





CONVENTION ARTISTS Chris McPHEE

Chris McPhee began learning electronic organ in Adelaide at the age of 9, studying through the Australian Guild of Music and Speech.

His natural ability combined with hard work and enthusiasm gained him the Associate Diploma of Electronic Organ with Honours, as well as places in many competitions, talent quests and National Awards from AGMS. In 1990 he achieved full marks for his Matriculation Music (Performance and Theory) and in 1992 was the winner of the Royal School of Church Music's Scholarship.

He is a church organist as well as a rostered house organist for film shows at Adelaide's Capri Theatre, and a part time organist for a commercial undertaking. Last year he released his first commercial tape, Introducing Chris McPhee, recorded on a Lowrey Heritage electronic organ and his efforts were widely acclaimed.

Chris is in the enviable position of having the WurliTzer in the Capri Theatre, Goodwood, S.A., as his homebase instrument. The availability of such a fine instrument and the opportunity to play it regularly for film shows has done much to aid Chris' development. Chris

also has the honour of being the Vice-Patron of the Electronic Organ Club of South Australia.

In 1992 he visited the USA on a concert and study trip, where he spent a month under the tutelage of the brilliant musician, organist and teacher, Jonas Nordwell.

Probably his greatest achievement so far is the winning of the senior section of the 1993 Young Theatre Organist Competition conducted by the American Theatre Organ Society, as well as being declared the Overall Winner of the whole competition, which includes entrants from England, Canada, America and Australia. His \$3,000 prize included a trip to the USA in July, 1993, to play at the ATOS Convention in Chicago, where he took part in a concert at the 3/17 Barton organ in Chicago's Patio Theatre and was presented with his award. He was invited back last year to play at their 1994 Convention, which was held in Fresno, California.

Chris has recently played in Brisbane, Melbourne, Adelaide, Ballarat and Sydney. Avid TOSA Conventioneers will have heard Chris at the 1989 Perth Convention, when as a 15 year old he shared the stage with

Ballarat's Sean Dunwoodie, and at the 1993 Adelaide Convention, when this 19 year old's brilliant technique and sensitive interpretation were the exciting surprise of the whole Convention.

In September, 1993 Chris joined the ranks of duettists privileged to perform in tandem with the piano talents of Tony Fenelon at the Capri, Adelaide. They played to an ecstatic full house there and received a similar welcome at the Orion in December, 1993, when Tony introduced Chris to Sydney audiences for the first time.

These achievements and his stunning ability, combined with the warm, engaging personality which Chris unassumingly displays during his performances, provide the ingredients for a truly superb concert from this rising young star.

Chris has just released a new CD, called Concert Hits, recorded on our Orion WurliTzer. Our Record Bar will be happy to sell you a CD copy for \$25, or \$15 for a cassette. Chris has the honour of giving a sneak preview of the Marrickville WurliTzer before its official re-opening by Tony Fenelon on Sunday, 5th May.

Cliff Bingham

Cliff Bingham began classical organ studies in 1962 at St Matthew's Anglican Church, Manly. In 1964, his last year at school, he was featured organ soloist at the Festival of School Instrumental Music in the Sydney Town Hall, the first of many occasions on which he would feature at the magnificent 5-manual William Hill Organ.

Cliff joined the NSW Division of TOSA in 1962 and, with a natural flair for rhythm and registration, was soon featured at Society meetings at the State and Capitol Theatres' organs. Since then, he has played numerous concerts for TOSA in all Australian States, on both pipe and electronic organs.

In more recent years, Cliff has acted as consultant on several church pipe organ rebuilds in **Sydney**, the most notable being the fine 26-rank organ in the **East Lindfield** Baptist Church, where he was organist for 12 years. He was also involved in the restoration of the beautiful **Christie** organ in **Epping** Baptist Church, playing at its reopening during the 1985 TOSA **National Convention** and at an afternoon recital for the official rededication several months later.

In December 1981, Cliff was appointed organist for the annual "Christmas at the Opera House" thus succeeding the late Wilbur Kentwell. He was also the first organist to feature the Opera House organ on record when he recorded music for the soundtrack of the film, "Breaker Morant". He has also played many popular lunchtime recitals at the Sydney Opera

House.

