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WEDNESDAY 20th AUGUST AT 8pm. The Society will present our member LES DENLEY in his first concert for the Society at Marrickville Town Hall. LES DENLEY opened the 2/7 WurliTzer of the Regent Theatre Wentworthville in 1940. Prior to that, he had been the resident organist at the theatre's three manual concert organ, which the WurliTzer replaced. He was also featured at the Victory Theatre Kogarah, and around the suburban circuit, both as resident and relief organist. His first public appearance was at the console of the Civic Theatre Auburn, WurliTzer. He appeared at the Roxy Parramatta, Strathfield Cinema, Burwood Palatial and Savoy Theatre Enfield, among a number of others.

Members of the Society will look forward to hearing LES DENLEY at the console of our own WurliTzer at Marrickville this month. There will be a guest artist appearing on the programme. This will be a public concert advertised in the press, and the admission will be \$1 each to the public, with a concession price of 75¢ to our members on production of their current membership cards at the doors. Children of members will be FREE. Other children and pensioners will be admitted for 50¢ each. All tickets will be sold at the doors ONLY on the night of the concert. The Society looks forward to seeing you at Marrickville for the first concert by LES DENLEY.

SUNDAY 24th AUGUST AT 1pm SHARP.

At the Lyceum Theatre, Pitt Street Sydney, our member HOWARD RUSSELL will present a theatre organ concert on the 2/9 Christie Theatre organ in the Lyceum Theatre. HOWARD RUSSELL is the resident organist, and he desires to demonstrate to the Society that this organ, despite all rumours to the contrary, is still a REAL THEATRE ORGAN indeed. The original Christie pipe work is still retained in the instrument, although it now boasts a nice new console. The tremulants have been reset to accepted theatrical standards, a spotlight has been installed, the console has been moved forward, and a microphone added.

Whilst this concert is primarily for T.O.S.A. members, visitors and the general public are invited to attend. A collection will be taken up to assist with the expences, and the doors will open at 12.45pm. This is a separate function prior to the usual Pleasant Sunday Afternoon, which will commence as usual, at 3pm.



LOOKING BACK AT LAST MONTH.

HALF-YEARLY BUSINESS MEETING PLUS "SEE & HEAR" NIGHT.

Due to the fact that there were insufficient members present to form a quorom, the half yearly Business Meeting did not take place. However, an informal discussion on the financing of the Society's Electronic organ was held. Member Robert Gliddon spoke on the subject raised by your Editor in last month's TOSA News, namely that of following the lead given by Theatre organ fans in England in an attempt to persuade radio stations to broadcast the Theatre organ again. A Sub. Committee has been formed by Robert Gliddon to look into all aspects of this project and to recommend a course of action to the General Committee. The Sub. Committee consists of Robert Gliddon, Frank Ellis, Bill Schumacher and John Andrews. A meeting will be held shortly and those on the Sub Committee are hopeful of having the enthusiastic support of every member of the Society in this very praiseworthy effort.

Following the above matters, the rest of the evening was taken up with the enjoyment of the "See & Hear" programme which was voted a great success. A wonderful slide show took us on a tour of Europe not only showing many delightful scenes, but expertly depicting many of the fine Cathedrals and Churches with emphasis laid on things organ—wise. We were given many fabulous close-ups of organ consoles and pipework - the excellence of the photography was obviously the result of many painstaking hours of preparation, and was a great credit to Mr Clive Gunning of the Sydney Organ Society who brought along his projector and screened the show for us. A second projector, used for the screening of the Society's own slides, was supplied by Committee man Bill Schnitger, who is also the official photographer for the NSW Division. As we viewed the slides we were entertained by a tape prepared by John Clancy which featured theatre organs from various parts of the world played by many fine organists. Some of the material heard was being played for the first time in this country, and was taken from tapes sent over from Concert Recording of America by Concert's President, Mr Bill Johnson and we thank him for the permission to use this material.

ERIC SMITH CONCERTIZES AT CAPITOL THEATRE.

On Saturday 26th July, our Honorary Member <u>ERIC SMITH</u> thrillingly brought back to life the mighty 3/15 WurliTzer of Sydney's Capitol Theatre, after its long silence due to extensive maintainence. The excellence of <u>ERIC's</u> playing was matched only by the flawless performance of the instrument which has never sounded better. The theatre atmosphere, lighting and effects, which are only possible in a movie mansion such as the Capitol, all added their own particular magic to the presentation, and we are grateful to those responsible in the booth, for a fine show, presentation-wise. The spots and house lights were tastefully and expertly handled.

