



"ON A SPRING NOTE" - #2

A themed variety concert, similar to the one staged in September at the Epping Baptist Church, will take place at St Mark's Anglican Church, The Mall, South Hurstville on Sunday 10th November at 2pm.

Featured artists include organists Margaret Hall and Tamara Rozek, saxophonist Owen Watkins, violinist Ann Nillsen, plus the Choir of St Mark's. A Viscount digital theatre organ will be specially installed for the afternoon and the church's Walcker pipe organ will also be played.

ORGAN AND SAXOPHONE DUO ON CD

Well-known Sydney organist Margaret Hall and ragtime saxophonist Owen Watkins are currently recording a CD which features the Christie organ in the Epping Baptist Church. The tone of the 1932 Christie organ and the acoustics of the church ideally complement the 1930 Selmer alto saxophone for recording purposes. The result is a certain "period" quality which suits the ragtime and novelty repertoire of the jazz agethe musical focus of this recording.

The CD's working title is "Elite Syncopations" after a piece by Scott Joplin.

We'll keep you posted on the release data expected early 2003.

Margaret and Owen featured with such spectacular success at TOSA's Marrickville concert in June earlier this year.

JOHN SENG

Allan Brooker of Belfield informed me of the death of well-known US organist John Seng, and Dan Bellomy, who played for us in October, announced the sad news on the Web:

For those of you who have not heard, it is my incredibly sad task to let you know about the passing of one of the most incredible musicians I have ever had the pleasure of knowing and hearing - not to mention being able to call friend - John Seng of Chicago, Illinois, passed away in early September of a heart attack.

John was a musical marvel at a theatre organ. Over the course of his career, he found sounds and did things musically that have wowed and amazed the most jaded of us. From the bench of the WurliTzer at Mundelein to the Yamaha electronics he promoted for a period, John never failed to make the most of whatever instrument he was playing at the time.

(John Seng's distinctive style was heard at the 1995 TOSA National Convention in Melbourne, when he played the Moorabbin Town Hall WurliTzer)

FESTIVAL 2003

In a letter to the Editor in the July/ August 2002 issue of the Theatre Organ (USA) magazine, Shirley Clausen of Portland, Oregon, wrote to encourage US members to attend the Adelaide National Theatre Organ Festival next Easter:

Though we live in Oregon, my husband Jim and I have attended several theatre organ conventions in Australia, and have become close friends of many of the wonderful folks down under. The conventions there are well-planned with fine artists, splendid theatre organs, and extra special activities as well. We would heartily recommend that ATOS members make

the trip down under. The featured artist at the Australian Theatre Organ's Festival in April 2003 will be Lew Williams, and of course there are many fine Australian organists as well.

There have been at least eight young people from Australia who have won their division in the ATOS Young Organist Competition in the past ten years (five of these from Adelaide, including this year's Senior Division winner) and three of them have gone on to win the over all competition. Several have gone on to become world-class artists.

This is a golden opportunity to find out what they do in Australia to attract so many young folks and inspire them to become fine organists. The Capri Theatre in Adelaide, with its magnificent 4/29 WurliTzer, is one of the very few theatres wholly owned by the local organ club, TOSA(SA).

Mrs Dorothy Van Steenkiste who lived in Detroit, USA, championed the American Theatre Organ Society's Young Organist Competition died on 5th May this year. Our members will know that in recent years many young members of TOSA from Adelaide and other cities of Australia have been successful in that competition and have won a trip to the USA conventions courtesy of ATOS.

It is with sadness that I have learnt of the passing of Dorothy.

Over the past twelve years the Australia Felix Chapter of ATOS has had contact with her as a most enthusiastic supporter of the theatre organ, especially to the younger generation of players in the promotion of the Young Theatre Organist Competition.

During that time we in Australia have had twelve winners of various divisions, including one in the *Hobbyist* division, and many have attended the ATOS conventions and met Dorothy. All of them have returned to Australia with glowing reports on her friendliness and helpfulness.

My wife Gail and I had also met her at several conventions and found her to e a most charming lady.

ATOS has been extremely fortunate to have such a hard worker as a member of the committee.

The results of her efforts continue to be heard around the theatre organ world.


My Harp is refugee from Ireland and, although the air is drier here, her voice is just as sweet.

ORION REPORT: Published in TOSA News. Moved that the Orion Report be accepted.

GENERAL BUSINESS: Moved that Patrons, Mr Ian Davies and Mr John Gorrie be re-appointed for the year 2002.

R. Marschall / P. Seward. Carried.

Moved that Mitchell & Partners be re-appointed as Auditors for the year 2002.

G. Brimley / N. Palmer. Carried.

Frank Lewis asked who determined the order of names on the ballot. Returning Officer advised the meeting that the names appeared on the form in the order that they were received by himself.

John Batts spoke about grants to TOSA It was explained the Committee had made approaches to the State and Federal Governments but without success. John Batts will make some more inquiries. John also spoke about our declining concert audiences and what they are doing in Canada to attract more people.

Peter Sheldon thought that we needed more variety at concerts.

