A Letter from Vice President Frank Ellis.

Dear Members.

As most of you already know, our member, Wal Cook has been in the State Hospital at Lidcombe for five months or more, and, unfortunately has had a leg amputated, due to gangrene. Wal has been a dedicated TOSA

member since 1963. At the August meeting, the Committee decided that a benefit concert would be a very good way of helping him financially and at the same time demonstrating that he has many good friends in the Society who are more than just "fair weather" friends. Our Honorary member, David Parsons, didn't wait to be asked to help - he immediately offered to donate his services for a Benefit concert, and the Committee quickly accepted with gratitude. This is just another of the many occasions on which David has displayed his regard for, and loyalty to, the Society - a loyalty, which is so generously given, that we tend to take it for granted.

Cec Cranfield, organ manager of Palings, very kindly agreed to make available to us, the recently arrived, all new, <u>Hammond Theatre organ</u> for a concert with David Parsons at the console. This new organ, a radical new concept from Hammond is the most exciting model ever to come from the Company. It has a traditional horse-shoe console, two 61 note keyboards and possesses no draw bars or tone wheels. Instead, it has large scale integrated circuitry, and is a true electronic theatre organ. Here then, are all the ingredients for a great night's entertainment-David Parsons, plus an outstanding new model from Hammond. The concert will take place on <u>Wednesday</u>, <u>26th September at 8 p.m.</u> in the Church Hall of St. Anne's Church (cnr. Homebush & Beresford Roads) at Strathfield and the admission will be \$2 per person with 50¢ for children.

I personally appeal to every member especially those who do not attend every concert, to please attend this one. At the opening concert of our Wurlitzer at Marrickville, we donated the proceeds to the Childrens Medical Research Foundation, and they received over \$1,000 from that concert. This being the first time we have ever set out to assist one of our own members, let's make sure the financial result of this benefit concert reflects our "mateship" as well as the affluent times we live in. If only 300 members bring along their wives or a friend, we would have a full house and a financial result which we would feel proud to hand over.

<u>Please</u>, dear member, <u>DON'T LEAVE</u> this concert for others to support - my appeal is to <u>YOU PERSONALLY</u>. Come along yourself and bring a friend or two with you.

I have already received \$20 in donations from 3 people and this will be added to the amount raised at the concert. Because stocks of the new Hammond "Regent" theatre organ are very limited, and delays in production and shipping are being experienced, it could happen that the

new instrument will be unavailable for the concert, but this is considered to be unlikely. Should it occur, however, Cec Cranfield will make available a suitable replacement organ. See you at the Wal Cook Benefit concert on Wednesday, 26th September.

SUCCESS STORY.

YOUNG AUSTRALIAN PLAYS IN U.S.A. CONVENTION

Members who attended the T.O.S.A. Convention last Easter, will remember the young man from the Queensland Division, who played our Marrickville Wurlitzer during the Saturday afternoon session of Cameo Spots. His name was Neil Jensen.

Until January of this year, Neil had never, ever seen a real Wurlitzer theatre pipe organ, let alone played one. He was given the chance to try our 2/10 one Saturday morning, and after less than an hour at the console, he so impressed our Vice-President Frank Ellis, that he was immediately invited to play a Cameo Spot at our Convention. The rest is history. He was an instant hit with Conventioneers, many of whom found it hard to believe that his entire Wurlitzer pipe experience totalled around two hours. He received a tremendous ovation which ended in the only way possible - he was brought back at the end of the show for a well deserve encore.

And now history repeats itself. In July, Neil and his mother attended the ATOS Convention in the U.S.A. and Neil was invited to play a 15-20 minute Cameo Spot for them. As in Sydney, he was encored, and chose to play one of the numbers which had won him such a warm response from T.O.S.A. Members. The number, "I Left My Heart in San Francisco".