ERIC opened, playing his theme, "Life Is Nothing Without Music" as the console rose very slowly and very majestically from the pit. Later in the programme, the console's rise and fall were at the normal speed, but for the opening, the slower than usual rise made a tremendous impression. Speaking of the work done on the organ by the Society members, ERIC then referred musically, to the future of the organ by playing, "This Could Be The Start Of Something Big", and all present would fervently echo his wish.

Next came Leroy Anderson's "Serenata" which was followed by a Wrightish "Tip Toe Through The Tulips". The delightful Noel Coward composition, "I'll Follow My Secret Heart" was hauntingly played and registered and evoked a feeling of warm nostalgia, as does most of Coward's music. It was given very sympathetic feeling by ERIC SMITH. "The More I See You" was followed by a Fred Astaire-Ginger Rogers Selection consisting of "Cheek To Cheek", "Isn't This Alovely Day", "The Continental", "My One And Only High-land Fling" (with a dandy bagpipe effect), "Let's Face The Music", and finally "Top Hat" as the console descended for interval. The second half opened with a personalised version of "The Dendy March" arranged by <u>ERIC</u>, and which, incidentally, established the organist's ability to arrange a number so as to create an orchestral sound rather than a mere organ sound - an effect he achieved splendidly in "Tales From The Vienna Woods", which was a delightful offering. Widor's "Toccata in F" was the next item presented, and this was magnificent in its technical mastery and scope, as well as its Cathedral-like registration.

"Carioca", "Secret Love" and Buddy Cole's arrangement of "Sassy Brass" followed and were well received by the audience. A Jesse Crawford arrangement of "Stairway To The Stars" had your Editor looking up at the ceiling, and, wonder of wonders, in these less romantic days, I found the Capitol's twinkling stars twinkling away brightly, and bringing back very vividly to my mind, the awe and wonder I experienced as a boy when I first beheld, from the front stalls too, what to me, was a pinnacle of movie mansion magic. ERIC's playing of this number was an excursion into pure nostalgia - enough to wallow in and enjoy to the full.

The next two items were also highlights for me - "Embraceable You" and a hauntingly beautiful "I Left My Heart In San Francisco" which was a very lush and tender arrangement indeed. Softly registered, richly chorded, the melody seemed to reach out and touch one, and the purple spotlight gave the impression of mistiness as real as a San Francisco fog. It was indeed a highlight. The "Washington Post March" and finally his theme concluded a splendid early morn concert by ERIC SMITH. The Society thanks <a href="ERIC and extends to the tireless workers on the organ, its thanks for their efforts."

An excellent and varied programme was performed by a trio consisiting of the very talented leader Leon Rodda on the organ and piano ably backed by Phillip Lynch on bass and rhythm guitar and Graham Lane on drums. Maestro Rodda seemed to get some sounds and effects on his D2B Yamaha than many more well known organists can get out of instruments double the price, however, most of this credit I feel is due to Leon and not Yamaha. To say he is brilliant would not be an exageration and to merely say he is good would be an understatement. His "Flight Of The Bumble Bee" including the

simulation of an authentic fluttering and buzzing sound was something to be long remembered. For some numbers our maestro chose the piano and the same flawless technique was displayed. During some of the faster and 'hotter' organ numbers the style and 'tricks' of both Earl Grant and Joe Davis (both Negroes) were evident. To summarise a 2 hour musical treat which proved to be the best 50¢ worth I have had in a long time.

VICTORIAN DIVISION NEWS (From Vox Magazine)

The Victorian Division announce a "farewell" concert by TONY FENELON on the Dendy WurliTzer before he leaves for his American tour. This is set down for Sunday 31st August at 2.15pm. It was also announced that WILBUR KENTWELL will be heard in concert at the Camberwell Civic Centre on Thursday 2nd October at 8pm playing a three manual Conn Theatre Organ.

