There has been a lapse in reporting on Members' Events over the past many weeks. This is not to say that there has been a cessation of activity, even though certain dates caused cancellations: Marrickville was lost to another booking in March and April coincided with Anzac Day (April 25); a most rare computer failure silenced the Orion organ on May 12th.

Otherwise, notwithstanding these matters, on our regular days and times a cadre of regular organists and listeners have attended regularly, and here I refer to those who have provided music: Tom Barber, Graeme Costin, Roger Dornan, Kevin Eadie, Simon Ellis, Ian Georgeson, Craig Keller and John Batts. We have also heard briefly and intermittently from some of the young organists who are being tutored by Simon: Lin Chong, Titus Grenyer, Claudine Michael, and Nico Tjoelker. And among those who have attended socially over the recent months are: Kevin Clancy, Roger Dornan, Rob Gliddon, Neil Palmer, Barry Tooker & Pam, and Ross Wells. Ross, son of a well-known Sydney theatre-organist made his first appearance at a Members' Event in many years. And also an unusual moment was the request of Roger to try out his unamplified voice with several songs being accompanied by the Wurlitzer.

The most recent meeting (9 June) was the first time we met at the Orion for a 10.30 start. Happily the Sydney wet had not penetrated the console hoist-well as it had for the Chris Powell concert. Six organists played the Wurlitzer. Two listeners made a first-time appearance, **Clyde Shoebridge** (who was first to arrive by the way) and **Doug Matthews**; this ensured a tour of the chambers, too.

As usual, tea and coffee were supplemented by the generous provision by members of sundry comestibles.

Soon after 1.30 we handed over to Simon and the youngsters. Once again we are grateful for the cooperation of the lessee **George Khouri** and his brother **John**.

About David Gray



David Gray was born in Glasgow, Scotland in 1990 and first showed an interest in music at the age of four. He first taught himself how to play the piano by ear, and his first lessons followed a year later. At the age of 13 he began attending St Mary's specialist music school in Edinburgh with a principal focus on piano, but also started studying classical organ in St Mary's Episcopal Cathedral with Simon Nieminski.

It was around this time he had his first encounter with theatre organ, and the first instrument he ever played was a 3/8 Compton organ in Glasgow. With the help of Duncan Sinclair from the Scottish Cinema Organ Society, he began to learn to play the instrument, and in 2005 won the ATOS Young Theatre Organist of the Year competition. This led to great acclaim internationally for his skills as a theatre organist.

He has made many appearances in the UK, and was the recipient of the Ian Sutherland Award from the Cinema Organ Society (UK) and the Dean Herrick Memorial Cup from the ATOS London chapter. Towards the end of his high school studies, he chose to stop playing and studying classical organ as there simply was not enough time to do everything. However, he kept the theatre organ going as it is just too much fun and enjoyment to ever let go of! In 2008, David began studying piano on an undergraduate programme, with a full scholarship to the Royal Academy of Music in London. His teacher was renowned pianist Hamish Milne. In time between lessons and exams he remained as active as possible on the theatre organ scene.

He has since played concerts throughout the UK, Australia, New Zealand, USA and Switzerland. In June 2013, **David** graduated with honours with a Bachelor of Music (Performance) degree at the Royal Academy of Music in London. David was featured organist at the American Theatre Organ Convention in Atlanta, Georgia, in 2013. Walt Strony, one of the world's most highly sought after theatre organists, commented on David's performance:

"As I write this, David Gray just finished playing an amazing piano solo. Today we are witnessing the birth of a new concert artist—one with talent, technique and a quiet, unassuming personality that will win many supporters. In an organ world filled with mediocrity and, in my opinion, too many 'formula' players who are not at all original, it's such a joy and privilege to know that the future of the art form is secure."


