RADIO CITY OFFERS LENGTHY DAILY TOUR OF STAGE

Stage-struck people, those with curious natures, and those who want to go where the action is around theatres are now given the opportunity to see it all in New York City at the Radio City Music Hall. Beginning Friday April 11th the Music Hall inauquerated regularly scheduled tours of the Entertainment Centre.

Tours are two and a half hours long and cover the stage. They are operated seven days a week from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. and the admission is \$5.95 per person (kids are admitted free). Special rates and tours of varying specialities and lengths are available at special rates for groups of 15 or more.

Winding over, under and across the great stage, the tours will allow the public to explore every corner of the legendary theatre, from rehearsal halls, costume and set shops, recording studios, projection booths, dressing rooms, production areas and giant multi-levered stage elevators. For the organ minded, the main theatre WurliTzer is included and the 3/14 studio WurliTzer also may be seen. His selection of music provided first-nighters with a complete demonstration of the superb tonal range of the organ. He vividly brought out that the old Foort/BBC Moller is indeed a new organ as installed by Dave Junchen.

This article has been designed to inform members what happens in the background before you walk through the doors at Marrickville Town Hall and sit down to hear a concert.

The Executive and Committee organise at least six concerts each year, and we endeavour to the utmost to keep standards as high as possible. Local and Interstate artists are approached and a suitable professional fee is agreed upon providing it doesn't break our limited budget. The cost of hiring the hall plus a suitable public address system also publicity in the form of posters, (designed, typewritten and printed by the committee) plus postage or hand distribution all have to be considered. We also engage at least one overseas artist each year and this has to include return air-fare plus accommodation etc. The organ has to be tuned for every function.

We are now introducing at certain concerts an additional vocal artist for a 'spot' during the concert, and as you know, we've had some very pleasing results. Sometimes the extra artist is provided by the visiting organist, just to help us on the day, and very often for a very reasonable cost. Perhaps they just like singing with the pipes!

Your Ladies Committee play a big part at our concerts by creating a social atmosphere in providing tea, coffee & bikkies also cans of soft drink during interval. This service requires a lot more effort than appears on the surface, carting all the gear to the hall, buying drinks and carrying them around (quite often more than 12 dozen per concert), setting up at the hall, and they get there early just to provide coach travellers with a cuppa before the concert! Full marks to our Ladies, who never fail in this important job. All their work is done voluntarily just for the benefit of the members, and the Society as a whole.

A very important essential at some concerts and cabaret nights is lighting effects. One of our members, (very dedicated, but seldom thought of) provides virtually thousands of dollars worth of lighting, colored spots, mirror balls etc for a cost of next to nothing. If hiring costs on todays rates for assembly and provision of all this equipment was ever fully paid for, the bill would give us all, a very large fright! I cannot say how much we are in debt to this member.

The Editor tries to keep in touch with other organ functions around the town and advises us in TOSA NEWS just what is on that would be of interest to our members. Naturally, an occasional event is missed out, but this is generally through communication breakdown..we just cant keep track of everybody.

WE INVITE YOU to write to the Secretary and tell us your views.. what you think can be improved, what you would like to see at concerts, what BUGS you most at concerts, what BUGS you most at cabarets, or any other function. Constructive criticism in any way, that you think will help us to produce a better function. All information will be kept strictly confidential although an assessment of all data received will be published in TOSA NEWS at a later date.

GREAT THEATRE ORGANS

GAUMONT-STATE THEATRE, KILBURN.

Throughout 1937, above the usual hum of daily life in London's cosmopolitan suburb of Kilburn, could be heard the sounds of heavy construction work. The sights and sounds of super-cinemas under construction had become commonplace in immediate pre-war years.

At Kilburn, the Hyams Brothers were building Britain's largest supercinema, and as the site became dominated by a monolithic spire thrusting skywards it was soon apparent that something really special was taking place.

On opening night, Tuesday, December 28th, 1937, the "S" beacon shone out from the apex of the spire, a silent muezzin visible for miles around - the escapist religion of the silver screen had a new cathedral...For many, the climax of the evening came when a cover slid open at the right hand side of the orchestra pit and the Mighty WurliTzer console spiralled upwards - its white paint and gold-leaf trim glistening in the spotlight. As it slowly turned around, many saw for the first time, Sidney Torch, who's snappy rythm style of playing had brought a new dimension to the theatre organ.

Few in the audience would not have possessed at least one of Morch's many outstanding best selling records..maybe Hot Dog, at the Regal, Marble Arch, perhaps Orient Express, at the Regal, Edmonton..or had not listened with pleasure to his scintillating broadcasts. He was to remain resident organist at Kilburn for three years, repeating his Piping Hot series of records, before joining the RAF in 1940.

