

ORGAN LITERATURE

The Organ Literature Foundation has a new Catalogue "T" (40 pages) which lists 581 books of which 67 are new items. Of the 323 theatre organ records, 68 are newly listed. In the band organ-music box section, 5 new items have been added for a total of 101 items. The largest increase is in the miscellaneous classical records division.... of the 1989 listed, 181 are new to this catalogue. A brand new section of organ music (46 items) has been added this year and will increase as new items are added.

The Organ Literature Foundation was established 36 years ago and is the largest supplier of organ books, recordings etc in the world and offers the most diversified stock that can be found anywhere. Virtually 100% of all items "in print" are in stock at all times.

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Overseas Members Donate Organ Parts.




Those from Seattle were Russ and JoAnn Evans - longtime (about 20 years) members of T.O.S.A. (N.S.W. Division) and chief "parts scouts" on behalf of this division; Ray and Muriel Whelpley - Ray being a well respected Seattle area organ technician and Muriel a music teacher of long standing; and Walt and Marie Cook who were so taken with their reception in Sydney that they decided to join the Society.


Walt had a long career as a design engineer with the Boeing Airplane Company (from 1935 until his retirement) and some of his innovations are still in current use by Boeings. With Walt's retirement came time to do more of the things he wished to do himself - like building a theatrestyle organ for their beautiful home in Renton, Washington. Walt constructed the three manual console, chests, regulators and relay from scratch and the workmanship is superb!


During the Cook's stay here Walt asked what organ parts we needed, as he wished to make something useful a gift for us. It was decided that some style tremulants Wurlitzer additional would be needed for both the Society's arriving home Walt Wurlitzers. On had these trems built within a matter of a few weeks and ready to ship to us here. In addition one small tremulant for the Vox Humana rank (donated by Russ and JoAnn Evans) for the Christie organ at Epping Baptist Church. Thanks are also due to Russ for arranging the shipping of all the trems to us here.



"Jazz Classics in Digital Stereo - Fats Waller: Great Original Performances 1927 -1934". ABC Records C38415 (Cassette), also available on LP.

Mention of the name of Fats Waller immediately conjures image up an rotund pianist good-humouredly clowning his way through "My Very Good Friend the Milkman" or "Two Sleepy People". However, there was much more to Fats than this musical buffoonery. He was undoubtedly of the greatest jazz pianists of all time; he was also, and this is known to a much smaller circle, perhaps the greatest jazz organist ever.

Thomas Waller was born in May, 1904 on West 134th St., in New York's Harlem district. By the early 1920's he had begun to make a name for himself as a planist, holding his own in such notable company as James P. Johnson and Willie ('The Lion') Smith. He began to make player piano rolls and some fine records for Okeh label. At this time, however, his regular income came not from the piano, but from his position as organist at the Lincoln, and later the Lafayette, Theatres in Harlem, where he played organs by Wurlitzer and Robert Morton, respectively. At both of these theatres, his fresh and creative silent film accompaniments brought him immense popularity and acclaim and acted as a magnet which attracted some of the greatest names of jazz to hear him. A regular "fan" was the young Count Basie, whom Fats taught to play the organ.

His popularity as a theatre organist was not confined merely to Harlem, for on several occasions he played at the prestigious Paramount Theatre, Times Square, New York City, when the famed Jesse Crawford took his annual vacations. He also broadcast the Wurlitzer organ installed in the Paramount Theatre's broadcasting and recording studio.

By the mid 1920's, the success of his many piano records on minor labels led to an invitation by Victor to cut some sides for them at their studio in the former Trinity Baptist Church

Camden, in New Jersey. Fats appeared at the studio on 17th November, 1926 (which in itself must have been a relief to all concerned, as he was renowned for failing to appear at sessions, and had "blown" his first session with Okeh by oversleeping and forgetting all about the recording session!). When he arrived, he found that the studio contained an Estey organ of three manuals and twenty-one ranks pipes, which had been specially designed and built for recording for popular Victor (contrary to belief. it was not an instrument left over the building's previous function from as a church). He sat at it and tried "St. Louis Blues", the tune he was booked to record on piano. The magic he coaxed from the rather staid pipes (the organ was a church-style instrument, not a theatre organ) meant that no-one objected when he asked to record on organ instead of piano. He cut the first of some fifty pipe organ records there and then. lyrical symbiosis of player and instrument resulted in nearly all Fats' Victor records for the next year or so being made on organ, often with vocalists other instrumentalists. Each every one of these is a classic, some being hot jazz, some more plaintive, but all with an individual and unmistakeable spark of magic.

