



A Nervous Wreck !!!!



TOSA member John Atkins of Campsie has provided the following interesting article which he found in the May 2001 issue of the Best of British magazine

MIGHTY MATLOCK WURLIN



The Old Methodist Church and school high up on Bank Road, Matlock, houses one of Britain's best-kept secrets.

What a beautiful country Britain really is, I mused as I stood at the summit of Bank Road, looking over towards Riber Castle and snowcapped peaks, down the Derwent Valley with Cromford and Belper in the distance.

My journey to the Peak District spa town of Matlock, however, was not simply to admire the breathtaking scenery, but to unearth one of Britain's best-kept secrets and, in so doing, discover the remarkable talents of Graham Fields.

Over the past 25 years Graham has dedicated his life to the painstaking restoration of an important piece of Britain's cinema heritage. Now, thanks to his skill and vision, the Old Methodist Church on Bank Road regularly echoes to the wonderful sounds of a mighty three-manual eightrank WurliTzer- meaning that it has three manual keyboards and eight different pipe voices.

Graham's passion for WurliTzer

organs began at an early age. "Like many organists I got hooked through visits to Blackpool Tower Ballroom and listening to the great Reg Dixon playing the WurliTzer there," he told

Graham's fascinating mission, to rescue the former Mansfield Granada WurliTzer began in the 1970s when the cinema in which it stood - originally called the Plaza - was demolished to make way for city centre developments. It contained one of the 96 wonderful WurliTzers imported into Britain from the United States during the late 1920s and early 30s. The organ had been installed in 1936 - to the specification of resident organist Harold Ramsey - at a cost of around £10,000.

Graham explained, however, that welcomed everyone WurliTzers. "What you have to remember is that they were designed to replace the ten or twelve-piece

orchestras which accompanied silent films from the pits, particularly in the larger cinemas," he said. "These organs saved the cinema owners quite a lot of money, but in so doing put many musicians out of work."


WurliTzers were often installed on lease-hire arrangements so that they paid for themselves over a period.

The man behind the WurliTzer company, which was based in North Tonawanda, Buffalo, New York State, was Rudolph Wurlitzer, an American immigrant who had no musical background or knowledge of organs, but made his money manufacturing vending and amusement machines. "He saw a niche in the market and exploited it," said Graham. "He was a clever entrepreneur who simply had the right factory and tools for the job."

By the late 1920s 'talkies' had already made their debut in American

to all but the larger establishments, and WurliTzers continued to be used. Even with the advent of talkies here in Britain, WurliTzers still had their place in the cinema, providing interval entertainment and, of course, playing the National Anthem at the end of each film.

The Wurlitzer Pipe Co. ceased trading during the Second World War, but the name was later purchased and revived by another company which became synonymous with the manufacture of compact electric organs and juke boxes.

Having performed its final anthem in 1973, played by the last resident organist Watson Holmes, the Mansfield Granada Wurlitzer, still complete with its original inspection certificates, was gifted to John Madin, who had sat at its console as resident organist for many years. John put the instrument into storage, and a few years later sold it to Graham Fields.

"I had to re-mortgage my house in Rotherham to buy it, and with the help of eight friends we made six journeys to collect it," he said. "The organ parts completely filled the house, so I just lived around it for a long time." Two more house moves were made, and thousands of working hours were spent restoring damaged parts before Graham began to think about suitable premises in which to reconstruct the instrument that had become part of his life.

Keyboards were stripped and the

cigarette-burnt keys re-covered with ivory; worn pedals were replaced and damaged pipes were sent away to be redrawn. Graham thinks the organ was cannibalised from other instruments in the WurliTzer factory at the time of its manufacture as the pipes date from 1926, ten years before the organ was ordered. Nothing was compromised in its restoration, however. "I took my time and got it right and used all the correct parts," said Graham. "That's why it sounds and performs the way it does today."

Despite his dedication to the task in hand, Graham did find time to marry Julie in 1979 and a year later they were joined by baby son Alister, who is now studying at university but still lends a hand on concert evenings.

After scouring Britain for a suitable building in which to complete their dream, Graham and Julie discovered what looked to be the ideal resting-place for their cherished WurliTzer in 1988.

The Old Methodist Church and adjoining school on Bank Road, Matlock, closed in the 1960s and had last been used by a local college. It had survived remarkably well, however, and still contained most of its original features, including a magnificent balcony with bench seating.

Between 1990 and 1995, as well as working on the completion of the organ, Graham turned his attention to the restoration of the church, which included the laying of a new maple

floor.

The organ was installed to fit around the family's living accommodation, the blowing gear down below, pipe chamber above the living room and percussion chamber, with its opening shutters, tucked away in the roof section.

The organ is powered by a threephase electric motor with more than 2,000 colour-coded conductors running to the keys.

The first concert was performed by Nicholas Martin in 1995, around which time Graham and Julie also conducted viewings of the vast mechanics of the instrument, much of which you hardly know is there when sitting in the auditorium.

