IAN DAVIES in concert Bondi-Waverly R.S.L. Tuesday 3rd March

Some 80 people attended the concert given by IAN DAVIES at the Bondi-Waverly R.S.L., and were well satisfied by what they heard and saw.

Ian Davies is an organist with many years training, starting out when he was six to learn the piano and twelve to learn the classical organ. At a young age he took lessons from Horace Weber at the Capitol Theatre Melbourne, and Arnold Coleman at the State Theatre Melbourne, and he then commenced playing at the Capitol and Plaza and also the Regent Theatre in Melbourne.

After quite a number of years Ian was touring around Australia with Franquin the Great and playing on a Bourne Electronic organ and later Ian was demonstrating the organ at a number of Sydney stores. Such is the wealth of experience and showmanship that Ian has to draw on readily.

The instrument at Bondi-Waverly is a Rogers Trio, a 3 manual electronic theatre organ which speaks through two cabinets mounted at ceiling height on the stage and speak towards the rear of the stage which gives added presence. The Tibia and Flutes speak through the left cabinet and the Reeds, Strings, Toy-Counter and Pedals speak through the right, and the sound of the organ is quite pleasant indeed.

The concert began with the Washington Post March, featured a bracket of Waltzes, an excellent rendition of March of the Toys, The Happy Whistler and a stirring version of Soldiers Chorus from

After interval came an Improvisation on a Theme, and a bit of the old showman came out with Ian Davies coming out with a T shirt on, showing the words, 'Ian, We love Your Organ', and a wig, and Bill Schumacher was also donning a wig, and an organ & piano duet followed with the J.O'K number, Sing-followed by a disco version of Have you ever been Lonely.

The evening seemed to come to an end too quickly with a beautiful rendition of the Peter Allen number"I Still Call Australia Home'.



THE WILBUR KENTWELL STORY.

On Tuesday 10th February, whilst listening to an ABC news broadcast, I was shocked and saddened to learn of the death in Brisbane, of my good friend Wilbur Kentwell. We were close friends for over forty years, and I dare say that few people knew him better than I, both in regard to his musical career as well as his family and personal life.

Wilbur was born in the Sydney suburb of Castle Hill, and was educated at the Parramatta High School. He studied organ and in his early teens played the organ at his local church. His introduction to the theatre organ took place at the Roxy Theatre Parramatta, and he fell in love with the magnificent 3 manual Christie organ which was such a feature of the theatre in those golden days.

Although he never became a resident organist at the Roxy, he made many apperances there, usually as a featured guest artist in conjunction with the resident organist. Des Tanner. The appearances, usually for a one or two week season, found Wilbur at the console of the Christie, whilst Des Tanner was on stage playing either piano, violin or piano-accordion, for he was equally expert on all of them. Around 1939 Wilbur became resident at the Hammond organ installation of the Savoy Theatre, New Lambton, Newcastle where his six months contract was renewed several times, culminating in a five year contract.

called up for wartime service, he was stationed in the Newcastle area, and when the newly built Century Theatre Broadmeadow was opened Wilbur was the organist playing there each weekend plus every night during the week when he could obtain a leave pass. The Hammond organ in this theatre was mounted on a very "art decor" dais which was on rather obvious wheels - it was wheeled onto centre stage whilst the front curtain was closed, a stage manoeuvre carried out by a stage hand in seconds. It was therefore inevitable that Wilbur was affectionately referred to as "Ben Hur and his chariot." During his days at the Savoy Theatre New Lambton, he made no less than eight "live" broadcasts each week - four in the 8.15am time slot and four around 6.30pm before the National news broadcats, which, during the war years, emanated from the ABC and were relayed to all commercial radio stations who were compelled to accept the relay.

After the war, Wilbur came back to Sydney and became staff organist at Radio 2CH for several years. One of the big shows he did on that station was the high-rating "Stars Of The Services" which was compared by Joan Read. Whilst still with 2CH he became resident organist of the Vogue Theatre Double Bay, on a Hammond organ set half way up the proscenium arch in an elaborately conceived niche, and simultaneously held the position of organist at the huge Trocadero Ballroom. Many times have I been with him at the VogueTheatre, and as soon as he had finished his 12 minute feature spot, we would dash to the Trocadero Ballroom in George Street City, for Wilbur to play his 20 minutes of dance tempo music, whilst the big stage band took a break. We would then race back to the Vogue Theatre whilst Wilbur played the interval music, followed by another mad rush back to the

Trocadero for him to play his second 20 minuteson the organ there. This usually occurred around 10.30pm. The three engagements of radio, theatre and Sydney's largest Ballroom made Wilbur a very busy boy indeed.

Between his radio 2CH days and the time he joined 2GB as Musical Director, he had many appearances on the ABC (both in solo organ work and with his trio formed for just such broadcasts), as well as a considerable amount of free lance work which took him into the studios of both 2KY and 2UE where he provided suitable eerie music for the spine-chilling episodes of UE's "Inner Sanctum".