Robert Gliddon advised the meeting that audience numbers had started to fall when we lost our weekly theatre organ program on 2CBA-FM.

Peter Held addressed the meeting.

Geoff Brimley spoke about GST and advised that the Committee was working through changes.

There was a show of hands re leaving concert tickets at the current prices. One dissenter - Peter Held.

Rod Blackmore advised the meeting of the results of the ballot. There were 77 votes and 2 were informal. The results are Vice-Presidents: Neil Palmer and John Shaw. Committee Members: Peter Harding, Ron Mosman, Robert Gliddon, Richard Marschall, Amy Caldwell, and Cliff Bingham.

MEETING CLOSED: The President thanked the members for attending the AGM and closed the meeting at 3.04pm. Afternoon tea followed. Then Barclay Wright took the group on a tour of the Mastertouch premises.

Organ Reports for Annual General Meeting Saturday 23rd November 2002

The Marrickville Wurlitzer has served the Society well over the last 12 months for both concerts and member's practice.

No major repairs have needed to be undertaken. The instrument is thoroughly checked the week prior to a concert and any necessary repairs carried out.

To aid in tuning stability, small oil-filled column heaters have been installed in the chambers to keep a constant temperature in the days between tuning and the actual concert day.

The Orion Wurlitzer has continued to give good service at our concerts, though we restrict the number of concerts at Campsie because of the high rental.

Early in the year we had the usual problems of access to the instrument for service but over the last few months we have been able to get in on Saturdays, even though we are not always free to bring the console up to auditorium height on the hoist. However we have adapted the wiring so that the organ can be played and tested from the console even while it is still below in its "garage".

The hoist has become a continuing and seemingly endless problem. It is at present very difficult to get it properly fixed and we have had to be very careful and patient to see that the upstairs "safety" fence is safe to use – that's when we can get it to go at all. We are presently in correspondence with Canterbury Council and the Orion Management to try for some action.



Dan Bellomy Concert Report

Orion Centre Campsie

Sunday 6th October 2002

When Dan Bellomy plays theatre organ, he breaks all the rules; or should I say, he writes a new rule book. His approach is bold, aggressive, even brash and, above all, exciting. Dan is to the theatre organ what Oscar Peterson or George Shearing are to the piano.

With a solid grounding in traditional theatre organ stylings, Dan has branched out very widely into the unlimited field of jazz, with spectacular and sometimes startling results. His concert at the Orion Wurlitzer demonstrated a mastery of the traditional, the ballad and the jazz idioms.

The console rose to the strains of Cosi Cosa from the Marx Brothers' movie classic A Night at the Opera. Played in traditional upbeat theatre style, this number has become synonymous with Dan (I hesitate to use the old phrase 'signature tune'.)

He followed up with a beautiful reading of 1Don't Know Why in which he introduced a feature of his playing that certainly intrigued this writer that of a very clever simulated string bass used with great effect throughout the program.

For the next four numbers, Dan introduced a guest jazz drummer, Laurie Bennett, whose understated accompaniments complemented Dan's jazz arrangements perfectly in I'm Beginning to see the Light, Lullaby of the Leaves,

Falling in Love with Love and Tangerine.

Dan revealed a hidden talent for composition when he played his own piece, Quiet Time, a beautifully melodic ballad and backed it up with Open Your Eyes.

To bring the .first part of the program to an end, he played a great arrangement of a Billy May original, Brassman's Holiday. I first heard Dan play this number over 25 years ago during a Thomas organ (remember them?) promotion concert at Hurstville Civic Centre on his first major tour as a product specialist for Thomas Organs. He has lost none of that wonderful, youthful ability and indeed it has refined and matured.

After interval, It's Time from Mame brought the console back up and followed with another wonderfully-constructed ballad from Miss Saigon, Sun and Moon.

Now that Dan has left Sydney, I can reveal another aspect of his career that does not appear in his CV -that of orchestral conductor. Some years ago, Dan spent considerable time in London during which he was offered the position of assistant conductor in the Cameron Mackintosh production of Miss Saigon and was privileged to conduct a significant number of performances 'without any major disasters'.

Drummer Bennett returned

for the next three jazz numbers: Teach Me Tonight, Fats Waller's Ain't Misbehavin' and George Shearing's Lullaby of Birdland. Lots of no-tremulant registrations interspersed with 'big band' full ensemble sounds were a feature of these arrangements.

Two contrasting ballads followed A Nightingale Sang in Berkeley Square and Willow Weep for Me.

For the final piece, Dan reintroduced Laurie Bennett and together they improvised on the great jazz number, C Jam Blues, which also featured a too-short (for this writer anyway) drum solo which allowed Laurie to "strut his stuff'.

Prolonged applause brought Dan back to the console for an encore - Something Wonderful from The King and I.

While Dan's programs not be to everybody's liking (and may well be a tad short), the sheer musicianship of this talented organist cannot be disputed.

Some people may possibly prefer a little less of the jazz idiom; some suggested that the drummer was a little too understated and could have played a little louder!

