


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

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

T.O.S.A. NSW DIVISION ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING 1985 SECRETARY'S REPORT

It has been another year of progress for the Society in which we will have presented 9 Home Organ Parties, 8 Paid Concerts, 2 Free Concerts, a Charity Concert, a Christmas Cabaret at the venue for the 3/15 WurliTzer - the Orion Centre - and the very successful Silver National Convention at Easter. A new venture for the Society was the Spring Fete in October which proved to be a significant financial success raising some \$3500 approx. towards the Capitol Organ fund.

In this International Year of Youth it is interesting to observe that the Society presented several young artists at the Console of the WurliTzer - Andrea Harrison, Nerida Rossiter, Giancarlo Giachhi, Sharon Maennl and Damien Scott.

Many artists in the younger age group of Theatre Organists were also presented in concert for your listening pleasure - they being Richard James and Beverly Kennedy, Candi Carley from the U.S.A., Cliff Bingham, Bill Schumacher, Clinton White and finally David Smith making a welcome return to the Console of the WurliTzer.

The year began on a high note with the superb concert performance by Tony Fenelon and Lyn Larsen at Marrickville where we were to see the best audience attendance for the year. The music of these two world class artists was a delight to hear and the additional magic of an evening performance put the icing on the cake.

David Parsons A.M. returned to Marrickville this year to present another of his interesting and well thought out programmes and the Society congratulates David on his award of the Order Of Australia. We were fortunate to present one of Sydney's formost theatre organists - Jean Penhall - who has returned to live in Sydney after spending a number of years in the U.K. Together with Cliff Bingham, Valerie Hanlon and Leonard Lee, she played a most interesting concert to raise funds for radio station 2CBA FM. who broadcast the Society radio programme.

Warren Lubich from San Francisco was on his second tour 'down under' and played a very listenable concert for us with an interesting balance of music and relaxed presentation. We were surprised that there weren't more members in attendance.

We are delighted to have presented Len Rawle from the U.K. for your enjoyment and please ask your musical friends to come to his concert on 24th November. Len has an entertaining presentation and should not be missed.

Finally, we look forward to the closing concert for the year with that great ambassador of the theatre organ, Tony Fenelon.

The Silver National Convention was a very busy time for all those involved and the management of this Division are most gratefull to all those who took part. I believe it was the highlite of a very busy year and all the artists are to be congratulated on a high standard of presentation. The featured artist, Candi Carley from Los Angeles, certainly showed her audience an individual style of theatre organ playing and was obviously well received.

In preparation for the Convention the Society was very fortunate to engage the services of George Stephens from Adelaide who, together with his apprentice Geoff Bails, spent a very full week regulating and adjusting the Marrick-WurliTzer resulting in improvement to the response and balance of the organ. George had primarily come to Sydney to work on the Christie Unit Organ at the Epping Baptist Church which had been restored through many hours of work by Rob Gliddon, David Bruce and John Andrews with several other helpers from time to time. The organ was finished in time for the Convention and was very well received all patrons. Our sincere thanks to the project leader, Rob Gliddon and his team for bringing another theatre organ to life for Sydney audiences. A most successful club night was held at Epping during the year.

The restoration work on the 3/15 WurliTzer has been progressing under the valuable leadership of Norm Weismantel. cnt'd..

He has trained a group of members in various aspects of restoration and they have made a significant contribution to the program already. The console has been restored and re-sprayed in readiness for the installation of the key-desks and other hardware. The wiring of the electro-magnetic stop switches is well on the way. The swell pedals and piano pedals have been replated. The chambers at the Orion Centre are ready to accept the organ with the floor having been covered in vinyl. Work is proceeding to prepare the shutters for installation.

At Marrickville, the shutters nearest the procenium, were reversed in each chamber and the toy counter was mounted on the rear wall in the solo chamber to make room for the installation of an additional chest. Members involved in these most successful manouvres were Ron Wilson, Bill Schumacher, Neil Palmer, Ernie Vale, Bert Chamberlain, Doug Smith, Sam Bruderlin, Norm and John Weismantel, Merv Palmer and Rob Gliddon. The 'plumbing' requirements were supplied by our member Richard Rock.

Negotiations have continued throughout the year with Microset Pty. Ltd. for the manufacture and supply of the solid state relay system for the Society organs. A claim against the company has been lodged with the Consumer Claims Tribunal.

The Spring Fete held for the first time this year was successful beyond our expectations and the management of T.O.S.A. express our sincere thanks to everyone who worked for the Fete at the Fete and who made and or donated items for sale. The Capitol fund benefitted by some \$3.300 dollars.

The record bar continued to be popular throughout the year when a wide selection of recordings were made available. We thank our members for your continued interest.

The refreshments at our functions continued to be well presented and we thank everyone involved in the smooth running of this facility under the leadership of Phil Wilson.

