REVIEW OF ETHNIC GROUPS CONCERT - DECEMBER '74 - C.J.C.

The All Nations Folk Festival Concert was held in conjunction with TOSA in the afternoon of Sunday, 15th December, 1974 at the Marrickville Town Hall.

It was quite a pleasant day and with prospects of a very interesting and spectacular programme of folk singing and dancing, coupled with music on the Wurlitzer organ, one would have anticipated a good attendance, and about 100 people were present, including a few TOSA members. Those who made the effort were rewarded with a very vivacious and colourful concert of great variety.

Many ethnic groups in national costumes danced and sang their folk songs to fast and spirited music, interspersed with solo items by a Greek vocalist and novelty acts by juvenile Ukranian dancers.

Enthusiasts amongst the audience took the opportunity to set up flood lights to enable them to record colour movies of some of the more spectacular dance routines.

Our well known TOSA member Joh Congert was the organist and in addition to playing introductory music he gave two brackets of numbers interspersed half way through the first and second parts of the concert, which covered a wide variety of items.

Some that come to mind are the March from Sempur Fidelis, The Merry Widow Waltz, Vienna City of My Dreams, Wooden Heart, Mack the Knife, Funiculi Funicula, and as Christmas was less than two weeks away he included a most enjoyable medley of numbers suited to the occasion. The organ was played with great gusto and the selections moved along at a pleasant pace. During interval, the Mayor of Marrickville briefly addressed the audience and congratulated the organisers and performers on producing such an interesting type of concert and expressed the hope that it may become an annual event.

After further mixed items the concert finished on a note of good cheer with representatives of the various countries coming forward to convey Season's Greetings to those present in his, or her, national language. The compere, Mr. Frank Ellis, in closing the programme thanked the audience for attending and the performers for a most colourful display of national costumes and folk lore and then with the combined cast assembled on stage Joh Congert began to play Jingle Bells on the organ and gradually everyone in the hall joined in singing chorus after chorus.

My only criticism was that the music accompanying the ethnic dance groups was amplified to such an extent that it was discomforting to many in the audience and should future concerts be contemplated this should be controlled to a more acceptable level.

Another matter which should be given attention is to arrange for more adequate publicity as it was reach that after arranging such a fine concert only a hundred or so were there to enjoy it.

VISIT TO MASTERTOUCH

On 29th January, over 60 people crammed their way into the small premises of the Mastertouch Piano Roll Company in Canterbury. It was anticipated that two groups would be accommodated to inspect the machines and roll making set-up but the Manager and staff of Mastertouch had to take us through in four larger than foreseen groups!

During the visit we were shown the methods of production used by this unique Company to produce player piano rolls and were made to realise that the

labour intensive care taken to produce Mastertouch rolls together with Company taxation is gradually forcing this company out of business. We heard unique piano rolls recorded by artists long gone and we saw roll playing mechanisms fitted to modern pianos and a Yamaha electronic organ. We also had the opportunity to hear a Beale piano and a Steinway Grand fitted with Ampico reproducing action. The music from these instruments was absolutely enthralling as the action produces every nuance of the performers' origal art. The inspection of Mastertouch premises proved to be so popular and such a friendly get-together of members that we must organise this type of inspection again in the future. If you have any ideas please bring them forward at a Committee meeting or to a Committee Member. At the end of the evening's entertainment Tom Halloran asked for a vote of thanks to Mr. Wright the Manager of Mastertouch and this can only be reinforced in these pages - it was fantastic.

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This month sees the continuation of the article started in February covering the reinstallation of Christie from the King's Theatre Gordon into St. Columb"s Anglican Church, West Ryde.

Once the blue-print stage had been completed and the knowledge of the team had been organised for the long job ahead, new problems arose. One was storage of all the parts at West Ryde while the work was in progress. The material, when collected for removal, filled three furniture vans. The long sixteen-foot pipes were too tall to fit under the roof in the space allotted at the rear of the church. Their shape had to be altered before they could be properly accommodated.

Rewiring was another time-consuming task. Fifteen miles of wire were used before it was completed. To keep costs to a minimum, various manufacturers were approached to scrap lots. As a result, the expenditure on materials

used in the whole project was kept down to £100.

