The phrase, most beloved by theatre managers, 'house full' certainly applied to TOSA's Xmas party at the Elim Reception Centre at Burwood on the night of December 5th. In fact, so many extras were pushed in about 3 weeks before the function, that the walls were almost bulging, yet we were still unable to accommodate quite a number of members, to their great disappointment. And it was a grand night indeed. After an excellent dinner, seating was quickly re-arranged for the entertainment to follow and our Patron, Ian Davies as compere wasted no time in getting the show rolling. He was also first to take his place at the console playing a bracket of bright and tuneful melodies suitable to the festive occasion. During the evening Cliff Bingham and honorary member David Parsons, were both heard at the organ and they were warmly received by the capacity house. Both gave their usual highly competent performances. Interspersed between the organists were a fine array of guest artists and these all contributed to a first class evening of variety. Baritone Alex Brunbeck sang a bracket of well chosen songs in a delightful manner and violinist Peter Eqri displayed his mastery of the violin. He was accompanied on the piano by his sister Susan. Master of magic, Cec Dalgleish, amazed all with his spectacular tricks and illusions despite the fact that the audience were in very close proximity indeed. At such close quarters, his huge guillotine with Mrs. Pam Tooker's head on the block, looked a fearsome sight, and I guess all, including Pam, were relieved when the huge blade descended without damage to the victim. Everyone present agreed that this was the greatest Xmas party we had ever held and that it had been a spectacular success. 'ORGAN STOP" PIZZA PARLOR!

From the pages of the USA newspaper, "The Arizona Republic" published in Phoenix comes the very interesting news that organ buff, Bill Brown, has done it again. Yes indeed! "In Phoenix, Bill Brown built a pizza parlor so he'd have some place to put his theater organ. That's a somewhat backward way to get into the restaurant business, but then what do you do with a magnificent \$25,000 instrument that would be the envy of any theatre in America?" Bill Brown has another Wurlitzer at home too! The Organ Stop Pizza Parlor Wurlitzer originally had three manuals and fourteen ranks of pipes when it was installed in the Egyptian Theatre. (It was from the Egyptian Theatre that Fred Scholl came to open Sydney's Capitol Theatre in 1928.) In 1954, Harvey Heck bought the instrument and installed it in his home adding 13 more ranks of pipes to it, plus the four manual console from the Missouri Theatre in St. Louis. When the instrument is fully installed in the pizza parlor it will have 28 ranks altogether, that is one more than when it was installed in the Heck residence, and fourteen more ranks than it had in the Egyptian Theatre.

Your Editor is indebted to an American friend, now resident in Australia, for the item from the Phoenix newspaper. This same friend incidentally helped install the Bill Brown residence Wurlitzer some few years ago. Yup -- I think we could say Bill Brown's done it again with, not ONE but TWO mighty Wurlitzers to maintain from now on. By Heck -- he's done it!!

CONVENTION NOTE

N.S.W. members should remember that it will be at least three or four years before another Convention can be held in Sydney. It may be 1977 before you can attend another Convention in your own Sydney town. The cost for a two day event of six functions and a dinner for only \$9.50 each is a very inexpensive one indeed. MINUTES OF THE 1972 ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING OF THE THEATRE ORGAN SOCIETY OF AUSTRALIA HELD AT ST. ANNE'S CHURCH OF ENGLAND HALL, STRATHFIELD ON MONDAY, 24TH JANUARY, 1972 AT 8.15 P.M.

Members were welcomed to the Meeting by the President, Mr. Neville Wright.

APOLOGIES: Mrs. Joyce Walker and Mr. Des Russell.

 $\overline{\text{Dunn.}}$ of the Annual General Meeting, 1971 were read by the Secretary, Mrs. Phyllis $\overline{\text{Dunn.}}$ Moved by Mr. W. Schumacher, seconded by Mr. T. Halloran that the Minutes be accepted as a true record - Carried.

REPORTS:

The <u>President</u> gave his report and thanked all who had helped him during the past year. Plans to purchase the organ in the Capitol Theatre, Sydney, were being made and members were invited to donate or lend the sum of \$3,400 being needed. Reginald Porter-Brown's coming visit was also brought to notice. The President's Report was received with acclamation, being moved by Mr. F. Ellis and seconded by Mrs. P. Tooker.