Frank reports that Neil was given many opportunities to play theatre pipe installations in the U.S.A, including a giant 4/61 Robert Morton organ, during his Stateside holiday. It is gratifying to know that his theatre pipe organ debut was made on the N.S.W. Division's 2/10 at Marrickville. The Queensland Division are fortunate to have such a brilliant young player ready, willing and able when they open their Christie theatre organ in due course. He will be a great asset to them.

REVIEWS!

Vic Hammett at Marrickville.

The Marrickville Wurlitzer really was "pipin'-hot" under the experienced fingers of Vic Hammett on his return visit to Australia from swingin' England. A fair-sized and appreciative audience heard a balanced program of newies and oldies and all of them good.

As a confirmed Gershwin enthusiast, I thoroughly enjoyed Vic's opening medley containing favourites such as "I Got Rhythm", "Lady be Good," "A Foggy Day", "Fascinatin' Rhythm", "Biding my Time", and a rousing "Strike up the Band" with tuning up sounds and plenty of percussion accompaniment. A medley of Viennese waltzes were followed by the beautiful "Hashmiri Love Song", played as a bolero, and a selection of songs revolving around the theme of Japan, (with appropriate oriental registrations).

After interval, Vic opened up with a selection of numbers of the type of music that he obviously enjoys playing the most. Among others, we heard "Cheek to Cheek", 'Winter Wonderland" and "Brother can you spare a Dime" played in the exhuberant Hammett style that has entertained audiences all over the world. The serenade from "Hassan" was followed by a tasteful rendition of the intermezzo from "Cavalleria Rusticana" which showed off the lovely strings and voxes of the Wurlitzer. A swinging 'Sunny" was followed by the highlight of the evening - a 'Tenth Avenue" selection including a fabulous performance of the famous "Slaughter".

Encores were definitely in order and Vic included his very funny send-up of the not-very-good "Village Band".

To sum up, an enjoyable top-line concert from an artist who obviously is complete master of his music and the instrument and is able to effectively communicate his enjoyment to his audience.

John Atwell - Where Have You Been Hiding?

On Wednesday, 8th July in Marrickville Town Hall, a disgustingly small (but wildly enthusiastic) audience consisting mainly of the "old faithfuls" of T.O.S.A. heard one of the best concerts ever performed on the society's Wurlitzer. The artist was a young Melbourne organist named John Atwell, a medical student by profession (they seem to make good organists, don't they?) and obviously a young man with a tremendous musical future.

John's lively program opened with "On the Sunny Side of the Street" followed by the bright waltz "Belle of the Ball". The Carpenter's "Close to You" preceded Fats Waller's arrangement of "Ain't Misbehavin' Overcoming some initial nervousness, John then gave a brilliant performance of Mozart's 40th Symphony in its current swinging style, and continued with the recent hit "Tie a Yellow Ribbon". Space does not permit a full list of the items played but some of the highlights were Jesse Crawford s "High Hat" the march "Semper Fidelis" and a riproarin' "Tiger Rag". A magnificent performance of the Prelude to Act III of "Lohengrim" by Wagner (with some very adept double-pedalling) ended the first half of the program.

After a refreshing intermission (thanks to the hot drink stall staff) 'Sing Hallelujah' opened a bright second half followed by numbers such as 'Mountain Greenery', ''If I Loved You', a stirring theme from 'Lawrence of Arabia', 'Roller Coaster' (with more than a touch of George Wright) 'Sometimes I'm Happy' and finishing with two beautiful ballads, 'Fascination' and 'Goodnight Sweetheart'. Such a performance deserved more than one encore and John responded with 'It's all right with Mr' and a song very reminiscent of the late Horace Weber 'Look for the Silver Lining'.

It was obvious to the audience that a great deal of time had been spent on careful preparation of this program. John's technical ability, his imaginative registrations and his choice of music all added up to a top-line concert. It's a great pity that more people didn't bother to encourage this brilliant young performer by turning up at his concert. The loss was completely theirs!!