At the end of the first twelve months, the basic layout of the new organ was completed. The work then settled down to a steady process of giving

new life to neglected materials and restoring their mechanical and electrical vim. This was a tedious period of trial and error when the skill and judgment of the three men directing the work were put to severe tests. Their enthusiasm, far from diminishing, was communicated to other people who readily came to their assistance with various special tasks. Excitement increased as the work progressed to the stage where the first experiments to test its efficiency could be made. After moments of suspense, three elated men heard the first notes issue from the

reconstructed organ. It worked. They knew then that they would accomplish the job they had set out to do.

There was only one minor relay fault in the construction. Otherwise the organ was a perfect example of what pride in craftsmanship, co-ordinated skill and endless patience and enthusiasm could

produce.

Much still remained to be done. Tuning and adjustment had to be carefully carried out, pitch and mechanical aids had to be corrected, and complete and instantaneous response to touch on the keyboards had to be assured.

There was too much air in some bellows, and not enough in others. The ranges of sound intensity between very soft and very loud had to be adjusted, and the air pressure in the pipes had to be regulated to ensure smooth, flowing harmony.

The organ responded to all this gentle and persistent coaxing and, after almost three years, the men who had restored its music were

satisfied.

The dismantled piles of wood, steel and lead, covered in a theatre's back-stage dust, were a thing of the past. In their place was a richtoned musical instrument.

Before the organ project was completed, many features of church atmosphere had been missing from St. Columb's. Good deeds, however, seldom pass unnoticed, and the news that the church was to have an organ stimulated other people to acts of generosity. Somebody thought the floor needed sanding and polishing and unobtrusively had it done. Then, one day, a new carpet appeared in the aisle. The Sanctuary was redesigned, and delicately scrolled fretwork added a touch of artistry to the rear wall.

In these sacred surroundings, the reconstructed organ was dedicated by Archbishop Gough of Sydney on October 2, 1960. As its pealing notes led the worship of the congregation, three satisfied men stood quietly by..

PROFILE FOR MARCH - Knight Barnett
Knight Barnett is remembered for his residency at the Adelaide 'Regent'
where he was featured at its 3/15 WurliTzer from 1949-1967; an engagement
lasting 18 years. He was the last of the 'full-time' Theatre organists
in Australia.

At the age of 10, having learned piano, he commenced taking lessons on the pipe organ. When only 11, he was appointed as organist at St. Luke's Church of England in the country town of Wagga Wagga. He continued his career and played at various Churches over the next few years, which included a long engagement at St. Peter's Neutral Bay. He studied Public Accountancy, and in the golden era of the Theatre, played organ and conducted orchestras in many of Sydney's theatres. He joined the staff at Radio 2BL, and among many other duties, conducted the Studio Light

Orchestra and assisted as announcer.

In 1929, Knight became assistant to American, Fred Scholl, at Sydney's 'Capitol' 3/15 WurliTzer. From there, he went to the 'State' as assistant to another visiting American, Price Dunlavy; residing at its 4/21 WurliTzer. Later on he was featured as resident Organist at both of these Theatres. Knight then undertook a successful tour of the suburban theatres and succeeded the American, Eddie Horton at the Kogarah 'Victory' 2/8 Christie, and later, at the 'Ritz' Concord which boasted an instrument of similar specifications. When Julia Dawn left the 'Prince Edward' Theatre, Knight took over and resided at its 2/10 WurliTzer for the next two years. He left the 'Prince Edward' in 1933 and successfully toured the New Zealand scene; appearing at the 'Regent' Auckland WurliTzer and Dunedin's 'Empire' Christie. Returning to Australia, he joined the Western Suburbs Cinema Circuit and played at the 'Palatial' Burwood, which had a 3/10 Christie; Auburn's 'Civic' 2/13 WurliTzer, the Parramatta 'Roxy' 3/10 Christie and at Hurstville's Savoy' 2/10 WurliTzer. In 1941, he left the Circuit to joing the A.I.F. On his return from the War, Knight joined the Hoyt's Theatre Circuit, and after residency at many of the former theatres, moved to Adelaide in 1949 to take up a post at the 'Regent'.

Over the many years that followed, Knight regularly broadcast from the Theatre over Radio 5CL on the Weekly programme 'Melody Land'. His wife, an accomplished violinist, regularly appeared with the S.A. Symphony Orchestra during this period.

