The Mighty Wurlitzer

An article by TOSA Member Richard Benham

The Mighty Wurlitzer certainly came from humble stock. It began with Rudolph Wurlitzer, who, born in Saxony in 1831, did what thousands did in Europe in the 1800's; sailed to America, the Land of Opportunity. With only a smattering of English and even less money, Rudolph came to the East Coast in 1853. The Wurlitzer family had been making musical instruments since 1659 so it was probably inevitable that Rudolph would seek to tap into that market. Having saved the not inconsiderable sum of \$700.00, he invested it all into a shipment of various Wurlitzer instruments which he set about selling into what was probably a market short of quality stock.

He must have been a good salesman and a smart business man because after only 3 years he had a lucrative and growing business in Cincinnati. He took American citizenship in 1859. He was soon joined by two brothers, Anton and Franz and from then on the Wurlitzer Company thrived. In 1880 they produced their first piano and coin-operated musical instruments also went into production. In the 1890's, Wurlitzer merged with DeKliest, owner of the North Tonawanda Barrel Organ Works.

In 1904 they were joined by Farny Wurlitzer who saw the potential market for musical instruments, including organs, to be used in accompanying silent movies. These were first housed in piano cases. In 1909 Wurlitzer acquired the patents etc. which were the property of the insolvent inventor Robert Hope-Jones whose life and work is well known to all organophiles.

Skillful marketing and a quality product soon made Wurlitzer the best known and most prestigious provider of theatre pipe organs in the world. The term "Mighty Wurlitzer" was born. In 1926 the Company was sending out one complete pipe organ every day! and by 1931 the Company was grossing \$6 million per annum. A lot of money back then.

The first genuine Wurlitzer is reputed to have been the Style L, 2/6, produced around 1912. Nine of this model were built. It did not have the horseshoe console, later to become so "theatre organ" but it did have a concave pedal board and a detached console. The price was around \$9,000. Probably the first organ designed specifically for a Theatre was the 3/17 (some say3/16) instrument installed in 1914 in the Liberty Theatre, Seattle, at a cost of \$45,000. In 1955 this organ was removed to the Pacific Lutheran University and in 1973 it was sold for \$5,000 to the Spokane 1st. Church of the Nazarene where it resides today, greatly enlarged and refurbished. It is said that this was the first Wurlitzer in Jesse Crawfords's life. Crawford was fascinated when he heard it played by Henry B. Murtagh. As we know, Crawford "The Poet of the Organ" reached the pinnacle of his career at the New York Paramount Wurlitzer and rarely played any other brand of instrument. The rest is history.

Having trained under William Whitehead at Kings School Rochester, he became Organ Scholar at Exeter College Oxford, studying with David Sanger. Further organ scholarships followed at Portsmouth Cathedral and Westminster Abbey. He now pursues a freelance career and is Organist at St Mary's, Bourne Street.

His career in the theatre organ world has been equally prestigious. He has numerous prizes and awards to his credit, both in this country and in the USA, where he was named 'Organist of the Year' by the American Theatre Organ Society in 2010 in honour of his contribution to the art form. He has appeared many times on national and international radio and TV and has several recording credits. He has a particular interest in the music and playing of Quentin Maclean, legendary organist of the Trocadero Elephant & Castle in the 1930s.

He has appeared many times on national and international TV and Radio, including solo appearances on programmes as diverse as Radio 3 Choral Evensong and Radio 2's 'Friday Night is Music Night', and has several recording credits. His most recent solo recording was made on the magnificent dual-purpose Compton organ of Southampton's Guildhall. He performed on the Royal Albert Hall organ for the BBC Proms in 2013. The Royal Albert Hall organ is an 1871 Willis and Sons instrument which has had two rebuilds by Harrison and Harrison and finally Mander Organs.

When not on the bench **Richard** serves as Musical Advisor to the Cinema Organ Society and maintains a practical interest in organ building.


History of the Kelvin Grove Christie Theatre Pipe Organ Part 2

But like a living, breathing organism, it too gets sick. The ageing 1934 wiring, relays, chest motors, stop tab mechanism etc were now randomly going on strike. In February 1988 it was decided to install solid state multiplexing led by Arthur Midgley. This modern-isation was felt necessary in order to provide reliable service of the organ. The organ's hardware was also overhauled and 12 TOSA volunteers aided in this work. Multiplexing allowed cabling between the console and the chambers to be reduced by up to 95%, doing away with the old relays and contacts in the chambers. This work took over 2,000 man hours. Power supply and regulation problems meant that it was not completed until December 1988. However, ongoing problems meant that the organ was not ready until April 1989.

With the Christie up and running again, members threw themselves into using the organ again for more concerts, spectaculars and playing sessions.



In January 1990 the console was given a new coat of paint.