A special meeting of the Victorian Division was held on Sunday 27th July to decide on the organist to open the Moorabbin Town Hall WurliTzer organ. We are unable to say who this will be at present. The installation of the Moorabbin WurliTzer is proceeding apace, and the organ was turned on for the first time with both the blower and generator, and with well over half the pipes in place some slight resemblance of a tune was managed from the console. It is expected that the organ builders will be able to begin voicing, regulating and tuning the organ the first week in August. Your Editor (in Sydney that is) thinks the opening of this organ must be drawing very close now, and awaits the announcement of the opening date with great interest. If it is at all possible I hope to make the pilgrimage to Melbourne to be present for this great occasion, so please dear Irene Veale, do let us know as soon as you can so that we can plan for the occasion.

A "Stop Press" announcement appeared in the July Vox which states that the Victorian Division have agreed to purchase, from member Frank Douglas, the three manual Compton Theatre Organ which has, at the moment, five ranks of Compton pipes. The console and Relays are capable of handling twelve ranks. The organ has been water damaged whilst in storage in England, but their organ crew is confident that none of the damage is beyond repair. Further details are to be given in the next issue of Vox.

Before leaving the Victorian scene, your Editor received a very nice letter from Alan Glover, past President of the Victorian Division. The letter, which arrived a few weeks ago was to thank TOSA News for the publication of the information furnished by Alan concerning the WurliTzer in the Hearne residence in Geelong, and the fact that this was the first horse-shoe consoled WurliTzer in this country. It was a pleasure to publish your letter my friend, and I thank you for sending it. I hope to get around to a personal letter to you one of these days. Time is our enemy alas.

RECORD NEWS.

CONCERT RECORDINGS "ORGAN OF THE MONTH" CLUB.

After a pause in operations, due to a re-organisation, Concert Recording (Aust) are now back on the scene and plan to resume regular releases from now on. The first release will be DENIS PALMISTRA'S LP disc "ESPECIALLY FOR YOU" which was recorded on the Clancy residence WurliTzer organ. A limited supply of this record was specially rushed in for DENIS PALMISTRA'S very successful concert on this organ last March, and these sold out almost immediately. A larger shipment has now been received, and is available for sale NOW. All Club members have now received a printed brochure about this record. As this record has already been reviewed in the April issue of TOSA News by Rod Blackmore, it is not proposed to reprint this review. However, for the benefit of new members of TOSA in all States, a brief excerpt is given hereunder.

Our member in America, that famous and popular organist BILLY NALLE, writes to tell us something of his recent activities. Some of his recent concerts were at Gray Hall in Hartford, Mitchell College in New London, and these were most successful. The Allen Organ Company surprised him by offering to make available for these concerts, a new model theatre organ not yet released. The offer was quicly accepted and the new organ was thus given its national premiere. The third concert was the one for BILLY NALLE to offer a major surprise. He played an "all improvised" recital as the first THEATRE ORGANIST ever to be engaged for a concert at the former estate of Pierre Dupont. The organ is a four manual Aeolian with 169 ranks, and is the largest organ ever installed in any USA residence. The concert was a smash hit and drew a long standing ovation from the largest audience ever to attend a concert at this residence.

It has also been announced that the 1969 Home Organ Festival will be held from September 16th to the 21st at its usual location at Hoberg's Resort at Lake County California.

COL TRINGHAM ENJOYS U.S. HOSPITALITY.

Our member Colin Tringham spent the last few months in the United States of America, where he enjoyed wonderful hospitality and friendship amongst members of our American counterparts, the A.T.O.E. Col sends us the following report on his trip.

"In Boston I had a wonderful time, due mainly to the Baldwin Company - Mr Richard Frank (Baldwin salesman and demonstrator) whom I met last time in Boston. He gave me a very impressive demonstration of the various Baldwin organs, particularly the Spinet (CT2) and the PRO Organ which has a really fantastic sound. I heard Dick and another talented organist, Robert McDonald (Dr of Music) play in a night spot in Revere (Boston) and I even played a tune or two on the PRO organ there. I also met David List, who plays a Hammond X66 in a beautiful country club, I went along twice and enjoyed every minute of it. David gave me a recording which he had just made on the X66 as a memento of the occasion.

Also met Ray Lassonde and Daryl Stuckey who used to play two Hammonds as "Knights of the Organ" and who are now Baldwin agents at Brockton. Heard Ed Walsh play a concert on the Baldwin Pro, and he had me fake the first few bars on a small spinet whilst he played the big organ backstage. Thew I got up and the audience seemed genuinely mystified as the music kept playing. I heard the Conn 3 manual, the WurliTzer electronics, and had an amazing demonstration of the Allen models. The large church (classical) model is really indistinguishable from a real pipe sound.