Knight recorded several 78's for the Regal-Zonophone label and was a prominent broadcaster from the 'Civic' Auburn Wurlitzer. Prior to the closure of the Adelaide 'Regent' Knight recorded an LP for Moonlight Records. He played the 'Final Curtain' performance from the Adelaide 'Regent'; an occasion which was marked by the stage appearance of many performers who had starred at the Theatre in its past days. Although in his seventies now, Knight Barnett is still active in musical circles and has continued to render many thrilling performances in recent years.

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RECORD REVIEWS (Interstate Editors, please copy) We have news from the agent for Concert Recording Company in Australia that the Australian recordings available from them are becoming rare items and soon will be in the 'sold out' category. One particular recording that should be a must for every member of the society was made by Ian Davies at the "Capitol" 3/15 Wurlitzer and is titled 'Australian Style'. There is a booklet which comes with the disc of 20 or so pages, the photographs and information contained therein was compiled by Barry Tooker, Frank Ellis and John Clancy. This record alone is worth an enquiry from every member that doesn't at present own a copy. Telephone No. 631 6189.

"Out of a Dream" -Lyn Larsen; If you are a dyed-in-the-wool enthusiast of elegant theatre organ playing, being especially fond of subtle tone colours and sophisticated arrangements, then this disc is for you. After a rolling crescendo on the crash cymbal introduces a rousing version of YOU (from the 1936 film, "The Great Ziegfield") the Marr & Colton Tibia and Vox Humana croon to SONNY BOY. This 'tear-jerker' originally created in jest by Henderson, Brown and DeSylva, was sung by Al Jolson in the 1928 film, "The Singing Fool", and Lyn delivers it here on bended knee.

From 'Sesame Street', RUBBER DUCKIE is a bit of fun featuring the unusually loud 8' Kinura and a playful toot on the comedy whistle; followed by a moving version of the Swedish Folk Tune, HOW GREAT THOU ART.

The STUDENT PRINCE SELECTIONS are a grouping of favourites from Sigmund Romberg's 1924 operetta. The OLD PIANO ROLL BLUES is a not-so-old (1950) tune which gives the organ piano a chance to bang out a few notes. The Jazzy LOVE ME OR LEAVE ME, from 'Whoopee' (1928) makes use of the brush cymbal and back beat snare drum.

The Tuba Horn introduces Lyn's own ballad, THERE'S A PLACE IN MY HEART FOR YOU, which expresses the artist's sentiment musically. ME TOO, a 1926 novelty briefly features a synthetic Posthorn effect. George Harrison's beautiful SOMETHING contrasts the organ strings and Flute mutations against the Flute and Vox Humana, with solo passages on the Tuba Horn and a Tibia Clarinet combination, while brush cymbal maintains an easy dance beat. Then on to another dance the TARANTELLA, combining two traditional Italian dances in 6/8 time. All the traps are part of the organ and are played from the console.

YOU STEPPED OUT OF A DREAM begins with a Clarinet solo and contrasts Beguine rhythm on the untremmed Flute with the melody on two different Tibia Vox Humana combinations.

The Thomaston Opera House 3 manual 10 rank Marr & Colton Theatre Organ was originally installed in the Palace Theatre, Danbury, Connecticut. In 1967 Conn. Valley Chapter of the American Theatre Organ Society purchased and removed the instrument from the theatre. For a period of five years members of the Society re-built and re-installed the organ in the historic Thomaston Opera House.

In this recording we hear the results of the work carried out by yet another ATOS Chapter. Lyn Larsen's undoubted talent shows off the resources of this fine instrument to great advantage. It is not often we hear anything of Marr & Colton organs here in Australia so here is an appropriately to add a recording on this make of instrument to your collection and it is available from John Atkinson (587 3374) and Robert Gliddon (869 2083).

ATOS 20TH NATIONAL CONVENTION Celebrate 20 years of theatre organ history next summer in San Francisco, 'everybody's favourite city!' You'll hear Gordon Kibbee at Joe Chadbourne's "Myrtle," recreating the sound of our very first national meeting; and visit the incomparable 'Pizza Joynt,' where a whole theatre organ tradition was born. At Grace Cathedral, a special program will present the fabulous John Fenstermaker at San Francisco's most exciting organ, the 5 manual Aeolian Skinner, personally voiced by the legendary G. Donald Harrison. event alone would make a trip to San Francisco worthwhile. But best of all - better than Morton, Better than Wurlitzer, Better even than a 'Pizza Joynt' pizza-will be San Francisco itself: 'the Paris of the West'..'the City that knows how'...'the cool grey city of love' to list just a few appraisals.