Simon Pierce (of City Hall Willis fame) was called on to tune and regulate the organ. During the school holidays in 1991, 15 major overhaul tasks were completed by 25 volunteer members. Over \$18,000 was spent on the instrument from 1988 to end of 1991. Fortunately, funds from many well-supported events defrayed the costs.

By the mid-1990s, the limitations of the old console was becoming more evident with gremlins appearing at some embarrassing moments for some artists and players. Len Rawle was one such recipient. The maintenance chairman reported in December 1994 that there we 33 items needing work on the organ, from pipes to wind chests to percussion to trunklines to the console and piano.

The Restoration Decision

In October 1995, Don Clark took over the maintenance of the Christie as Vice-President for Restoration. He undertook a thorough examination of the organ and reported to committee in early 1996 that the console needed major work, much of it urgent. The chambers also were in need of attention. In an effort to guarantee reliability and ease of use, it was decided to scrap the old console and for Don to build a completely new one. Repair work commenced and Don and team had the Christie back working by May 1996. A month or so later, water leaked into the Tuba chest in the Solo chamber (right of stage). So in July, the

Christie was again closed down for major work.





The restoration project involved the re-leathering of regulators and tremulants and the re-leathering of all the pneumatic motors in the chests, in the toy counter, the tuned percussion; and replacing leather on the lips of some of the wooden pipes. Also, all wooden surfaces including the wooden pipes were sanded down and re-finished. All metal pipes were thoroughly cleaned, and where needed, the bent pipes straightened. As before, during the Christie's lengthy silence, electronic organs kindly supplied by the city music houses (Ellaways, Fords, and Buntings in this case) would substitute at the hall.

In October 1996, Russ Evans in USA sourced an Orchestral Oboe rank and Don Clark was also able to locate a Clarinet rank, both in good condition and at a bargain price. The committee agreed to the purchase of these and now space in the chambers had to be found. The Tuba rank was to be moved from the Solo to the Main chamber. It was decided that the Main chamber would be tackled first with a major rebuild.

Tremulants were rebuilt as were the regulators. New plastic wind lines were installed. New regulators/trems were provided to sustain all ranks, including the new Clarinet for the main chamber and the Orchestral Oboe for the Solo chamber. Even the swell shutters were looked at. The Chrysoglott was repositioned on the side wall above the reorganised Multiplex panel. By June 1997, the Main chamber was completed and David Bailey played the first notes of the "new" Main chamber organ on 27 June 1997. The Solo chamber was silent.

Work on restoring the Solo chamber commenced that July. As before, everything was dismantled and rebuilt. The Christie was able to be used for meetings (minus Solo chamber) from September 1997 and in October the Chrysoglott was back online. During 1998, Don Clark worked his way through the Solo chamber ranks and hardware. To bring the organ up to today's standard in theatre pipe organs, all bass offsets have been taken off tremulants and seven new regulators and two new tremulants have been added. Three new ranks were added, as mentioned, to the original eight, these being Clarinet the Main chamber (last to go in), Orchestral Oboe and Solo String (both in the Solo chamber). The Tuba was moved to the Main chamber and the French Trumpet moved from the back of the Solo chamber to the front and the Chimes repositioned on the back wall. The Diapason has been extended to 2 foot and the Concert Flute has been extended down to 16 foot.

The chambers were redesigned so that tuning became easier, with the placement of tuning walkways closest to the reed pipes (which need to be tuned regularly) and the maximum space used for the organ's expansion.

The Third Console

Since the second console of the organ was converted from a twomanual to a three-manual console, all the measurements were incorrect, therefore making it uncomfortable for the organist to play. The ergonomics were just not right. To fix the problem, a lot of modification would have to be done to the console and still the problem might not be fixed.

Bearing this in mind, as well as the internal hardware difficulties and horseshoe configuration, it was decided to build a completely new console from scratch around the existing toe pistons, the swell pedals, the pedal board, the keyboards and some trim timber from the old console's pedals and their pistons' mounting plate. The bench seat and 'Christie' music rack were also retained. The new console was to be made out of Western Red Cedar in a polished wood grain finish.



Review of Dwight Beacham show at the Orion Wurlitzer Sunday 19th October, 2014

To those of us who spent some of our careers in the Public Service, we are aware of the propensity of the Public Service to use acronymns. I thought a perfect acronym for Mr Beacham's concert would be "PSA" – Pleasant Sunday Afternoon! The music was laid back, taken largely from the Fifties, and our October artist produced some very pleasant sounds from our three manual Wurlitzer. How nice to see the inside of the Orion Centre Theatre, now without all the yards of tulle and other tizziness that graced it in past years!