This amazing young man is only 26 and scooped the pool in his final graduation recital last year from the London Royal College of Music, majoring in piano performance. In the same year he was awarded the prestigious American Theatre Organ Society "Organist of the Year" award recognising his contribution to this genre. His quiet demeanour, understated humour, and endearing accent brings immediate rapport with the audience, but these were only icing on the cake compared to his high level of musicality, expression, and technique throughout his concerts. Judging from the standing ovations and comments after them, the audience clearly look forward to his return performances as well!



REVIEW OF CHRIS POWELL CONCERT – ORION CENTRE 5TH JUNE 2016

"I feel right at home", said the UK theatre- organist Chris Powell, returning to Sydney after an absence of 11 years. Of course, he was referring to the 'elements' which chose to empty hundreds of millimetres of water over the east coast of Australia on the very day of his concert. Rather predictably, the audience numbers were down, but Chris heaped praise on the hardy souls who managed to brave the 'elements' to enjoy an afternoon of entertainment from this apparent 'hyper-drive' organist. 'Besplendent' in a vibrant red-coloured suit, he leapt onto the console and commenced what was to become a frantically-active program.

The TOSA promotional brochure iidentified Chris as "Bringing the Blackpool Sound to Sydney on the Mighty Wurlitzer". Having heard recordings of the Blackpool Tower Wurlitzer over the years, and more-recently seen 'YouTube' clips, it soon became clear that Chris was actually providing a very similar format on the Orion Wurlitzer, and a very similar spoken-word patter, typical of the format at the legendary Blackpool Tower ballroom-dancing venue.



Chris opened his performance with a selection of items commencing with the 'Dam Buster's March', largely setting the 'pace' and the 'sound' for the rest of his programme. The audience was equally impressed by the flamboyant criss-crossing of his legs skirting across the pedal board, and the frequent selection (and de-selection) of tabs and pistons.

Barry Manilow's 'I Write the Songs' was 'next cab off the ranks' which enabled Chris to exploit many of the lovely ranks of the Wurlitzer. A very brief pause to acknowledge the applause, and he was off again, but this time for an extended selection of the best-of 'My Fair Lady' involving 'I Could Have Danced All Night', 'All I Want is a Room Somewhere', 'I've Grown Accustomed to her Face', 'Show Me', 'With a Little Bit of Luck', 'On the Street Where You Live', and 'Get Me to the Church on Time'.

Chris next introduced a piece he included as a "tribute to the Scots", 'The Highland Cathedral'. He 'couldn't help reporting' that the piece was at one time being considered for a National Anthem for Scotland, but he added that it was ironic that it was actually written by a German for a German audience!! There it was in all it's splendour, with all the cleverly simulated sounds of the bagpipe drones and chanters. I'd love to know how he even managed to achieve the somewhat questionable tuning (or lack of it) of the bagpipes.

Surprisingly with virtually no break, Chris embarked on a full-bore throaty version of the ubiquitous 'Tocatta' from the Symphony No. 5 by Widor. The dexterity and general accuracy of the fingering was quite a feature of his performance, as was the sheer grandeur of the registrations. Equally amazing was Chris' 'seamless' transition from the 'Toccatta' to 'Rock Around the Clock'!! Bill Haley would have been most impressed. There's nothing like an eclectic mix. Chris leapt straight into a selection of mainly British pop 50's and 60's favourites with 'All My Loving', 'Yesterday', 'Down Town', Puppet on a String', 'Secret Love' (a US composition) and 'Hey Jude'. It was noticed that Chris employed a sort of 'shimmering' effect with his left hand, rapidly alternating between thumb and 4th finger with ascending and/or descending intervals.