A delightful, but possibly apochryphal tale of one of these sessions is that when Fats was in full swing immortalising a piece of hot jazz, and one of the recording staff was enjoying a fat cigar on the steps of the old church, two negroes walked past, savoured the sounds of Fats rocking organ, possibly in response to Alberta "Honk Hunter's exhortation to thing, Fats", looked at the affluent cigar, and asked the official, "Say, how do you'all become a membah of dis here church?" Ben Hall recounted this episode to John Landon, who included it in his book "Jesse Crawford, Poet of the Organ".

Record Review - Fats Waller ... cont.

Fats continued making recordings on pipe and Hamond organs throughout his tragically short career; his very last recording session was on a Hammond organ in September 1943. Jazz critic Ashton Stevens once said "The organ is the favourite instrument of his heart; the piano only of his stomach". Fats himself said "Well, I really love the organ. I can get so much more colour from it than the piano that it really sends me."

It seems unfortunate that many SO today think of Fats Waller purely a pianist, and it is thus refreshing new album does much to that this redress this, for Fats can be heard the Estey organ in Victor's playing Trinity Church studio on four of the sixteen tracks, with two solos and splendid numbers with Thomas Morris' Hot Babies.

two solos, "The Digah's Stomp" The and "Sugar" (this is the solo version, not the vocal one, recorded the same day in which Alberta Hunter made the exhortation quoted earlier) were recorded on 1st. December, 1927, and 20th May, 1927, respectively, and show much of the beauty of tone of this interesting organ, of which the stop control was by illuminated push buttons, with a moveable console. This beauty can be heard now for the first time in true clarity, as the remarkable digital re-mastering eliminates all the distortion and surface noise of the original 78rpm recordings as well as expanding the frequency range to give previously unheard treble frequencies. The Vox delightful Humana, strings and that four-foot Harmonic Flute benefit particular.

"Red Hot Dan" is a milestone in its own right, as it contains Fats' first vocal on record, a delightful piece of "scat" singing, the forerunner of all those famed tongue-in-cheek vocals later to become a hallmark of his records. In both this song and "Geechee", Fats plays both organ and piano (consecutively, not simultaneously!). It is interesting to note that when the Morris' Hot Babies recordings were first issued in England, in the 1920's, they were

dismissed by an influential critic as "crude, nigger-style music", a judgement which today would bring on that critic's head the wrath of not only the jazz world, but of the race relations people as well.

unfortunately does not permit Space me to review the other tracks on this record, all of which feature Fats at the piano, solo, singing, and in the company of such luminaries as Eddie Condon, Coleman Hawkins, Benny Carter, Muggsy Spanier, Benny Goodman, Pee Wee Russell and Henry ("Red") Allen. Through the marvels of digital technology, all the tracks sound as fresh as tomorrrow, so much that when I had finished playing the album, I found echoing that famous by I forget whom, "Fats Waller died in 1943, but I don't have to believe it if I don't want to.".

Ed Kirkeby ended his biography of Fats Waller ("Ain't Misbehavin'") with these words:

"Fats was many things to many men - you will have heard much of this man and his music. To you he will be perhaps a gravelly voice on record; a patron saint of a whole school of pianists; the composer of your favourite a buffoon who led a jumping group of jazzmen in monstrous sessions; or he may even be to you, by chance, a giant among jazzmen, whose recordings with his little band can lift you to the heights of ecstasy. Or maybe your position will be somewhere in between all these? But whatever your position, it is surely not a negative one. No -one has ever said "I can take Waller or leave him".

There can be not better introduction to Fats Waller's special genius than this album. Rush to your record store and buy it now. There's jazz in them there pipes!

DOWN MEMORY LANE

Number 23 of a series by Frank Ellis

1984, January/February issue the In of TOSA NEWS carried the first of my Down Memory Lane articles, and they have continued each month since then, however, this is the final article of the series. The period I covered was from May 1938 to the start of 1941. After that, I was then in the Army for around five years, so I was out of touch with the organ scene except for those brief periods of leave when I would soak up as much theatre organ music as I could.