Some of his theatre organ recordings are still available on LP today, 40 years later..a remarkable tribute to a talent which made the organ swing in a way unequalled by anybody, before or since. Torch's period at Kilburn was marred by an accident in which he caught his foot in the revolving mechanism fitted to the organ console lift. After playing his interlude in great pain, he collapsed when the console sank back into the pit..his big toe was broken. This "killer" lift has since claimed further victims, inflicting less serious injuries on Sandy McPherson. Earlier this year it viciously mangled former Radio City organist, Ashley Miller's briefcase!

Rudy Lewis followed Torch at the console for six years, leaving to exchange consoles with Terence Casey, organist of Europe's largest WurliTzer, in the Trocadero, Elephant and Castle. A couple of years later the ever ebullient Bobby Pagan, another Trocadero organist, took over. The final resident organist was Louis Mordish, who was based here until 1953, when the use of the organ during normal film shows ceased.

The WurliTzer was not completely neglected, however, as it was maintained in full working order. It was used occasionally for enthusiasts' concerts and was recorded by Jackie Brown, Sandy McPherson, George Blackmore and Frederic Bayco. It also accompanied many of the special stage presentations which always have been a feature of the theatre. The seating capacity of the auditorium was reduced to about 1800 when the rear stalls area became a dance hall and later a casino. The magnificent main chandelier was removed from the foyer. Lean times had come to the cinema industry.

It is often darkest before the dawn, and this proved true, for there then came to the Gaumont-State a man with an extraordinary talent for showmanship, its current manager, Billy Weir. Under his encouragement the organ was dusted off and brought back as a featured item for special film presentations..played by John Stewart, who also recorded it and in more recent times by George Huber. Hubert Selby also made a fine record on it a few years ago. It has always been a popular broadcasting organ, and is still featured regularly on "The Organ Entertains".

The Gaumont-State has a special place in the hearts of theatre organ lovers throughout the country as it has become London's leading venue for concerts presented by the Cinema Organ Society, The Theatre Organ Club and the London Chapter of the American Theatre Organ Society (ATOS).

Top national and international organists have displayed their skills and the instrument's capabilities. No one who was present will ever forget the concert given by master organist George Wright, when every seat in the house was taken.

The organ contains 16 ranks of pipes, plus the usual tonal and non-tonal percussions and comedy effects. A grand piano used to be playable electrically from the console, but this was renowned during the early 60's. Its designer was another great British theatre organist, Quentin Maclean, who some years later wrote: "It was not' as has been stated, designed for Sidney Torch or for anyone else, but embodied my conception of a 16 rank WurliTzer giving, bluntly, the best value for money, from a tonal point of view...My object at Kilburn was to strike a true balance between the extremes of 'lushness' (Tibias & Flutes) and 'brashness' (English Horns etc)..."

A brief summary of the ranks is given below. Of particular note is the full extension of a generous six ranks to l6ft. pitch, including the only l6ft. English Horn on a British WurliTzer. These give the organ a very powerful bass. The flexibility of the pedal division is increased by the inclusion of an octave coupler, another unique feature. Many organists have expressed surprise that the tonal colours available exclude a Saxophone or Clarinet rank. George Wright was greatly impressed with the organ's tonal qualities, especially the large Tibia Clausa. The Harmonic Flute is a particular gem. The instrument does, however have its failings. The remoteness of the console from the pipework, which is in two chambers in the opposite wall of the auditorium, 110 ft. away, means that there is a noticeable delay of one-seventh of a second while the sound waves travel from the chambers to the organist, who thus has to play that much ahead of what he hears. In the early days, loudspeakers were used to overcome this time lag..one even being fitted to the music stand..but then the organist heard everything twice, which was worse.

The pipes are poorly disposed in badly proportioned chambers, with swell shutters behind heavy drapes. These factors combine effectively to contain the sound, and consequently the full power and grandeur one expects from 16 ranks of pipes are never heard in their true glory. Indeed, the percussion instruments can scarcely be heard at all. Nevertheless, the organ can, and frequently does sound thrilling and exiting as the floor and building vibrate with its sonorous bass notes. In short, it is a good organ, which sounds magnificent on records or on radio, but which is fractionally disappointing in the theatre.

The ranks of pipes and pitches at which they are available are:

The resultant Bass 32 ft. draws the Concert Flute rank at 16 ft and 10-2/3 ft pitches. The rank is not available separately at this latter pitch.