It was during his days at Radio 2GB, as Musical Director for the fabulous Jack Davey shows, that Wilbur became a Nationally known artist. His name was a household word and such was his fame that a personal appearance by him was certain of a sell-out house. He toured Australia many times with the Jack Davey shows, which genial Jack liked to periodically record in other cities rather than to always have them emanate from the Macquarie Auditorium.

Around the early 1950's, many famous overseas artists were discovering that there was big money to be made appearing in Australia and the "trek" to "down under" began in ernest. Most of these shows were held in boxing stadiums or open air sportsgrounds as the fees demanded by these artists could not be met from conventional theatre's takings, even those with a capacity of 3000 or more. As well as their stadium show profits, huge fees were paid by Radioland for the artists to "guest spot" on the top radio shows of the day - this of course, was before the advent of TV, and in this capacity Wilbur played for the world's top-liners. Among those he played for were, Bob Hope, Larry Adler, Betty Hutton, Nat King Cole, Anne Ziegler & Webster Booth, Peter Dawson, Louis Armstrong, Gladys Moncrief, Donald Peers, George Formby, Joe E. Brown, Allan Jones and Strella Wilson just to name a few.

The advent of TV to Australia found Wilbur moving to Brisbane where he became Musical Director for one of the TV stations. He later joined Channel O Brisbane in the same capacity, and was featured regularly in many shows of all kinds - some of these were seen nationally. He was also featured on a Hammond at a plush Brisbane restaurant providing the most delightful dinner music this writer has heard. It was in Brisbane that he decided that his musical knowledge and vast professional experience should be used to teach the organ as well as to perhaps inspire those whom he taught, and he began accepting pupils, of whom there was no lack. Strangely, it was one of his early morning pupils on the morning of 9th February, who, on being unable to gain admittance to the Kentwell apartment, called the police, who entered and found that Wilbur had been dead for some time.

It was unfortunate that the March edition of TOSA News reported that Wilbur had been resident organist at the Brisbane Regent Theatre for many years, where he became known as "the poet of the organ". From my knowledge, Wilbur was never resident at the Wurlitzer of Hoyt's Regent Theatre Brisbane, nor have I ever heard him described as the "poet of the organ" - this title belongs to Jesse Crawford, and has done so for many years. However, during one of the Warana Festivals in Brisbane, Wilbur did play an electronic organ in the foyer of the Regent Theatre. The following year he played an electronic organ which had been placed on the orchestra lift of the theatre

for some special feature of the year's Warana Festival, but I repeat, Wilbur was never resident organist at the Regent Theatre Brisbane on its mighty Wurlitzer theatre pipe organ.

In 1970, I arranged with Wilbur to come to Sydney and appear in concert on our Marrickville Town Hall Wurlitzer, and I journeyed to Brisbane to finalise arrangements on behalf of TOSA and also to travel back to Sydney with him by car. Wilbur was in an effervescent mood all the way down, and it was a happy and memorable journey - one I shall never forget.

With his usual flair for doing something different, Wilbur had conceived a brilliant idea for his first concert for the NSW Division of TOSA. As our organ came from the lovely old Prince Edward Theatre he decided that he would play some music of a song from every film which had ever been screened at the Prince Edward in its forty-odd years as a cinema. The amount of research done by Wilbur to carry out this mammoth undertaking was astronomical, but the length of the programme became around four hours or more, so the pruning knife had to be produced. Even so, the "ooh's and aah's" of the audience as each nostalgic song evoked happy memories, was something never to be forgotten. This concert was an official part of Sydney's Captain Cook Bi-Centenary Celebrations held that year.

Wilbur had a most remarkable knowledge of the era of the big "Hollywood Musicals", and could tell you who wrote the song, who sang it, who conducted the orchestra, who produced and directed it, and even who arranged the music, such was his utterly fantastic knowledge of film music.

During his long career Wilbur made many LP records and is probably the most recorded Australian artist. Years ago Wilbur gave me many of the Master Test Records (i.e. the first one pressed) that he had kept. These records in plain cardboard covers and just a white label with the title and other credits written on by hand are to me quite priceless, recalling memories of many happy times.

On Friday 13th February, at the funeral service, some 200 friends and fans heard Neil Jensen, one of Wilbur's former pupils play the church organ for this sad occasion. His passing has left us the poorer by the loss of his warm and friendly personality, his great gift of music, and his fierce pride in the talents of Australian musicians. These things we cannot replace.

Alas, THE SONG IS ENDED BUT THE MELODY LINGERS ON, AU REVOIR WILBUR.

JACK PENN HUGHES.

Noted organist, Mr. Jack Penn Hughes passed away on March 11th, 1981 at St. George Hospital.

Jack Penn Hughes had been an organist, choirmaster and pianist from the early age of 14 years. He had lived in Sydney all his life with the exception of 3yrs in Adelaide and 1 yr in London, where he played in Brickstone, Wolverhampton and Liverpool. On his return to Sydney in 1948 he joined Hoyts Theatres playing in many of Sydney's well known Theatres. He built a pipe organ in his home at Bexley where he regularly held musical evenings. He sold the organ to a person in Darwin from which it was removed one month prior to the event of cyclone Tracy, and now belongs to the South Australian Division of TOSA and is presently being restored. Jack Penn Hughes will be sadly missed by his family and many friends.