The <u>Secretary</u>, Mrs. Phyllis Dunn gave a very comprehensive and encouraging report, copy of which is on previous page of Minute Book. Accepted with acclamation, the Secretary's report was moved by Mr. F. Ellis, seconded by Mr. B. Schnitzer.

The Treasurer, Mr. Oscar Moen, expressed special thanks to people who had had parties in their homes in an effort to raise funds. He also thanked Committee members for their help, especially the Secretary and Mr. Rod Blackmore. As the Financial Statement and Balance Sheet had been published in the January, 1972 edition of "TOSA" News, Mr. R. Blackmore moved the adoption of the Treasurer's Report, which was seconded by Mr. T. Halloran - Carried.

RESIGNATIONS:

The following resignations were announced by Mr. F. Ellis:-

Mr. Neville Wright: President. Mr. Ian Griggs and Mr. Col. Tringham: Committee. Mr. Aubrey Byrne: TOSA News Committee. Mrs. Joyce Walker: Minute Secretary. Mrs. Phyllis Dunn: Secretary.

Mr. Frank Ellis complimented all retiring members for their individual contributions to the Society's affairs.

<u>ELECTION OF OFFICERS FOR 1972</u>: It was announced that Mr. C. Tringham would be Returning Officer. Mr. Somerville and Mr. Lawson volunteered to assist as Scrutineers. The ballot resulted in the election of the following officers:-

President - Mr. T. Halloran. Vice Presidents - Messrs. Ellis and Russell. Secretary - Mrs. Betty Randall Treasurer - Mr. Oscar Moen.

Minute Secretary - Mrs. Shirley Nott.

Committee - Messrs. Blackmore, Garrett, Irwin, Richards, Schumacher, Tooker.

Tosa News Editor - Mr. A. Kitley.

Diaphone Editor - Mr. Rod Blackmore.

Honorary Member - Mr. David Parsons. Patron - Mr. Ian Davies.

Honorary Auditor - Mr. Rod. Blackmore.

The President, Mr. T. Halloran, invited Mr. Ian Davies, our new Patron to address the members.

Mr. Davies thanked the members of the N.S.W. Division of T.O.S.A. for electing him to take over the patronage of this section from such a famous person as Reginald Dixon. He was quite thrilled and an honour to him and hoped to be able to live up to this position for many years to come. Mr. Davies reminded members that the Society must become progressive. He said he would like the members to get right behind the Committee and support their efforts. We must move with the times as we are living in Space Age 1972.

The President seconded these remarks amid generous applause.

SPECIAL BUSINESS:

By Law 16A. The President reminded members that the By Law 16A required ratification,

(a) Nominations for office to close 6 weeks before Annual Meeting.

Nominations to be signed by two financial members, as proposer and seconder; and also by the nominee, to indicate his willingness to be nominated.

Moved by Mr. Rod. Blackmore, seconded by Mr. Frank Ellis that the By Law be amended as above - all in favour - Carried.

"Tosa News" Editor. Mr. Blackmore moved and seconded by Mr. Ellis that the "Tosa News" Editor could be elected at the Annual General Meeting. There was no discussion and the motion was carried.

GENERAL BUSINESS:

Capitol Theatre Organ Purchase Discussion. The President, Mr. Halloran advised members that the organ had been offered to the Society at a purchase price of \$5000. Members having already indicated that they are in favour of the purchase, the President formally requested that the meeting ratify the Society's purchase of this organ. Moved by Mr. Lawson, seconded by Mr. Somerville that the Capitol Theatre Organ be purchased at a price of \$5000.

Discussion on Finance.

Further loans and other donations were made during the discussion and it was moved by Mr. Ellis, seconded by Mrs. P. Dunn that transfer of funds be made from Electronic Organ Fund and General Fund to Pipe Organ Purchase Fund, specifically as a loan, in order to cover the purchase - Carried.

Mr. Treasurer advised that the Commonwealth Trading Bank had agreed to a 3 year loan, if necessary, for \$2000 reducible 74%.

A very lengthy discussion then followed on the fact that we still have to negotiate with the new Lessee of the Capitol Theatre. It is understood that Sydney City Council is still calling tenders for the lease of the theatre and these tenders will be considered at their February meeting.

Mr. Somerville brought up the subject of a final concert and a discussion followed pertaining to date and recording for a final concert before 12th February, 1972.

Discussion ensued by several members on location of Capitol Organ and the President called for a motion in this regard. Mr. B. Tooker moved that the matter be left to the Executive to consider all aspects of locating the organ. Seconded by Mr. E. Smith. All in favour - Carried.