The true value of Graham and Julie's remarkable achievement, however, can only be gauged by hearing this wonderful WurliTzer in action, and I was privileged to witness eminent organist Arnold Loxam put the Mighty Matlock WurliTzerthrough its paces. Arnold, still sprightly at 85 years young, braved the bitterly cold weather to make the journey to Matlock from his hometown of Halifax, in Yorkshire. "There's something for everyone tonight, I can guarantee you that," said Arnold as he addressed the audience before bursting into a marvellous medley of popular evergreens from showtime and screen. Smoke Gets in Your Eves was followed




by Somewhere Over the Rainbow and Singing in the Rain. Tea and biscuits were served at the interval before seats were filled for a second helping of music, followed by several stirring encores.

It was a magical evening's entertainment, made possible through the dedication and hard work of Graham and Julie Fields. Thanks to their vision, this wonderful WurliTzer will continue to bring joy and pleasure to many people for many years to come.

The State Theatre Sydney

As so often happens, Sydney news is to be found in all sorts of international journals, and not in our Sydney-based TOSA News. Some of our members must have heard the following news about the WurliTzer in the State Theatre, but evidently none wanted to share it with other theatre organ lovers in our Society. Too bad - truth will out (eventually!). Here is a letter, written by John Giacchi of Melbourne, to the Lancastrian Theatre Organ Trust in the UK and which appeared in the Autumn 2001 issue of their journal Vox Lancastria:

I learned from Ray Holland (the consultant appointed by the Heritage Council) several days ago, and confirmed by John Parker, that Greater Union have pulled out funding indefinitely for Stage 3 (which I think was the complete restoration of the Solo Chamber).

The money allocated is now going into the restoration of the State Theatre Ballroom. I have heard that it is intended to use this facility as part of a convention centre. Once this starts making money, if it ever does, money will then be put into completing the restoration of the WurliTzer.

Unsurprisingly, as I expected, the organ will not re-open at the 75th anniversary celebrations in 2003/4.

I hope that I am proven wrong when I say that I fear that the organ may never be finished.

Church Buys 3 ALLEN Organs

Some things in the USA seem to be done in a big way! This item is from the June, 2001, issue of ATOS International News:

The USA's third largest Methodist Church, with over 12,000 members, has recently installed three new Allen Renaissance organs.

Houston's First Methodist Church worships in two locations. The landmark downtown worship center now has a new Allen R-270 organ in the chapel alongside the church's 118 rank Aeolian Skinner pipe organ.

At their new 40 acre Westchase Campus, erected at a cost of \$40 million, an Allen R-480 organ has been installed in the 2300 seat worship area. This four-manual instrument, speaking from six main and one antiphonal chamber, uses more than 160 speaker cabinets. The dedicatory recital was performed by Dr Joyce Jones of Baylor University on September 23, 2001. An Allen R-370 organ has been installed in the adjoining Hinson Chapel.

In recent issues of Theatre Organ, Journal of the ATOS, Brian Pearson, of Adelaide, has been giving a summary of the most important theatre organ events in Australia for the benefit of the (mostly American) readers of the Journal. The following reports come from this year's July/August and September/October, issues.

The TOSA Easter Convention in Brisbane, the capital of the State of Queensland, was a great success. After a most inspiring opening address by the Queensland Division's Patron, Dr Robert Boughen OBE, who holds the two offices of Brisbane City Organist and Director of Music at St John's Anglican Cathedral, in which he convincingly demonstrated that classical organists have much to learn from their theatre organist confreres and vice versa, it was time to hear the Christie organ.

Over the last few years the organ has been undergoing extensive restoration, a great deal of it in the Maroochydore home of Don Clark, some 60 miles to the north of the city. He constructed a completely new console and new chests and transported them to inner suburban Kelvin Grove for re-installation in the assembly hall of the special music high school there.

The organ occupies chambers, purposely built when the hall was constructed, on each side of a wide and deep fly-tower stage. As usual when a rebuild of such magnitude has a deadline to meet, the organ was almost unplayable a day or so before the convention, but to say that it performed without a hitch and sounded wonderful is something of an understatement.

The French Trumpet rank in particular is to die for, but the whole ensemble of the instrument and its tremulation was most pleasing to me, and I didn't hear anything but praise from anyone who attended any of the concerts.

This 3/11 Christie, originally installed as a 3/8 in a theatre in Maidstone, Kent, and soon to have a Clarinet rank added, is a most welcome addition to the ranks of fine Australian theatre organs. It is to be hoped that the Style 260 3/15 WurliTzer originally installed in the Brisbane Regent Theatre will one day find its way back from private ownership in New South Wales to a new home somewhere in

that city, giving the Queensland Division two excellent organs to enjoy.

Richard Hills paid us a flying visit from his duties at Oxford University. Those of us who are privileged to know him as a personal friend were very pleased to meet him once again on our own home soil and, of course, his concert received a well-deserved standing ovation.

Nevertheless it was only one concert in an embarrassment of riches, particularly from John Giacchi and Neil Jensen. Two young Queensland organists, David Bailey and Robert Wetherall also gave very good accounts of themselves.