Cliff is the manager of the church organ division of one of Australia's leading musical importers. He is married with four children and, apart from his music, he enjoys water skiing and motor racing, the latter strictly as a spectator.

In recent times Cliff has played, amongst others, ACT TOSA's Compton in Albert Hall, Canberra, Perth's Karrinyup Centre WurliTzer, Auckland's Hollywood Theatre's WurliTzer, and, most recently, was part of Adelaide's National Convention last year when he played the newly-installed Walker organ in the Adelaide Town Hall. Cliff is currently the President of the NSW Division of TOSA.

Bill Schumacher

From a young age, Bill had the ability to play tunes on the keyboard "by ear". When he was 7 years old Bill had piano accordion lessons for a 2 year period.

On leaving school Bill studied modern piano techniques for some 4 years. Noted Sydney organist and teacher, Eric Smith was Bill's tutor for popular and classical organ for 5 years.

Twice, Bill has won the popular organ section of the City of Sydney Eisteddfod. More recently Bill has completed a course by correspondence with the Dick Grove Modern Harmony School in Los Angeles.

The Hammond Organ Club was formed in Sydney during the 1960's and Bill was one of the foundation members, also serving several terms as Musical Director. During this time the first all-Gershwin programme ever played in Australia was presented in the Concert Hall at the NSW State

Conservatorium and Bill was one of the featured artists.

Bill is well known for both piano and organ playing in restaurants. He was organist at the Hawkesbury Inn for some 10 years and had a 4 year season at the Burning Log Restaurant in Dural. During this engagement at the Burning Log Bill worked as a soloist and also as part of the resident band. Many notable personalities appeared at the Burning Log, including Toni Lammond, Gordon Boyd, and Neil Williams, all working there to Bill's stylish accompaniment.

Shortly after the formation of the NSW Division of TOSA, Bill became a member of the Society and has appeared in concert many times for TOSA on the WurliTzers in Sydney's State Theatre, Prince Edward Theatre, and Capitol Theatre, and also at the relocated organs in the Orion Centre and in Marrickville Town Hall.

He has also given interstate concerts

at the Dendy Theatre, Melbourne, and the Capri Theatre, Adelaide.

During several visits to the USA, Bill has played a recital for the Puget Sound Chapter of the American Theatre Organ Society, and has been guest artist at the Pizza and Pipes Restaurant in Seattle.

Bill considers himself fortunate to have visited and played some major US theatre pipe organ installations, including Seattle and Portland Paramount, San Gabriel Civic Auditorium, the Kern residence, Detroit Fox and both Portland and Denver's Organ Grinder Restaurants.

Every TOSA concert usually finds Bill working indefatigably for many hours on the technical side of things controlling the setting up of the live sound system and the tape-recording of each concert. This time we will have the pleasure of appreciating his other talents - his musical entertainment skills at the console.

NEIL JENSEN

Neil Jensen is undoubtedly one of the most exciting Australian talents to emerge on the international theatre organ scene in recent years.

Resident organist at the Hayden Orpheum Picture Palace, he is an accomplished musician, adept at playing a wide range of theatre organ numbers. His repertoire extends from American pop tunes and standards to classical music - and in between he sprinkles tangos, rags and contemporary music.

Neil, who is of Scandinavian descent, always displays a bright, magnetic and energetic stage personality. He made his theatre organ début in the Brisbane Town Hall, at the age of 18.

His ability and dedication to the instrument quickly brought him recognition and the chance to tour Australia and New Zealand, performing theatre organ programs.

In 1983, Neil was invited to tour Canada, the United States and New Zealand, visiting more than 30 cities. To coincide with this tour he released his record Neil Jensen Australia-Wide. A second international concert was

organised in 1985 and again on the strength of its success a second record, *Neil Jensen Concepts*, was released. He has now made a total of 6 records.