Removal of Organ - Mr. Lawson in favour of executive committee presently handling the Capitol Theatre maintenance to remove organ as they will insure this to be carried out in a proper manner. Mr. R. Gliddon moved that Mr. Barry Tooker be placed in charge of removal arrangements. Seconded Mr. W. Schumacher - Carried.

Mr. Somerville referred to A.G.M. 1971. Mr. Somerville proposed a scheme whereby members could be swiftly advised of functions to be held at short notice. Notices were printed in 'Tosa News' and Mr. Somerville thanked those who did reply. However, as the number of replies considering the total membership was not very encouraging (approx. 60) the matter was to be dropped.

Discussion on heavy promotion required for future concerts. Mention was made of charities, in particular, Children's Medical Research Foundation - one of the few charities prepared to assist and the inclination of everyone in supporting childrens' foundations.

Central Methodist Mission Concert. Mr. Eric Smith referred to the organ concert and film premiere held at the Lyceum Theatre, which raised over \$5000 for Central Methodist Mission and extended sincere thanks from the Central Methodist Mission to the Society for their assistance.

The Meeting closed at 9.35 p.m., the President introducing Ray Thornley who entertained the members on a Lowrey Organ.

Note re Purchase of Capitol Organ

In order that the Society could finance the purchase of the Capitol Organ in January, 1972 for \$5000, all funds of the Society were pooled and in addition Members contributed \$1015.40 by way of donations and \$791 by Interest free loans. A temporary bank loan of \$1500 was also required for 3 months.

The present position is that there is still owing the \$791 Loans advanced from members and also the funds borrowed from the Electronic Organ Construction Fund \$684.64 and the Marrickville Organ Maintenance Fund \$330.39.

PROPOSED T.O.S.A. WORLD TOUR COMMENCING JULY 1973

Probably for the first time an overseas tour for Theatre Organ enthusiasts is to be arranged to leave Australia in July 1973, to coincide with the convention of the American Theatre Organ Society (A.T.O.S.) in Portland Oregon early July. Unfortunately the date for the convention has not yet been fixed, however Mr. Erwin Young Jr. the new president of A.T.O.S. promises wonderful hospitality, at the convention and with various chapters of A.T.O.S. in the U.S.A., as well as visits to various home installations, the huge instruments in Los Angeles, Chicago and Radio City New York with its 4/58.

The tour will be available to members of T.O.S.A., their friends or anyone interested and will be made up in two sections, one part for U.S.A. only with the optional extension to Europe. The following is a brief resume of the proposed itinerary:-

Early July 1973

Leave Australia by air with a night in Honolulu. On to Los Angeles for three nights to include a day in Disneyland. Two nights in San Francisco, on to Portland for about a week, with five days at the convention and two days touring in the beautiful Rocky Mountains country of north west U.S.A. and Vancouver. By air then to Detroit, Chicago, a stop at Niagara Falls. New York for three days, Washington for three then return to Australia with a stop at Tahiti to rest up. This section would take about one month. As a guide only the approximate cost would probably be about \$1290, to include all travel from Sydney and back to Sydney, accommodation, hospitality and touring. Meals would be additional at about \$7 per day.

It is hoped to have a tour leader with the group to attend to all small details so it would be ideal for people travelling on their own and a wonderful opportunity to see and hear some 'mighty fine music' with the opportunity to play some unusual instruments.

To include U.K.

This extension will make it a round world tour, and is designed to include:-

Air travel Washington-London. Five days free in London which accommodation is included in the cost. Then a coach tour in U.K. to include Devon, Cornwall, Wales, Blackpool (not to be missed) Manchester with its BBC installation, then on to Edinburgh, York and then back to London, visiting points of interest. This tour would be for fourteen days.

Members of the group could take optional tours to Europe or elsewhere which can be arranged before departure, or whilst in England.

As a guide, an approximate cost for the extension to U.K. to include the five days accommodation in London, fourteen day coach tour, with all meals and accommodation and air travel back to Australia, per person \$1800. These approximate prices are on a SYDNEY/SYDNEY basis.

Amend Rule 10 to read:

The President, 2 Vice Presidents, the Secretary, the Treasurer and six committee members and a Minute Secretary shall be elected at the Annual Business Meeting to hold office until the next Annual Business Meeting.
