had some degree of influence on Dwight's style and the "sound" he expected from a great theatre organ.

He studied with theatre organist Lloyd del Castillo and got his degree in Music from Chapman University in Orange, California. Dwight and his wife Gini live in Sun City, Arizona. He is currently organist at Belevue Heights Church.

History of the Kelvin Grove Christie Theatre Pipe Organ

Compiled from various sources, with special thanks to Don Clark.

This information is reproduced from TOSA Queensland Division's 50th year - 2014 Souvenir Book with the kind permission of the Author - Mike Gillies

One of the main objects of the Theatre Organ Society – Queensland Division since its inception was to own its own theatre organ. This became a reality with the purchase of a Christie Organ from England.

Origins of the Christie

The Granada Theatre in Maidstone, Kent UK opened on 10th January 1934 with Tom Walls in "Cuckoo in the Nest" and John Barrymore in "Reunion in Vienna". Organist Alex Taylor opened the Christie 3 manual/8 rank cinema organ. The white console was in the French style but in a beefier look than the Wurlitzer versions. There was a stage, but no fly tower for scenery. It had a popular cafe-restaurant (the Fiesta) and a car park.

The striking interior was designed by noted Russian theatre set designer Theodore Komisarjevsky. There were three decorative grilles masking the twin organ chambers on one side of the proscenium, with a matching set of grilles on the other side. A narrow frieze, depicting charioteers, was set across the top of the proscenium.

HISTORY OF THE KELVIN GROVE CHRISTIE THEATRE PIPE ORGAN



The Christie was built by the respected English organ builders Hill, Norman and Beard to specification by noted theatre organist Harold Ramsay. This organ was one of the later theatre organs, being delivered in 1933, Opus 2911 with 144 stops. The ranks of this organ were: Tibia, Tuba, Diapason, French Trumpet, Flute, String, String Celeste, Clarinet, and Vox Humana; and wired for piano to be played from the organ console. On the opening night, the wiring for the grand piano was burnt out and never restored.

The society was fortunate to obtain a 78 disc recording made by Alex Taylor on this instrument. While the recording is old, the beautiful tone of this organ could be appreciated.

Organists known to have performed at Maidstone include: Alex Taylor, Harold Ramsay (who designed Opus 2911), Donald Thorne (the only organist who was 'resident' there for an extended time), Reginald Dixon (who toured for Granada during the winter months when the Tower Ballroom at Blackpool was closed), Horace Finch, Reginald Foort, Lloyd Thomas, Dudley Beaven, Stuart Barrie, Cecil Chadwick, Robinson Cleaver, Tommy Dando, Nelson Elms, Harry Farmer, John Madin, John Howlett, Neville Meale, Frank Newman, John Bennett, Reginald Porter-Brown, Leslie Simpson, Eric Smith, Ray Baines, Ronald Hanmer (who came to live in Brisbane in the 1950s), Frank Todd, Reginald Foxwell, Harold Betts, Elaine Blair, Harry Croft, Molly Cleaver, Charles Cooksey, Cyril Gell, Paul Gomez, Watson Holmes, Boyd Oxford, Leo Rae, Bernard Worster, Brian Rodwell and Douglas Sharp. It was last featured regularly in the early 1950s, and thereafter was heard only occasionally, apart from Saturday morning children's shows. It was maintained regularly, though, and like all other Granada organs at that time, continued to be tuned every two months.

In 1968, the River Len flooded part of the city and the Granada Theatre was closed on 15th September due to flooding, but it reopened the following week, using the 650 seat circle area only. Floodwater was forced up through an uncapped well under the stage and surged through the stalls and ground floor areas to a depth of about 2.5 metres. The magnificent white console located in the orchestra pit was destroyed but the still completely original organ pipes and relays were undamaged as they were high up at dress circle level in their two chambers.

The building was closed in April 1971 for conversion by the architectural firm George Coles & Partners into a Granada Bingo Club in

the former stalls area and a twin screen cinema in the former circle and former cafe, using a new side entrance. Today the building remains empty.

The Search

As the Society hoped to one day have their very own working theatre pipe organ in Brisbane, a sub-committee was formed during 1967 to investigate this possibility. It comprised Bill Dickinson, Don Clark and Nev Seymour. Through Bill Dickinson's contacts, Ralph Bartlett and Bill Ravenall of the British Theatre Organ Preservation Society, negotiations in 1969 were made to purchase the now redundant organ from the flooded Granada Maidstone cinema. On the sub-committee's recommendations, the TOSA management committee led by President Howell Whitehouse and Vice-president Gordon Berry, on behalf of the membership, agreed, and the purchase was made in March 1970. Society Treasurer Warren White worked tirelessly behind the scenes securing a bank loan for this purpose.