In November 1987, on his return from his fifth international tour which included England and Wales as well as the USA, Neil was invited by entrepreneur and television personality Mike Walsh to become resident Musical Director at his Cremorne Orpheum, which was in the process of being restored to its original Art Deco opulence. This massive multi-million dollar restoration included the installation of a 1924 "Mighty WurliTzer Pipe Organ", which was originally installed in the Wilson Theatre in Fresno, California. Since then Neil's appearances at the Orpheum have entertained hundreds of thousands of patrons annually. His high public profile has certainly exposed thousands of Australians to the magic of theatre organ music. As well as enjoying Neil's cameo performances which precede selected screenings on Tuesday, Friday, Saturday and Sunday evenings, Orpheum audiences have also been treated to a "sell-out" series of Silent

Film Classics, such as Charlie Chaplin's The Gold Rush and The Kid, and Phantom of the Opera. For these films Neil has skilfully arranged, composed and performed the live accompaniment score.

Neil promotes and produces a yearly Theatre Organ Series at the Orpheum, which attracts capacity houses. He has also appeared with the Yellow Rolls Royce, a distinctive 30's style band, as well as in his own show, The Organ, The Dance-band and Me.

In 1993, Neil was invited by the Cinema Organ Society of the UK to perform as a special guest artist in their 40th Anniversary Theatre Organ Festival.

A gifted all round musician, Neil Jensen has an innovative approach to keyboard styling. His knowledge of modern hi-tech, computerised techniques combine with his traditional musical talent to produce his individual and distinctive sound.

Last year Neil celebrated his 21st year of professional theatre organ playing and played a very well received concert at the Orion. His latest CD was recorded on the Orion WurliTzer.

The YELLOW ROLLS ROYCE ORCHESTRA

The Yellow Rolls Royce Dance Orchestra was formed in 1987 by Phillip Sametz and John Godfrey. The purpose of this unique band was, and still is, to explore the music of the so-called "Dance Band Era", also known as the "Swing Era".

The bulk of the repertoire therefore

comes from the 1930's and 1940's, in the original orchestrations featured by the great bands of those times.

Of the bands taking part in the 1990's swing revival here in **Sydney**, **The Yellow Rolls Royce** has its own special place by virtue of its extensive repertoire and also its great line-up of

talent. Complementing the reeds, brass and rhythm sections usually found in the "Swing" or "Big" bands, The Yellow Rolls Royce features a string section which gives this orchestra a unique sheen to its sound.

The orchestra leader and vocalist is **Phillip Sametz**.

DAVID DRURY

David Drury was born in 1961 in Coolamon, NSW. He gained his B. Mus. Degree in Organ Performance from the NSW State Conservatorium in 1984. At that time he played the Poulenc Organ Concerto with the Elizabethan Sydney Orchestra in the Sydney Opera House. He also worked with the Sydney Symphony Orchestra, as well as appearing as soloist in the Sydney Youth Orchestra Prom in 1983.

David has been a prizewinner in a number of competitions - Brisbane Pipe Organ Prize (1983), Wollongong Organ Competition (1984), English Organ Festival, London (1985). In 1987 he became the first Australian to win the coveted "Tournemire Prize" for improvisation at the St Albans International Organ Competition (1988).

He was awarded the "Vasanta" Scholarship for overseas study and subsequently went to London to work with David Sanger, Professor of Music at the Royal Academy of Music. During his 3 years in Europe, David was much in demand as a counter-tenor and choral accompanist, and gave many recitals on well-known organs, including St Paul's and Westminster Cathedral in London and Notre Dame in Paris. Also during this time he earned the Associate Diploma in Organ and the Choir-Training Diploma from the Royal College of Organists.

In the United States, he has toured as a recitalist, tutor, accompanist and choral director. He has also given Masterclasses and performed on US radio and television.

Since his return to Australia in

1987, David Drury has appeared at the Melbourne International Festival of Organ and Harpsicord, the Sydney Opera House, the Sydney Town Hall and has broadcast for the ABC and other FM radio stations. He is organist at Christ Church St Laurence, Sydney. He continues to travel regularly to give concerts in the USA, the UK and on the Continent.

During 1990, David made the first compact disc to be recorded on the Sydney Town Hall organ. This CD was released by the ABC to mark the centenary of the 1890 William Hill and Son organ.

David Drury's repertoire reflects his special interest in 19th and 20th Century French and English organ music. Improvisation is often a feature of his concert programmes.