Other highlights included visits to the very fine organs in St John's Cathedral and the Concert Hall in the Performing Arts Centre, where Dr Boughen combined pleasing entertainment with a good deal of invaluable instruction.

The large Willis in the City Hall was also visited. It was also great to spend time with Dr Edward J. Mullins of the Jesse Crawford and Nor-Cal Chapters, who is a frequent and popular visitor to Australian organ events.

TOSA members from all over the continent attended the convention and a good representation of those who are also members of ATOS was able to attend a meeting of our chapter at which Graham Ward was elected President in time for him to bear that office while visiting the United States recently.

We are all pleased that Mathew Loeser won the Junior Division of the Young Organist Competition. He has been most capably entertaining us at the console of the Capri 4/29 since he was ten, regularly travelling the 70 miles to Adelaide from his seaside resort hometown of Victor Harbour to practice and perform.

Though we benefit greatly from the frequent visits of well known organists from the USA and Great Britain, it

is pleasing that these benefits have become a two-way exchange of talent in recent years as more and more Australian organists travel overseas to give concerts.

Eric Wicks, our founding President, died recently. I have known him for many years - ever since the first days of the Victorian Division of the Theatre Organ Society of Australia. Eric and I shared a profound admiration for the outstanding musicianship of the doyen of Australian theatre organists, Horace Weber, who opened the Style 260 WurliTzer organ in the Capitol Theatre in Melbourne in 1924, after playing smaller instruments in that city and previously in Adelaide.

The Capitol- the only one of its kind in the world, and in the opinion of some architectural critics, the finest and its organ became bywords throughout Australia.

Horace, who had been appointed assistant organist at Adelaide's St Peter's Cathedral when he was just 12 years of age, was still able to make magnificent music in his mid-eighties. His pedal skills were legendary and he frequently carried the melody line with his feet while he supplied the ornamentation with both hands.

More than anyone else, Eric befriended and supported a lonely old man in his final years - fostering a revival in interest in theatre organ music and in Horace's talents as well.

Eric couldn't stand second rate playing. He rightly believed that one poor performance could do enormous damage to the perception of the theatre organ as a serious musical instrument, and he became a trenchant but always respected critic.

It gave him great pleasure in his last involvement in a theatre organ event to be part of the Easter convention of TOSA in Brisbane, even though he was quite ill. The fine sound of the

relatively small Christie was part of this, but Nola, his partner of very many years, told me that his chief joy had been that he was able to express his unreserved admiration of the musicianship of Richard Hills directly to Richard himself. Praise from such a man was praise indeed, for many found him acerbic and his participation in meetings could be painful for the other members. These traits, however, sprang from his lifelong love affair with the theatre organ and his determination that it deserved only the best. During my Presidency of the Australia Felix Chapter, he was

unfailingly supportive. I am very far from the only person who will miss him.

Members, particularly those of Norcal, will be sorry to learn that Edward (Ted) Lloyd of Adelaide is very ill with mesothelioma, contracted when he inhaled asbestos fibres in the course of his employment. Ted has also had a lifelong love of the theatre organ, and he played an active part in the years of self-sacrifice and hard work which gave his home city its two fine TOSA organs-the 2/12 WurliTzer in Wyatt Hall and the 4/29 in the Capri Theatre.

When I visited him at home recently, he was openly weeping at the beauty of the string ranks of the Capri instrument to which he was listening. (Sadly, Ted Lloyd has since passed away - Ed.)

MARRICKVILLE ORGAN REPORT

During the first week of January I received a call from one of the members who has a practice slot on the Marrickville WurliTzer, that the blower cut out after about 20 minutes and successive coins in the timer would not restart it. A piece of wiring braid in the thermal overload of the blower motor's control gear had disintegrated. As this control gear probably came with the organ from the Prince Edward Theatre, it was decided to replace it with new equipment.

Fortunately we were able to call upon the services of member John Weismantel's brother who is an electrician. The new equipment was installed and after some initial running in problems over several weeks, the blower was back in full operation during March.

Other major work that was undertaken was the re-winding of all tonal and non-tonal percussions so that they are fed with a regulated wind supply.

The organ is in good condition and has seen regular use for members' practice and concerts throughout the year.

ORION ORGAN REPORT

We were impressed by a final report on the Orion WurliTzer which we received earlier this year, The sub-committee - headed by John Andrews - has recommended a number of changes in wind-pressures and air lines. Then the disposition of ranks can be finalised. It was a very full and detailed report and we plan to follow it through.

Unfortunately, due to a number of problems, and with access to the Orion severely limited we have not made much progress. However the organ has been kept in quite good operational condition, largely due to the good work done at tuning times by Ken Martin. It sounds excellent at concert times.

The fence around the organ hoist is in terrible condition, largely due to the rough way the Orion staff treat it. Last concert we had to gaffa-tape the mechanism to make it work. We hope the Council will help us with repairs,

We have had notice from Canterbury Council that they have granted us a sum of money toward the work of TOSA. Considering the high concert rentals they have left us to pay each concert, we can only hope this grant will be substantial.