TOSA Qld bought the organ minus the console. The organ arrived from England in two shipping containers in early 1971. The only parts of the console to be imported were the stop actions with tabs and the pedal board. The pedal board of course was a mess, but Don completely stripped and restored it, and carted it around for some 20 years though various house moves! It eventually went to Sydney for possible use in an organ down there.

Arrival

The organ arrived in Brisbane on 11 January 1971 and, after quarantine, was unpacked and stored under the science block and Kelvin Grove State High School. Through TOSA Qld President Howell Whitehouse's excellent connections with this school (his daughters were pupils there), TOSA was able to negotiate for the Christie organ to be housed in the new assembly hall which was on the drawing board just as the Christie arrived. The Education Department architects kindly included two purpose-built organ chambers in the design of the hall.

In the meantime, work commenced on inspecting, cleaning and refurbishing the thousands of pipe organ parts laid out in the science block "Christie room". Calls for workers to help saw many keen TOSA members spend thousands of man-hours preparing the Christie for installation. Parts were ferried to and from members' home workshops and the expertise of Whitehouse Bros organ builders was tapped. On 15 July 1973 work on the

organ chamber(s) installation commenced. Supervisor of the installation team was Peter Dekker with Howell Whitehouse, Harry Porter, John Crane, Bert Dakin, Selwyn Walker, Barry Walker, Alec Alcorn, Don Clark, Barry Bailey, Paul Bailey, Mike Gillies, Robert Way, Bill Harvey some of the working bee members. (Apologies if any names have been omitted).

The Second Console

During the late nineteen-fifties and early sixties, a Mr Penn Hughes of Sydney was active in buying, selling and installing theatre organs around Sydney as they were being sold off from Sydney's suburban theatres. During this time he bought the 2/8 Christie organ from the New Empire Theatre in Dunedin, New Zealand. This formed the nucleus of his own home organ.

The original 2 manual Christie console was sold to a Mr Barry Treyena of Sydney. He did nothing with it and Don Clark bought the console off him in c. 1969. His plans were to build a large electronic organ around this console. Also at this time, Don was chairman of a sub-committee looking for a theatre organ for the Society.

Now TOSA Queensland had an organ with no console, so Don Clark reassessed his plans and sold the 2 manual console to the Society. During the restoration and installation, a third (solo) manual was added to the console. From memory, this was obtained from the organ builders, Whitehouse Bros. As it was not a genuine Christie keyboard, although close, it did not exactly match. The console's original electro-pneumatic combination piston mechanism was replaced by a new all-electric mechanism. This was in keeping with the rest of the instrument, as Christie fitted all-electric combination pistons from 1933 onwards.

Testing Times

Work on the installation continued steadily for the next two years. Rewiring, re-leathering and testing of many of the aged components was time-consuming, as was the laying down of trunk work from the blower room in the building behind the hall. Reconfiguring the console to three manual layout was a project in itself. It was decided to paint the console white and gold as introduced timbers in its enlargement did not match the wood grain of the

original.

At last the Christie installation was finished. Over 10,000 manhours had been spent by TOSA volunteers over weekends, school holidays and even at night to get this far. A month or two of testing, fault fixing and retesting saw the organ ready for it first public performance. A demonstration of the Christie toy counter was given during a combined TOSA/P&C concert in the new hall on 6 September 1974. TOSA Qld held their first meeting in the new assembly hall on Wednesday 11 September 1974. The Christie was inspected by members but not ready to play.

Actual playing in front of TOSA members first occurred on Monday 11 August 1975. Then on 12 September 1975, the organ was opened by Mr C A Roberts BA, A Ed, Chairman of the Board of Secondary School Studies, Queensland. Headmaster K F Pembleton and TOSA Qld President H Whitehouse each gave speeches in front of a packed auditorium. Then up from beneath the floor rose the gleaming white and gold Christie console with Sue Whitehouse at the controls. Sue, a former pupil at the school, was supported by the senior school orchestra and a jazz ensemble.

The official public commissioning of the organ was held with a sellout concert by Tony Fenelon held at 8 pm on Monday 24 November 1975. Busloads of theatre organ enthusiasts travelled from afar to witness this momentous occasion. At last Queensland had its own theatre pipe organ.

Over the next decade-plus the Christie was well used and performed in numerous concerts by international artists, theatre organ spectaculars (up to six organs on stage), TOSA national conventions and monthly meetings. It was recorded on LP records by Barry Bailey (1978) and Wilbur Kentwell in 1979. The maintenance team Peter Dekker, Bill Sheavils, John Crane, Les Langham, Ken Wherrett, Arthur Midgley, Nigel Wherrett, John Taylor and Blair Linnett kept it fed and watered over this time. In 1980, the console received a fresh coat of white paint and the relay system was overhauled.