Next stop in the U.S. was at Chicago. After registration at the A.T.O.E. Convention I was taken to see a 2/5 Estey in the home of Jack Smith who also has a Conn Theatre De Luxe. Next the Convention started in earnest with a visit to the WGN T.V. Studios to hear a Kimball 3/11 played by Hal Turner. Then to the Elm Skating Rink to hear a very interesting performance by the very tall Tony Tahlman playing a 4/24 "Bitzer" with a wonderful array of unenclosed percussions. At night we went to the Aragon Ballroom and danced to Frankie Masters Orchestra with Hal Pearl playing a 3/10 WurliTzer.

On Saturday July 5th we went to hear Jack Hatfield on a 3/10 Barton, then to the Chicago Stadium to hear the massive 6 manual 62 rank Barton. At the Stadium Al Melgard played tunes for the various States, and Conventioneers were asked to stand as their song was played. Of course I considered myself safe, but after a suitable introduction "Watlzing Matilda" was played and I had to stand up all by myself in front of 1000 people with Arc lights trained on me alone.

On Saturday night, John Muri played a 3/10 WurliTzer. A highlight of the evening was his expert accompaniment of two silent movies - one an "Our Gang" film was so hilarious and the organ effects so well done that we all ached from laughing. After a vaudeville show, we went to the Hoosier Theatre at llpm for a concert by Eddie Weaver on a 3/11 WurliTzer. As a finale Eddie played "The Impossible Dream" and the stage curtains opened to reaveal the four manual 28 rank WurliTzer console from Chicago's "Uptown" Theatre. This organ will be installed in the Hoosier Theatre soon.

On Sunday at 8am we went to the Oriental Theatre and heard Tom Sheen give a very interesting concert on a 4/20 WurliTzer. Then on to the Patio Theatre to hear Pearl White give a very nimble fingered performance. Sunday night we had a banquet and heard Norm Nelson at a Gulbranson Rialto.

Monday we went to the Pickwick Theatre and heard Larry Roou give a splendid performance. His footwork during the playing of "Misserlou" was really spectacular. This was a 3/11 WurliTzer. Monday night saw the crowning final event, an absolutely amazing concert by John Seng on a 4 manual 24 rank WurliTzer at the Saint Mary of the Lake Seminary near Mundelein. Words cannot describe this concert - it was just too fabulous for words.

After the Convention, at which Conn had a 3 manual Theatre organ in a room for all to play at any time, I said goodbye to the many wonderful, friendly and hospitable people I met there. I had to turn down five invitations to go to various districts and hear more organs. People wished to provide transport and accommodation etc.

Next stop was Salt Lake City and the Mormon Tabernacle and "The Organ Loft", an amazing night spot with a 5 manual 33 rank WurliTzer made out of two three manual organs. This was followed by a visit to Los Angeles where I received absolutely Royal treatment from Dr Phillip Olsen and Dr Wallace Acton who took me on a three day tour of L.A. We all played and heard the 4/61 Robert Morton organ in the Elks Temple, the Sam-Francisco Fox Theatre Wurli in the home of Mr Frank Lanterman, the four manual Wurli in the home of Mr Richard Simonton where we had a real jam session, with me on the organ and the two doctors, one on each grand piano.

Next to the Wiltern Theatre to play the 4/37 Kimball which has a Serpent rank and a 32! Diaphone. We made a trip out to the Warehouse of Tubes Incorp., where the owner Chuck Baker has a 210 model Wurli (2/9). He teaches organ maintainence free of charge to interested people. This organ has a very nice Vibraphone connected to it. Next we paid a visit to the warehouse and showroom of Hathaway & Bowers who specialize in buying and selling mechanical musical instruments. Finally to the Star Theatre at El Segunda which is being re-modelled by Bill Coffman into a silent movie house and organ concert place. This has a 4 manual WurliTzer which started out as a style 311 and will eventually have 26 ranks We had a pizza one night at an establishment called "Pipes & Pizza" which features a style 215 Wurli with unenclosed percussions. The place is usually packed out on Friday & Saturday nights and the customers seemed very enthusiastic about the music.

It seems like Col had himself a wonderful time in USA and has been a good ambassador for TOSA at the same time. Well that's it for this month,