The radio program on 2CBA FM has now been running over 12 months and is a credit to Frank Ellis for maintaining the interest in Theatre Organ through this medium. Each program time in writing takes considerable the dialogue, deciding on the items to be used and timing them in order that the total program time is not exceeded. The live content of these broadcasts would not be possible without the considerable effort of our two members Ron Wilson and Bill Schumacher who have been making high quality recordings on their own personal tape recorders and cassette deck for the past three years. As a result of their efforts the Society has been able to provide artists with a recording of their concert to assist them in development of their playing technique, registration of the organ and their concert presentation. In addition, members have been able to borrow tapes from the tape library thereby enjoying performances in the comfort of their home. The management sincerely thank Ron and Bill for making this significant contribution to the Society and its members.

We wish to thank the membership for their support of the raffles that have been run for the Capitol organ fund and all members who have organised home organ parties for this cause.

We thank once again Ron Wilson for his long hours of work in preparing and printing TOSA NEWS to the high standard that it is presented every month. Ron has given many hours of his time to the compilation and production of the News and has had the full support of his wife Phil in keeping information comprehensive complete, hence making for interesting reading. There has been a willing group of helpers to put the magazine together each month and their assistance in this important role is very much appreciated. Doug Smith has filled an important role as assistant Editor by typing pages of the magazine, contributing articles and revues and chasing up information.

Ron has also spent many hours in preparing publicity for Concerts, printing tickets and Society forms and taking and developing photo's.

He is to be congratulated on the presentation of the Silver National Convention program in its entirety and also for doing a lot of the preparation of the audio visual publicity for the Convention. He was ably assisted by Barry Tooker, Rob Gliddon, Frank Ellis and Phil Wilson in that exercise.

Ron and Phil Wilson have saved the Society thousands of dollars in printing and production costs and for this very significant contribution the management is sincerely grateful.

Barry (flash!) Tooker has continued his good work as photographer.

The Palmers are doing a great job with concert bookings!

Frank Rohanek and his band of helpers have been looking after our Patrons in a most efficient manner at concerts.

CONCERT REVIEW

LEN RAWLE AT MARRICKVILLE

Wednesday evening 6th November 1985

This was a concert particularly memorable for its seemingly endless variety of registrations and new sounds; they had to be heard to be believed. Particularly noteworthy in my view were Len's Vox Humana choruses, discerning and effective use of tonal percussions and in places "Mantovani" strings.

Whilst Len did not hesitate to use the full power of the organ when required, he did not overlook some very light registrations of great delicacy. These, together with frequent use of the crescendo pedal, readily demonstrated the enormous dynamic range of the instrument.

Len opened his concert with considerable imagination; the first sounds were thunder and wind which gradually gave way to a wide combination of pieces under the general heading "No Business Like Show Business". This was so extensive it was almost a mini concert within itself.

Unlike most Marrickville concerts, where there are periodic introductions to set pieces, Len kept his comments to almost a minimum and devoted considerably more time to his creative playing. His introductory medley would, without doubt, have included more sounds than would normally be heard during an entire concert.

Towards the end of the first half, slides of London's well known tourist attractions such as St.Pauls, Westminster Abbey, The Tower, Buckingham Palace etc were accompanied by Len with Elgar's "Pomp And Circumstance No.1" on the WurliTzer.

Following interval, the second half began in Len's somewhat customary manner with his rendition of "Tuning The Orchestra". Items which followed included "Chatanooga Choo Choo" as well as "Blaze Away".

We also saw some slides of Len's home in the U.K. his family and his 4/25 WurliTzer installation, no doubt the envy of many!

This remarkable concert concluded with an encore - the "Maoris Farewell".

What a pity a greater number of members did not attend.

Well done Len Rawle!

DOWN MEMORY LANE

No.21 of a Monthly series by Frank Ellis.

During the early part of 1940, feature writer for Music Maker magazine, Ronald Roberts, interviewed a number of Sydney's leading theatre organists, regarding their views on the organ interludes they provided in their cinemas, and the difficulties they encountered in their profession. Among the organists he interviewed was singing organist Denis Palmistra, who had definite ideas to offer on the subject - ideas which, in my opinion, are just as valid today, so with my grateful thanks to Ronald Roberts and Music Maker magazine, I here reprint Roberts account of that interview.

"Denis favours the Medley Palmistra or Selection, wherein all manner of items are presented. In this way, he says, it is possible to please each section of the audience. It enables one to play for each of the "brows", so to speak - high, low and middle. It is a well known fact that what one person admires, another cannot tolerate. So, in playing a medley, it is practically certain that each and every one of the audience will hear at least one piece that he whole heartedly enjoys. Continuing, he stated that the ultimate success of such a policy rests upon how a selection of numbers is made, a combination of taste and judgement being essential. For instance, it would be foolish to play a combination of three bright and noisy items together, or to go to the other extreme and play a bracket of quiet pieces. Variety is the keynote of success or otherwise.

Palmistra then discussed interpretation. The most vital thing, he said, was to see that the number played received proper treament. In this it is necessary to see that the character of the selection is strictly adhered to, and no radical departure made from it. Round up in this question, also, is the point of musical training. He considers that a sound and very thorough musical education is something no cinema organist can afford to be without. A solid background of such training helps a great deal in overcoming the trials which are part and parcel of the game.