Most people this writer spoke to, as a sort of exit poll, thoroughly enjoyed the variety in the program and expressed the opinion that it was a change to hear our Wurlitzer sounding 'not like another Wurlitzer'.

our next artist : Len Rawle

With a family name that is synonymous with the very heart of the organ scene here and overseas, Len Rawle has the benefit of a family steeped in the tradition of theatre organ preservation. More than 40 theatre organs have passed through the 'saving' hands of the Rawle's! He is currently refurbishing the WurliTzer in the Granada, Harrow.

Born in Tonypandy, South Wales, in 1938, Len's classical training, starting at age 4, came from the London College of Music in Cardiff. Later, when his parents moved to London he studied piano under concert artist Martin David of the uildhall School of Music and organ under George Metzler at St. Stephen's, Walbrook.

Len developed his own style of playing entertainment music, first during National Service, at the small WurliTzer in the Ritz Aldershot, then at the larger WurliTzers in Ritz Richmond and Regal Kingston-upon-Thames. This was aided by close contact with several notable theatre organists, in particular George Blackmore, Joseph Seal, Gerald Shaw and Vic Hammett. He was also fortunate in having the UK's first residence WurliTzer, in the family home.

Eventually he purchased the famous manual WurliTzer of the Empire Theatre, Leicester Square, which became the centre piece of his selfbuilt home at Chorleywood. Described by many, as the finest residence WurliTzer in the world, he has savoured its rich golden tones for over thirty years. "To this day it remains a privilege to play," he says. He has recorded, broadcast and televised this, the largest WurliTzer in Europe, many times. Two particular highlights were, appearing on the very first the 'Organist Entertains' programme (plus many subsequent ones), also in the much celebrated and often repeated Sir John Betjamin BBC TV documentary 'Metroland'. He also appeared in Carlton TV's 'The Mighty Organ'.

Len was Musical Director for Yamaha UK for 17 years. As 'Mr

Yamaha' he helped establish the UK electronic organ market. He also structured a network of over 190 music schools, trained 400 teachers which in turn led to over 11,000 students being taught on a weekly basis!

Among others, he coaches Catherine Drummond this year's outright Winner (in both the UK and America) of the 'ATOS International Young Organist of the Year' competition.

His skills at teaching, lecturing and writing, in addition to his concert schedule on both pipe and electronic instruments, keep him at the forefront of the organ scene. In the UK he has been described as 'The Rembrant of the Organ' and in Holland 'The Sound Magician' as he invariably produces a wide variety of new sounds from the instrument at hand.

Len's musicality is called upon from time to time when theatre organs are transplanted or upgraded. He has a passion for organ tone and has acted as consultant for pipe and electronic installations both here, on the Continent and even in Australia and the USA. He is proud of having been invited to help inaugurate several reinstallations of theatre organs, in particular, the WurliTzer in Hobart, Tasmania, the LTOT Granada WurliTzer, Studio Tours Manchester, the famous 'Torch' Christie at Barry, the Sheffield Compton, the St Alban's Organ Museum WurliTzer, the Ashorne Hall WurliTzer and the new Woking WurliTzer. He is currently refurbishing the Granada Harrow WurliTzer, one of the handful of theatre organs still in their original venue.

Len has given numerous concerts and 'workshop sessions' in the USA, Australia and Europe. One rather special 'Educational programme' for children in Buffalo USA saw no less than 69 busloads arrive at the spectacular Shea's Theatre. 'Len's finest hour' comprised more than 2,500 youngsters, all of whom were absorbed in a one-of-a-kind presentation which introduced 10-15 year olds to the organ for the first time.

Over 30 recordings illustrate his ability to change his style to suite a very diverse range of recording organs.

His latest CD/cassette, 'Magic Melodies', is the first to be made on one of the few theatre organs in Germany. 'At Sundown', recorded on his much travelled Yamaha HS-8 is a big seller alongside two albums on WurliTzer, 'Riverside' and 'One More Time'. For 2002 he has requests to record three other instruments.

Happily married with three children and two grandchildren, he has an interest in full-size and large model aviation and has obtained his private pilot's licence. Len is keen on swimming and to "get away from it all" he simply hitches up his touring caravan.

Len has been honoured by a number of Organ societies. He is a Past Patron of the Theatre Organ Club and is a Vice President of the Lancastrian Theatre Organ Trust. He is also President of several other societies, including the Windsor Organ Society, the Ipswich Organ Music Society, the Dunbar Electronic and Theatre Organ Society and the Theatre Organ Society of Australia (WA Division).

He also aided the setting up of the Aylesbury Organ Society and the Netherlands Organ Federation.

Len enjoys his role as a trustee of a number of Organ Trusts. He is also Musical Adviser of the American Theatre Organ Society in the UK, and is author of a widely read and long running column 'Len's Notes' in the monthly 'Organ and Keyboard Cavalcade' magazine.

When his fingers are free, he edits the UK's ATOS Newsletter, just for the fun of it!

Len is one of those much sought after specialist artists who enjoys playing for the love of making live music in general and the many sounds of the Theatre Organ in particular. Each concert he has but one aim before going on stage as he says to himself, "Tonight will be my finest performance ever".