SYDNEY TOWN HALL

Opened in 1890 as the largest and finest concert organ in the world, the historic William Hill and Son instrument continues to thrill thousands of listeners each year. With its majestic tone, its splendid front case and its famous and rare 64' pedal stop, the Sydney Town Hall organ has become one of the best known musical instruments in the world.

The organ with its 5 manuals and nearly 150 stops was first played in public on 9th August, 1890 by British organist W.T. Best. Not only was it the largest organ in the world but it was also heralded as one of the technical and musical triumphs of the time. Yet during the 1950's and 1960's, criticism of the organ's tone and mechanism became increasingly sharp and public. There were 2 problems - the tone of the organ had become "old-fashioned",

with critics more likely to refer to it, not as "the grandest concert organ in the world", but as "one of the ugliest Victorian monstrosities ever created"; and secondly, it had deteriorated with the ravages of time, its mechanism was tired and worn, its wind system faulty and many of its pipes were partially clogged with dirt. The Sydney City Council decided in 1973 to restore the Grand Organ, as near as practicable, to its original state.

Between 1973 and 1982, the gigantic pipe organ in Sydney Town Hall was restored by the Sydney organ building firm, Roger H. Pogson Pty Ltd. As the restoration progressed and the condition of the organ improved, so faith in the instrument grew as its unique and beautiful musical qualities became ever more evident. The organ again came to be regarded, not as a

loathsome brother of the Baroque organ, but as a rather splendid and authentic member of the Romantic organ family.

The Grand Organ, set in the splendour of the refurbished Town Hall, is now an object of world-wide acclaim and is visited by many international organists. Even more importantly, the organ is now heard regularly, not only in civic and private functions, but through concerts, particularly those organised by the City Council and performed primarily by the City's own organist, Robert Ampt, from whose writings these notes have been adapted.

The organ contains 9,000 pipes ranging in length from 19.5 metres to 2.5 centimetres, and is famous for its unusual 64' Contra Trombone.

JOHN GIACCHI

At the relatively young age of 26, John Giacchi from Cronulla has already achieved considerable success in his theatre organ career. Having commenced electronic organ studies at 12 years of age, John was awarded, just a few years later, first place in the Classical category and second place in the Popular category of the Sydney Eisteddfod.

In that same year, John made his theatre organ début on TOSA's 2/11 WurliTzer installed in the Marrickville Town Hall. His performance was highly acclaimed and since then John has made a number of other appearances for the TOSA NSW Division and interstate.

In 1988, TOSA NSW sponsored a competition to compose a piece of music appropriate to the Bicentenary and John achieved first place with his entry. As a result he was invited to play his composition, called *Opus* '88, on

the 5-manual Hill and Son pipe organ in Sydney Town Hall.

With an intense interest in the technical side of theatre organ, John was a member of the project team who rebuilt the Capitol Theatre WurliTzer and installed it in the Orion Centre, seeing the project from its initial stages through until the opening concert in 1988.

The 1990 international Young Organists' Competition, sponsored by the American Theatre Organ Society, saw John become the first Australian to be awarded first place in the Senior Division (19-21 years). In 1991, as part of his prize, he travelled to the annual ATOS Convention in Indianapolis, USA, to play a solo spot as part of Barry Baker's concert on the 3/26 WurliTzer installed in the Manual High School Auditorium in front of 800 enthusiastic conventioneers. While in the USA, he also played the 4/27

WurliTzer in the Oakland Paramount Theatre, the famous 4/21 WurliTzer in the Castro Theatre and many other installations

He was highly praised for his February 1991 performance in Victoria at the 3/15 WurliTzer in the Dendy Theatre, Brighton and has played both interstate and overseas engagements, always to high acclaim.

At Sydney's 1991 National Convention, John played a memorable concert with Margaret Hall on the Christie Theatre Organ in the Epping Baptist Church. That convention also marked the release of John's first recording entitled Night Moods, which was recorded on TOSA's 3/17 WurliTzer in the Orion Centre.

In recent years he has been kept busy with his job as a Law Clerk and his studies for his Bachelor of Laws degree from the University of Technology, Sydney.




CURIOSITIES