Back to the 'Blackpool' theme with, as he put it, "Music from the Golden Mile", (the Golden Mile being the Blackpool beach-front promenade). Beginning with the legendary Tower Ballroom organist Reginald Dixon's opener 'I Do Love to be Beside the Seaside', Chris added 'Nobody's Sweetheart Now' (with some stunning arpeggios), 'Toot Toot Tootsie Goodbye', (with equally stunning pedal work and 'manual-surfing'), 'Around the World', 'Blue Moon', 'The Wedding of the Painted Doll', ending with Rachmaninoff's highly modified 'Prelude in C Sharp Minor', otherwise known as 'Russian Rag' by George L Cobb. The last item in the bracket was a vehicle for copious quantities of the apparently-customary gimmick of 'manual surfing', which seems to be associated with mostly British theatre-organists. At breathtaking speed, Chris' hands flashed between the three manuals, the impact of which was aided and abetted by having the benefit of the projection equipment to allow the audience to better appreciate the technical difficulty of the 'manual-surfing' technique. Needless to say, the feet flashed across the pedal board too, and it was observed that the entire console wobbled considerably under the onslaught. A real audience favourite.



As the post-interval opener, Chris launched forth with a selection of Latin American-influenced favourites including 'Brazil', 'Quando, Quando, Quando', 'Spanish Eyes' and 'Tea for Two Cha Cha' (complete with piano and castanets), followed by a change of rhythm and tempo to 'Jalousie -Gypsy Tango' (by the Danish composer Jacob Gade) followed by 'The Girl from Ipanema', by Antonio Carlos Jobin and a big finish with 'El Relicario' and another manual- surfing finale.

Onwards with some of the wonderful music of Cole Porter, including 'Another Opening, Another Show', 'You do Something to Me', 'It's Delightful'. Then came a very welcome enhancement to the dance-hall type programming, as TOSA members Pam Lawson and Alan Reid responded to an invitation by Chris, and superbly danced at the front of the auditorium to Chris' strains of 'True Love'. Maintaining the dance-hall strict tempo technique, Chris continued the bracket with 'Anything Goes', 'It's Alright with Me', 'Night and Day', 'Begin the Beguine', 'So in Love', and a solitary 'G sharp' pipe (not a composition by Cole Porter)!!! This last item was somewhat out of the control of Chris.

A seldom-occurring set of circumstances involving the ability of the computer controlling the organ, to accommodate many 'instructions' almost simultaneously. Chris' 'demands' at that time, caused the 'beast' to become confused and shut down, except for one pipe. He handled the interruption with 'aplomb', and after a 're-boot' of the computer, it was on for one and all again, and enabled him to bravely complete the piece

Undeterred, Chris 'launched forth' with Offenbach's 'undiminutive' 'Orpheus in the Underworld'. With some irreverence, just before launching forth into the 'Can Can' finale, Chris called out "Are you ready?" and of course, the audience responded with "Yes", to be rewarded with a super-fast rendition of this most-recognisable finale, complete with the criss-crossing of the legs skirting across the pedal board, and an equally impressive performance by the organ.

Some generous words of thanks from Chris to the TOSA crew and the audience members who braved the rain. Then followed some further opportunities for Pam and Alan to 'trip the light fantastic' at the front of the hall. They charmed the audience dancing to Vera

Lynn's 'We'll Meet Again', and on to 'You Made Me Love You', 'Bless 'em All', 'Daisy' Daisy', and 'Somebody Stole My Girl', all played metronomically-perfectly for dancing. Chris seguéd into 'Twelfth Street Rag', which saw/heard the piano spring to life again as an appropriate adjunct to this old favourite. The projection television display enabled the audience to better appreciate some amazing finger-work with the ubiquitous 'manual surfing' resuming at breakneck speed, culminating in a really big finish and applause for Pam and Alan.

As a finale to a very satisfying afternoon's entertainment came a change of musical genre, with a representation of the 'Last Night of the Proms', not unexpectedly including Sir Hubert Parry's 'Jerusalem', Thomas Arne's 'Rule Britannia', the traditional 'Sailor's Hornpipe' (complete with the statutory hand claps), and Sir Edward Elgar's 'Land of Hope and Glory', an all-British and totally appropriate celebration of Chris Powell's heritage, stirringly played – and grandly supported by our very own 3/17 Wurlitzer (and it's slightly embarrassed computer).