From personal experience, he learned that the type of audience governs the choice of music to be played, and the type of program screened, in turn, governs the class of audience to be expected. One is not long on the console without learning the reactions of the people listening. It is not difficult to tell whether they are with you, against you, or just merely indifferent to your efforts.

I questioned him as to his attitude toward singing. His reply was that he has no wish to make the song the presentation, and that as far as possible he kept the proportion of song numbers down to about 15% of his total program. But there is one big advantage in being able to sing - that is, that it makes a more direct contact with the public and adds quite a personal touch to the program. When the powers that be decide to change the organists around you might have to leave the organ but you can take your voice with you.

Summing up the position as regards presentation, he said. Always make it short and snappy and always aim to leave the audience in the frame of mind that they haven't had quite enough." End of article. I would say that they were wise words from Denis Palmistra whose career took him into most of Sydney's major cinemas.

During that same month in 1940, Ronald Roberts received a short note from Hayes, then being Regent Theatre in then being featured Reubert at the Brisbane. said, that he would shortly Reubert be passing through Sydney, but didn't say where his destination would be. My guess is he was just on a short holiday. Jim Williams was, at that time, relieving Owen Holland at the Sydney Regent whilst Owen took a couple of weeks holiday. Les Waldron was still in residence at the Plaza at that time too.

Would anyone believe that Saturday night audiences in the suburbs would accept an organist playing Wagner? Of course not, you'd probably say, but Barry Brettoner played an arrangement by American organist, Emil Valesco, (formerly of the Roxy, New York) of The Pilgrim's Chorus. Here indeed was class with a Capital

"C".

DOWN MEMORY LANE cnt'd.

First he played it straight and then in rhythym style. Some folk may throw up their hands in horror at such sacrilege taking place, but Barry did it very well indeed, and the audience lapped it up and applauded enthusiastically, and after all, audience approval is the name of the game in cinema organ playing.

That same month, Denis Palmistra came up with one of his best presentations. He featured Poet and Peasant and Liszt's Leibestraum, and his careful interpretation was outstanding. His use of the swell pedal was said to be an object lesson other organists could well take heed of. Those are not my words dear reader, but those of Ronald Roberts.

June the 1st that year, saw Western Suburbs Cinemas make the usual sixmonthly swop around of their organists. Knight Barnett went to the Civic Auburn, Barry Brettoner to the Savoy Hurstville, Ray Chaffer to the Enfield Savoy, Denis Palmistra to the Roxy Parramatta, Cullen to the Burwood Palatial, Clarrie Black to the Strathfield Cinema, and Norman Robins to the Astra Parramatta. Reubert Hayes went on holidays and was relieved by Reg Case, and as the clouds of war gathered, Charles the Melbourne Regent Tuckwell of enlisted in the services. Ron Boyce gave up his newly renewed contract with the Vogue Double Bay and joined up too. Len Davis was then at the Hammond of the Albert Park Theatre in Melbourne and had been accompanist to American Negro singer Bob Parrish, then a singing sensation in Melbourne.

Radio 2GB started a recorded session of organ music on Sunday nights but the Gremlins got into the works and fouled one of the broadcasts up properly. Several records, about 3 or 4 I think, played by Reginald Foort were announced as having been played by Reginald Dixon. That would have caused some red faces at the station.

Well, that's it once again - more bits and pieces in the next issue which will be the Jan-Feb one. Compliments of the Season to all "Memory Laners".

BRISBANE'S BEAUTIFUL REGENT THEATRE

Hoyt's Regent Theatre in Queen Street Brisbane was undoubtedly the most beautiful of all the Company's chain of Regent Theatres in Australia's capitol cities. Whilst not as large as the Melbourne Regent, it was more elegant, and certainly completely surpassed the Regents of Sydney, Adelaide and Perth.

The auditorium, finished in tonings of gold and bronze, had a metalic sheen to it which responded perfectly to amber or coloured lighting, and surrounded one with a feeling of luxury.


Its 3/15 Wurlitzer organ was a superb example of the theatre-organ builder's art, and, during the war years, was the most widely heard Wurlitzer in Australia, being broadcast by Reubert Hayes both nationally and to the military forces in the South Pacific. The program called "Forces Sing Song" went to air at the prime time of 6.30pm each Sunday on the ABC.

The Entrance Lobby, 20 feet wide and 75 feet deep, opened into a Grand Lobby 40 feet wide and also 75 feet deep, which was luxuriously carpeted and furnished. The theatre accommodated 2587 patrons in air-conditioned comfort and the proscenium arch was claimed to be the widest of any theatre in Australia at that time.

the management discontinued After the orchestra, the Wurlitzer was removed from its own lift on the left, and placed in the centre of the very large orchestra lift, with a grand piano on the right of the console and some percussive instruments on the The photo with this article shows the organ on the orchestra lift, and a very very rare photo indeed. The other photo shows the grandeur on the Entrance Lobby.

Sadly, the theatre is no longer in its original state, having been turned into a cinema centre housing four cinemas in December 1978.

Although blind, Richard has mastered the techniques of all organs, and his music shows a vast depth of feeling, as his many audiences would testify. His talents will be displayed as Richard puts the Christie through it's paces.

SUNDAY, 30TH MARCH. (b.t.)