I am indebted to Simon Ellis, another resident of the Southern Highlands, who has introduced me to his wonderful 4/34 George Wright Allen organ (expanded to 72 ranks via Midi) and has given me valued tuition in how the professionals use an instrument to produce the vast array of sounds that come out of the pipes. So much for me to take in and surely not enough time left in life to absorb all the necessaries to perform adequately both for self entertainment and the listening pleasure of others! I hope I have now learnt enough to write a more comprehensive review of our great visiting TOSA artist Dwight Beacham.

Dwight opened the programme with *You are my lucky star* (Debbie Reynolds sang it in "Singin' in the Rain). A quiet introduction but built up quickly to that familiar tune. The contrast in the verse was noticeable and enjoyable. Straight on with *Moment Musicale*, composer Schubert but played in a modern way.

On with music from "High Society" – *True Love*. Memories of Bing Crosby and Grace Kelly in the 1956 movie.

Dwight liked the percussions of the Campsie Wurlitzer and used them often. A lot of his arrangements were short but still very enjoyable.

Something's gotta give swung along and then the more gentle *Hi Lili, Hi Lo* with which Dwight commenced his George Wright arrangements. Always a pleasure to hear a good playing of the Master's (Wright) style.

Dwight asked if we remembered the Four Preps a la 1956. There

seemed general consensus from the audience so he dropped into their hit: *Twenty-six miles cross the sea.*

Another George Wright arrangement to follow: *While we're young.* Can't leave out a march or two in a Dwight Beacham concert so J P Sousa came to the fore with *Hands across the sea*. Long time since I've heard a march on the Wurlitzer.

In the wee small hours of the morning and Sleepless in Seattle were next. The Wurlitzer piano came into use in the latter, some lovely harmonies and good jazz style playing. Back to 1918 then for Jazzin' the blues away. Dwight can "swing" the organ and did so in this number.

Dwight then told us he has a job as a church organist in Phoenix Arizona where he lives these days (he was brought up in Los Angeles). He's away from that console for eight weeks on tour here and in New Zealand. It was appropriate then for him to give us two gospel tunes: *There is a Redeemer* and *Shout to the North*. Played in great arrangements.

Dwight obviously has a soft spot for Hawaii and the first of two Hawaiian numbers, *Hawaiian Paradise* came next, right out of 1929. What's a bright number to take us up to Interval but George Gershwin's *Lisa*. This left us with high expectations for Part Two. Dwight seemed much more relaxed after Interval and his opening *Keep your sunnyside up* and a soft shoe version (is there any other way to play) *Cuddle up a little closer* both lifted the audience with their spot on interpretations.

Back to George Wright arrangements next with *I know that you know* and we agreed that Dwight did fine justice to the George Wright original.

From the 1985 movie Colour Purple came music of Quincy Jones -*Miss Celie's Blues*, a favourite of this reviewer and played just how it should be, recalling some excellent versions on LP in past years. Think I've heard *Junkman Rag* before. It's out of 1914 and the composer is Charles Luckey Roberts. You can hear it on YouTube played by the composer but I'll get on my "rag" hobby horse again and say that, even though Roberts composed it, rags are not meant to be played at the frantic pace Roberts recorded it, but GENTLY! Dwight knows this and gave it to us at just the right pace. As sadly, some of our American friends say: "I play it fast 'cause I can!", that's no excuse. That's not how rags are SUPPOSED to sound!

More of gospel music and the composer of *Until Then*, Stuart Hamlin, found his faith in the 1949 Billy Graham Crusades and Dwight noted that Hamlin's promotion of Graham led to the evangelist's huge following of later years. (The Billy Graham crusades also happened in Australia and the former Archbishop of Sydney, Peter Jensen and his brother Philip – were converts).

The 1930's tune *Rainbow on the River* made for delightful listening, the tune out of the movie of the same name. A Jesse Crawford favourite from around that time?

More of Hawaiian sounds and *Hello Aloha*, how are you? as Dwight related playing this many years ago as his wife tried the Hula! A Fifties programme couldn't leave out a Maguire Sisters number – *Sugartime*, and those of us of a certain vintage probably had that tune engraved in our minds for ever. Then followed a song out of the 1970s – *Time Immemorial*.

A David Rose composition was next - *Our Waltz*, he who was famous for compositions Holiday for Strings and The Stripper. Heading towards the end and Dwight entertained us with two songs from the Irving Berlin musical movie "Holiday Inn", *Valentine's Day* and *Be careful it's my heart*.

Dwight said that he didn't play encores but rounded off the PSA with the 2013 composition from the movie "Frozen", *For the first time in forever*, somewhat out of keeping with the rest of the afternoon's programme, but a favourite of his daughter's. Well played of course, and coincidentally, a favourite of Donna Parker at her recent Orion Centre performance.

An enjoyable, technically skilful, afternoon's entertainment, and a good introduction to Dwight's "live" playing for the first time in Australia and, as he reminded us, the oldest first time American organist in TOSA's history.