Down Memory Lane has been compiled from several sources as I said in the first article. They were the scrapbook of my old friend Eddie Aiken of New Zealand, who owned the Wurlitzer from the De Luxe Theatre Wellington, from magazines and newspapers of the day, and of course, from my own personal recollections of happy moviegoing days, and movie-going back then was indeed a most happy experience.

Theatres in those days were full of atmosphere - they were large, luxurious, and fully staffed with ushers and other attendants, unlike the intimate dog boxes that pose as theatres in today's world. As well, there were fine orchestras, stage presentations AND, MOST IMPORTANTLY FOR ME, THE THEATRE ORGANS.

Hollywood and the film studios of Great Britain, produced great family entertainment in those days, and an "Adults Only" film was a rarity - today the situation seems to have been reversed. With entertaining films, great live music and stage presentations, movie going then, was an experience in total entertainment.

As one took one's place in the box office queue you could hear the sound of the organ soaring into the entrance lobby filling you with thrills of anticipation for the joys to come inside the auditorium. You waited, as patiently as you could, to buy your tickets, and then the hurried climb up marble staircases, the long walk through an upstairs foyer that seemed to have

acres of luxurious carpet and be replete with expensive furniture and lighting then another carpeted staircase, and suddenly, as you reached the top step, the auditorium with all its magnificence burst upon you with an overwhelming force.

For the next two or three hours you would be captivated by the magic conjured up by those who ran this great Palace for your entertainment. The magic of lighting, of beautiful stage settings, of organ consoles and orchestras rising and falling with split second timing, and even if the movie wasn't quite as good as the trailer you had seen the previous week had led you to believe, you still left the theatre content with what you had experienced - total entertainment. These are my memories of movie-going as it used to be, now onto what was happening at the start of 1941.

In my article last month, I reported that Les Denley had opened the Wurlitzer in the Regent Theatre Wentworthville. Les played the featured spot and his deputy, Tom Kelly, played the interval, however I forgot to mention that the playout at the end of the show was done by Gunnar Paulson. Paulson was one of Eustace Dodd's organ technicians who had installed the instrument. Later on, when Les Denley went into the Army, and I seem to remember Tom Kelly going into the Air Force, Paulson became the resident organist for the duration of the war.

Also, last month, I reported on some console swopping between Sydney, Melbourne and Perth. Perth's Ambassador Stanfield Theatre organist, went into the Army for three months, Lionel Corrick from Melbourne's Regent arrived in Sydney to replace Les Waldron at the Plaza. Waldron went to Perth as a replacement for Holliday. Later, Corrick went back to the Melbourne Regent as he had some illness in his family. Charles Tuckwell swopped consoles with him and came to the Sydney Plaza where he had a highly successful season which continued for quite some time.

DOWN MEMORY LANE....cont.

Geoff Robertson who had signed up with Hoyt's Theatres some five or six months previously, continued travelling the circuit with a Hammond organ being transported from theatre to theatre. He usually had an associate artist with him, one of these being that fine singer, Ormond Douglas. Robertson had also toured Australia and Tasmania for the ABC. When famous tenor Richard Crooks sang 'The Lost Chord' and Thee' in the Supper Angels Guard Shell Show on radio in 1939, it was who provided Robertson organ accompaniment and he was highly the world famous praised by for his artistry. He also toured the circuit with that great American coloured singer Bob Parrish. After the War, Geoff. was resident at the Melbourne Regent for some time and from where he frequently broadcast over the ABC. appeared four times daily also at Rumplemeyer's famous Collins Street restaurant in Melbourne. It could be said that Geoff. was a very busy boy indeed.

Charles Tuckwell was being heard three times each week on 2CH, not on the Plaza Theatre's Wurlitzer though, as 2CH had just acquired a Hammond organ and Charles was featuring their new toy.

In England, Quentin Maclean had enlisted I think it was in the R.A.F. as he had sailed for Canada, and as that country was where thousands of airmen received their basic training, I think that Quentin must have joined the R.A.F.

Well 'Thats Your lot' as Tommy Trinder used to say, and I hope that over the last two years, I've been able to jog your memory and help you recall some of the things that happened in the golden years of movies, and more importantly, THE MIGHTY THEATRE ORGAN SCENE.