Apparently assumed to be the final item for the day, the small but very appreciative audience 'insisted' that Chris return to the console for one final item – 'Radetzky March' by Johann Strauss. Characteristically appreciative, Chris nevertheless 'fled' the stage with the audience ready for more – but regrettably it wasn't to be so.

TOSA(NSW) is to be congratulated for 'snaring' Chris Powell who originally wasn't on the calendar for 2016, but due to an advisedly-fortunate change of schedule delaying his performances in New Zealand, Chris was able to 'slot in' an appearance in Sydney before subsequently going on to Auckland and Tauranga. His style of performance and engagement with the audience is quite different to many of the artists we have been privileged to experience, and it was interesting to compare and contrast the presentation and musicianship of this very competent artist, and hope that it won't be another 11 years before we can again renew musical experiences with Chris.

Change to Orion Player Day arrangements

The committee has recently been working in cooperation with OMSS (Organ Music Society of Sydney) members and Sydney area pipe organ teachers to encourage young organists to experience and learn about theatre pipe organ. This has been successful and we now have five young and skilled organists who have had initial sessions at the theatre organ and now wish to learn more. To better accommodate these organists' availability, the TOSA NSW Committee agreed to change the arrangements for Orion Player Days. From June 9th the Player Days will still be on the 2nd Thursday of the month but the time will change – commencing at 10:30am and concluding at 1:30pm for TOSA members. The young player session will then run from 1:30pm to 4:30pm under the leadership of Simon Ellis.

The young player sessions will be run as tutorials and as such will not be open for participation or viewing by others. Regular players will be requested to leave the premises so that the tutorials may commence. We trust that the members of TOSA NSW will support this change as a way of fostering new players into the world of theatre organ so that the art form may continue.

An Excerpt from Fanfare

A section in the ATOS USA "Theatre Organ" Magazine May June 2016

"In the spring of 2016, in an ongoing effort to introduce young people to the sights and sounds of the magnificent Barton theatre organ, Joliet Area Theatre Organ Enthusiasts (JATOE) was pleased to have as our guests the Southlake Children's Choir from Crown Point, Indiana. The choir was founded in 1984 as a non-profit choral ensemble dedicated to offering a quality experience to children in grades two through high school in Northwest Indiana. The Southlake Children's Choir promises to provide a premier choral experience for children and audiences throughout Northwest Indiana. They live up to this promise by performing quality literature with excellence, providing age-appropriate voice training for treble singers, helping children build confidence and poise through performance, and inspiring a lifetime of musical involvement. The director of the concert choir, which includes students in grades five through 12, is Michael Cierski, JATOE

member and former ATOS board member and Youth Committee member.

For most of the students, this was the first time they had experienced not only a theatre organ, but a real, restored 1926 movie palace. The apprentice choir, grades two through five, opened the program with several selections. The concert choir followed, and when director Cierski the next piece required an organist, he asked, "Is there an organist in the house?" Young theatre organist Donnie Rankin, being up to the task, ran up to the Barton console and accompanied the choir's last piece to the delight of the audience.

Donnie's program followed, and he was quick to include some modern selections from the Disney studios as well as medley from *Star Wars*, and two selections from the James Bond movie, *The Spy Who Loved Me*. The kids' spontaneous applause at hearing familiar selections was heartwarming for the more senior audience members and families of the students. About halfway into Donnie's program, the students asked several questions about the Barton organ including where the sound comes from and how long it takes to learn how to play a large theatre pipe organ. Donnie was very patient in answering all of the student's questions and worked well with them. He also demonstrated the various percussions, traps and sound effects noting that everything being heard was real instruments, not synthesized sounds.

After the program, the students were invited to go on stage for refreshments and view the console and other areas of the theatre. The JATOE board of directors is pleased to be able to provide an outlet for schools and students in the area to experience theatre organ at its best.

For other ATOS chapters who operate venues that will accommodate large groups, we encourage you to invite groups to your socials. To see the faces of young people experience the theatre organ is truly a gratifying experience that you will not soon forget! And who knows? You may even grow your membership!"
